A Sergeant assigned to Fort Carson, Colorado, died in a PMV-2 mishap in Fountain, Colorado, at 2340 local. The Soldier was riding his motorcycle when he crashed into a guardrail and was pronounced dead at the scene. He had completed his unit check ride with the battalion motorcycle mentor as well as all required Motorcycle Safety Foundation training. This mishap is under investigation.
