

REQUEST A SPONSOR

The Total Army Sponsorship Program (TASP) is now accessible in Army Career Tacker (ACT) to assist Soldiers, Officers, and DA Civilians during the transition to their new assignment. Commanders now have the ability to guarantee the successful assignment of individuals through the streamlined Sponsorship process found only on ACT. All Soldiers are eligible to receive a sponsor from your gaining unit, however it is mandatory for all E1-E6, WO1-Wo2, and O1-O3. The TASP process is outlined below:

Incoming Soldier:

- Receives ACT system notification to complete DA Form 5434, Sections 1,2,4, and 5
- Receives Sponsorship Notification and Welcome Letter
- Responsible for completing DA Form 5434, Sections 1,2,3 and 5
- Completes Sponsorship Surveys

Sponsor:

- Completes DA Form 5434, Section 3
- Input "Date of Physical Contact" in ACT, only after having physically meeting Incoming Soldier
- Works with Incoming Soldier throughout transition

Unit TASP Coordinator:

- Responsible for identifying local sponsors
- Sends ACT system notification and Welcome Letter to Incoming Soldier
- Ensure that communication is flowing between Incoming Soldier and sponsor



AIRPORT ARRIVAL & TRANSPORTATION



Honolulu International Airport (HNL)

HNL is the primary hub for domestic overseas and inter-island flights and is currently one of the three State airports accommodating international flights. Once you arrive at the Honolulu International Airport, sign in at the Replacement Detachment Liaison desk located between baggage claims F and G.

Shuttle transportation is available thru Replacement Detachment Liaison Desk for PAX from the Airport to the Replacement

Barracks, Schofield Inn, Hale Koa Hotel, and several other TLA authorized hotels between 1100-2230 hours or last flight of the night. Please contact (808)655-0389 for availability.

Cab fare is approximately \$60.00 to \$80.00 from the airport to Schofield Barracks. Most cabs fares are by meter rates estimated at \$3.10 per meter. Estimates are subject to change. You can you Uber or Lyft as well rates varies.

Driving Directions to Schofield:

Honolulu International Airport to Schofield Barracks

The installation is approximately 17 miles from the airport. To reach Schofield Barracks from Honolulu International Airport follow exit directions to Interstate H1 west bound. Proceed on H-1 to the H-2 interchange and go north to Wahiawa. Continue on H2 (about 8 miles) until it ends into a divided highway (Wilikina Drive 99), proceed to the second traffic light (Wilikina & Kunia Road) and turn left onto Kunia Road. Make a right at Lyman Gate.

TEMPORARY HOUSING ALLOWANCE (TLA)

Approved Army Hotels in Hawaii:

Upon arrival, newcomers must report to their housing office within 72 hours. From the housing office you will be directed to <u>on or off base temporary lodging</u>. Depending on availability of on base lodging, there's a chance you'll be authorized for TLA, which can extend up from 30 to 60 days. Before checking into a TLA-approved hotel, ensure you have authorization to do so by requesting a TLA "Non-Availability" letter prior to making any reservation at a TLA-approved hotel. TEMPORARY MAILING ADDRESS

Upon arrival, temporary mailboxes can be reserved for 90 days and can be extended by request. 30 days prior to your PCS would be a good time to reserve a mailbox. Please refer to Oahu's Military Directory (808-499-7110) to reach the Post Office for temporary mailbox information and set up.



PET OWNERS

<u>Pets</u> are a part of the family, so it's important to take the time to understand Hawaii state laws concerning your pets prior to your PCS. Hawai'i is rabies-free. All dogs and cats, regardless of age (puppies and kittens included) or purpose, must comply with Hawaii's dog and cat import requirements. Hawaii's Animal Quarantine Law is administered by the Hawaii Department of Agriculture who outlines all the guidelines for shipping pets to Hawaii. All dogs and cats must go through quarantine.

Depending on how early you get started on your pet's pre-arrival checklist will determine how long your pet will stay in quarantine. Pets may be eligible for 30 day, 5 day, or direct release from the Honolulu International Airport (HNL) if requirements are met. Otherwise, pets will be quarantined for 120 days upon arrival. It's never too late to start the quarantine process at your current location. For more information: <u>Hawaii's Animal Quarantine Information Page</u>. To qualify for the 5-day-or-less quarantine program, please follow the requirements stated in this <u>checklist</u>. Inspection hours for dog and cats at HNL are between 0800-1700 daily. Pet owners must be sure to arrange flights to arrive by 1530 because it may take up to 1 hour for the airlines to transport a pet to the Airport Animal Quarantine Holding Facility. Pets will have to stay overnight at the Animal Quarantine Station if airline arrival times occur beyond 1630. Pick up for pets that stay overnight must be by 1000 or an additional \$59 will be charged.

<u>United Airlines Military & State Department pet exemptions</u> – Pets travel as checked baggage with PCS orders.

The pet Kennel is available for your cats and dogs. This 102 kennel facility will quickly become your cat or dogs favorite home away from home. The kennel is located next to the Halawa State Quarantine site in Halawa Valley. Look for the sign "MWR Pet Kennel." Limited spaces are available for Active Duty/ DOD/ Retired/Reservists

- If your animal requires medication, you must contact the kennel to discuss whether they can administer the medication or not.
- All animals must have current vaccinations
- Pets must be free of fleas and ticks.
- Reservations To reserve a kennel for your pet, call (808)368-3456. The earliest that you can make a reservation is
 60 days prior to the month you would like to board.

PRIVATELY OWNED VEHICLE

Personally Owned Vehicle (POV) Shipment – Military members are authorized a shipment of 1 POV at government expense. From ports in the west coast, you can expect to be charged approximately \$1000-\$2000 for transport to Hawaii. A timeline for transportation could be 2 weeks to a month, depending on when the cargo ship leaves harbor. The Vehicle Processing Center can provide information on the shipping status of your vehicle. The phone number for inbound POV is (808) 848-8383.

Auto Registration: All automobiles used on the highway must be registered with the state within 30 days of arrival. You may keep your original plates, but you must register to get a Hawaii vehicle sticker. Proof of ownership or a certificate of registration; shipping documents, Hawaii no fault insurance and proof of a safety inspection is required. <u>http://www1.honolulu.gov/csd/vehicle/mvinformation.htm</u>. NOTE: Service personnel who are legal residents of Hawaii must obtain plates just as a civilian would upon expiration of their out-of-state plates. Non-resident active duty military personnel must submit a properly completed Non-Resident Certificate, Form CS-L (MVR) 50, for each registration, renewal, or transfer transaction. Form CS-L (MVR) 50 and Form CS-L (MVR) 50A is available from your military personnel office or your unit that will exempt you from paying Hawaii vehicle registration taxes.

Safety Inspection: Vehicle registration approval will require passed Hawaii State Safety Inspection (annually). This can be accomplished at selected auto-garages around Oahu. Call to verify an auto-garage can do a Safety Inspection. Once passed, you can then get your car registered. For inspection, bring a valid identification card and a Non-resident Certificate Form to one of the state's authorized inspection stations.

Driver's License: Hawaii recognizes other state driver's licenses. When your license expires, if you wish to apply for a Hawaii driver's license, you must present your Social Security Card, and a current out-of-state license. If your out-of-state license has expired, you will be required to file an application form, complete a written examination, pass an eye test, and pass a road test. Most rentals do not allow pets. Pet regulation for *On-Post housing* is Pit-bulls or any type of pit-bull breeding combinations such as American Pit-Bull Terrier, American Staffordshire Terrier or Staffordshire Terriers are strictly NOT ALLOWED on installation.



Newcomers and their families have 3 options to consider when <u>moving to Oahu</u>. They can either move on base, rent, or purchase.

Moving On Base – Depending on which base you're being assigned to will determine the base housing you'll be directed to. Connecting with each service's housing office will be able to link you with vacancy options at the time of request. Unfortunately, all or most of your military Base Housing Allowance (BAH) will be taken away from you by moving on base. Contact your sponsor or reach out to military directory for updated housing office contact information.


Renting Off Base – If you decide on base living is not for you, renting is an option. Moving off base means you will be provided a significant amount of military BAH in accordance with your grade and dependent status. BAH is supposed to offset the cost of market rental housing by offering a monthly allowance that will permit you to live comfortably in the local area. In fact, BAH is actually formulated off local area rent averages. As rent increases or decreases, BAH amounts will follow in trend. Due to the fact that rents are high on Oahu, so is BAH. To find out what you will be provided in BAH on Oahu, visit the <u>Defense Travel Management Office's BAH Calculator Tool</u>.

Purchasing a Home – Not interested in losing your military BAH to on base housing or rental landlords? Buying a home on Oahu just might be the option for you. The best time to buy a home is upon your first PCS arrival into Oahu. Military members and their families are provided 8 days of "house hunting" and up to 60 days of Temporary Housing Allowance (TLA) to look for and purchase a home. Considering it takes 45-60 days to "close an escrow" (purchase a home), this is exactly the right amount of time to get into an island home.

<u>Honolulu Board of Realtor FACT</u>: Median price of a home on Oahu in 1985 was \$158,600. In July 2015, the median price of a house was \$710,000. Based off historical sales data, values double every 10-15 years on Oahu.

Using Your VA Loan Entitlement – Oahu's current VA loan benefit limit is set at \$721,050. This means if pre-approved for a <u>VA loan</u>, a veteran can buy a home at 0% down up to \$721,050; as opposed to a Conventional 3-20%+ down loan non-veterans are subject to when buying a home. If you've already used your VA loan in another location, you'll be surprised to find out you most likely have enough of the loan left to use the rest of your VA loan on Oahu. The only requirement for use of the VA loan is the buyer(s) must live in the home for at least 1 year immediately after closing.

Other benefits to using a VA loan include not having to pay Mortgage Insurance, lower interest rates, and lower credit score requirements. VA loans can also be used to purchase multi-family properties. It is important to keep in mind when looking to use a VA loan, strict condition requirements must be followed, homes need to be in good condition (no fixer uppers) and only have permitted work done on them.



When it comes to VA loans, closing costs can be negotiated and sometimes covered by a lender. However, in general, buyers will need 2% of the loan amount to pay for closing costs, appraisal, home inspection, taxes, and fees, etc.

Commute Times in Oahu: It's no secret, Oahu is busy with a population of almost 1 million, meaning traffic is everywhere. The peak commute hours are 6am-10am and 2pm-6:30pm. Living on the Leeward side of the island could mean transit times from 1-2 hours if traveling into and out of Honolulu. Windward traffic jam commuting generally takes 40 mins-1 hour. From the North Shore to Honolulu it can be 45 mins-1 hour. If you happen to work odd hours, you might be able to escape being stuck in traffic too long. Outside of traffic hours, commutes from the Leeward and Windward sides into Honolulu can be a speedy 30 minutes.

PERMISSIVE TDY

Incoming Soldiers will not be able to take PTDY prior to signing in. Once Soldier has completed in-processing with the Replacement Company, Soldiers will be released to their unit and should then request PTDY for house hunting. Once household goods arrive the Brigade Commander is authorizing 5 days of non-chargeable leave to be taken.

BARRACKS SOLDIERS

All Single Soldiers and unaccompanied Soldiers, E-5 and below, will be placed in the Replacement Company Barracks upon arrival. Once inbound Soldier has completed inprocessing, he or she will be released to their unit and be provided a barracks room from Barracks Management.

FIREARMS REGISTRATION

Upon arrival, military members must register their firearms with the state of Hawaii and the base assigned. The limit to register your firearms is 3 days with the Honolulu Police Department (HPD). Failure to register your firearms could result in a felony possession of firearms charge. To register simply take the unloaded firearm to the Firearms Division of HPD for inspection along with proper identification and proof of ownership. You will be fingerprinted (\$16.50 fee) and photographed.

If you plan to live in military or privatized on base housing, you must register the firearm with the base's security office you are on. You will need to bring a valid military ID card and proof of HPD firearm registration, and proof of residence in the housing area.

Personally-owned firearms must be registered with the state of Hawaii and either the Schofield Barracks Provost Marshal Office within 72 hours of arrival.



OAHU BEACH SAFETY TIPS

BEACH SAFETY

- Study the conditions before entering the ocean.
- OBSERVE the activities of others in the ocean-i.e., if everyone is on surfboards, swimming might not be the best activity at that beach.
- ASK the lifeguards.
- KNOW your limits in the water.
- If in doubt, don't go out.
- Swim in lifeguarded areas.
- Never swim alone.
- Don't dive into unknown water or into shallow breaking waves.
- Check with lifeguard on beach and surf conditions before swimming.
- If you are unable to swim out of a strong

HAZARDOUS CONDITIONS



SHARP CORAL Most of Hawaii's beaches have sharp coral reefs close to the shoreline. Utilize caution when swimming in shallow reef area. Foot protection is advised. Don't walk on the reef.



DANGEROUS SHORE BREAK This condition occurs when waves break abruptly in shallow water or directly onto the sand near or at the shoreline. Shorebreak waves can cause serious

injuries, including neck and spinal fractures that may result in paralysis and/or death. These injuries occur in small waves as well as in large surf. Exercise extreme caution and avoid being thrown "over the falls" and striking the bottom.



LARGE SURF Large powerful waves generated by storms at sea sometimes thousands of miles from the Hawaiian islands. Seasonal high surf occurs on all shores of Oahu. Typically, ---shorelines facing north, east and west receive high

surf during winter months. Shores facing southeast and southwest receive high surf during summer months. High surf causes strong currents that can take you out to sea.



STRONG CURRENT Swift moving channels of water difficult to swim against. Strong currents frequently accompany high surf and rapid tide changes and can be recognized as a

turbulent channel of water between areas where waves are breaking.



WAVES ON LEDGE Large waves originating from deep waters breaking directly on rock ledges. This can occur even when the water appears to be calm. Be cautious when walking along rocky coastlines where waves are

breaking. Don't go into the wet rocky zone. The ocean is unpredictable and has been known to wash people in. Don't put yourself in a position where you could be swept away.

NORTH SHORE This coastline blessed with pristine white sand beaches is known for its worldclass surfing. Caution is advised especially during the winter months when waves may reach heights of up to 25 feet. The summer is excellent for snorkeling and swimming as there is often no surf.

WEST SHORE This coast is more arid than the windward coast and has many excellent beaches. This coast is known for offshore fishing spots. Caution is also advised during episodes of high surf which occur in both winter and summer months. **EAST SHORE** This coastline known as the windward coast has lush tropical beach setting which are favorite locations for windsurfing, canoeing, and sailing enthusiasts. With northeast tradewinds blowing 90% of the year, watch out for the Portuguese-man-of-war (stinging blue jellyfish); they can pose a problem for beach-goers.

SOUTH SHORE This

coastline is known for its many family beaches. Activities like snorkeling, tide pooling, swimming and any general ocean recreation are popular on the South Shore. Caution should be taken during seasonal high surf in the summer. Box jellyfish come into the South Shore beaches often; don't swim when they are in the area.
