



LOOKING FOR A DIRECTION ON KWAJ

The Kwajalein Hourglass thanks former Kwajalein resident and historian Bill Remick for permitting KHG to reprint these historic photographs from his collection, and for his account of several historic Kwajalein landmarks.

Directional signposts were a common feature on faraway and remote American outposts. GIs all over the world erected them during WWII to provide a little connection to home. Yet, it seems Kwajalein was an exception for many years.

Having reviewed Kwajalein photographs from WWII through the Korean War-era, I can't find even a hint of a directional post on Kwajalein island

There was once such a post on neighboring Ebeye, which once operated as a U.S. Navy seaplane base. A photo of that sign has lately appeared on the last page of The Kwajalein Hourglass with "Kwajalein Atoll" painted on the top, it gives the appearance of being on Kwajalein.

However, other photos of the signpost from different angles reveal a direction arrow pointing to Kwajalein, located three miles away.

The first dated photo of a directional signpost on Kwajalein is from 1956—the same year the oceanside memorial cross was first erected.

Interestingly enough, a photo from 1961 shows a sign nailed to the cross to inform the viewer it was erected in 1956 for "the first Easter service in the world" that year on April 1, due to Kwajalein's proximity to the International Dateline.

The little rise that the cross

sat on was leftover quarry material used by U.S. Navy Seabees and contractors building the "old Navy housing" as it is called now, and the Kwaj Lodge. Either concurrently or shortly after the cross was erected, the Navy put up a directional signpost and moved an old Japanese anchor next to it.

The proximity to the island's air terminal, chapel and the Kwaj Lodge has led to this group of monuments being frequently photographed over the years. The signpost was even the subject of some humor. In 1962, operations associated with the Nike Zeus program were also taking place on Ascension Island in the Atlantic Ocean. Check out a globe of the Earth, and you will find Ascension located nearly opposite of Kwajalein. So, someone nailed up two direction arrows to Ascension Island. One pointed to a route around the world, and one pointed straight down.

When the Army took over Kwajalein operations in July 1964, the direction pole and anchor received special attention from the new management.

According to the island rumor mill at that time, the anchor was reported to be particularly offensive, and it was moved posthaste to a site next to the Small Boat Marina.

At the same time, it seems the direction pole was moved to the gate area of the Kwajalein air terminal. In those days, the gates were outdoors, and it was a major social event for residents to meet arrivals and say goodbye to good friends.

The direction pole was renovated a few times at this new location, but follow-





ing the events of 9/11, the open-access gate area was closed.

Not long after that, the pole was moved to the curbside of the street outside the terminal entrance. It has remained there since.

In 2014, due to safety reasons, the terminal was condemned and has remained closed ever since. It is slated for demolition at a date yet to be determined.

There is no doubt that operation will require clearing the general area for construction access needed to build Kwajalein's new air terminal.

When that occurs, it would be fitting for the directional pole to be returned to the mound near the oceanside cross, where for many years it pointed the way. 1) The signpost appears in the Kwajalein air terminal gate area in this 1974 Kwaj calendar photo. MARSHALL ISLANDS LOOKS TO RELAX HAWAII QUARANTINE, RAMPS UP COVID VACCINES

The head of the Marshall Islands government's National Disaster Committee is hopeful the government will adopt a reduced quarantine policy for people coming to the Marshall Islands starting next month.

Since it began allowing people into the country in mid-2020, the Marshall Islands has maintained one of the world's strictest Covid-prevention entry systems. As a result, this western Pacific nation remains one of the few countries in the world that is still Covid-free, even as many of its Pacific neighbors have seen their first Covid spread in the past several weeks.

Chief Secretary Kino Kabua, the NDC chairperson, said that in line with United Airlines being unable to continue a "travel bubble" for repatriation groups meant the longer quarantine of sevento-14-days "does not make any sense" to continue. She also said the significant decline in Hawaii Covid cases was a positive sign for looking to reduce the quarantine period from seven to three days.

Currently, the Marshall Islands requires seven days of managed quarantine with multiple Covid tests in Hawaii for people who are fully vaccinated, and 14 days quarantine for those who are not. On arrival in Marshall Islands, they must quarantine for another 14 days.

The Ministry of Health and Human Services has recommended maintaining the status quo for the time being. The government's Cabinet has approved in principle the plan to move to a three-day quarantine period in Hawaii.

"United Airlines is not able to continue our safe travels bubble so we are getting feedback from folks who have returned to Marshall Islands, including a few government heads of agencies who just returned from personal and duty travel, that it does not make any sense to do seven days quarantine in a hotel and come to the airport to mix and mingle with everyone flying out," said Kabua.

"Folks outside the Marshall Islands have adapted to living with Covid-19 and that is something the Marshall Islands needs to accept. We need to accept, adapt and act."

She said the US Centers for Disease Control "does not recommend pre-quarantine before travel and it makes sense now for us because United Airlines cannot continue our travel bubble."

The Chief Secretary said it was essential to maintain the "quarantine on arrival in the Marshall Islands as it serves a purpose— to catch any cases while in strict quarantine and have them remain in quarantine until they are clear and no longer contagious before release into the community".

"It is all about controlled entry upon arrival and into the quarantine center until the quarantine phase is over and tests are negative."

The Marshall Islands has now shifted from its earlier repatriation program to what it calls the Safe Travels Program.

"Safe Travels Program started in Jan-

uary 2022," said the Chief Secretary. "March is when Marshall Islands citizens will need to pay for their quarantine costs in Honolulu and for the final phase in Marshall Islands."

Kabua is anticipating 60 to 80 people in the March Safe Travels groups.

"I expect a reduction in numbers because of the quarantine fees that a traveler will need to cover himself or herself," she said. The reduction to three days in Honolulu will also reduce the financial burden for citizens travelling.

For the repatriation program that started in October 2020, the Marshall Islands government "spent \$2.5 million and counting from budget support from our partners," said Kabua. "This budget support has been exhausted."

As part of an effort to ramp up the Covid vaccination rate in the country, the Ministry of Health and Human Services launched a house-to-house vaccine campaign - the same as it did 14 months ago when the Moderna vaccine first became available.

In the first two days of the campaign earlier this week, 1392 shots were administered, more than half of which, 748, were booster shots.

Over the past several months, as Covid booster shots became available, the uptake of the boosters has been modest.

Although there was a spike in people getting the third booster shot in January

after news of three positive Covid border cases at Kwajalein and the spread of Covid in Kiribati, Palau and elsewhere, the numbers dropped off by the end of January.

In the two weeks from 26 January to 9 February, only 140 people came into the hospitals on Majuro and Ebeye to get the boosters.

The first two days delivered nearly 10 times the number of shots administered in the previous two weeks.

"This is without question the best way to defend both you and your family against Covid-19," said Health Secretary Jack Niedenthal in a statement.

Vaccination "is the way we defeat this virus," Niedenthal said. "We know from other countries close by to us that those who have been vaccinated and 'boostered' do not get nearly as sick as those who have not. Most if not all of the hospitalizations and serious cases and even deaths are suffered by those who have not been vaccinated."

Niedenthal pointed out that people in the Marshall Islands are "vulnerable to this virus because we have extremely high numbers of people with diabetes and other health issues that causes Covid to be even worse."

Fifteen years ago this month, the community on then-U.S. Army-Kwajalein Atoll, or USAKA, dedicated two memorials near the island's runway. One memorial is dedicated to all the military families who have served on Kwajalein since 1944. The second remembers 11 nurses and the crew of a Navy VR-21 who were lost in an aircraft accident off the coast of Kwajalein on Sept. 19, 1950.

Beverly Vencill, secretary to the USA-KA commander, first proposed the concept in 2005. Assisted by former island resident Darlene Duarte, Kwajalein residents Melissa Dethlefsen and Dr. Doug Helper developed the design concept for the displays. The projects were funded by donations and a fish fry at the Vets Hall.

The ceremony featured two guest speakers, Capt. Lori Carlson, director of Health Services at the Naval Health Clinic Hawaii, Pearl Harbor Naval Base; and Lt. Col. Jeffrey Klein, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nation director.

Carlson commended the nurses for following a career path which would take them away from family and friends, "at a time when travel and communication was much more difficult than it is today to deliver world-class health care anytime, anywhere."

Later, standing before the memorial wall mural of flower leis representing the "aloha spirit," Klein observed that "this memorial will act as a touchstone to link a shared experience—living and working on Kwajalein Atoll." In an interview with The Kwajalein Hourglass, Vencill, Memorial Projects Program Chair, stated, "I want these people remembered for what they represented, their bravery, self-sacrifice."

Similarly, Venicill noted that the memorial wall celebrating the military personnel of Kwajalein was a way to "let them know that we do appreciate them."

The American Legion provided water during the 4:30 p.m. ceremony and invited island residents for a BBQ at the Veterans' Hall following the events

The VR-21 was en route from Barbers Point, Hawaii, to Tokyo to provide support for the war in Korea, with scheduled stops at Johnston Island, Kwajalein and Guam. The aircraft crashed soon af-

ter takeoff that night and exploded upon impact. There were no survivors.

All 26 persons on-board were members of the U.S. Navy. Ranging in age from 24 to 40, they came from towns and cities across the nation. Seven served as members of the air crew, while eight were members of the relief crew. The remaining 11 victims were with the U.S. Navy Nurse Corps. Nineteen were veterans of World War II.



SPORTS HEROES WHO SERVED: GERALD FORD

Sports Heroes Who Served is a series that highlights the accomplishments of athletes who served in the U.S. military.

Gerald Ford, 38th president of the United States, World War II Navy veteran and collegiate football star, is also the president who, in 1975, signed Public Law 94-106 admitting women to the all-male military colleges West Point, Annapolis and the Air Force Academy.

Even though the team won only one game in 1934, Ford was considered the team's star player.

He was a star player off the field, as well. That year, the Wolverines were scheduled to play Georgia Tech, which said it would not play Michigan if a Black player named Willis Ward took the field, and University officials kept Ward out of the game.

Ford was Ward's best friend on the team, and they roomed together during road trips. Ford threatened to quit the team in response to the university's decision. He eventually agreed to play against Georgia Tech, but it was only after Ward personally asked him to play.

On April 13, 1942, shortly after the start of World War II, Ford received a commission as an ensign in the Navy Reserve. He attended flight school in Annapolis, Maryland, and became an instructor at Navy Preflight School in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, where he taught navigation skills, ordnance, gunnery, first aid and military drill. He also coached swimming, boxing and football.

After Ford was promoted to lieutenant, in March 1943, he was assigned to the new aircraft carrier USS Monterey, at New York Shipbuilding Corporation, Camden, New Jersey.

From the ship's commissioning on June 17, 1943, until the end of December 1944, Ford served as the assistant navigator, athletic officer and antiaircraft battery of-

ficer on the Monterey.

In 1943, the Monterey saw combat action in the Pacific Theater, including at Makin Island in the Gilberts, and New Ireland. During the spring of 1944, the Monterey supported landings at Kwajalein and Eniwetok and participated in carrier strikes in the Marianas, Western Carolines, and northern New Guinea, as well as in the Battle of the Philippine Sea.

In November and December 1944, the Monterey's aircraft launched strikes against Wake Island and the Ryukyu Islands of Japan and supported the landings at Leyte and Mindoro in the Philippines.

The Monterey was one of several ships damaged by Typhoon Cobra that hit Navy Adm. William Halsey's Third Fleet on December 18-19, 1944. The Monterey was damaged by a fire, which was ignited by several of the ship's aircraft tearing loose from their cables and colliding on the hangar deck.

As the general quarters officer of the deck, it was Ford's job to assess the damage and help contain the fire. The ship got underway again but was declared unfit for service due to the extensive damage that occurred.


In 1945, Ford was stationed at the Navy Pre-Flight School at Saint Mary's College of California, where he was assigned to the athletic department until April 1945. From the end of April 1945 to January 1946, he was on the staff of the Naval Reserve Training Command, Naval Air Station, Glenview, Illinois, with a rank of lieutenant commander. He received an honorable discharge in February 1946.

Interesting Ford Facts

Ford once said that his experiences on the gridiron helped prepare him for the "rough-and-tumble world of politics."

In honor of his athletic accomplishments, the University of Michigan retired Ford's No. 48 jersey in 1994. With the permission of the Ford family, it was placed back into circulation in 2012.

When he became president, Ford often had the Navy band play the University of Michigan fight song, "The Victors," instead of "Hail to the Chief."

Ford graduated from Michigan in 1935 and received offers to play football with the Detroit Lions and Green Bay Packers of the National Football League. Instead, he took a job in September 1935 as the boxing coach and assistant varsity football coach at Yale University, where he also attended and graduated from law school.

Gerald Ford's name at birth, July 14, 1913, was Leslie Lynch King Jr. Ford's parents later divorced and on Dec. 3, 1935, Ford legally changed his name to Gerald Rudolph Ford Jr., in honor of his stepfather, who had that name except for the junior.

BLACK SOLDIERS PLAYED PIVOTAL ROLE IN ARMY LOGISTICS

FORT SHAFTER, Hawaii—Black Americans have served and sacrificed in every conflict in the history of the United States, contributing greatly the U.S. Army and the freedom of our nation. The development and advancement of Army logistics can be attributed in great part to Black Soldiers.

Prior to the desegregation of the military in 1948 by President Harry Truman, the majority of Black Soldiers served in logistics-related fields under the Services of Supply branch, according to the National Archives.

Many of the fundamentals of Army logistics today can be traced to the Services of Supply branch of the Army during World War II. Historians across disciplines have researched these contributions and the results are not only fascinating, but ones to be celebrated and discussed more.

The Red Ball Express

U.S. Army sustainers can look to the Red Ball Express to learn how to overcome under established and broken infrastructure when planning and preparing for large scale combat operations.

The Red Ball Express, established during World War II, delivered fuel and materiel to Soldiers across France through motor transportation convoys. Due to the damaged rail infrastructure from the war, and the fast pace of the mission, sustainers faced logistical challenges to delivery necessary supplies.

The Allied forces relied heavily on the Red Ball Express drivers, the majority of whom were African American, to meet their supply needs. The sustainment provided by the Red Ball Express led to the success of the Allied forces in Europe.

Black Logistics Soldier was awarded Medal of Honor

Pvt. George Watson, a member of 29th Quartermaster Regiment during World War II, was one of seven Black Soldiers awarded the Medal of Honor by President Bill Clinton in 1997.

While six of the recipients served in combat units, Pvt. Watson was recog-

nized for his courageous efforts saving others after enemy bombers hit the U.S. Army transport ship he was on while off the coast of New Guinea. Watson ultimately drowned with the ship.

WWII Black Quartermaster Profiles

War historian and member of the editorial board for the Quarterly Journal of the Army War College, Douglas Bristol, Jr., profiled four Black Quartermasters who served during World War II.

In his writing, Bristol has shared their experiences and how these Soldiers, and others like them, were indispensable in the success of the U.S. Army in the European and Pacific theaters.






THE THREE R'S OF UXO

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMEN

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- **Retreat** from the area of the UXO; and
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 5-1433. You can also call CPS at 5-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder
