USAG Fort Detrick History

Fort Detrick traces its roots to the small municipal airport known as Detrick Field in the 1930s. The first military presence was the encampment of the 104th Aero Squadron of the Maryland National Guard. It was named Camp Detrick to honor squadron surgeon Maj. Frederick L. Detrick, who served in France during World War I. Detrick Field was a cadet pilot training center until 1941.

Camp Detrick became Fort Detrick in 1956, continuing its mission of biomedical research and its reputation as the world's leading research campus for agents requiring specialty containment. When the nation's offensive biological warfare program was disestablished in 1969, laboratories were closed and a period of transition occurred in the 1970s. Former laboratories and land were transferred to the Department of Health and Human Services and the National Cancer Research and Development Center was established in 1971. and is now called the National Cancer Institute-Frederick.

The installation continues to grow in the scope of its operations and now has an interagency-agency campus that provides opportunities for scientific coordination, education, and partnerships.

Fort Detrick houses all of the military services as well as five cabinet level agencies and has matured as a center for advanced biomedical research and development, medical materiel management, and long-haul telecommunications for the White House, Department of Defense, and other government agencies.

Annexed into the city of Frederick in 1983, Fort Detrick continues to partner with the city on many progressive endeavors that benefit everyone in the community. As the largest employer in Frederick County, Fort Detrick supports over 39,000 active duty, civilians, retirees, and their Families.
