GARRISON COMMUNITY WELCOMES BACK RMI TRADE FAIR

Kwajalein residents gathered at the Corlett Recreation Center Nov. 7 for the grand opening of a special, returning event.

The annual Marshallese Trade Fair was cancelled last year due to the impact of Covid-19 on travel and logistics outside the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Much anticipated, this year's event attendees welcomed back guests and vendors from Majuro and Ebeye, selling an array of fresh foods and handcrafted gift items, many of them made in the outer islands.

RMI Minister of Natural Resources and Commerce John Silk, USAG-KA Commander Col. Thomas Pugsley and USAG-KA Director of Host Nation Activities Maj. Jay Parsons opened the ceremony with words of welcome.

Pugsley, a first-time trade fair attendee, thanked the community members and guests queued outside for their support for an event which continues to have a positive impact on the island community.

"We are excited to offer up an opportunity for our community here on Kwajalein to share and to spend some time with our host nation," Pugsley said. "We have a lot of vendors, friends and families from Ebeye and Majuro, fresh foods, unique fish and an unbelievable selection of handicrafts."

Early visitors had their pick of fresh yellowfin tuna and marlin at an outdoor sales tent. Inside the CRC, new island residents greeted members of the atoll community, tried new foods and took the opportunity to truly "shop local."

One of those shoppers is Tina Hop-

"I got marlin jerky," Hopkins said. She also picked up handicrafts and a tub of spiced mangoes and was eager to try the new foods.

Nearby, Kwaj resident Jay Thornton sipped a "bob" milkshake made from pandanus and ice cream.

"I've never had anything like it before," he said. "It's very sweet."

But not everyone at the trade fair is a first-time shopper.

Kwajalein resident Labtak Langrus made a beeline for tables laden with Majuro produce and purchased a bag of fresh papaya and bottles of sweet coconut drinks and syrups.

"It's not always easy to find these things here," said Langrus, a Marshallese citizen.

Elsewhere, others hunted for the latest styles in locally-made jewelry.

Kalani Riklon paused at a table of necklaces and wuts from Arno Atoll studded with small, brown cowries. She was searching for a wide cuff bracelet made from these shells, but a new product caught her eye.

For Riklon, the product tells the story of its origin, an initiative marketed by the RMI Ministry of Natural Resources and Commerce as "one island, one product."

Often, it is women residents of the outer islands, Riklon said, who design and weave the finely detailed handicrafts that shoppers covet and collect each year.

She pointed out the latest in wut style—a wide, double-band of shells studded with faux black pearls—and described how she shops. "We don't have these shells [in such abundance] everywhere," Riklon said. "They are collected far away and shipped in for the fair. Many things purchased here help to support those people living in the outer islands."

STORIES TO TELL OUR DAUGHTERS: WOMEN UNITED TOGETHER, MARSHALL ISLANDS

The assault was wrong.

Afterward, when preteen Cindy Wase told her grandmother she'd been sexually assaulted by a drunk cousin, the older woman asked her not to tell her grandfather. To her, the reason seemed simple.

"He'll kill him," her grandmother said. Wase, now a mother, regularly sees her tormenter walk free, and she remembers.

Instead of staying silent, Wase found the opportunity to speak. Today, she is one member in a team of women advocates for human rights throughout the RMI. WUTMI—Women United Together Marshall Islands—serves women aged 14 and older who have been targeted or are experiencing domestic assault and gender-based violence. In addition to offering counseling, assistance and safe harbor to women who seek help, with the help of international sponsors, WUTMI offers medical screenings for colorectal cancer, breast cancer and women's health exams.

A local WUTMI office, Weto In Mour, opened on Ebeye earlier this year. Staff members there are working on a way to open a safehouse.

Wase is rare. She is a woman who is being heard, and she wants others like her to speak up.

According to a national survey published by WUTMI in 2014, more than 65 percent of Marshallese female respondents had experienced gender-based domestic violence and sexual assault. According to that survey, 90 percent never tell anyone.

"I still see him around," Wase said. After joining WUTMI—Women United Together Marshall Islands—Wase became a victim advocate for the chance to do something few might expect: to talk.

"I thought maybe my story could help someone," she said. "I want them to know they are not alone. ... I didn't know about anything like WUTMI before."

WUTMI hopes to spread its message to unite women in their struggle for equal human rights. Part of that work is educating the communities around the RMI about what to do and how to respond and offer the best assistance.

Thanks to support from the USAG-KA SHARP program and Legal Counsel,

during a recent visit to USAG-KA, Wase and team members were able to begin those conversations with members of the island community. WUTMI met with emergency responders, law enforcement and school and health officials to discuss Marshallese women's cultural concerns in asking for help.

A speaking engagement with island high school students is tentatively planned for next year.

As more women and girls learn that they can speak up, justice is being built slowly. More voices area speaking out.

"My daughter is 11-years old, now," said Wase. "I talk to her. I tell her what to look out for."

Even if only a few people hear Wase's story, she hopes she can help them work through a terrible ordeal toward a healthier outlook.

"If you are a woman or girl who has experienced sexual assault, speak up," said Wase. "It will cause more problems if you stay quiet. It can be traumatizing. You are not alone."

THIS WEEK IN KWAJALEIN HOURGLASS HISTORY: VETERANS DAY 2001 HELD AT RICH THEATER

The tradition of honoring those who served in the armed forces continues this Veterans Day with a noon ceremony on Nov. 11.

But in a break with tradition, the event will take place at the Richardson Theater, not at the flagpole area near the airport as in previous years. The idea behind the move is to accommodate a larger crowd, according to Pres Lockridge, USAKA Public Affairs officer.

Lockridge said that with Soldiers again in harm's way, it's more important than ever for the public to support its veterans.

"We're hoping to have a big crowd out," Lockridge said. "We had such good success with the candlelight ceremony after the Sept. 11 attacks."

The ceremony includes remarks by

Col. Curtis L. Wrenn, Jr., USAKA commander, and Lt. Col. Clarence Johnson, RTS range commander, who will represent all veterans.

Also expect a more musical program this year, with performances by the Jr./Sr. High School Band, the Chapel Quintet, the Chapel Trip and "Amazing Grace" by the Kwajalein Pipes and Drum Corps.

Veterans Day traces its origins back to 1918, when on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, a hush fell over the battlefields of Europe. WWI, the war to end all wars, was over. One year later, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 Armistice Day to celebrate the end of the war to honor those who fought.

In 1954, Armistice Day was redesignated "Veterans Day" to honor all American veterans, living and deceased, whether they served in war or peacetime.

"It should be a very nice ceremony, and we hope everybody comes out," Lockridge said.

Kids can make a difference in the world. It seeks to heighten awareness of the fact that the climate crisis is a child rights crisis, and to acknowledge the historic movement of children and young people demanding urgent action and that their voices be heard."

Q) What are concerning signs of possible skin cancer and when should I go to the hospital?

There are different types of skin cancers, and they all come in different shapes, sizes, colors and locations. When diagnosed and treated early, most are highly curable. The key is early detection and treatment.

The most concerning and life-threatening skin cancer is melanoma. Melanomas develop in melanocytes, the cells that produce melanin, or skin pigment. As such, they are commonly dark in color and most frequently present on sun exposed areas of the body, often seen on the backs of men, and legs of women. They can occur in other locations like under nails or very rarely in eyes. Look for a new or enlarging dark mole or changing birthmark. Melanomas frequently have irregular borders and different shades of color and may or may not be raised. If you see something new, unusual or changing, get checked right away.

Merkel cell carcinoma is a rare but dangerous cancer that forms from the basal layer of the epidermis (top layer of the skin) in sun exposed areas. Risk factors include fare skin, sun exposure, male, and immunocompromised state after organ transplant or other medical therapy. This cancer can metastasize and recur.

The most common skin cancers are basal cell, squamous cell, and the precancer actinic keratosis. These usually present on sun exposes areas of the face, ears, arms or hands. AKs are rough to the touch and appear a little red on fair skinned people. Basal and squamous cell carcinomas usually manifest in sun exposed areas of the face, neck, ears, arms and hands, are locally invasive—meaning they do not metastasize—and may present as bumps or sores that don't heal or heal and return. These are very treatable, especially if caught early.

In summary, if you find a spot or area of skin that is changing in color, has irregular borders, growing, crusts, scabs, bleeds and doesn't heal within about three weeks, please come to the hospital for an examination.


U.S. Entry Requirement for Unvaccinated Travelers Entering the United States

Attention unvaccinated residents and TDY personnel departing Kwajalein via United Airlines. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention now require unvaccinated passengers to have a negative Covid-19 test one day prior to departure.

How does this impact you?

If you are traveling to the U.S., you must visit the Kwajalein Hospital during regular business hours the week before your departure to pay for your Covid-19 test and to schedule your weekend swab. The hospital is open 8 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

MAILING RESTRICTIONS ON E-CIGARETTES, SIMILAR DEVICES

The United States Postal Service has posted its final ruling on part 47 of Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted and Perishable Mail. The rule implements new restrictions on mailing Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems, or ENDS, including their liquids, parts, components and accessories.

ENDS devices include any device that delivers a substance—not just nicotine—via an aerosolized solution to users inhaling from the device. These include electronic cigarettes, e-hookahs or vape pens.







PUBLIC SHEETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Remember the three Rs of UXO: Recognize an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance. Retreat from the area of the UXO. Report suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures.

Look but do not touch. For a detailed refresher, please attend the Island Orientation Briefing on the fourth Wednesday of every month.

WEATHER WATCH

WEATHER DISCUSSION: The epic battle between the wetand dry-season is presently taking place over the Marshall Islands.

This tug-of-war between a strengthening subtropical ridge to the north and an active Intertropical Convergence Zone to the south will help instigate a wide range of potential conditions over the Kwajalein Atoll over the coming week. Locally, a weak upper tropospheric trough to the north of RMI will help aggravate the ITCZ over the coming days, before weakening further and scooting off to the west later this weekend.

As this trough becomes less relevant, the ITCZ will slowly ease back to the south, relieving the atoll from much of the cloud and shower coverage that has become so normal this past week. By the start of the workweek, ridging to the north will help suppress the ITCZ, allowing for easterly trade winds to increase while limiting shower activity.

There is some uncertainty in next week's weather, as numerical models differ on the overall evolution of the ridge; some models want to develop a ridge more akin to a dry-season like pattern, while others want to develop a lo-

calized trough that would aggravate the ITCZ once again, causing it to behave similarly to how it has been over the last few days.

Based on present information, we believe at least a temporary flare up of activity is likely next week.

SATURDAY AND SUNDAY:

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers becoming partly sunny with isolated showers at times. A few brief periods of overcast skies and scattered showers are possible from time to time. Winds ENE-E at 9-14 knots with occasional higher gusts.

MONDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds ENE-E at 10-15 knots decreasing to 7-12 knots, with higher gusts near showers.

TUESDAY: Partly to mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers and winds ENE-ESE at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near showers. Some showers may contain blustery conditions.

NEXT WEEK: ITCZ activity will be most concentrated over the southern Marshall Islands while occasional surges of activity impact the Kwajalein Atoll. ENE-ESE trade winds will remain elevated for the remainder of the workweek.


