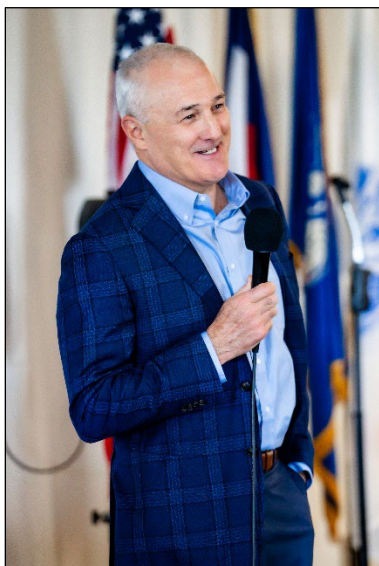


# RMA Army Program Manager Charlie Scharmamm Retires



The Rocky Mountain Arsenal (RMA) celebrated the legacy and career of longtime Army Program Manager Charlie Scharmamm (pictured left) recently, following his retirement on June 30, 2024.

Scharmamm began his service to the RMA program while with the U.S. Army Toxic and Hazardous Materials Agency at Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland. After transferring to Colorado in 1989, he became Program Manager at RMA in May 2000 and assumed leadership of the \$2.1 billion environmental remediation program as part of a unique public-private partnership formed with Shell Oil Co. and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. In this role, he ensured remediation goals were met, stewarded public resources effectively, and built a nationally recognized safety program and performance record.



In honor of Scharmamm's exceptional service, commitment, and integrity, Colonel Sean M. Brown (right), Garrison Commander at Fort Carson, presented him with the Army's Meritorious Civilian Service Medal, as well as a flag flown over the Pentagon on May 14, 2024, in Scharmamm's honor.
