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Introduction

In accordance with Stipulation (J.1.a.) of the Amended Programmatic Agreement Among the United States Army, The State Historic Preservation Officer of Kentucky and the State Historic Preservation Officer of Tennessee regarding the Operation, Maintenance, and Development of The Fort Campbell Army Installation at Fort Campbell, Kentucky (Amended December 2018), an annual report of all Army projects and activities carried out on the Tennessee portion of Fort Campbell, and reviewed by the Fort Campbell Cultural Resource Management Program (CRMP) must be submitted to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), Installation Management Command-Readiness (IMCOM), and the Tennessee State Historic Preservation Office (TN SHPO). The following report includes a list of projects and activities that have been reviewed for possible effects to historic properties, a determination of those effects, a summary of mitigation and/or treatment measures, and a summary of consultation activities performed by the CRMP in Montgomery and Stewart Counties, Tennessee.

Planning

Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

Fort Campbell CRMP has finalized the Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan (ICRMP) after input from the TN SHPO Tribes and Public in May 2013. Fort Campbell will be completely updating the ICRMP to incorporate updated review procedures upon signature of a new Programmatic Agreement with both states and ACHP. The new Programmatic Agreement is expected to be finalized within the 2019 calendar year. Until that time, the ICRMP will be reviewed and updated annually. The yearly review of the ICRMP was completed in December 2018. The annual review of the ICRMP included updates to NRHP statuses of identified archaeological sites and a list of projects completed by Fort Campbell. The review also included updated contact information for pertinent Fort Campbell personnel, tribal contacts, and preservation office contacts. The annual update is uploaded on the public Fort Campbell Cultural Resources website.

Programmatic Agreements

Fort Campbell has two programmatic agreements for operations that were amended in December 2018 to extend the agreement until December 31, 2019. *Programmatic Agreement Among the United States Army, The State Historic Preservation Officer of Kentucky and the State Historic Preservation Officer of Tennessee regarding the Operation, Maintenance, and Development of The Fort Campbell Army Installation at Fort Campbell, Kentucky* (Effective January, 2009) covers undertakings across the installation. The programmatic agreement for operations, maintenance, and development are now valid through December 2019. The agreement outlines proper procedures and regulations for managing all undertakings within Montgomery and Stewart Counties, Tennessee. The CRMP is currently developing a new programmatic agreement for base operations which will incorporate management of the Clarksville Base Historic District. Fort Campbell has already begun coordinating with the Tennessee SHPO, Kentucky SHPO, and ACHP to provide comments and suggestions regarding the development of a new Programmatic Agreement. *Programmatic Agreement Between Fort Campbell and the Tennessee State Historic Preservation Office Regarding Development, Construction and*

Operations at Clarksville Base Historic District (Effective January, 2009) is for development undertakings within the Clarksville Base Historic District in Tennessee. A separate annual report is submitted for undertakings at Clarksville Base Historic District to the TN SHPO.

Staffing

In July, 2018, Installation Management Command (IMCOM) Readiness Director disapproved a new contract providing on-site Cultural Resources services at Fort Campbell. The Director determined that the contract violated Title 10, Section 2461 of U.S. Code prohibiting converting functions designated for performance by DoD civilians to contractors. The contract supplying three (3) Secretary of the Interior (SOI) qualified Archaeologists to complete the majority of the requirements in this Programmatic Agreement ended on September 12, 2018. Fort Campbell has created and filled a new permanent Government position to help meet the workload requirements. This position was filled by Ms. Nicole Sorensen-Mutchie on January 22, 2019. Ms. Sorensen-Mutchie's Curriculum Vitae (CV) can be found in Attachment X. The CV's of the previous Contract Personnel who worked at the installation until September are also included in Attachment X. Fort Campbell is currently working to establish a Cooperative Agreement with Colorado State University to supplement the government personnel.

Inventory

Overview

Inventory of resources is a requirement under Section 110 of the National Historic Preservation Act. Under stipulations B.4 and B.6 of the *Operations Programmatic Agreement* (OPS PA), the CRMP must conduct a comprehensive inventory of archaeological sites and historic buildings on the installation. The CRMP maintains an extensive GIS database to keep track of archaeological sites, historic sites, historic buildings, and cemeteries across the installation. This database organizes site information in a format that can be queried for various tasks, such as project review and assessment. This database is made available to researchers in accordance with distribution requirements stipulated in the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (1979).

Historic Buildings

The majority of Historic Buildings are characterized by being at least 50 years old, or older, from the current year. Therefore, as buildings approach the historic year range, they will need to be evaluated for NRHP eligibility to fulfill requirements of Section 110 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Historic buildings at Fort Campbell include facilities classified as World War II temporary buildings, residences originally constructed as part of the Capehart and Wherry Housing programs Unaccompanied Personnel Housing, and structures that were used as Cold War weapons and ammunition storage. All of these buildings are more than 50 years old and are considered through nation-wide Program Comments that allows the demolition and alteration of these remaining building types at Fort Campbell. All buildings on the installation will be assessed for eligibility for listing in the NRHP as they reach 50 years of age as funds allow.

Architectural Evaluations

There were no architectural evaluations completed at Fort Campbell during the reporting year. Any architectural evaluations that are completed within the 2019 calendar year will be submitted to the TN SHPO upon completion.

Archaeological Investigation

Overview

According to the OPS PA, areas that have been heavily disturbed and/or unsafe for survey are excluded from further archaeological survey. These areas include the Cantonment Area and Impact Areas. Some areas that have been previously inventoried for archaeological resources are being resurveyed due to various oversights and other documentation discrepancies of previous work. As funding is made available, more Phase I archaeological surveys and Phase II evaluations will continue at Fort Campbell.

New Contracted Phase I Surveys and Phase II Site Evaluations

A Phase II archaeological evaluation of two (2) sites in Tennessee is currently under contract with Fort Campbell. Phase I surveys are being finalized in both Tennessee and Kentucky by New South Associates. Surveys were performed for initial site and artifact detection for both Historic and Prehistoric archaeological sites. The initial draft reports for these surveys have been provided to each State for comment to incorporate into the final report.

During the calendar year of 2018, two (2) survey reports were sent to the TN SHPO for level of effort for the survey and concurrence with Fort Campbell's eligibility determinations.

In-House Archaeological Survey and Evaluation

Fort Campbell Cultural Resources contract personnel also perform small scale Phase I archaeological survey and Phase II site evaluations. Phase I archaeological surveys are limited to five (5) acres in size, and occur on an as needed basis. These Phase II evaluations will be used to deliver eligibility recommendations to the SHPO on sites that have been recommended as

Potentially Eligible by previous surveys. Survey information and site eligibility determinations will be forwarded to the TN SHPO upon completion.

During the calendar year 2018, no in-house archaeological reports were completed within Tennessee.

Project Review

National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Review

Fort Campbell primarily uses internal NEPA review as a clearing house for all projects within the installation. A critical part of the NEPA process is reviewing projects for potential effects to *Historic Properties*.

Record of Environmental Consideration (RECs)

The Record of Environmental Consideration (REC) is an Army process for internal review of proposed projects in accordance with NEPA. The REC requires multiple disciplines to review projects to determine and comment on potential impacts including to Cultural Resources.

The CRMP reviewed 115 REC documents in Tennessee, between January 2018 and December 2018. Most frequently, the proposed undertaking was reviewed internally, in accordance with the OPS PA. RECs usually have no effect to historic properties or can be modified, through coordination with the CRMP, by the proponent to avoid effects to historic properties. The CRMP completes a *"Cultural Resources Comment Sheet"* for all RECs. Comment sheets describe, in detail, how an effect determination was made. All comment sheets are digitally signed by the Cultural Resources Program Manager. All comment sheets are maintained at Fort Campbell and are available for review upon request.

According to Stipulation 2.a. of the OPS PA, the FTC-CRO staff may inspect small areas not adequately surveyed for archaeological materials to determine the level of disturbance and the likelihood of any significant archaeological sites remaining. No RECs were reviewed in accordance with Stipulation 2.a. in Tennessee during calendar year 2018.

A list of RECs reviewed and finalized by the CRMP is listed in Table 2. RECs are labeled by fiscal years; therefore, fiscal years 2018-2019 will be listed. All of the REC documents listed in this section were determined to have *No Effect to Historic Properties*. RECs that required further Section 106 Consultation are highlighted within the list. One REC was determined to have an *Adverse Effect to Historic Properties* and is detailed separately under Major Projects.

Individual Section 106 Consultation

Under Stipulation C.2 of the OPS PA, when undertakings are not exclusively reviewed by Fort Campbell personnel, an individual Section 106 Consultation, per 36 CFR 800, with the TN SHPO must be performed before an undertaking can proceed. When a Section 106 Consultation is completed, it is forwarded to the SHPO for concurrence with the Army effect determination.

The CRMP completed two (2) formal Section106 consultations with Tennessee. One Section 106 consultations for Tennessee was determined to have *No Adverse Effect to Historic Properties*. One Section 106 consultations for Tennessee was determined to have an *Adverse Effect to Historic Properties*. A list of individual Section 106 Consultations completed is listed in Table 3.

Tennessee One Call

The Tennessee One Call is an automated system that notifies installation personnel of any underground digging that will occur on the installation, in both Tennessee and Kentucky. This automated system notifies callers of any underground utilities buried within the project area. The CRMP receives automated Tennessee One Call tickets, via email, referencing geographical locations for review for potential impacts to cultural resources. The CRMP has 72 hours to respond via the automated system prior to the beginning of the project. Most Tennessee One Calls are placed for repair and/or maintenance to utility lines and satellite television installation. The CRMP reviewed 2035 Tennessee One Calls in 2018, all of which were determined to have *No Effect to Historic Properties*.

According to Stipulation 2.a. of the OPS PA, the FTC-CRO staff may inspect small areas not surveyed for archaeological materials to determine the level of disturbance and the likelihood of any significant archaeological sites are remaining. No Tennessee One Calls, in Tennessee, were reviewed requiring additional fieldwork in accordance with Stipulation 2.a.

Formal Correspondence

The CRMP also developed formal correspondence packages with the TN SHPO regarding activities not covered through REC documents or Section 106 Consultations. Correspondence packages are summarized in Table 4.

Major Projects

Childers House Adverse Effect

A Section 106 Consultation was conducted with the TN SHPO regarding the vacancy of the Childers house due to the expansion of nearby range safety areas in 2014. Fort Campbell determined that the abandonment of the Childers House represented a Demolition by Neglect and constituted an *Adverse Effect to Historic Properties*. In March 2014, the TN SHPO concurred with this determination. Fort Campbell has developed, in coordination with the TN SHPO and invited concurring parties, a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to mitigate the *Adverse Effect*. The TN SHPO signed the MOA in October 2017. Fort Campbell is currently working on completing stipulations outlined in the MOA. The TN SHPO will be contacted accordingly during this process.

NAGPRA Consultation

In 2018 Fort Campbell began the initial steps to complete its Sections 5, 6, and 7 requirements of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA). This effort was facilitated by the St. Louis Corps of Engineers Mandatory Center of Expertise in curation (MCX). The MCX reviewed all known NAGPRA subject materials and remains as well as all suspected materials and remains from the installation. Twelve (12) Federally Recognized Tribes were invited to participate in the NAGPRA process. A formal, in-person, meeting was held on February 21, 2018 at Fort Campbell to discuss and solicit information from the Tribes. Through consultation with the Tribes, Fort Campbell decided that the remains are *Culturally Unidentifiable* in accordance with NAGPRA. The Federal Register notice of the decision, and repatriation of the remains are expected in 2019.

Privatized Housing Programmatic Agreement Amendment

In 2018 the Programmatic Agreement entitled *Programmatic Agreement Among Fort Campbell, Kentucky, Kentucky State Historic Preservation Officer, Tennessee State Historic Preservation Officer and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation for the Privatization of Family Housing at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, was amended to change the areas of responsibility of the privatized Housing partner. The amendment removed the NRHP Eligible Parrish House (5001) from the day to day responsibilities of the housing partner, Campbell Crossing LLC, and returned it to the Fort Campbell Garrison. There were also changes in the overall footprint of the areas managed by Campbell Crossing, none of which contained <i>Historic Properties* or intact archaeological deposits. The amended agreement was filed with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, the Tennessee SHPO, and the Kentucky SHPO on January 25, 2019.

Adverse Effect to Facility 7739, 7740, and 7747, in the Clarksville Base Historic District A Section 106 Consultation was conducted with the TN SHPO regarding the renovation of facilities 7739, 7740, and 7747 within the National Register Eligible Historic District, Clarksville Base. Fort Campbell determined that required renovations would not comply with Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation and would constitute an *Adverse Effect to Historic Properties*. The Tennessee SHPO concurred with this determination in a letter dated March 27, 2018. Fort Campbell has developed, in coordination with the TN SHPO and invited concurring parties, a DRAFT Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to mitigate the Adverse Effect. Once the DRAFT MOA has completed legal review, it will be forwarded to the appropriate signatories for signature.

Actions Not Reviewed by CRMP

Between January 2018 and December 2018, one (1) action was completed by Fort Campbell personnel that did not follow established environmental review procedures. The project would have been reviewed internally, under the OPS PA, and approved by the CRPM as having *No Effect to Historic Properties.* Fort Campbell is continuing to develop internal controls to ensure proper environmental review is completed before all projects are implemented. Additionally, stricter controls are being developed to ensure that work does not exceed previously reviewed project footprints.

Training Area 28 Agricultural Field Training Damage

On April 24, 2018, Dr. Katherine Burnett, Ph.D., RPA of the Fort Campbell Cultural Resources Office (contractor) and Ms. Elizabeth Boren, Fort Campbell Agricultural Lease Program Manager, observed training damage in an agricultural field east of Grant Road and north of Jordan Springs Road in TA 28, in Stewart County, Tennessee. The damage consisted of berms and ditches that were situated in a roughly circular pattern. Mechanical digging of a nearby fire base at Firing Point 28C in TA 28 was approved by the CRMP on March 28, 2018, as part of a dig request. Agricultural fields were clearly marked on the map provided to the military unit as part of that dig request as areas to avoid. The fire base, however, was dug in the agricultural field north of the approved area. Dr. Burnett investigated the area to obtain a GPS boundary around the area of disturbance and to ensure no accidental disturbances to archaeological sites had occurred. No artifacts, features, or other potential Cultural Resources were observed. After identifying where clearing had occurred, the CRPM determined that the area had been adequately surveyed for archaeological resources, and that there were no Historic Properties within the impacted area. There were no archaeological sites or cemeteries impacted by the current clearing. This action was determined to have No Effect to Historic Properties. A summary of the fieldwork completed by the FTC-CRO for the project is located in Attachment 1.

Public Outreach

Between January 2018 and December 2018, the CRMP staff has organized and participated in several programs to promote awareness and stewardship of Cultural Resources at Fort Campbell. These events highlighted stewardship of Cultural Resources on the Installation and commitment of the US Army to preserving these resources.

Current Research in Tennessee Archaeology Annual Meeting

On January 27, 2018, Fort Campbell CRM staff attended the Current Research in Tennessee Archaeology annual conference sponsored by the Tennessee Council for Professional Archaeology at Montgomery Bell State Park. Contract Archaeologist, Ms. Hillary Burt, M.A., RPA, presented a paper at the conference entitled *The Cemeteries of Fort Campbell: An Examination of Rural Burial Practices in the Southern United States in the 19th and 20th Centuries.* The paper utilized existing cemetery data from the installation to make conclusions about settlement and burial patterns in the region.

STEMposium

On March 23, 2018, Fort Campbell CRM staff participated in STEMposium, an event sponsored by the Fort Campbell High School. The annual event brings employers and professionals in the sciences and engineering professions to the High School to promote education and careers in these fields. The CRMP displayed unprovenanced artifacts from the teaching collection as well as the documentary entitled: *The Barrens of Fort Campbell*. CRMP Archaeologists distributed pamphlets about careers in Archaeology and discussed education and training requirements with numerous students.

Earth Day

On April 13, 2018, Fort Campbell CRM staff participated in an Earth Day event held on the installation at Werner Park. The event, sponsored by the Directorate of Public Works (DPW) Environmental Division, was attended by several hundred dependent children from local schools. The CRM staff displayed unprovenanced artifacts from the teaching collection and also had mock excavating activities to demonstrate field techniques for younger students.

TCPA Archaeology Day

On September 9, 2018, Fort Campbell CRM staff participated in Archaeology Day, an event sponsored by the Tennessee Council for Professional Archaeology at Bells Bend State Park. Fort Campbell provided blank, air dry clay discs as a medium to demonstrate precontact ceramic decoration techniques. An official count of participants was not kept, however CRM staff gave out over 400 discs to children.

Daughters of the American Revolution presentation

On September 25, 2018, Mr. Ronald Grayson, M.A., RPA, Fort Campbell Cultural Resources Program Manager, gave a presentation to the Captain William Edmiston Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Clarksville, Tennessee. Mr. Grayson was invited to present to the Chapter by their President. The presentation entitled *Historic Preservation at Fort Campbell: A Basic Overview* provided a background on Historic Preservation legislation as well as some of the unique, significant properties on the Installation. The presentation was part of the organization's monthly meeting and was attend by approximately 30 people. Mr. Grayson presented the Chapter with a DVD of the documentary video *Barrens of Fort Campbell* as well as answered many questions about cemetery management and access.

Clarksville and Montgomery County Retired Teachers Association presentation

On October 18, 2018, Mr. Ronald Grayson, M.A., RPA, Fort Campbell Cultural Resources Program Manager, gave a presentation to the Clarksville and Montgomery county Retired Teachers Association in Clarksville, Tennessee. Mr. Grayson was invited to present to the Association by their President. The presentation entitled *Historic Preservation at Fort Campbell: A Basic Overview* provided a background on Historic Preservation legislation as well as some of the unique significant properties on the Installation. The presentation was a part of the organization's monthly meeting and was attend by approximately 100 people. Clarksville Mayor, the Honorable Kim McMillan was also in attendance.

Clarksville and Montgomery County Historical Society presentation

On November 19, 2018, Mr. Ronald Grayson, M.A., RPA, Fort Campbell Cultural Resources Program Manager, gave a presentation to the Clarksville and Montgomery County Historical Society in Clarksville, Tennessee. Mr. Grayson was invited to present to the Society by their President. The presentation entitled *Historic Preservation at Fort Campbell: A Basic Overview* provided a background on Historic Preservation legislation as well as some of the unique, significant properties on the Installation. The presentation was part of the organization's monthly meeting and was attend by approximately 60 people. Mr. Grayson presented the Society with a DVD of the documentary video *Barrens of Fort Campbell* as well as answered many questions about cemetery management and access.

Public Requests for Cemetery Information and Visits

The Fort Campbell Cultural Resources Management Program periodically receives requests for information regarding cemetery information, genealogy, and cemetery access. Between January 2018 and December 2018, the CRMP staff received a total of eighteen (18) requests for information about cemeteries. A total of thirteen (13) requests were for genealogical, photographic, or other currently available information. Two (2) requests were for descendants to conduct a site visit facilitated by CRMP personnel. A total of three (3) requests were unable to be responded to due to the reduction in staffing from loss of contract personnel in September, 2018.

A prominent site visit occurred on May 8, 2018, involved the Emmy award winning comedian and documentarian W. Kamau Bell, his Mother Janet Cheatham Bell, and a CNN film Crew. The crew was filming a segment for the special *Finding Kamau Bell*, retracing Mr. Bell's family history. The Bell family purchased a small farm in the late 1860's, in Montgomery County, Tennessee. The archaeological remains of the farm house and outbuildings are currently in Training Area 7 on Fort Campbell. CRMP archaeologists provided CNN with historical documents as well as led the crew, the Bells, and representatives of Fort Campbell Public Affairs to the site. The portion of the site visit was incorporated into the program exploring the Bells family history and aired on CNN and CNN online. <u>https://www.cnn.com/2018/06/06/us/unitedshades-ancestry-finding-kamau/index.html</u>

With the pending update of the Programmatic Agreement and implementation of the ICRMP, the CRMP can foster consistent and appropriate methods for Cultural Resources management. The CRMP will be coordinating with the TN SHPO on Programmatic Agreement updates and ongoing archaeological investigations. The Fort Campbell Garrison intends to increase onsite support through a cooperative agreement with Colorado State University in 2019 to have the capability of maintaining a consistent level of Cultural Resources management that has been performed at the installation for over 30 years. The Fort Campbell Cultural Resource Management Program hopes for continued improvement and efficiency in the management of Cultural Resources within the installation boundary.
