LaPlace initiated several community policing efforts designed to foster cooperation from the community. He also provided over 700 hours of training despite staffing and budget shortages.

A civil engineer, Wiseman was instrumental in devising a method to remove/ 13,700 cubic yards of lime sludge from the lime sludge lagoon at the water treatment plant that saved Fort Knox \$1,870,000. He realized that transportation costs were too high and suggested they spread the sludge across flat ground. Harmless to the soil, his idea frees up the money for other projects.

AER Team, DFMWR

The team demonstrated flawless teamwork, dedication and swift / response to support Soldiers and Families of Fort Campbell impacted by recent tornadoes. They mobilized a coordinated response, arranging immediate support with the Fort Campbell ACS division chief and AER headquarters. They provided remote assistance to pre-screened applicants, culminating in the review of 68 cases, 50 of whom were approved. As a result, \$22,196 in grant funds were rewarded.

The Fort Knox Army Community Service delivers services to the **L** installation that enhance quality of life and promote readiness. ACS strives to deliver tailored programs and services that meet the needs of the community, offering a wide range of education, events, individualized counseling services and life skills and prevention education trainings. Programs include Employment Readiness, which provides resources on career coaching, job fairs, and job listings; the Exceptional Family Member Program; the Family Advocacy Program; the Financial Readiness Program; information and referral services; mobilization, deployment and stability and support operations; relocation readiness resources and counseling; and survivor outreach services.



GOLD STANDARD EXCELLENCE

Sixteen civilian employees graduated from Garrison Leadership Academy April 25. Charged with finding new solutions to customer service issues, each of four groups presentated their solutions to the Garrison Command Team for their last course assignment. The Fort Knox Emergency Communications Center receives and dispatches calls for service to installation police, fire and emergency medical services. The center monitors radio channels for all DES activities, managing radio traffic across 16 talk-groups. Team telecommunicators are also responsible for a wide range of technical competencies. Additionally, the ECC functions as the initial Emergency Operations Center until the full EOC can be stood up during a large-scale emergency. The team provides 24/7 service, answering about 40,000 calls, dispatching more than 1,200 emergency calls per year, and managing more than 3,000 non-emergency calls. The ECC also monitors all fire alarms and security alarms on the installation.



The Housing Services Office is divided into several sections to effectively assist customers with all housing needs. They liaison between the privatized housing partner and service members, civilians and families, guide and assist all incoming and departing personnel with quality, up-to-date information on military relocations, mediate for disputes, and counsel, educate and guide residents on maintaining clean, quality, and safe homes and neighborhoods. The HSO is comprised of a housing chief and deputy, a program analyst, engineering technicians, housing managers, a furnishing management office team and housing management assistants. In addition, HSO schedules and performs various inspections of community rental properties to determine adequacy, habitability, and suitability. They also gather and provide a variety of reported data to the Army to assist in determining future BAH entitlements.
