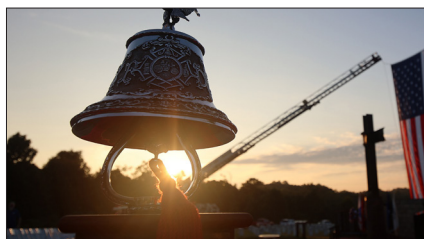

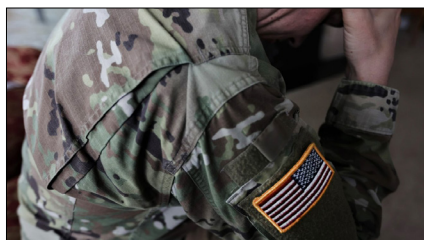

As the assistant director of Youth Sports and Fitness, Brandon was integral in the organization receiving zero deficiencies during an AHHI inspection. In order to accomplish this, he stayed late multiple days each week while still accomplishing his daily tasks. He also developed an effective plan to reduce wear and tear on equipment during colder months and identified old equipment that could be turned in, netting the program over \$50,000. He also purchased top soil at a significantly reduced cost, saving FMWR money.

**DPW Operation & Maintenance**

Despite a 40% personnel shortage, David Brown, Kevin Everson, Kevin Addison, Harlan Mitchell and Gary Payton maintained facilities, utilities and grounds to enable visiting and tenant units to accomplish their missions. In addition, they took on several tasks to make up the personnel shortfall, including extra training courses to better serve customers with maintenance and inspections. They often reshuffled duties, combined efforts and limited travel to tackle 2,028 work orders and 227 QA inspections, while developing 27 additional projects and maintaining 42 special projects.

An administrative support assistant for the SSD Division chief, Stacy has a 100% success rate at tracking and managing timecard submissions for over 450 employees. She communicates with other pay superusers on issues and serves as the subject matter expert for ePay. As the go-to for debt collection, her efforts helped regain over \$5,000 in one quarter. She also facilitates team member orientation training and has assisted with Employee of the Quarter and several Hero of the Week ceremonies as well as the bi-annual DFMWR town hall.

As the drug test technician and primary GPC cardholder for DHR, Lisa quickly embraced both roles and absorbed the necessary training to perform nearly flawlessly, with only two noted errors in the urinalysis packing and quality control process out of 1,462 specimens. She ensured accuracy and completeness of all required documentation, while improving the process. She understood the bigger picture in her roles.

## MONTHLY SPOTLIGHT

JULY

The Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation Delivery System (FM-WR-DS) team works to provide more efficient and customer-focused opportunities for recreation. This has largely been accomplished through improved utilization of the installation's current facilities as well as non-facility-based programming, outsourcing and unit outreach. The team works closely with facility managers within several divisions to ensure program requirements have physical, marketing and sponsorship support to maximize awareness of and participation in all its initiatives. They are also responsible for bringing adventure programs, clinics, classes, concerts, community-wide events and special events to Soldiers and their Families and others near the Knox community.



AUGUST



The Fort Knox Religious Support Office provides comprehensive spiritual support to meet the needs of the installation's Soldiers, Families, retirees and civilians. The Chaplain Family Life Center offers family life ministry and pastoral counseling, and conducts Building Strong & Ready Teams events quarterly to assist in developing healthy Soldier and Family structures. Family Life Chaplains provide integrated counseling. The RSO also conducts weekly chapel services for members of the community. The Religious Education Center enriches the spirituality and faith of the community by hosting religious studies and education events. An annual highlight is Vacation Bible School, offered each year in July.

SEPTEMBER

Fort Knox's Child Development Center offers nationally accredited full-day and part-day care for military children ages 6 weeks to 5 years. Leaders devote countless hours vetting and training top-notch caregivers. Competency-based training sets the center apart from others, making it the only NAEYC-accredited child care center in Hardin County. It also earned a 97% during its most recent accreditation. Many parents participate in CYS Parent Advisory Board meetings, bringing fresh ideas. The center's mission focuses on ensuring children are well-prepared for schooling. To achieve this, the CDC follows a curriculum of activities and experiences that improve motor, social, emotional, cognitive, language and other developmental skills for all children, including those with special needs.

## ASHLEY SHEEK

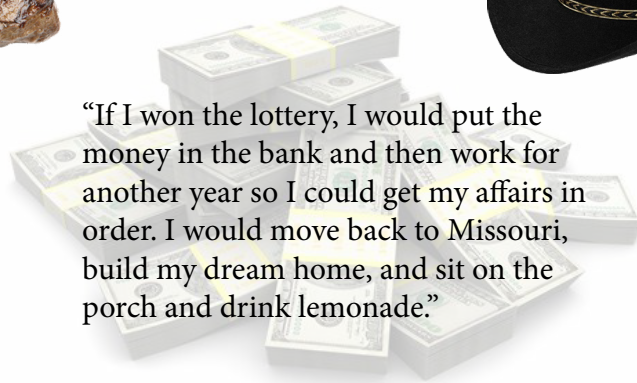
My favorite food is a ribeye steak that is cooked to a perfect medium rare. I love beef. My parents raise beef cattle so we have always promoted the beef industry.
