Following them were decorated golf carts and vehicles sporting tinsel and holiday swag.

KWAJ CELEBRATES HOME HELPERS AT ANNUAL HOLIDAY GATHERING

A special holiday appreciation event for Kwajalein's Marshallese home helpers occurred Dec. 2 at the home of the garrison commander. Coordinated through USAG-KA Child and Youth Services, the Home Helpers Party is an opportunity for employers of Marshallese domestic workers to say thank you for their hard work throughout the year.

Sporting festive holiday dresses, more than 40 home helpers—some of whom are also Kwajalein shift workers—joined their employers for a holiday lunch with games and gifts. In return and per custom, the home helpers performed a special series of dances as a thank you.

The Home Helpers party began in 2016 as an effort by Community Activities Director Kim Yarnes to recognize the helpers—a significant portion of the island workforce who did not have a formal end-of-year gathering.

With support from Jeanna Larsen, spouse of Col. Michael Larsen, Yarnes and island resident Cari Dellinger invited

the ladies to quarters to Qtrs. 241 for a fun afternoon that was destined to become an island tradition.

Over the years, the party planning effort has grown. Support activities begin months in advance and incorporate the talents and ideas of many on- and off-island volunteers.

Among their many contributions, USAG-KA CYS assists in coordinating supervised care for participating households with young children during the event. A CYS Parent Committee organizes donated gifts and funds to provide raffle items, food, desserts and tokens of appreciation, said Christi Cardillo, committee member.

"The ladies just enjoy laughing and having a good time," said Cardillo of the party. "Even if you don't have a home helper, getting to know these ladies can give you a different perspective on life."

Cardillo thanked the Pugsley household for allowing the party tradition to continue at Qtrs. 241 this year, and the many participating volunteers and donors who contributed to the party. Each year, she enjoys the chance to meet the

community's home helpers and to witness the Kwaj community spreading joy in a meaningful way. During the year, Cardillo occasionally spies a tote bag or gift item in use by a home helper—and for her, that is a great reward.

"I enjoy buying things for people," said Cardillo. "I enjoy finding things that they will appreciate and be able to use."

Most of all, the party allows due recognition for the important role home helpers play in the day to day life of Kwajalein. Cardillo, who has employed home helper Likma "Kima" Mabe for more than five years, said that over time, appreciates her enduring support and assistance with everything from household tasks to helping care for the Cardillo children.

Though the holidays come but once a year, Cardillo fondly recalls the positive impact Mabe has on the household all year long. The Cardillo children's drawings of the people in their family include parents, siblings and Kima.

"She really is a part of our family," Cardillo said.





LET BYGONES BE BYGONES: ARMY CORPS HOUSING

Within a short walk of Kwajalein High School and Emon Beach, the decayed remains of once-beautiful homes sag into the earth, prompting open speculation from the island community about their safety.

Most of "new housing," the late 1980s-era housing development that replaced Silver City quarters at Kwajalein's North Point has long stood vacant. Environmental and structural factors and their possible impacts to occupant health and safety led to the eventual closure of many of the quarters by the early 2000s.

Today, visible signs of that prudent decision are discernable from the street.

Just past the Corlett Recreation Center, the lower-floor supports in some units have caused the visible collapse of second-story rooms. Planks of plastic siding have fallen to lay pink insulation bare to the elements. Palm trees and foliage grow unabated and basketball courts and cul-de-sac playground areas stand empty.

Molds and mildew spread across the exterior siding of many units.

It wasn't always like this.

In its heyday, new housing was the talk of the island. It sported second-floor views, private backyards enclosed by privacy fencing, and larger storage areas and kitchens. With much aplomb, the garrison held a soft-opening and ribbon-cutting ceremony in 1988 to allow community members to tour furnished model homes.

Kwajalein Hourglass feature writer Megan Stegmann reported on plans for a March 1989 opening for the entire development. Occupancy was set to begin in August of that year.

Stegmann also spoke with then-acting site manager for USACE Rob Lewis, who said praised the construction and design: "The Morrison-Knudsen contractors went even beyond their scope of work in the design of the new homes, enlarging the total living space as well as usable storage and closet areas."

To understand the excitement, know that silver-sided modular homes, bach-

elor quarters and old Navy housing were the only housing available housing options on island at the time. The sheer size of the new quarters caused visitors to marvel, wrote Stegmann. Imagine—even more places to store things.

"After seeing the spacious home, one woman said, 'I was surprised [with the large size of the house] because it doesn't look that big from the outside.'

Remarking on the spacious homes, she said, 'I'd never have to ask someone to move so I could get up from the table. I'd never have to put my ironing board away, and I wouldn't need a ladder to get into my cupboards.'"

Of course, the big question on everyone's mind was who would be eligible to live in the beautiful new homes. In 1988, the garrison public affairs office reported that eligibility would be determined using a process like that utilized today—with one exception. Some of the three-bedroom units would be prioritized for families.

With the eventual closure of the homes came the loss of the island's most modern and sophisticated living

options. Yet the derelict homes persist, posing an uncomfortable ellipsis at the semi-ending to a bygone era.

While the loose insulation poses no health risk other than as a potential irritant, "spectators" have voiced concerns over the recent strong winds and potential for loose debris to be caught in the wind. The impending demolition will solve these concerns, and then some—when it happens. Adjustments to the original demolition date for the homes by the Army Corps of Engineers have been extended from 2019 into the future to an unforeseeable date.

In the meantime, the homes continue to disintegrate within the confines of a safety enclosure.

Incongruously, across the street stand the island's dome homes—the most recent addition to island housing.

The opening of new housing was a noteworthy milestone in island history. Though some of the homes are still functional, its heyday has long since passed. Let's hope the new year brings a real opportunity to clear this space to make room for what comes next.

TORPEDOES FOUND ON ROI GOLF COURSE

It's easy to overlook unexploded ordnance when you don't know what to look for.

It was 20 years ago today that The Kwajalein Hourglass reported a unique find on Roi-Namur: a familiar and long-neglected protrusion on the golf course that turned out to be something far more deadly. Feature writer KW Hillis covered the story of how Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal stepped in to handle the threat.

Over the years, a lot of people have walked behind the ladies' tee box on Roi-Namur golf course hole number two. They probably would have tread more carefully if they had known that 2,000-pound torpedoes rested under their feet.

Saturday, Dec. 1, golfer Bog Smooth took a second look at a familiar, eight-inch circular disk protruding an inch above the ground and called the police, said Thomas Eisele, senior explosive ordnance device technician.

"Lawnmowers running over it have flaked the metal away until [explosives] were exposed," Eisele said. "Apparently, a lot of people had seen it but didn't know what it was. [Smith was] an EOD laborer

on Kaho'olawe with me ... he knew what he was looking at and gave us a call."

Kaho'olawe is a Hawaiian island that was used as a bombing range and is now being cleaned of munitions, Eisele added.

"I saw what looked like clay, and that's what got my attention," Smith said. "We don't have clay out here. ...I knew it was something explosive."

The police immediately roped off the area, but IFT-7 took priority until EOD personnel could come to Roi-Namur Wednesday. After closing both the road and golf course as added precautions, the team started digging, said Joshua Rich, EOD technician and team leader.

"With such a little bit showing we thought it may be a 100-pound bomb," Eisele said. "It turned out to be two Japanese torpedoes ... one doesn't have much of a warhead, the other has over 500 pounds of high explosive. That was the one that was showing."

Although there is always a chance of explosion, the torpedoes were not fused, Eisele said, explaining that just the "explosives, body of the torpedo and propulsion system" were there.

The torpedoes are now being held in the ordnance holding area, but special precautions are being taken, said Rudy Gil, USAKA Safety acting chief.

"To my recollection, we have never

found anything as big as what we found on Roi this week," Gil said. "We have to put some restrictions around the area where they are stored."


Areas include the Japanese cemetery and holes 12 and 13 at the golf course.

After a Saturday morning meeting with USAKA and Raytheon Safety, Environmental, Launch Ordnance and EOD, Gil said the restriction would remain in place until further notice.

"We are looking at a couple of different options, and we still want to get more information from Navy EOD on ways to dispose of these torpedoes," Gil said.

You are sure to have noticed a few key differences in how Hillis described the island community from 2001. Two decades ago, the prime contract for base operations support and range activities was operated by Raytheon. The garrison was known as "USAKA"—a name still reflected in range safety literature today—before an official name change later.

Other aspects of atoll life remain the same. Perhaps least surprising of all of is that UXO continues to be found in and around Kwajalein Atoll; we live and work on a WWII battlefield. Do your part by familiarizing yourself with the three r's of UXO found later in this issue of The Kwajalein Hourglass.

U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

On Dec. 9, 1961, the Nike-Zeus Program conducted its "toughest test yet."

Largely unreported, it was a shallow angle firing over the extended range—or more specifically—a low altitude flight down the Pacific Missile Range from Pt. Mugu, California.

In contrast, all previous tests had been high altitude flights which proved easier to control using ground-based radar. The accomplishment was soon overshadowed. Five days later, the project office conducted three separate NIKE-Zeus tests within an hour.

From Pt. Mugu, the Nike-Zeus team achieved their longest and highest flight to date. At the Kwajalein Test Site, the Nike-Zeus was launched against a space point in the first firing from the facility. Finally, at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, the Nike-Zeus successfully acquired, tracked and intercepted a high altitude, maneuvering Nike-Hercules ballistic missile target.

Extant U.S. Army records from the test note the spotting charge burst was "well within the lethal radius of the Zeus warhead."

In what was described as "a major ABM system milepost," the team achieved the first intercept of a Hercules guided missile and the first successful integrated system test.

HEALTH, TRAVEL AND VACCINE UPDATES

U.S. ENTRY REQUIREMENT

Attention all residents and TDY travelers departing from Kwajalein on United Airlines.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention now require that all passengers have a negative COVID test one day prior to departure.

How does this impact you? If you are traveling to the U.S., you must come to the Kwajalein Hospital during the week prior to departure day for your COVID test and to schedule your weekend swab.

FOR THOSE TRAVELING DEC. 27 - 28 AND JAN. 3 - 4

The Kwajalein Hospital will be closed for the Christmas and New Year's Eve holidays.

If you are departing from Kwajalein on United Airlines Dec. 27 - 28 and Jan. 3 - 4, all Covid-19 testing arrangements must be made prior to these dates.

Passengers must visit the hospital no later than the Friday prior to their respective flights to make payments, and must visit the hospital lab to arrange testing times.

HEALTH CONNECTION: CONSTIPATION AND PERSONAL HEALTH

COMMUNITY CONNECTION / DR. NICK BIRD, CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER

Last week, you heard from Dr. Nick Bird, Kwajalein Hospital chief medical officer, about lifestyle changes that can help alleviate hypertension.

This week, we get up close and personal with the trials and tribulations of the lower gastrointestinal system, as well as tips for alleviating pain and symptoms. Here's a first clue: Drink more water.

Q) What is constipation?

Constipation results from having insufficient frequency and volume of bowel movements.

Slow transit of stool within the large bowel, or colon, contributes to drying, hardening and difficulty passing stool. For many, fewer than three bowel movements a week may suggest constipation. Constipation is frequently considered when passing small, dry, hard pellet stools—even if daily.

What does constipation feel like?

Common descriptions include dry stools and the need to strain with bowel movements. Some experience abdominal fullness, lower abdominal cramping, bloating and the feeling of incomplete emptying with bowel movements.

Reduced energy, appetite, and a "feeling of heaviness" are frequently described. Straining may also produce hemorrhoids and minimal rectal bleeding.

What factors contribute to constipation?

There are many factors associated with constipation. Key factors that make constipation more likely include a diet low in fiber found in whole grains fruits and vegetables; insufficient water intake; and inactivity.

Additional health factors that may increase the likelihood of constipation include stress, diabetes, certain medications, illness, pregnancy and being an older adult, although people of all ages can become constipated.

What can you do to maintain regular bowel habits?


Step 1 Lifestyle changes

- Add more fiber to your diet. Reduce the amount or stop eating processed foods, white bread, and white rice. Start eating more vegetables, fruits and whole grains or high fiber cereal and fiber supplements.
- Increase your consumption of water. If you are backed up, start with drinking about two liters of water per day. The goal is to have light-colored urine, an indicator of good hydration status, and good urine volume. If your urine is dark and of small volume, or you're only urinating one to two times per day, you are not drinking enough water.
- Exercise regularly—even if it's just an evening walk. Movement and activity are very helpful for reducing stress, keeping us healthy and encouraging bowel activity.

Step 2 Medications (laxatives)

Stool softeners like Colace gently help, but they require you to drink sufficient water. These are safe and gentle.

Osmotic laxatives range from gentle (polyethylene glycol - Miralax) and milk of magnesia, to more aggressive options like magnesium citrate.



Miralax is safe and gentle and can be used both regularly and as needed. Magnesium citrate frequently causes cramping and should be used with some relative caution.

Stimulants like Senna (Senokot, Ex-Lax), and Dulcolax may cause cramping due to increased bowel activity. As with other laxatives, these work better when you also drink lots of water or combine with stool softeners.

If these things do not help after two to three days, or you would prefer to receive physician consultation prior to taking medications, please make an appointment.

MAILING RESTRICTIONS ON E-CIGARETTES, SIMILAR DEVICES

The United States Postal Service has posted its final ruling on part 47 of Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted and Perishable Mail. The rule implements new restrictions on mailing Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems, or ENDS, including their liquids, parts, components and accessories.

ENDS devices include any device that delivers a substance—not just nicotine—via an aerosolized solution to users inhaling from the device. These include electronic cigarettes, e-hookahs or vape pens.

All such items are prohibited in inbound and outbound international mail effective immediately. This includes mail to and from overseas military and diplomatic addresses. For more information, visit the USPS Postal Pro online at <https://postalpro.usps.com/node/10267>.

IS IT YOUR APO BOX? THEN IT SHOULD BE YOUR MAIL, TOO.

Help U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll and garrison Postal Operations do their part to protect physical security on island. Island residents are not authorized to share use of their mailbox with unauthorized customers.

Only yourself or registered members of your immediate island household may check and withdraw mail from your mailbox. Please do not give out the combination to anyone not authorized to collect your mail.

Registered APO holders on Kwajalein may elect to have an individual collect packages and letter mail during the APO box holder's extended travel. If this convenience is desired, APO box holders should visit the post office to arrange for temporary authorization for mail pick-up.



UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- **Recognize** an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- **Retreat** from the area of the UXO; and
- **Report** suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 5-1433. You can also call CPS at 5-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- **Location.** Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- **Size of the UXO** as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

For a detailed refresher on UXO safety, attend the new island orientation or call Kwajalein EOD at 5-1433.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Pleasant conditions have been seen within Kwajalein Atoll over the last week thanks to limited atmospheric moisture and a muted subtropical ridge between low pressures in the central Pacific.

These conditions are expected to persist through the first half of the weekend until a trade wind push to finish the weekend brings moisture into the area.

Monday will see a higher likelihood of showers and gusty conditions, persisting into the start of the workweek.

Next week, moderate to fresh northeast to east breezes with occasional to frequent higher gusts for much of the time.

The back half of the workweek will see a reemergence of the Intertropical Convergence Zone within the area as the budding subtropical ridge from early in the week subsides, which allows the ITCZ to shift northward. Northeast to east-northeast winds will interact with east-southeast winds to create enhance convection within the Kwajalein Atoll region.

SATURDAY

Sunny to mostly sunny with stray morning showers. NE-E 6-11 knots

SUNDAY

Sunny to mostly sunny with stray to isolated evening showers. NE-E 5-10 knots becoming 9-14 knots with occasional higher gusts.

MONDAY

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered to scattered showers. NE-E 11-16 knots with occasional to frequent higher gusts, especially near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Moderate to fresh breezes from the northeast to east with gusty conditions are expected to start the workweek. Widely scattered showers are expected to become stray to isolated trade wind showers as the week progresses.

Later in the workweek winds are expected veer towards the east-southeast creating more widely scattered showers within the atoll as the ITCZ reenters the area and break wind speeds to moderate breezes from the east-northeast to east-southeast.


