SUBJECT: United States Army Garrison (USAG) Alaska Fort Greely
Commander's Response to Domestic Violence and Abuse Policy #23-08

2. This command is committed to the safety and security of all Soldiers and Families. Domestic violence and abuse detract from readiness and our quality of life. Commanders have a vital role in the coordinated community response to domestic violence and abuse. Commanders are expected to respond to all reports of domestic violence and are encouraged to utilize the resources available within our community. An appropriate response includes, but is not limited to, the requirements listed below.

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3. Domestic violence is defined by the DoDI 6400.06, E2.14 as the use, attempted use, or threatened use of force or violence against a person, or a violation of a lawful order issued for the protection of a person, who is a current or former spouse, a person with whom the abuser shares a child in common, or a current or former intimate partner with whom the abuser shares or has shared a common domicile.

4. Domestic abuse is defined by DoDI 6400.06, E2.13 as domestic violence or a pattern of behavior resulting in emotional/psychological abuse, economic control, and/or interference with personal liberty that is directed toward a person who is a current or former spouse, a person with whom the abuser shares a child in common; or a current or former intimate partner with whom the abuser shares or has shared a common domicile.

5. Pursuant to Title 18 U.S.C. §921(a)(33)(A), domestic violence as applicable to the Lautenberg Amendment is defined as: an offense that involves the use or attempted use of physical force, or the threatened use of a deadly weapon, committed by a current or former spouse, parent, or guardian of the victim; by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common; by a person who is cohabiting with or has cohabited with the victim as a spouse, parent, or guardian; or by a person who was similarly situated to a spouse, parent, or guardian of the victim.

6. After an incident of domestic violence or abuse, if the incident has not been reported to law enforcement, report the incident to the Fort Greely Police Dispatch at (907) 873-2677.

7. Commanders should issue a Military Protective Order (MPO) for a minimum of 72 hours. This "cooling off" period allows the law enforcement and social service agencies time to respond to any safety concerns of the victim and protects all involved in the altercation. Once this verbal order has been given, put the order to paper using the MPO. Issue an MPO (DD Form 2873) and within 24 hours forward a copy of the signed MPO to the victim, Provost Marshal's Office, and Military Justice Advisor. Ascertain if there is a restraining order or "condition of release" order from a civilian court and ensure the Soldier complies with the order.

8. Command will contact the Domestic Abuse Victim Advocate (DAVA) at (907) 799-9770 available 24 hours a day and seven days a week. The Fort Wainwright Family Advocacy and Victim Advocacy Program can be found at 3414 Rhineland Avenue. Soldiers and civilians should feel free to report incidents.

9. Command will notify Family Advocacy Behavioral Health at (907) 353-6299. During non-duty hours, call (907) 496-0915 for the on-call worker to arrange for an assessment. In any alleged incident of domestic violence involving a weapon, injury to a victim, or threat to kill self and/or victim, refer the Soldier to Community Behavioral Health

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Services for an evaluation located in Building 4066 and can be reached at (907) 361-6059/ 6285/6299. Refer to Alcohol Substance Abuse Program if drugs/alcohol were involved in the incident.

10. Commanders that know or have reasonable cause to believe that a Soldier has a qualifying conviction, the commander must consult with their Trial Counsel and take all reasonable action to investigate. A commander at any level may initiate the investigation by ordering the Soldier to complete DD Form 2760. Document the measures taken, the date they were taken and determine if other measures (e.g., command referral to mental health, counseling, etc.) are appropriate. Forward a copy of all documents to the Trial Counsel.

11. The commander must also immediately retrieve all Government issued firearms and ammunition from the Soldier. The Soldier must immediately turn in all privately owned firearms to the unit's arms room. The NCO (with Police assistance) in the grade of E-6 or higher will go to the soldier's home to retrieve any firearms (that need to be secured in the Unit Arms Room) and personal or professional items needed to stay in the barracks for 72 hours. The Soldier will be ordered to have no contact with firearms unless in the course of normal duty.

12. Command will notify the USAG Alaska Victim Witness Liaison through the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate, (907) 406-4304 to ensure the victim has been informed of all rights to assistance through the Victim Witness Assistance Program. National Guard Regional Special Victims' Counsel (980) 395-2917. Ensure the victim has been counseled using DD Form 2701 IAW AR 27-10, chapter 18.

13. Commander or first sergeant will participate in the Case Review Committee (CRC) when their Soldiers are involved in spousal abuse and or child abuse/neglect case. Commanders are required to complete the Decision Tree Algorithm training before attending the CRC and bring the certificate of completion to the CRC. The training can be completed at <https://www.milsuite.mil/book/trainingscenarios/1480>. Command will provide information and learn the disposition of the case and any treatment recommendations the Soldier must complete.

14. Commanders are required to complete a FAP desk-side briefing within 45 days of Assumption of Command. The Family Advocacy Program Manager (FAPM) or Family Advocacy Program Specialist (FAPS) can conduct the desk-side briefing and can be reached at 907-353-7317, FAPM or 907-482-3419, FAPS.

15. Commanders and leaders have the inherent responsibility to respond compassionately, but resolutely, to allegations of domestic abuse and to establish a Command Climate that promotes safety.
