

MONTHLY SPOTLIGHT

The Fort Knox Fire and Emergency Services Division is comprised of 63 employees tasked with preserving lives and protecting property within the installation's 108,000 acres, as well as the U.S. Bullion Depository. The Fort Knox Fire Department began in 1935 and has three stations today. In addition to normal duties, firefighters participate in multiple training events every year with other departments. In 2022, it became the first Army installation department to receive accreditation from the Center for Public Safety Excellence for the second consecutive time under new criteria. It conducts a 150-hour Kentucky State certification course offered to high school seniors. The FKFD works 24/7 to keep Soldiers, Families, civilian employees and visitors safe.





The Fort Knox Casualty Assistance Center supports military-connected families during emotionally stressful times of bereavement. A small team of professionals at the Center receive, task and track up to 11,000 funeral honors requests across a five-state area each year. They also manage the operations for the Post Cemetery, where 966 individuals are laid to rest, including 18 prisoners of war. The cemetery is the only military burial site besides Arlington National Cemetery to earn National Shrine honors twice. The Center coordinates placement of flags and wreaths on the headstones annually. Center staff also train and certify casualty notification officers and assistance officers within their area of operations, and they assist family members of the fallen with benefit claims.

The Fort Knox Energy Program is the most highly decorated of its type in DoD due to the team's groundbreaking and longstanding accomplishments centered on reducing the installation's energy footprint and becoming more energy secure. In 2015, Fort Knox successfully demonstrated its ability to operate completely independent of the external energy grid. During April's installation energy resilience readiness exercise, the team had the entire on-post electrical grid up and running within 7 minutes. The Fort Knox Energy Program and Nolin RECC were recognized for their excellence earlier this year with the Army Partnership Award for reducing the installation's power costs by 50% over a six year period.



QUALITY CHILDCARE RE-AWARDED



The Child Development Center has been reaccredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children for the exemplary services it provides the Fort Knox community.

Valid for five years, the NAEYC accreditation process evaluates a variety of categories related to the care provided, curriculum, facilities, management and many other standards at the CDC during the rating. Overall, the CDC received a score of more than 97%. Garrison leaders presented the certificate Oct. 7
