2. This command is committed to the safety and security of all Soldiers and Families. Family violence, in the form of spouse and child abuse, detracts from readiness and our quality of life.

We all share specific responsibilities in preventing abuse, protecting victims and providing appropriate treatment and intervention for offenders.

3. The Family Advocacy Program (FAP) is the Commander's tool for prevention, early identification, prompt reporting and intervention of Family abuse, which is inclusive of intimate partner violence (IPV), child abuse and neglect, and youth problematic sexual behavior in children and youth (PSB-CY). For Soldiers involved in abuse, treatment should be immediate, uninterrupted and continued through completion.

a. Prevention: Supporting Soldiers and Families to prevent abuse is the top priority for the FAP. Marriage enrichment and relationship support is available from Chaplains, Military One Source, Military and Family Life Counselors (MFLC), and FAP Clinical at Basset Army Community Hospital (BACH), as well as other civilian resources. New Parent Support Program (NPSP) home visitors provide professional advice to expectant mothers and fathers and help with the challenges of parenting young children. Involvement of all caregivers is important. Army Community Service (ACS) FAP provides parent support, playgroups, advocacy and life skills education. Commanders should refer Soldiers early to prevent greater problems. For confidential counseling, contact Military One Source, 1-800-342-9647, MFLC, (907) 802-0822/ (907) 616-1688, Chaplains, (907) 873-4397, FAP Clinical BACH, (907) 361-6299, or ACS FAP, (907) 353-7317.

b. Training: Commanders and senior enlisted personnel must attend FAP training within 45 days of assuming command and schedule FAP awareness training for their Soldiers annually. Point of contact for community resources, training and education is ACS FAP Manager, (907) 353-7317.

c. Reporting: The Fort Greely Police Department will serve as the installation's Report Point of Contact (RPOC) at (907) 873-2677 for all incidents of spouse/intimate partner and child abuse. Commanders and leaders must report suspected abuse promptly to the Police Department which also serves as the 24-hour emergency response system capable of investigating abuse and mobilizing resources to protect victims of abuse. Commanders should also coordinate with FAP Clinical, BACH, (907) 361-6299 during office hours (M-F, 0730-1630) or (907) 370-9940/ (907) 496-0915 for after hours and weekends. Commanders should contact victim advocacy services 24/7 at (907) 799-9770. All Soldiers, FAP staff, Child and Youth Services (CYS) employees, law enforcement and healthcare providers are all mandated reporters for child abuse. Child abuse must be reported to the State of Alaska's Office of Children's Services (OCS) at 1-800-478-4444.

d. Investigation: Rights of alleged offenders must also be protected. Reports of abuse will be investigated by law enforcement and/or assessed by FAP Clinical, and in conjunction with civilian agencies as needed. Soldiers suspected of criminal acts should be properly advised of their rights under Article 31(b), Uniform Code Military Justice (UCMJ), before being questioned about suspected or known incidents of abuse. Afterwards, Commanders will direct Soldiers to participate in FAP Clinical assessment. The Provost Marshal Officer (PMO) and Staff Judge Advocate (SJA) will advise Commanders on options available to them, e.g., no contact orders,

military protective orders, emergency shelter, administrative or disciplinary actions when warranted.

e. Victim Safety: Victims have the right to protect themselves and make decisions affecting the welfare of themselves and their children. Adult victims of domestic abuse and sexual assault may opt to make a restricted report of abuse, allowing for access to medical and advocacy services without Command notification or in accordance with (IAW) enforcement investigation. Restricted reports for domestic violence, with limitations (child abuse, self-harm or harm to others) may be accepted only by military healthcare providers (including FAP Clinical Staff), FAP Victim Advocates and the FAP Manager. The FAP Victim Advocates are available 24/7 at (907) 799-9770.

f. Incident Determination Committee (IDC): The multidisciplinary IDC is chaired by the Garrison Commander. The IDC objectively considers disposition and/or recommends treatment on all reports of child and domestic abuse. Commanders or their representatives attend IDC meetings concerning their Soldiers and participate in the determination process. For Soldiers involved in Family violence, treatment should be immediate, uninterrupted and monitored until completion for optimal Family safety and stabilization.

4. The Army's goal is to eliminate domestic and child abuse. Commander involvement is the key to successfully addressing this problem. Please join me in keeping our Soldiers, Families and community safe, healthy and Army strong!

5. This policy supersedes Garrison Policy #23-28, subject: Family Violence, dated 27 October 2023.
