


Service Culture Campaign Employee of the Quarter

he Plans, Analysis, and Integration Office (PAIO) team conducts installation strategic planning and provides information management support. as well as performance evaluations of base operations and essential services and programs in support of the Fort Knox community. This includes facilitating installation planning boards and Fort Knox Garrison quarterly strategic planning offsites. PAIO serves as the lead for installation stationing management, customer service evaluations, integrating incoming senior leaders and coordinating visits for distinguished guests. The three-member team also manages the Garrison business portfolio, including command and control, safety, security, environmental, training, logistics, information technology, health care, Soldier and Family programs and infrastructure. They also submit the application for Fort Knox to compete in the annual IMCOM Best Garrison Competition.

he Fort Knox Garrison executive assistants are responsible for providing comprehensive administrative, logistical, and strategic support to the Fort Knox Garrison Command Team. They manage calendars. schedule appointments and meetings, coordinate travel arrangements and prepare expense reports. Beyond administrative tasks, they often act as gatekeepers by screening communications, prioritizing requests and handling confidential information with discretion. They are skilled communicators, acting as liaisons between leadership and other military personnel, civilian staff and external stakeholders. Ultimately, they ensure the Garrison commander & command sergeant major can effectively lead and make critical decisions impacting the entire Fort Knox community. According to Fort Knox Garrison Commander Col. Chris Ricci, they are the invisible hand behind all major installation actions.

he Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization, and Security (DPTMS) Operations Cell is integral to the efficiency of the Fort Knox Garrison as it ensures that plans, operations, training and security align with the Garrison's mission and broader senior leader objectives. Key responsibilities include managing Garrison operations, publishing situation reports (SITREPs), maintaining the Garrison calendar, facilitating command and staff meetings, managing operations orders (OPORDs), overseeing special events and handling critical resources. The team also oversees resources, including Waybur Theater, Haszard Theater, the post gazebo and Brooks Parade Field ensuring they are well maintained and available for use. With a variety of responsibilities, the operations team is central to ensuring Garrison operations remain aligned with senior command directives and operational goals while supporting both daily operations and the broader military mission.

Fort Knox PAO wins Organization of the Year for Community Engagement

It was announced on Feb. 6 that the Fort Knox Public Affairs Office was selected as IM-COM-level winner for the 2024 Maj. Gen. Keith L. Ware Communications Awards Competition "Public Affairs Organization of the Year for Community Engagement" category. They won for the planning and execution of a community support campaign by Public Affairs Officer Ryan Brus and Comunity Relations Officer and Social Media Chief Kellly Appelman that aided in the successful opening of the Digital Air-Ground Integration Range with the backing of area centers of influence. On Feb. 26, it was announced that the submission also won at the Army Material Command level and will now compete at the Department of the Army level.

It was announced on Feb. 6 that Savannah Baird won two individual IMCOM-level public affairs competition awards that would go on to compete at the Army Material Command level.
