RMI, USAG-KA COMMEMORATE ENNUBIRR CONSTRUCTION

HOURLASS REPORT

On the island of Ennubirr, the future is being built, one structure at a time.

Young island residents, traditional leaders and personnel from U.S. Embassy Majuro, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll and the Republic of the Marshall Islands government convened on Ennubirr Nov. 23 for the special dedication of construction projects in the island community.

Residents now have access to a new, completed schoolhouse, clinic and water catchment system. Personnel from USAG-KA command and the U.S. Navy conducted the groundbreaking on the multi-room schoolhouse during the 2019 Pacific Partnership, a relationship-building, multi-national naval activity.

In addition to the hospital and school, the Ennubirr community now has full use of an emergency evacuation center. Several of the projects are part of long-

term construction built by the U.S. Navy Seabees and the Kwajalein Atoll Development Authority.

In her official remarks, U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands Roxanne Cabral thanked the many groups who have contributed to the success of the community building projects.

FIREPOWERED

Happiness is about service, and service is about knowing you can count on your team, says Kwajalein Fire Department Crew Chief Angelo Smith. The firefighter and U.S. Air Force veteran recently shared his thoughts on dedication and commitment to the firefighter brotherhood on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll.

"I can't even consider what life would have been like if I'd had a different job in the military," Smith said. "For me, the fire service was the right place."

As a U.S. military recruit, Smith had interests in public affairs. Ultimately, Air Force fire service proved far more intriguing. What began as work became his calling. Smith has stayed the course ever since. His commitment to fire service remains the driving force in his day.

As the Kwajalein Fire Department faces the challenges of 2020 and prepares for the next year, the team's dynamic has proved invaluable.

"Firefighters run into places people run out of hysterical and scared," Smith said. "We remain calm and ready to go at all times. I know the firefighter going into that building with me is willing to put their life on the line. We have the same strength and mentality. We are going to make the rescue and get out of there together."

In addition to regular training, tasks, drills and maintenance duties, on any given day, KFD personnel can be found driving or crewing fire vehicles on Kwajalein, Meck and Roi-Namur to support the Army's mission. Due to travel restrictions and staffing requirements, many members of the small department have been on nonstop duty since early this spring to ensure the island community and its worksites are safe and supported. The team has maintained readiness. When needed, in five minutes or

less, a crew will arrive onsite to respond a call for help.

The long hours are mitigated by camaraderie and discipline, said Smith. Everyone has their own way to stay focused.

"We keep going," said Smith. "We keep our minds and bodies in shape. If something happens, we will be there for you."

Some, like Smith, find a quiet place to sit with coffee before beginning the day. Other firefighters cook. Over Thanksgiving, Assistant Chief Ronald Botts prepared Thanksgiving dinner for the team. Each Sunday evening, a firefighter prepares the team dinner.

"It keeps us grounded and levelheaded as we go along," said Smith. "Our chiefs are wonderful. After more than 240 days of work, we stick together."

For a firefighter, one simple meal means more than perhaps any island resident could know. If a firefighter gets through a meal, it means all is well.

"People in the community don't see the dinners or lunches we leave when we respond to a call," said Smith. "They don't need to see it. They just need to know we're there for them."

Talk about food with Smith, and he may tell you about the best dish from his hometown. He's partial to a certain pizzeria at Coney Island.

"You know you've got the right pizza if, while you're eating, the grease runs down your arm," said Smith. "That's when you know you have a good one. I'm from Brooklyn. If it isn't New York pizza, I'm just eating some thing."

Smith is ready for the challenges ahead. Together, KFD personnel will continue to keep USAG-KA safe. It's what the firefighter brotherhood does.

"The Kwajalein Fire Department is 'it' for me," said Smith. "The personnel stick together through the hardest times. We're there for each other. This is what keeps me in the fire service."

PCSING WITH A PET? GET A HARD-SIDED CARRIER

Though many island residents are staying on island this holiday season, it is never too late to plan for future travels—especially if you are a pet owner.

As of Aug. 10, a change in ATI flight transport regulations requires all incoming and outgoing pets to travel in a hard-sided carrier. Pets are not authorized to travel in the cabin with their owners and will be checked onto the plane. For their safety, pets must be transported in a hard-sided carrier.

Prospective and current island residents with pets considering future travel should plan in advance to obtain a hard-sided carrier, said USAG-KA Chief Warrant Officer 3 Alex Brown, garrison aviation officer. Military working dogs and service dogs for the blind are not bound by this rule.

Pet owners affected by 14-day quarantine in Hawaii should make advance arrangements with the state's pet quarantine authority to have their pet's health certificate verified while they complete their own 14 days.

"Since most pets will arrive [in Honolulu] before the 14 days begins, it is suggested owners make any appointments for the health certificate about five days out from travel," said Brown. "This ensures they will not exceed the 10-day requirement which would result in having a second certificate issued."

Following completion of quarantine for both pet and owner, the certificate undergoes review by both Brown and the Kwajalein vet tech. It is a last, important piece of required paperwork required before booking travel.

REMEMBER THE MARSHALLESE SCOUTS

KWAJALEIN HOURGLASS ARCHIVE

Hideo Milne, former marine and recreation superintendent at U.S. Army garrison-Kwajalein Atoll—called USA-KA in the 1990s—was just a baby when the Americans came to the Marshall Islands during World War II. Although he doesn't remember those days, he has cherished recollections about historic events of the era from his relatives who were interpreters and scouts for the Americans during the war. He recalls how the uncles were recruited and worked.

After the invasion of Kwajalein, U.S. servicemen came to Ebon, where Hideo's family lived. There were very few Japanese living on Ebon at that time, says Hideo. The Japanese fired upon the Americans and were subsequently killed.

Afraid, the Marshallese on Ebon approached the Americans with a flag of truce. The Soldiers asked for Hideo's uncles: Edward, James M., James K. and Walter Milne, all grandsons of a Scottish whaling captain and a Gilbertese woman. The Americans knew the men spoke English and wanted them to translate and reassure the Marshallese that they would not be killed.

Hideo's uncles boarded a landing ship tank vessel where they joined up with Dwight Heine, grandson of the missionary Carl Heine, and several other Marshallese men who had been picked up by the Americans on other islands. They all went to Kwajalein and worked as interpreters and scouts for the American forces.

The scouts helped with the "mop up" or securing of the islands and atolls that were not heavily fortified by the Japanese. They went ashore at night to check on the Japanese and explain to the Marshallese that the Americans meant them no harm.

Edward also told Hideo that, at first, the Marshallese were afraid of him. Marshallese people in those days, he explained, did not travel to other islands. With his light skin and bald head, Edward did not appear to be Marshallese.

The Marshallese were fearful of the Japanese who had confiscated food and severely punished them if they didn't cooperate. The Japanese also told the Marshallese that the Americans would kill everyone.

The Americans bypassed fortified bases on Jaluit, Maloelap, Mili and Wotje atolls. Although they didn't invade, U.S. forces harassed those bases daily with bullets and bombs.

Edward and other scouts went on reconnaissance missions on those atolls to report on the condition of the Marshallese and Japanese there. When he

was on Maloelap, Edward learned that his brother Alex was imprisoned at the camp on Taroa, Maloelap.

Alex had disappeared after some American pilots had been shot down. When the Japanese came to get him to interpret, he was out gathering breadfruit. Suspecting he was trying to help the pilots, the Japanese took him away from his family. They never saw him again.

Visiting Maloelap in the 1950s, Hideo found a grave bearing Alex's name. The Marshallese at Taroa said he'd been beheaded.

Hideo's uncles are gone, and with them, important information about a significant time.

"They rarely talked about that time," says Hideo. "And only when I asked. I'm glad I asked about that time of their lives—but I wish I had asked more."

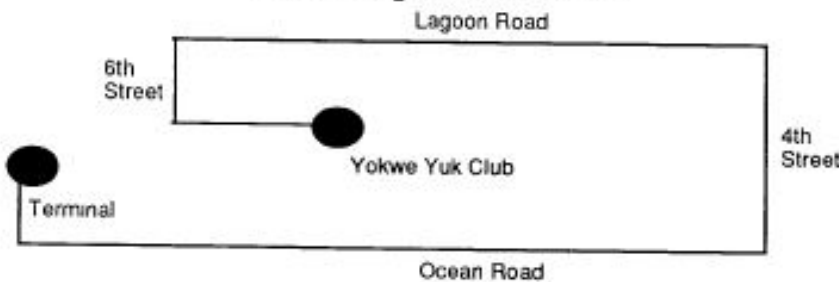
Santa and Mrs. Claus are scheduled to arrive on Kwajalein at the air terminal next Friday at 5 p.m.

Chorus to perform "The Messiah"

The Kwajalein Christmas Chorus will perform "The Messiah", a sacred oratorio by George Frederick Handel, on Sunday at 7 p.m. in the Island Memorial Chapel.

The 48 member chorus, along with soloists and instrumentalists, will present selections from the oratorio, concluding with the "Hallelujah" chorus.

Handel composed "The Messiah" in 1741. It is his most successful and best-known oratorio, as well as one of the most frequently performed major sacred works. It was last performed on Kwajalein in 1983.

This year's presentation will include ten of the choruses, and solos by Steve Thomas, Karen Eastburn, Alix Taylor, Ginny Briskie and Cheryl Shields. Sharon Cann will play piano, assisted by Sara Chiu and Nathan Ahlgren on flute and Francesca Dillman on oboe. Director for the ensemble is Dick Shields.

The use of cameras or recording devices will not be permitted during the performance.

Anyone wishing to record or photograph the work is invited to the rehearsal on Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the chapel.

During the holiday season we tend to share more photos and communicate more with friends and family. As you do so we'd like to remind you to practice good operational security: OPSEC.

Be aware of what is in the background of your photos, don't take photos of restricted areas and remember that sharing the following information is prohibited.

1. **Current, Ongoing and Future Operations Details**

Examples: Mobilization, deployment schedules, stationing, logistical shortfalls, readiness levels, rosters

2. **Critical Infrastructure**

Examples: Location, capabilities, weakness, airfields, communications

3. **Force Protection**

Examples: RAM measures, emergency response, new or emerging technology, access control, gaps, physical security

4. **C41 Locations, Capabilities and Vulnerabilities**

Examples: COOP, disaster plans, nodes

5. **Organizational Capabilities, Limitations and Vulnerabilities**

Examples: inspection results, AAR, surveys

6. **General Officer and VIP Itineraries**

Examples: Schedules, locations, special protective measures, visitors

7. **Budget and Resource Information**

Examples: Allocation, prioritization, shortfalls, contract specifics

8. **Threat Details to U.S. Forces, Agencies, Partner Nations**

Examples: Assessment, government control

9. **Personally Identifiable Information**

Examples: HIPPA, FOUO, LE-Sensitive, hiring actions, alert roster

10. **Detailed Casualty, Damage or Incident Reports**

Examples: SIR, police, Report of Survey 15-6 results

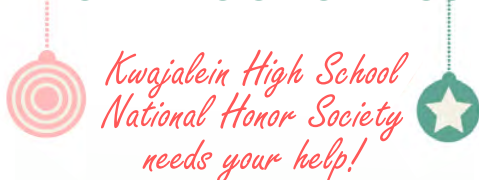

History with U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command



As early as 1959, the United Nations Report of the Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space observed the following: "Problems of re-entry and landing of space vehicles will exist both with respect to unmanned space vehicles and later with respect to manned vehicles of exploration.

Recognizing that landing may occur through accident, mistake or distress, members of the committee called attention to the desirability of the conclusion of multilateral agreements concerning re-entry and landing. Among the subjects that might be covered by such agreements would be the return to the launching state of the vehicle itself and—in the case of a manned vehicle—provision for the speedy return of personnel."

On Dec. 3, 1968, the Agreement on the Rescue of Astronauts, the Return of Astronauts and the Return of Objects launched into Outer Space—popularly known as the Rescue Agreement—entered into force.

The agreement builds upon Articles V and VIII of the 1967 Outer Space Treaty addressing requirements to notify the launching authority, to rescue and render aide to personnel as necessary and to return them promptly to the launching authority with similar language for a space object and its component parts. As of January 2020, 98 nations have ratified the treaty.

REMOVAL OF WATER FOUNTAIN FILTERS

Based on a sanitary survey conducted by the U.S. Army Public Health Center and an Environmental Performance Assessment and Assistance System audit by the U.S. Army Environmental Command, the Garrison Command made a decision to remove filters from all water fountains at USAG-KA, with the exception of water fountains at the schools.

The filters have the potential to grow bacteria if the fountains are not used regularly or are not maintained properly. The drinking water systems—potable water—on Kwajalein, Roi-Namur, and Meck meet the regulatory safe drinking water standards and, therefore, do not require additional filtration.

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

Glimpses of the dry season are appearing within the models with dry and increased trade winds expected within the region most of the next week. Drier conditions are expected through the rest of the work week with periods of isolated showers within the Kwajalein Atoll region.

Trade winds are expected leading into the weekend with winds weakening into the mid-to-low teens Saturday afternoon. Early this weekend will see widely scattered showers enter the area as a combination as a subtle wave and wind speed convergence enter the atoll early Sunday morning. After that, isolated showers are expected to linger during the weekend.

SATURDAY: Mostly to partly sunny with stray showers. NE-E at 14-19 knots with occasional

higher gusts becoming 11-16 knots.

SUNDAY: Mostly cloudy with scattered showers becoming partly sunny with isolated showers. NE-E at 14-19 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds NE-E at 14-19 with occasional higher gusts.

MID-WEEK: Average precipitation is expected next week with a subtropical ridge attempting to keep the Intertropical Convergence Zone at bay. The ITCZ is expected to make another push in the latter half of the week bringing widely scattered to scattered showers to the area. Trade winds at 15-20 knots likely with occasional to frequent higher gusts.

HOW WILL THEY APPROACH YOU OR GAIN ACCESS?

Official Foreign Visitors | Collectors may pose as members of a foreign government organization, or an intelligence or security service. Vetted Official Foreign Visitors and their entourage may include last minute, unvetted substitutions.

Conference/Expo/Tradeshow | Public venues align new technologies and Subject Matter Experts. The adversary can collect personal information through registration and/or sign-in.

Academic Solicitation | “Innocent” requests for information may come from students, professors, scientists, or researchers; a foreign affiliation may not be readily apparent.

Unsolicited Contact/Email | The adversary may use the name of a well known company to send requests for military-related information. This method is fast and often undetected.

Joint Research Ventures | Alerts an adversary to current scientific initiatives and the military’s latest activities, allowing for tailored contact attempts.

Front Companies | The adversary may shield their true identity by using a shell company or subsidiary typically financed by a foreign bank and with connections to a foreign business or embassy.

WHO IS AT RISK?

Cleared defense contractors and scientific researchers—because of who you are, what you research, and your knowledge of manufacturing processes, prototypes, and developed products.

WHO ARE THEY?

Traditional Collectors | Foreign Governments and Foreign Businesses whose intent is to illegally acquire information or trade secrets.

Non-Traditional | Can be anyone: scientists, researchers and developers, students, or sometimes our trusted colleagues who work along side us.

WHAT MAKES YOU A VALUABLE TARGET?

You have access to valuable insider and proprietary information. In the hands of the adversary, it can shorten their R&D efforts, counter our tech advantage, and cost us untold billions of dollars.

WHAT IS YOUR OBLIGATION TO REPORT?

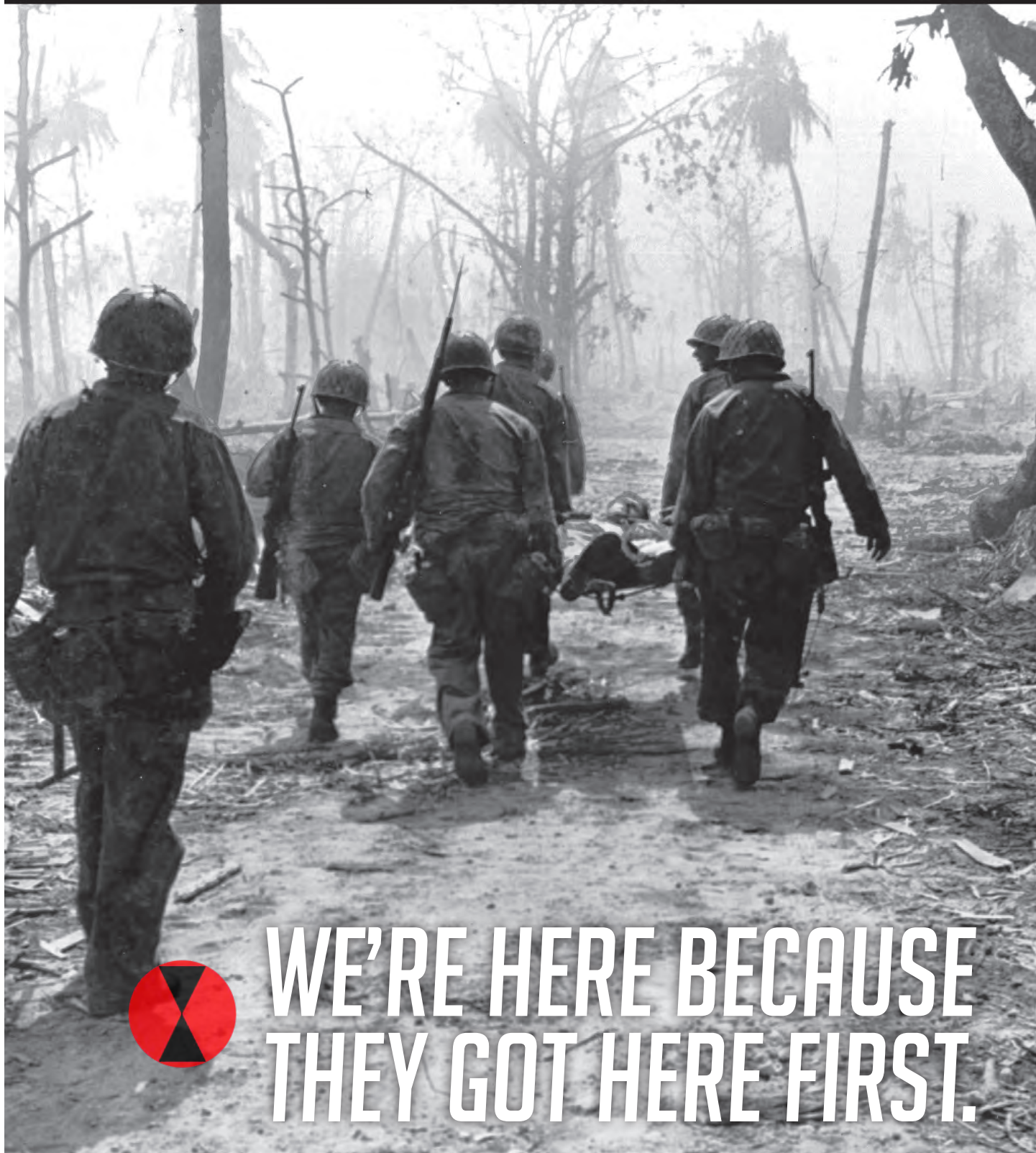
