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Introduction

In accordance with Stipulation (J.1.a.) of the Amended Programmatic Agreement Among the United States Army, The State Historic Preservation Officer of Kentucky and the State Historic Preservation Officer of Tennessee regarding the Operation, Maintenance, and Development of The Fort Campbell Army Installation at Fort Campbell, Kentucky (Amended December 2015), an annual report of all Army projects and activities carried out on the Kentucky portion of Fort Campbell, and reviewed by the Fort Campbell Cultural Resource Management Program (CRMP) must be submitted to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), Installation Management Command-Atlantic Region (IMCOM-AR), and the Kentucky State Heritage Council offices (KY SHPO). The following report includes a list of projects and activities that have been reviewed for possible effects to historic properties, a determination of those effects, a summary of mitigation and/or treatment measures, and a summary of consultation activities performed by the CRMP in Christian and Trigg Counties, Kentucky.

Planning

Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

Fort Campbell CRMP has finalized the Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan (ICRMP) after input from the KY SHPO in May 2013. The management plan is valid for five (5) years and will be completely updated in 2018. Until that time, the ICRMP will be reviewed yearly. The yearly review of the ICRMP was completed in July 2015. The annual review to the ICRMP included updates to NRHP statuses of identified archaeological sites and a list of project completed by Fort Campbell. The review also included updated contact information for pertinent Fort Campbell personnel, tribal contacts, and preservation office contacts. *Programmatic Agreements*

Fort Campbell has two programmatic agreements for operations that were amended in December 2015 to extend the agreement until December 31, 2016. *Programmatic Agreement Among the United States Army, The State Historic Preservation Officer of Kentucky and the State Historic Preservation Officer of Tennessee regarding the Operation, Maintenance, and Development of The Fort Campbell Army Installation at Fort Campbell, Kentucky* (Effective January, 2009) covers undertakings across the installation. *Programmatic Agreement Between Fort Campbell and the Tennessee State Historic District Office Regarding Development, Construction and Operations at Clarksville Base Historic District* (Effective January, 2009) is for development undertakings within the Clarksville Base Historic District. A separate annual report is submitted for undertakings at Clarksville Base Historic District. These programmatic agreements for operations, maintenance and development are now valid through December 2016. The agreement outlines proper procedure and regulation for managing all undertakings within Christian and Trigg Counties, Kentucky. The CRMP is currently working on a new programmatic agreement for base operations. Fort Campbell will be contacting the KY SHPO to

provide comments and suggestions regarding the development of the new Programmatic Agreement during this one (1) year extension.

Inventory

Overview

Inventory of resources is a requirement under Section 110 of the National Historic Preservation Act. Under stipulations B.4 and B.6 of the *Operations Programmatic Agreement* (OPS PA), the CRMP must conduct a comprehensive inventory of archaeological sites and historic buildings. The CRMP maintains an extensive GIS database to keep track of archaeological sites, historic sites, historic buildings and cemeteries across the installation. This database organizes site information in a format that can be queried for various tasks, such as project review and assessment.

Historic Buildings

Historic Buildings are characterized by being at least 50 years old, or older, from the current year. Therefore, as buildings approach the historic year range, they will need to be evaluated for NRHP eligibility to fulfill requirements of Section 110 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Historic buildings at Fort Campbell include facilities classified as World War II temporary buildings, residences originally constructed as part of the Capehart and Wherry Housing programs (Unaccompanied Personnel Housing) and structures that were used as Cold War weapons and ammunition storage. All of these buildings are more than 50 years old and are considered through nation-wide Program Comments that allows the demolition and alteration of these remaining building types at Fort Campbell.

Architectural Evaluations

In July 2015, a final report entitled *Architectural Survey and Evaluation Two On Post Structures Fort Campbell, Christian County, Kentucky-Final* (Van Steen et al 2015) was sent to the KY SHPO. In a letter dated September 4, 2015, the KY SHPO concurred with Fort Campbell's eligibility determinations of both structures evaluated in the report.

In August 2015, a final report entitled *National Register Evaluation of Eligibility Buildings of Fort Campbell, Kentucky* (Thomason and Associates 2015) was sent to the KY SHPO. As of December 31, 2015, the KY SHPO has yet to respond with comments or concurrence on Fort Campbell's eligibility determinations of structures evaluated in the report.

Several architectural evaluations are currently in progress. Fort Campbell will submit ongoing reports to the TN SHPO upon completion.

Archaeological Investigation

Overview

According to the OPS PA, areas that have been heavily disturbed and/or unsafe for survey are excluded from further archaeological survey. These areas include the Cantonment Area and Impact Areas. Some areas that have been previously inventoried for archaeological resources are being resurveyed due to various oversights and other documentation discrepancies of previous work. As funding allows, more Phase I and Phase II archaeological surveys will continue at Fort Campbell.

Legacy Investigations

In May 2015, a final report entitled *Management Report for the Kentucky Portions of Six Previously Insufficient Archaeological Reports Conducted for the Environmental Division of the Fort Campbell Military Reservation, Kentucky-Tennessee-Final* (Meredith and Mickwee 2014) was sent to the KY SHPO. In letter dated June 15, 2015, the KY SHPO concurred with level of effort for the survey and concurrence with Fort Campbell's eligibility determinations.

Current Investigations

A Phase I archaeological survey is currently under contract with Fort Campbell. Phase I surveys are being completed in both Tennessee and Kentucky by the Louis Berger Group, New South Associates, and ERG. The Phase I fieldwork, by the Louis Berger Group, has been completed and the report is currently in production. Surveys are being performed for initial site and artifact detection for both Historic and Prehistoric archaeological sites. After receiving the draft report for these surveys, the CRMP will be forwarding to the appropriate state SHPO for comments.

Phase II archaeological evaluations are also under contract with Fort Campbell. The Phase II testing will is being performed by New South Associates. After receiving the draft reports for these surveys, the CRMP will be forwarding to the KY SHPO for comments.

Fort Campbell Cultural Resources contract personnel are also undertaking small scale Phase II archaeological surveys. These Phase II surveys will be used to deliver eligibility recommendations to the SHPO on sites that have been recommended as *Potentially Eligible* by previous surveys. Eligibility determinations will be forwarded to the KY SHPO upon completion.

Project Review

National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Review

Fort Campbell primarily uses NEPA review as a clearing house for all projects within the installation. A critical part of the NEPA process is reviewing projects for potential effects to historic properties.

Record of Environmental Consideration (RECs)

The Record of Environmental Consideration (REC) is an Army process for internal review of proposed projects in accordance with NEPA. The REC requires multiple disciplines to review projects to determine and comment on potential impacts.

The CRMP reviewed 97 REC documents in Kentucky, between January 2015 and December 2015. Most frequently, the proposed undertaking is reviewed internally, in accordance with the OPS PA. RECs usually have no effect to historic properties or can be modified, through coordination with the CRMP, by the proponent to avoid effects to historic properties.

According to Stipulation 2.a. of the OPS PA, the FTC-CRO staff may inspect small areas not adequately surveyed for archaeological materials to determine the level of disturbance and the likelihood of any significant archaeological sites are remaining. There were no RECs that were reviewed under stipulation 2.a.

A list of RECs reviewed and finalized by the CRMP is attached. RECs are labeled in fiscal years; therefore, fiscal years 2015-2015 will be listed. All of the REC documents listed in this section were determined to have *No Effect to Historic Properties*.

Individual Section 106 Consultation

Under Stipulation C.2 of the OPS PA, when undertakings are not exclusively reviewed by Fort Campbell personnel, individual Section 106 consultation, per 36 CFR 800, with the KY SHPO must be performed before an undertaking can proceed. When a Section 106 Consultation is completed, it is forwarded to the SHPO for concurrence with the Army effect determination.

The CRMP completed eight (8) formal Section 106 consultations with Kentucky. Eight (8) formal Section 106 consultations for Kentucky were determined to have *No Adverse Effect to Historic Properties* or *No Effect to Historic Properties*. A list of individual Section 106 Consultations completed is attached.

Tennessee One Call

The Tennessee One Call is an automated system to serve as a notification for any underground digging that will occur on the installation, in both Tennessee and Kentucky. This automated system notifies callers of any underground utilities buried within the project area. The CRMP receives automated Tennessee One Calls tickets, via email, referencing geographical locations for review for potential impacts to cultural properties. Most Tennessee One Calls are placed for

repair and/or maintenance to utility lines and television satellite installation. The CRMP reviewed 2,926 Tennessee One Calls in 2015, all of which were determined to have *No Effect to Historic Properties*.

According to Stipulation 2.a. of the OPS PA, the FTC-CRO staff may inspect small areas not surveyed for archaeological materials to determine the level of disturbance and the likelihood of any significant archaeological sites are remaining. One (1) Tennessee One Calls, in Kentucky, were reviewed in accordance with Stipulation 2.a. The results of this fieldwork are located in attachment1 1.

Formal Correspondence

The CRMP also developed formal correspondence packages with the KY SHPO regarding activities not covered through REC documents or Section 106 Consultations. These projects include archaeological survey reports, architectural evaluations, and management documents. A list of correspondence is attached to this report

Parrish House: Inadvertent Discovery

In May and August 2014, Fort Campbell consulted with your office regarding renovations to the Parrish House, a National Register of Historic Places *Eligible* property. On Monday, October 27, 2014, Fort Campbell Cultural Resources Program Manager, Ronald Grayson, M.A., RPA and contract archaeologist Amanda Gill, M.A., RPA performed a walkthrough of the Parrish House to ensure all stipulations from previous Section 106 Consultations were adhered to. The inadvertent discovery is detailed in the document entitled *Inadvertent Discovery: Parrish House Renovations* (sent to the KY SHPO on February 12, 2015.)

In a letter dated May 13, 2015, Fort Campbell notified the KY SHPO offices of several remedial actions regarding the renovations that were completed outside of those discussed in previous Section 106 submissions to the KY SHPO Office. In a letter dated, August 31, 2015, the KY SHPO recommended an Adverse Effect finding for the project. The KY SHPO suggested that to mitigate the Adverse Effect, all original moldings should be repaired and electrical lines should be modified based on preserving as much historic fabric as possible. Fort Campbell is currently preparing a plan and timeline for mitigation activities. Before mitigation actions are implemented, plans and timeline will be sent to the KY SHPO once completed. The KY SHPO will be consulted accordingly during this process.

Scout RECCE Range

On May 31, 2012, the *Memorandum of Agreement Between the United States Army Garrison Fort Campbell and the Kentucky State Historic Preservation Officer Regarding the Development of a Scout RECCE Range at Fort Campbell, Trigg County, Kentucky* was signed by the KY SHPO. This MOA was created in response to the construction of a training range that will have an *Adverse Effect* on historic properties. Portions of this mitigation are currently being completed through Parsons Engineering, and the KY SHPO will be contacted with drafts for review.

Adverse Effect: 15TR257

In March 2013, the KY SHPO and ACHP were notified of an *Adverse Effect* to archaeological site 15TR257. In a letter dated April 25, 2013, the KY SHPO determined that site 15TR257 is Eligible for listing on the NRHP and that the impacts to the site constitute an *Adverse Effect*.

A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) is currently being developed in coordination with the KY SHPO, consulting tribal parties, and consulting public parties. Fort Campbell is in the process of soliciting consulting parties for development of the MOA. Fort Campbell will be contacting the KY SHPO to participate in development of appropriate research design, Phase III data recovery and resulting mitigation measures for the *Adverse Effect*.

Public Outreach

Between January 2015 and December 2015, the CRMP staff has organized and participated in several programs to promote the awareness and stewardship of cultural resources at Fort Campbell. CRMP staff attended Fort Campbell's annual Earth Day in April 2015. The CRMP staff displayed artifacts from the teaching collection and also had mock excavating activities for the public.

In March 2015, Mr. Ronald Grayson, M.A., RPA, Cultural Resources Program Manager, attended the 32nd Annual Kentucky Heritage Council Archaeology Conference. Mr. Grayson participated in the special session entitled "*Rural Historic Archaeology in Kentucky: Best Practices and Future Directions.*"

Conclusion

With the pending update of the Programmatic Agreement and implementation of the ICRMP, the CRMP can foster consistent and appropriate methods for cultural resource management. The CRMP will be coordinating with the TN SHPO on Programmatic Agreement updates and ongoing archaeological investigation. The Fort Campbell Cultural Resource Management Program hopes for continued improvement and efficiency in the management of cultural properties within the installation boundaries.
