Proclamation on Honoring The Victims of The Tragedy In Highland Park, Illinois


July 05, 2022 . Presidential Actions

As a mark of respect for the victims of the senseless act of gun violence perpetrated on our Independence Day, July 4, 2022, in Highland Park, Illinois, by the authority vested in me as the President of the United States by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, I hereby order that the flag of the United States shall be flown at half-staff at the White House and upon all public building and grounds, at all military posts and naval stations, and on all naval vessels of the Federal Government in the District of Columbia and throughout the United States and its Territories and possessions until sunset, July 9, 2022.

I also direct that the flag shall be flown at half-staff for the same length of time at all United States embassies, legations, consular offices, and other facilities abroad, including all military facilities and naval vessels and stations.

IN WITNESS THEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this fifth day of July, in the year of our Lord two thousand twenty-two, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and forty-seventh.

Cabinet endorsed RMI’s Roadmap on the Easement of international borders.

In early March 2020, the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) declared a State of Health Emergency (SOE) for COVID-19 and close its borders from its citizens and foreign nationals alike in the early stages due to the global coronavirus pandemic. The border closure has allowed RMI ample time for the RMI Government and the National Disaster Committee (NDC) to develop protocols across all sectors to prevent this novel virus from entering the RMI. Since then, the science and understanding of the COVID-19 virus have allowed many of the countries around the world to start opening their borders and begin their road to “normalcy” especially with the introduction of the COVID vaccines and anti-viral medication for COVID-19.

The Ministry of Health and Human Services (MOHHS), the lead government entity in this public health RMI state of emergency (SOE) has a target up to **95%¹** to fully vaccinate RMI citizens and permanent residents prior to opening RMI borders. This inoculation target is near. This Cabinet approved Roadmap will serve as a guideline for the RMI Government and as an information tool for the General Public.

RMI Roadmap plans to open its border in 2 Phases to allow the ease of entry for eligible travelers. **October 1st, 2022, represents a viable date for implementation.**

Prior to traveling:

Prior to departure, all travelers (including children under the age of 5) are required to conduct the following tests administered by health professionals (technicians) and show proof of the following required documents:

- A molecular test, such as Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test and an antibody blood test (venous blood- quantitative [Antibodies (IgG/IgM) against the core antigen] within 48 hours of planned departure; Rapid Antigen Diagnostic Test (Ag-RDT): tested within 12 hours of planned departure:

After the Republic of the Marshall Islands travel restrictions began in March 2020, life on USAG-KA began to change. With no incoming travelers and no spread of COVID-19, the garrison practiced social distancing measures in preparation for the future. 1) Signs posted at the Kwajalein Hospital indicate that visitors must wash their hands before entering the reception area. 2) Signs posted at Surfway indicated that social distancing should be practiced at points of sale.

- Historical Case: Traveler must provide a certificate from healthcare provider showing proof of anti-infectious or full recovery; Show proof of vaccination; Registration with the RMI STP;
- All travelers under the STP will need to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 (primary series vaccines and boosters per CDC, FDA and RMI COVID-19 vaccination task force recommendations);
- If a traveler(s) are required to pre-quarantine due to positive results, all costs associated with pre-quarantine are at the expense of the traveler(s).

Phase I [10 days Quarantine] – 30 June 2022 – 30 September 2022

- Borders are open **only to** those that are **fully vaccinated**.
- Provide either; (1) A negative PCR test within 12 hours of planned departure or (2) A negative PCR test within 12 hours of departure and a Negative rapid antigen test-Ag-RDT within 24 hours of planned departure.
- Testing while in the RMI will include PCR tests on day 3, 7 and 10.
- **Require mandatory 10 days quarantine – at designated quarantine facilities in the Marshall Islands.**

Phase 2 [0 Days Quarantine] - 01 October 2022

- Borders are open **only to** those that are **fully vaccinated**.
- Provide either; (1) A negative PCR test within 12 hours of planned departure or (2) A negative PCR test within 12 hours of departure and a Negative rapid antigen test-Ag-RDT within 24 hours of planned departure.
- Rapid antigen test on arrival.
- Home quarantine (restricted movement) 5 days with a Rapid antigen test on the 5th day-Mobile testing

Quarantining in the RMI

- Symptom monitoring of persons under active surveillance (PUAS) is managed using the SeraAlert system Inductive Health Respond (IHR) system;
- The detection of active cases of COVID-19 in border quarantine will trigger a 14-day period for isolation and quarantine for close contacts;
- COVID-19 therapeutics will be offered to border cases of COVID-19 (anti-retroviral and monoclonal antibodies as appropriate);

RMI Roadmap shall remain a living document and is subject to change given the dynamics of the COVID-19 Pandemic.

COAST GUARD KEEPS MARINERS SAFE WITH BUOY MAINTENANCE


During May, U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Sequoia, a 225-foot seagoing buoy tender, sailed more than 1,400 nautical miles to Kwajalein Atoll to service the surrounding aids to navigation constellation.

The cutter is a one of 15 seagoing buoy tenders active in the Coast Guard and has been servicing buoys in the Indo-Pacific since 2004.

Homeported in Santa Rita, Guam, CGC Sequoia is a multi-mission asset that focuses on establishing and maintaining buoys in multiple waterways within Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands and Kwajalein Atoll.

CGC Sequoia traveled to the Kwajalein Atoll to ensure the buoys are serviced and maintained in compliance with federal and international standards. A routine servicing consists of raising the buoy out of the water and inspecting the hull, chain, lights, and concrete sinker that holds the buoys assembly to the sea floor.

While in Kwajalein, CGC Sequoia and a team of Coast Guard divers serviced 33 buoys. This routine servicing extends the lifespan of the buoys and ensures that the buoy constellation within Kwajalein Atoll is functioning properly. The proper functioning of buoys is vital to safe navigation within harbors and channels and facilitates commerce within and between

the islands.

CGC Sequoia's Commanding Officer, Cmdr. Ryan Adams, speaks about the cutter's time in Kwajalein this past spring: "It was great for Sequoia to be back in Kwajalein for the first time since January 2020.

During this deployment, we worked with Coast Guard divers to recover two sunken buoys and continued our multi-year effort to replace steel buoys in Kwajalein with foam buoys, which are less

prone to corrosion and can remain on station significantly longer than steel hulls. I am proud of the work the crew of Sequoia was able to accomplish to ensure Kwajalein's Aids to Navigation continue to support maritime safety and facilitate the critical work that is conducted in Kwajalein."

CGC Sequoia thanks the people of Kwajalein for their warm welcome and hospitality to the crew during port calls.

HOURGLASS REPORT

Not much has changed at TRADEX, the Tracking and Discrimination Experiment radar site on Roi-Namur, in the years since the inception of the U.S. Advanced Research Projects Agency, now DARPA,

Ever since it acquired its first tracking target in June 1962, TRADEX has continued in its mission to support the U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command with the help of technical advisors from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Lincoln Laboratory.

The 84-foot radar dish is both the oldest and the smallest of the four tracking stations at the Roi Kiernan Reentry Measurements Site. The other sensors include ALTAIR (1969), ALCOR (1970) and MMW (1985). ALTAIR and TRADEX track and support space operations missions, monitoring everything from launches to debris.

“Our mission today is still the same as when TRADEX was built in 1962—to track ICBMs for the Air Force” said TRADEX Sensor Manager Jeffrey Jones. “We have added additional mission customers over the years, such as supporting local launches for the Missile Defense Agency and NASA.”

Under every radar, there is a lot of hard work to be done.

Daily operations are sup-

ported by system engineers, mechanics, field electricians, and a number of support personnel groups.

Below TRADEX is a massive mechanic’s workshop and the pipes, cooling systems and machinery needed to keep the systems running.

Like any decent garage, the workspace contains spare parts, tools and supplies necessary to keep the radar safe and free from corrosion.

Thick walls and doors coated in radio frequency proofing material, safety equipment and caution signs line the walls, along with historical prints and photographs of visitors and scientists that show the history of the mission support teams dating back to the 1960s.

“We have a support staff of antenna workers and receiver guys who keep the antenna functioning,” said Jones. The current support team on site includes members of the RMI workforce who perform painting, weatherproofing and other mechanical tasks to keep the radar on track, the gears oiled and the mission running smoothly.

The number one concern at TRADEX is rust.

“Keeping things from rusting is one of the top priorities we have to address every day,” Jones said. “We have a great support staff of antenna workers, transmitter and receiver personnel who keep the antenna functioning.”



NIKE-ZEUS DEMONSTRATED ASAT CAPABILITY WITH PROJECT MUDFLAP

In the early 1960s, as the opportunities of space were explored, a potential new threat was also recognized.

As newspapers and magazines reported that the Soviet Union was developing a bomb in orbit capability, the NIKE-ZEUS Project Office received a new mission. Having successfully intercepted a long-range target, in April 1962, Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara tasked the command's engineers and scientists to develop and deploy an anti-satellite capability at the Kwajalein Missile Range. The deadline was May 1963.

The result was Project 505, also known as Project MUDFLAP. With the ZEUS Acquisition Radar's long-range tracking capability, the issue was to increase the power and thereby extend the range of the interceptor. Few modifications were made to the basic ZEUS missile, the DM-15B configuration, to achieve higher altitudes. The DM-15S would incorporate a dual-phase gas generator in a two-stage hydraulic pump to extend the control power for longer distances. A new booster propellant, polybutadiene acrylic acid, being developed for the ZEUS DM-15C would also be adopted. Other features improved radio frequency communication and increased the battery life to five minutes from two.

Six modified ZEUS interceptors were developed for this program.

Two initial tests were conducted at White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico. The first DM-15S was launched on Dec. 17, 1962 successfully intercepting a fixed space point at 100 nautical miles.

On Feb. 15, the modified ZEUS achieved a space point intercept at 151 nautical miles. From there, testing transferred to Kwajalein. The next two flights proved unsuccessful as the Missile Track Radar failed.

On May 23, however, the NIKE-ZEUS Project Office achieved its goal, successfully intercepting an AGENA D

earth satellite. Missile ZK-20 (20138) was the 20th ZEUS mission at Kwajalein and the 100th firing in the overall ZEUS R&D program.

The designs for the DM-15S continued to evolve, but the MUDFLAP ASAT defense system was declared operational on Aug. 1, with a mission readiness requirement to engage a designated satellite within 24 hours of guidance received. As the missiles were tested against simulated satellites and booster space targets, Kwajalein personnel were trained to perform a possible tactical ASAT mission. Bell Labs and Western Electric personnel conducted several test-runs to reduce the time needed for Kwajalein-based Soldiers to launch the missile if necessary. Following the final test series in 1965, four missiles remained on Kwajalein to serve a standby capability, with one always in a state of readiness until the 66th Artillery Group, the operation designation of this capability was terminated as of June 25, 1966, per a memorandum from the Deputy Secretary of Defense.

BUILD THE GO-BAG

HOURLASS REPORT

Will you and your family be ready in the event of an emergency? Read on to learn about items to purchase order to complete your own survival kit. In the event of a crippling event, such as a destructive typhoon, you'll be glad you did.

First grab a large waterproof travel bag or suitcase and then cram it with the items you'll want to bring to the evacuation shelter in the event of a disaster or emergency.

- 1) A one-gallon jug of water for each person in your household
- 2) A one-day supply of non-perishable food to cover every person in your household
- 3) Manual can opener
- 4) Eating utensils, plates, cups and so on
- 5) Sensible clothing
- 6) Rain gear, such as ponchos
- 7) One blanket for each family member
- 8) First-aid kit
- 9) Short-term supply of all required prescription medications taken by members of the household
- 10) Short-term supply of over-the-counter medications
- 11) Personal hygiene items like travel-sized shampoos, soap and toothpaste
- 12) Battery powered radio
- 13) Flashlight
- 14) Fresh batteries
- 15) Entertainment items for kids
- 16) Plastic bags to protect items from water
- 17) Pet food

In addition to preparing a go bag to take along to the evacuation shelter, you should also prepare a post-disaster supply kit. This should be packed in a water-tight container and left inside your living quarters. It could be a game changer during the post-disaster phase after residents clear out of evacuation shelters. Here's what you'll need.

- 1) A three-day supply of fresh water for each person in your household. *One gallon per person per day
- 2) Three-five-day supply of non-perishable food to cover all family members
- 3) Hats
- 4) Sunscreen
- 5) Insect repellent
- 6) Baby wipes
- 7) Towels
- 8) Matches and/or lighters for starting fires
- 9) Propane or charcoal for grill
- 10) Short-term supply of all required prescription medications taken by members of the household
- 11) Short-term supply of over-the-counter medications
- 12) Pet food

Notice for In/Outbound Mail



- Parcels containing pre-owned, damaged, or defective electronic devices with **lithium batteries** are prohibited in inbound and outbound international mail.
- Customs Forms submitted at MPOs with items containing **lithium batteries** are **NON-MAILABLE** and MPOs are instructed to **RTS** the item.
- This restriction also applies to AMC flights due to the parcel entering the domestic network once arriving in the U.S. **Items containing lithium shipped from retailers, in original packaging, and free of damage or defects may be allowed to ship to MPOs. 



COVID-19 TESTS NOT REQUIRED TO FLY

There are new United Airlines Pre-Departure COVID-19 Testing rules for arrival in the U.S. from any foreign country.

Passengers do not need to show proof of a negative COVID-19 test before departing Kwajalein for Hawaii.

While the Center for Disease Control and Prevention action removes the requirement for airline passengers to provide a negative COVID-19 test prior to traveling to the U.S., all other CDC restrictions related to international air travel remain in effect, to include wearing masks.

U.S. Space Force – Space Systems Command Flight Tests Preliminary Final Environmental Assessment / Overseas Environmental Assessment (EA/OEA)

The United States (U.S.) Space Force (USSF) proposes to test a flight launch vehicle from launch facilities on Wake Island to the U.S. Army Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site (RTS), managed by the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command (USASMDC), in the Kwajalein Atoll. While Wake Island is managed and controlled by the U.S. Air Force Pacific Air Forces Regional Support Center, the launch facilities themselves are controlled and operated by the U.S. Missile Defense Agency (MDA). The test mission would require two test flights, which would be executed by the U.S. Space Force (USSF) – Space Systems Command (SSC) Launch Enterprise, Small Launch and Targets Division, located at Kirtland Air Force Base, New Mexico. The Department of the Air Force (DAF) has environmental management and oversight authority for USSF and is therefore the lead agency for this National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) analysis. On 21 April 2022, the USASMDC and MDA were requested by the DAF to become Cooperating Agencies.

The Preliminary Final USSF SSC Flight Tests EA/OEA analyzes the environmental impacts from the test launch of up to two flight test demonstrations from Wake Island toward the RTS in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, which operates under a Compact of Free Association with the United States and follows regulatory provisions of the NEPA.



E-WARENESS: PROTECTED SPECIES

COMMUNITY CONNECTION

The following species are protected in the Marshall Islands:

- All corals and sponges
- All sharks, turtles, and marine mammals
- All birds, except common sparrow
- All giant clams and coconut crabs
- Finger/scorpion conchs
- Black-lip pearl oysters
- Trochus and Lambis snails
- Humphead wrasse and bumphead parrotfish
- Giant grouper and coral trout

Do not purchase, harvest, collect, or transport protected species. Contact the post office for direction before attempting to ship any biological specimen, including driftwood, crushed coral (sand), and shells. Remember to take care of their habitats, too.

This session is specially designed for new parents of elementary school-aged students.



WEATHER DISCUSSION

With the rain-season in full swing, the long-term outlook indicates that unsettled weather will be common over the next week.

A series of Tropical Upper Tropospheric Trough that are common this time of year will cause the Intertropical Convergence Zone to go through periodic flare ups.

These flare ups will produce deep convection capable of producing heavy rain and thunderstorms throughout the region.

The weekend, the first TUTT will approach the region and will produce periods of heavy rain, gusty conditions, and an elevated chance of thunderstorms. By the start of the workweek, the TUTT will exit the region, but the ITCZ will remain close;

convection will be bubbling up from time to time, especially during the second half of the workweek as surface forcing increases.

By next weekend, another TUTT will approach RMI, this time even closer to Kwajalein. This second TUTT will produce even deep shower and thunderstorm development across the Kwajalein Atoll.

Based on the current outlook, make sure to take advantage of intermittent periods of clearing as it appears weather will often not be on our side.

SATURDAY

Overcast with light rain early becoming widely scattered late. Light variable winds will become SE-E at 8-13 knots late with a few higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY AND MONDAY

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers becoming early become overcast with scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms by the end of the weekend. Winds ENE-E at 11-17 knots with strong gusts possible near showers and thunderstorms.

NEXT WEEK

Periods of showers and stray thunderstorms will become increasingly more common as the week progresses. By the end of the week a TUTT will increase shower and thunderstorm activity further, resulting in periods of heavy rain, gusty winds, and thunderstorms. ENE at 12-18 knots early in the week will veer more southerly over time waning in intensity as it does. Strong gusts will be possible in and around heavy showers and thunderstorms.
