The Fort Knox Transition Assistance Program provides gold standard transition services with weekly distributed model curriculum and live counseling services to enhance individualized transitions, which includes partnerships with the Departments of Labor and Veterans Affairs, Small Business Administration, ACES, Kentucky Career Center, and Career Skills Program partners. TAP provides an executive-level experience for senior Soldiers, a retiree summit for all eligible service members, a Hiring our Heroes event, and an annual Career and Education Fair. These events support all military service members from across a seven-state region. All transition services are provided by a small team of dedicated professionals who assist about 1,500 clients annually.

The Fort Knox Physical Security Division assists the installation commander and Directorate of Emergency Services director in all aspects of physical security. The team develops, executes and maintains an effective program through the deployment of a highly trained and multidisciplined guard force and physical security inspection team. They administer and operate all access control points, access control equipment, and the visitor center to facilitate access for those working, visiting, or living on the Army installation. They also support mission partners by verifying regulatory compliance and certification of facilities used to protect arms, ammunition and explosives, as well as other sensitive or classified resources. Their efforts also include maintaining required intrusion detection alarm systems to protect personnel and mission essential vulnerable areas.







The Fort Knox Installation Safety Office safeguards Army resources, Soldiers, Family members, and Army civilians through effective risk management processes. The team guides, supports and instills safety by emphasizing engaged leadership, responsible employees and committed teammates. They are responsible for inspecting over 1,400 workplace sites, reviewing risk assessments and job hazard analysis, and supporting community events as well as Cadet Summer Training, force protection exercises, and motorcycle safety sustainment rides. They also facilitate the installation safety and occupational health council and oversee arms rooms licensing, OSHA compliance, and the Army traffic safety training program while providing multiple safety training classes. Their work earned the 2022 Army Safety Streamer for USAG as well as numerous DA level awards for risk management and individual excellence in safety.


