Aloha!


Hawai'i is the 50th state and most recent to join the Union. It is one of the most remote island chains on the globe, and it is located in the middle of the Pacific Ocean.

countless opportunities for Soldiers and their families to make the most of their tour in paradise.







Family Advocacy Program: New Parent Support Program (FAP: NPSP) Expecting a new baby? Already have a small child? NPSP is an early intervention program that works with parents during pregnancy and after baby arrives to help with breastfeeding, infant massage, development, and parenting concerns for children birth thru three years old.

Family Advocacy Program: Prevention, Education & Outreach (FAP-Ed) FAP-Ed provides troop trainings and command briefings. It also hosts Play Mornings, Toon Time Matinees, and voluntary classes in Stress Management, Anger Management, and Couples Communication. FAP-Ed offers parenting classes such as Newborn Care, Scream Free Parenting, 123 Magic, and Parenting 101. FAP-Ed provides outreach tables and resources at Soldier & Family Readiness Group and Steering Committee Meetings by request.

Family Advocacy Program: Victim Advocacy (FAP: VA) You have choices if you are a victim of spousal abuse. Victim Advocates are available to assist and support victims' autonomy by empowering them to make informed decisions relevant to safety and welfare.

Financial Readiness Program (FRP) Build your Financial

Resilience with classes and one-on-one Financial Counseling. The Financial Resilience Series consists of Money Management, Basics of Budgeting, Your Credit Report and Score, Investing & TSP, Home Buying, Car Buying, and Pre/Post Deployment Financial Planning.

Mobilization, Deployment & Stability Support Operations (MDSSO) Classes, interactive workshops,




Survivor Outreach Services (SOS) 371 Brannon Road, Bldg. 663, SB 808-655-8432

TOTAL ARMY SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

A sponsor is a person from your gaining installation who can answer questions about Hawaii and help you before, during, and after your move.

If you haven't been assigned a sponsor, you can request a sponsor through your new unit. Units try to match sponsors and service members by rank and family status. We also recognize that the service member isn't the only one affected by a move so kids can request sponsors, too.

To obtain a sponsor contact the Garrison Sponsorship Coordinator at 808-655-8276 or DSN 312-455-8276 prior to your arrival.

How to Request a Sponsor

Note: This can't be completed until you've received notification from Human Resources Command.

- 1.Log on to https://actnow.army.mil.
- 2. Complete DA Form 5434. In the left column, click the "Messages" dropdown menu, "DA Form 5434."
- 3. Click "Create New Form."
- 4. Fill out all applicable sections (Sections 1, 2, 4 and 5).
- 5. Once complete, your sponsor will be notified.
- 6. You will receive notification in the "Messages" section if your sponsor changes in ACT.

All personnel assigned to Tripler Army Medical Center call 808-433 -9160 to obtain a sponsor.

Your sponsor should meet you at the airport when you arrive. He or she will escort you to the US Army Hawaii Liaison Desk near Baggage Claim 19 to sign in.

If you are not met by your sponsor, you should report to sign-in at the US Army Hawaii Liaison Desk at the Honolulu International Airport located near Baggage Claim 19. You must sign in at the desk in order to begin TLA and in-processing.

The 24-hour CQ contact number is 808-282-0040.

Youth Sponsorship

Youth Sponsors can help your children connect to their new home before they arrive on the island.

A Youth Sponsor can provide an incoming child with information about his or her new school & communities and answer questions before arrival from a youth perspective.

Upon arrival, a Youth Sponsor can meet with your child and arrange community and school tours.

To apply for a Youth Sponsor, please reach out to the School Liaison Office [SLO] at 808-655-8326.

COMMAND SPONSORSHIP

Dependents moving with Service Members to Hawai'i must be Command Sponsored. This means that the installation is able to support the Family Members' basic needs. To qualify for a "With Dependents" tour to Hawai'i, the Soldier must have served for 36 months with 12 months remaining on his or her contract. Exceptions may apply. Command Sponsorship should be secured before

Dependents come to Hawai'i. Command Sponsorship beings the day the application is approved by the Army. It does not begin the day family members arrive in Hawai'i. It enables the Army to pay for flights and appropriate family housing. To receive Command Sponsorship, Dependents must be cleared through the Exceptional Family Member Program. EFMP ensures your family's special medical or educational needs are met before, during, and after your move.

EXCEPTIONAL FAMILY MEMBER PROGRAM

MAIN PROGRAM COMPONENTS

- 1. Identification and enrollment of a family member with special medical or educational needs.
- 2. Assignment coordination to ensure that a family members' needs are able to be met at the new duty station.
- 3. Support to help families find programs and services.

SHIPPING HOUSEHOLD GOODS



The Joint Personal Property Shipping Office at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam handles all processing for temporary storage and/or delivery of your personal property once it arrives on island. You can reach them at 808-473-7760.

Visit https://move.mil/, the Department of Defense's official customer moving portal, for weight limits, timelines, and OCO-NUS tips.

It can take weeks or even months for your personal goods to arrive in Hawaii. Remember, they're crossing the ocean on a boat.

Access the Defense Personal Property System to upload orders and create a shipment. Then, bring your forms to your local Transportation Office to get matched with a moving company. Next, you will get packing & moving dates.

> Remember, everything is being shipped over the Pacific Ocean, and that process takes time.

POV SHIPPING



The Army will ship one POV for your family. If you want to send another car, the cost will come out of pocket and it will need to be scheduled with a private company.

The Surface Deployment and Distribution Command handles all privately owned vehicle shipments. You can schedule and track the status of you vehicle shipment online at:

Schedule as soon as you can. If you are moving during a busy PCS time schedules will fill quickly. Items may take longer to ship and arrive during busy seasons.



TEMPORARY LODGING

Contact the Housing Services Office [HSO] as soon as you receive your orders to Hawai'i. HSO will help you with temporary lodging when you arrive on island, and work with you to start looking for a place to live.

Temporary Lodging Allowance [TLA] is authorized for up to 30 days from the Soldier's sign-in date at the Permanent

Duty Station and should not exceed 60 days. Exceptions may apply.

TLA covers lodging and food while you transition between duty stations.

If you are stationed at Schofield Barracks, Wheeler Army Air Field, or Helemano Military Reservation, you no longer need to secure a statement of non-availability to book accommodations on the economy at an HSO approved property. You must book with the hotel directly and not use an external website.

Vacation rentals, timeshares, MWR cabins, and B&Bs are not authorized for TLA reimbursement.

You will initially pay for the lodging out of pocket as TLA is a reimbursement so please budget accordingly.



mand Sponsored (see page 16) you can book flights through Family Travel to fly to Hawai'i. Expect it to be a long flight. Estimated flight times from the West Coast are over 5 hours. So if you're coming from anywhere East of LA, your flight will be longer.

The airport is not on a military base, so arrange for transportation from the airport to lodging.



YOUR ARRIVAL

Make sure you share all the important information about your flight and needs with your Sponsor and gaining Unit before you arrive on island. Daniel K. Inouye Airport is not located on post. You will need to plan for transportation from the airport to your temporary lodging.











Once you arrive, share your immediate needs regarding the following with your Sponsor:

- Temporary Lodging
- Pet(s) in Quarantine
- Food (you might be hungry when you get off the plane)
- Transportation
- In-Processing Schedule

Make sure to exchange contact information with your Sponsor before you arrive. You should also travel with you unit contact information and emergency contact information.

Provide the following info to your Sponsor



Who? How many family members?

Where? Which airline & flight number?

When? When does the flight arrive?

What? Do you have pets?

How? How much luggage to do you have?

Choose a place to meet your sponsor at the airport!

IN-PROCESSING

Your sponsor should meet you at the airport when you arrive. If you are not met by your sponsor, you should report to sign-in at the US Army Hawaii Liaison Desk at the Honolulu International Airport located near baggage claim 19.

If you do not sign in, you could experience difficulties and delays during your in-processing. You



must sign in at the desk in order to begin TLA and in-processing.

Soldiers are authorized to report in civilian clothes; however, they must be clean-shaven, and in accordance with AR 670-1 (i.e., no piercing, etc.) Soldiers should bring all initial issue uniforms and hand-carry all important documents (i.e., orders, POV shipping information, marriage license, birth certificates, etc.). Airlines sometimes lose baggage for a few days.

Personnel assigned to 25th Infantry Division, 8th Theater Sustainment Command, USAG-HI, 130th Engineers, 8th Military Police, 45th STB, 500th MI, 205th MI, 715th MI will in-process at Schofield Barracks through Replacement Detachment. Barracks and 24-hour CQ 808-282-0040. All other personnel assigned to USARPAC and 8TSC HQ will in-process at Fort Shafter.

In-processing begins the first Monday after you land on island. The only exception is if Monday is a holiday or DONSA, then you would report the first working day of the week.

LODGING & HOUSING

For Soldiers and families relocating to Hawaii, temporary lodging and housing is available both on and off post.

You must report to housing within 7 workdays after your reporting date in Hawaii, even if you do not intend to reside in on post homes. You will receive information on availability of homes and waiting times.

EDUCATION

The Hawaii Public School System falls under one school district and is managed by the Hawaii State Board of Education. There are no DoD Schools in Hawaii. With certain exceptions, all children between the ages of 6 and 18 must attend school. Kindergarten, for which a child must be five years old before July 31th of the school year, is optional.

Hawaii public schools charge a fee for school bus services. Besides public schools, parents have the option of private schools, charter schools, and homeschooling.

The Army School Liaison Office 808-655-8326 can help you make a decision regarding you child's education.

Plan to budget for the school bus.

When a child registers for school in Hawaii for the first time, the following records are required:

- Birth Certificate (baptismal records or a passport is accepted)
- Certificate of Release and Proficiency from the last school attended
- Special Needs students should bring in all IEP documentation
- Proof of Residency (housing papers, utility bill, etc.)

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Moving expenses can add up quickly and the cost of living in Hawai'i is high. Try to budget for your move before you PCS. Remember, TLA is a reimbursement so you will initially need to pay for your lodgings and food out of pocket.

Cost of Living Allowance [COLA] is a non-taxable allowance granted while you are stationed in Hawai'i. It ranges from \$500-1500 a month and is based on rank, time in service, number of dependents, and where you live. The amount of COLA can change from month to month.

Financial classes and counseling are available through Army Community Service.

CHILD CARE

Military families with children ages 4 weeks-5th grade may request child care by visiting MilitaryChildCare.com. This Department of Defense website serves all military families seeking childcare. Families may search for and request care, manage their requests, and update their profile online.

Once your child is on the waitlist, make sure to renew your request every 30 days to stay active.

Child care providers include Child Development Centers, Family Child Care, School Age Centers, and access to military-supported child care options worldwide.

Register as soon as you have orders. Wait lists can be long and depend on your family's priority level. Failure to make an early request could prevent a delay of services when you arrive on island.

Fee-assistance is provided for eligible military families who are unable to access on-post child care. For information on programs offered by Child and Youth Services, to include day care, school age care and teen center programs, visit https://hawaii.armymwr.com/categories/cys-services.



Make sure to register as soon as possible as there are usually wait list for open slots.

PETS

If you plan to bring pets to Hawai'i, begin planning as soon as possible to minimize the time your pet may be required to be quarantined. Hawai'i is rabies free so the state needs to be VERY sure your pet is not infected before it is released on the island.

There is a very specific and time sensitive process to be able to take your pet directly home from the airport. Use the state of Hawai'i's Department of Agriculture's Animal Quarantine website to access checklists and forms:

You will need to complete the AQS-279 and follow all instructions on "Checklist 1— For Direct Airport Release & 5 Days or Less

Program" in order to avoid quarantine. If you do not complete the tasks for Direct Airport Release, your pet could be quarantined for up to 120 days or sent back to the mainland at your expense.

Direct Airport Release Program Requirements

- Pet is microchipped
- Pet is vaccinated for Rabies
- FAVN Rabies antibody test completed
- Waiting period completed
- ASQ-279 pet import form completed
- Health Certificate completed by vet
- Flea & Tick treatment administered by vet
- Pet's paperwork sent to HI to arrive 10+ days before your arrival

RESTRICTED PETS

The following pets & breeds are not permitted on privatized military housing.

Dogs: Pit Bulls, American Staffordshire Bull Terriers, English Staffordshire Bull Terriers, Rottweilers, Doberman Pinchers, Chows and wolf hybrids

Exotic animals such as, but not limited to: reptiles, rodents (other then hamsters & guinea pigs), ferrets, hedgehogs, skunks, rats, raccoons, squirrels, pot bellied pigs monkeys, arachnids, or any farm animal.



Expect to pay a fee of \$185- \$244 to retrieve your pet from the airport animal quarantine station.

There are rules and regulations regarding owning pets in on- post housing. Island Palms Communities homes are pet friendly with a maximum of two pets per family. Certain pet restrictions do apply. There is a one time pet fee per pet upon move in and a one time de-flea charge per household upon move out.

FIREARMS

Personally-owned firearms must be registered with the state of Hawaii **and** either the Schofield Barracks Provost Marshal Office or the Fort Shafter Provost Marshal Office with 72 hours of arrival.

To obtain a Permit to Acquire a Firearm, or to register a firearm, you MUST appear in person at the Honolulu Police Department's Firearms Unit. Office hours are from 7:45 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday excluding holidays.

Out of state registrants need to take firearm(s), in person, to the Main Police Station Firearms Unit no later than 5 Records and Identification Division Firearms Section 801 South Beretania Street Honolulu, Hawaii 96813

calendar days from arrival. Out of state registrants are encouraged to arrive at the Firearms Unit no later than 3:00 pm. The out of state registration process can be lengthy. If there is a line, they may not be able to accommodate you. There is no 14-day waiting period for Out-of-State Registration. You need the following when you register your firearm:

- Background check fee \$43.25 Cash / exact change or Credit Card
- Valid photo identification
- The firearm for inspection (In a gun case, unloaded)

If you were born outside the United States, bring proof of citizenship such as an Original US Passport, Original Naturalization Certificate, Original Born Abroad Certificate, or if you are in the military your Enlisted (ERB) or Officer (ORB) Record Brief will suffice only if the document states you are a United States Citizen.

in prior to coming to the Firearms Section:

- Firearms Information Form
- Medical Information Waiver
- Mental Health Waiver
- Firearms Application/Questionnaire

Married couples who would like to have their firearms jointly registered in both names need to also bring the Original Marriage Certificate.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Can I submit my application to acquire a permit online?No. This feature is not available.

Can I register my guns online?

No. You may start the process by completing the online forms and bringing them to our office for verification along with your firearm if you already have it.

Do I need to Register with HPD every time I want to register a weapon?

Yes. All firearms that require a registration need to be registered with HPD.

If I am a U.S. Citizen but born in another country, do I still need proof of citizenship?

Yes. Need to provide a current U.S. passport, Naturalization, or Born Abroad Certificate. (If the applicant is active military, the Enlisted Record Brief would suffice.)

If I am not available to pick up my permit during the pick -up dates, can I pick it up prior or after?

No. Permits are only available during the pickup dates, which is always the 14th through the 20th day, and includes weekends and holidays.


OCEAN SAFETY TIPS

- 1. Minimize risk by being highly aware and respectful of the dangers of ocean conditions.
- Choose to swim at Hawaii beaches which are lifeguard protected. Also look for rescue station tubes at many beaches.
- 3. Follow Hawaii beach warnings and closures.
- 4. Check with a lifeguard if in any doubt.
- Watch the water carefully for some time before entering in order to look for larger waves appearing in groups.
- 6. Review ocean safety brochures which are provided in visitor accommodations.
- 7. Visit ocean safety websites and the Hawaii Lifeguard Association website. Understand rip currents and how to deal with them.
- Avoid painful jellyfish stings by checking the jellyfish report.
- 9. Don't get caught on wet rocks where unexpected waves can suddenly appear. Also look for hidden underwater rocks at beaches.



HIKING SAFETY TIPS

- 1. Tell someone where you plan to hike or hike with a group.
- 2. Wear bright colors while hiking so you can easily be spotted.
- 3. Stay on the trail and set a "turn back time."
- 4. Bring water and/or a water filtration system.
- 5. Bring a First Aid Kit.
- Wear hiking shoes or boots.
- 7. Know your limits and abilities.
- 8. Research the trail before you go.
- 9. Bring bug repellents and sunscreen.
- 10. Check the weather conditions before you set out!



HAWAIIAN HISTORY

The era of human settlements in the Hawaiian Islands begins sometime between 124 and 1120 AD, when the islands were first settled by Polynesians. Hawaiian civilization was isolated from the rest of the world for at least 500 years.

Europeans led by a British explorer named James Cook arrived in the Hawaiian Islands in 1778. Within five years of Cook's arrival, European military technology helped Kamehameha I conquer and unify the islands for the first time, establishing the Kingdom of Hawaii. The kingdom was prosperous and important for its agriculture and strategic location in the Pacific.

American immigration led by Protestant missionaries began almost immediately after Cook's arrival. Americans set up plantations to grow sugar. Their methods of plantation farming required substantial labor. Waves of permanent immigrants came from Japan, China and the Philippines to work in the fields.

The native population succumbed to disease brought by the Europeans (particularly smallpox), declining from 300,000 in the 1770s to over 60,000 in the 1850s to 24,000 in 1920. Americans within the kingdom government rewrote the constitution, severely curtailing the power of King "David" Kalākaua, and disenfranchising the rights of most Native Hawaiians and Asian citizens to vote through excessively high property and income requirements. This gave a sizeable advantage to plantation owners. Queen Liliuokalani attempted to restore royal powers in 1893, but was placed under house arrest by businessmen with help from the US military.



This government agreed on behalf of Hawaii to join the US in 1898 as the Territory of Hawaii. In 1959 the islands became the state of Hawaii and the 50th state.
