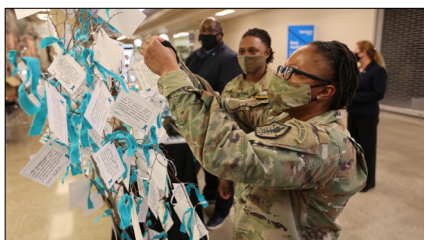

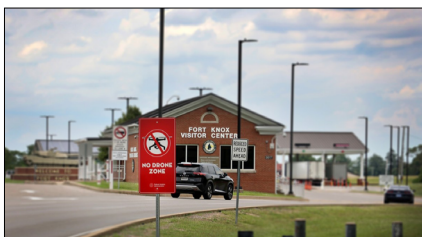

## MONTHLY SPOTLIGHT

APRIL



After joining the Fort Knox team as Sexual Assault Response Coordinator in the summer of 2021, Ella Foley created an immersive, interactive Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention program training tool that has people talking. In August, Foley discovered a basement full of broken and unwanted furniture while in search of a chair. Four months later with the help of a team of volunteers, she cleared and cleaned the area and converted it into an interactive training site, even capitalizing on some of the furniture. The training guides small teams of 8-10 employees through 13 progressive activities that challenge them with puzzles, scenarios and engaging Q&A. Foley has conducted 93 sessions since Jan. 21 and has trained over 98% of personnel.

MAY

The Fort Knox Training Support Center provides support to U.S. forces and foreign allies alike with thousands of training aids – many fabricated directly by the team – to provide realistic equipment that places troops as close to real-world scenarios as possible. Training Aid Devices, Simulators and Simulations houses, maintains, issues and ships equipment and teaches Soldiers how to use it. The Training Device Fabrication section – one of only four Armywide – handcrafts much of the equipment as well a variety of other items. The Virtual Training section provides simulation training with a vehicle rollover simulator, indoor Engagement Skills Trainer and a Black Hawk Aircrew Trainer. TSC's combination of extremely skilled, hard-working team members and state-of-the-art technology provide critical support to warfighter training needs, including ROTC cadets going through Cadet Summer Training.



JUNE



Besides year-round training support for all units that visit Fort Knox, BDPTMS Range Branch provides year-round direct support to the Army's largest training event – Cadet Summer Training. Planning for CST begins with analysis of all ranges, training areas and facilities. Planners coordinate with Range Branch Maintenance to identify and correct issues with facilities. Range schedulers document training requirements to ensure facilities are requested, de-conflicted, and available. When CST is live, schedulers track roughly 450 separate events. Range Branch repairs target devices, provides berm maintenance, and tackles other issues that cannot be corrected by cadre or supporting units. During CST, as range use doubles, Firing Desk operators keep track of all training, verifying with the officers in charge or range safety officers that training conditions are safe. Their adept and coordinated actions facilitate premier training for our nation's warfighters and military organizations.

## GOLD STANDARD EXCELLENCE
