- Fort Carson is the home to the 4th Infantry Division, the 10th Special Forces Group, the 1st Space Brigade, and the Army's World Class Athlete Program including five 2024 Olympians. Additionally, Fort Carson is home to twelve additional tenant units, as well as elements from the United States Army Reserve, the Colorado National Guard, the United States Navy and the United States Air Force
- U.S. News & World Report named Colorado Springs as the #3 Best Places to Live in the U.S. in 2024-2025
- Army Times named Fort Carson as the 4th top duty station in the Army
- FCCO is the 3rd largest employer in Colorado (University of Colorado has 36.5K employees, Denver International Airport has 35K and FCCO has 29.5K)
- Fort Carson provides a \$2.55B economic impact annually compared to Colorado \$33.7B for manufacturing, \$3.2B for agriculture /fishing /hunting, \$22B for tourism and \$19.8B for mining (2023 data)
- Winner Department of The Army 2024 Community Partnership Award for partnership with Colorado Springs Utilities
- 2024 Secretary of the Army Environmental Award for Natural Resources Management
- First in the Army to pilot 2023 Installation Climate Resilience Plan

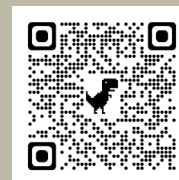
