CRIME PREVENTION



Crime Prevention is defined as the anticipation, recognition, and appraisal of a crime risk, and initiation of some action to remove or reduce the risk. Crime prevention is a direct crime control method that applies to before that fact efforts to reduce criminal opportunity, protect potential human victims, and prevent property loss.

Why Do You Need Crime Prevention?



To prevent catastrophic failure (i.e. loss of critical mission essential equipment, personnel, facilities, and negative media).

To protect potential victims or property from criminal acts by anticipating crime possibilities and eliminating or reducing opportunities for the acts to occur.

To discourage potential offenders from committing criminal acts.

To stimulate appropriate crime prevention procedures, attitudes, and behavior.

To save time and money.

Unit Crime Prevention Policies

Secure both private and government property always and avoid situations conducive to crime. Ensure any criminal act(s) observed or suspicious act(s) which might indicate the presence of criminal activity are reported to the Fort Liberty Provost marshal Office and the unit chain of command.

Ensure assigned wall/foot lockers are in serviceable condition. If these security containers are unserviceable, request a secure location to secure valuables until defects are corrected. A request through unit supple will be made to have locks replaced if the keys have been lost or combinations have been compromised.

Personal Property / High Value Items

South of Emergenici start

Record all items of personal property valuing \$100.00 or more on a Personal Property Record (DA Form 4986). Ensure that items listed on the form are verified by a supervisor/witness and the form is signed by the same supervisor/witness prior to returning it to the unit Crime Prevention Officer (CPO) upon completion.

Personal who decline to conduct and inventory, or have nothing to declare, will complete and sign an MFR stating his/her refusal to participate and will have supervisor/witness also sign.



Mark property with "Personal Identification Number." Mark property IAW AR 190-51, Appendix C.

Avoid placing valuables and money in pillows, mattresses, or unsecured nightstands, desk, or lockers.

Refrain from carrying large sums of money (\$100.00) on your person.

Accessibility and Location of Electric Engravers



Electrostatic engravers are located at the unit supply sections and are made available to unit personnel for marking personal property for identification. Property will be marked with "USA (Soldier's last four of SSN)."



Security Measures for Privately Owned Vehicles

All personnel will take the following security measures to prevent larceny of motor vehicles or their contents:

1. Secure all motor vehicles when unattended, regardless of location or time of day.

2. Remove from sight all valuable items left inside of vehicle.

3. Ensure all electronic equipment is permanently mounted inside the vehicle.

POV Parking

Secure POVs when unattended.

Remove valuable items from vehicles.

Permanently mount DVD, CD Players, CB Radios etc in vehicles, if applicable.

Do not store or leave TA 50 in vehicles on or off post IAW FL Reg 190-13-1.

POV Storage for Deployed Soldiers

Family Member Security



Security at Home:

1. Lock your doors and windows. Research shows that more than 60 percent of all burglaries show no sign of forced entry.

- 2. Use automatic timers to turn on lights, radio, or television when not at home.
- 3. Ask a trusted neighbor to watch your home and pick up mail and newspaper when out of town.
- 4. You can also place a temporary stop on mail delivery.
- 5. Trim shrubbery that could conceal criminal activity near doors and windows.
- 6. Outdoor lighting can eliminate hiding places and deter burglars.

Neighborhood Safety:

 Know the route that your children take to and from school. Point out places your child can and can not go along the way.... Include safe places that will have a trusted adult in case of an emergency.
Be alert in the neighborhood. Call the police about anything that seems suspicious and/or out of place.
