Fort Gregg-Adams Regulation 190-11

Army Physical Security

POSSESSION, USE, TRANSPORTATION, AND SECURITY OF PRIVATELY OWNED WEAPONS (POWs)

Summary. This regulation issues policies and procedures guidance for all personnel subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) or visiting the Fort Gregg-Adams installation. This regulation is applicable to the security, possession, use, transportation, and registration of POWs. Those who fail to comply with the requirements of this regulation are subject to punishment under the UCMJ and or the adverse action authorized by applicable United States Code sections of Federal regulations. Personnel not subject to UCMJ who fail to comply with the provisions of this regulation are subject to adverse administrative action or criminal prosecution as authorized by applicable sections of the United States Code or Federal regulation.

Applicability. This regulation applies to all units, activities, and personnel assigned to or visiting Fort Gregg-Adams. Violations of this regulation may be subject to punishment under the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), applicable civilian regulations, or administrative action.

Supplementation. Supplementation of this regulation by subordinate commanders is prohibited without prior approval from the Garrison Commander (GC), U.S. Army Garrison (USAG) Fort Gregg-Adams, 3312 Adams Avenue, Fort Gregg-Adams, VA 23801.

Suggested Improvements. The proponent of this regulation is the Directorate of Emergency Services, Physical Security Division. Chapter 1

General

1-1. Purpose. The purpose of this regulation is to establish uniform policies for carrying, securing, storing and using POWs, ammunition, and war trophies on Fort Gregg-Adams.

1-2. References. Appendix A contains required and related publications and prescribed referenced forms.

1-3. Explanation of Abbreviations and Terms. The glossary explains abbreviations and terms used in this regulation.

1-4. Compliance

a. Military personnel who fail to comply with this regulation are subject to judicial or non-judicial action under the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), or appropriate administrative action.

b. Government employees and civilians who violate this regulation may be subject to prosecution in the United States Magistrate Court, banned from post, referred to civilian authorities, or subject to disciplinary and administrative action according to appropriate Civilian Personnel regulations.

c. Weapons used, possessed, transported, or stored in violation of this regulation may be temporarily seized or permanently confiscated.

d. It is unlawful for any person to:

(1) Fail to register, store, or transport a firearm in accordance with (IAW) this regulation.

(2) Possess an item prohibited by this regulation on the installation.

e. The provisions of this regulation do not replace or relieve persons of their responsibility to comply with applicable Federal, state, and local laws and statutes regarding possession, purchase, sale, transfer, and transport of weapons.

Chapter 2

Responsibilities.

2-1. Senior Commander (SC). The SC will:

a. Establish a formal Physical Security program.

b. Regulate privately owned weapons, explosives, and ammunition on the installation.

c. Ensure that firearms and ammunition belonging to Soldiers living in unit billets or on-post quarters are secured in the installation armory or unit arms room in approved locked containers separate from military AA&E.

d. May authorize storage of firearms and ammunition at a Soldier's on-post quarters provided they are properly secured. Firearms will be secured in either a locked container or provided with a trigger lock. Ammunition for the firearm will be secured separately from the firearm in a locked container.

2-2. Directorate of Emergency Services (DES). Directorate of Emergency Services is responsible for operating the privately owned weapons (POW) registration program

on the installation and maintaining all on-post POW registration data. The DES also ensures compliance with applicable physical security standards and enforces violations under the UCMJ, applicable civilian regulations, and laws.

2-3. Unit Commanders. Unit Commanders will:

- a. Account for and inventory privately owned firearms and ammunition secured in unit arms.
- b. Ensure that a DA Form 3749 has been issued for each privately owned firearm secured in the arms room. Privately owned firearms will be inventoried in conjunction with and at the same frequency of the inventory of military weapons.
- c. Establish limits on the quantity and type of privately owned ammunition stored in the arms room, based upon availability of space and safe.
- d. Ensure that inspections are conducted per AR 190–13 and this regulation to ensure proper storage and control.
- e. Process unauthorized AA&E per AR 195–5.
- f. Post applicable local regulations and state and local law information on ownership, registration, and possession of firearms and ammunition on unit bulletin boards.
- g. Brief all newly assigned persons on this policy. All personnel will be made aware of changes.
- h. Verify information in accordance with AR 190-11 on requestor's [DES Form 694 \(Weapons Registration Form\)](#). If the POW(s) belongs to Family Members, they must follow guidelines outlined in paragraph 4-5, AR 190-11. Commanders are responsible for ensuring all Service Members comply with both AR 190-11 and this policy.
- i. Store POWs of Service Members residing in the barracks in the unit arms room or storage may be secured off installation.

Chapter 3
Registration.

3-1. Personnel Living on Fort Gregg-Adams. Personnel keeping or storing privately owned firearms and ammunition (including authorized war trophy firearms) on an installation will:

- a. Personnel arriving at Fort Gregg-Adams are required to register all weapons and war trophies on Director of Emergency Services [\(DES\) Form 694 \(Weapons](#)

[Registration Form](#)) within 96 hours of arrival. **Do NOT bring weapons into the VCC for registration.** POW registrations are valid for a period of four years. Weapons must be declared at the access control point.

- b. POWs will not be stored in barracks or on post lodging facilities.
- c. Comply with federal, state, and local laws and regulations on ownership, possession, registration, off-post transport, and use.
- d. Store both firearms and ammunition in the unit arms room or other locations authorized by the installation commander.
- e. Follow local security and safety regulations. Safeguard the unit-issued DA Form 3749 for turn-in to the unit armorer, when the firearm is withdrawn from the arms room.
- f. Follow local security and safety regulations. Safeguard the unit-issued DA Form 3749 for turn-in to the unit armorer, when the firearm is withdrawn from the arms room.
- g. Withdraw privately owned firearms and ammunition from the unit arms rooms only upon approval of the unit commander or authorized representative.
- h. Comply with the National Firearms Act and other relevant laws and regulations when receiving or bringing arms into the United States.
- i. War trophies and Memorabilia that are legally possessed and registered may be stored on post so long as they meet Federal and state statutes pertaining to weapons in general and were originally acquired in a legal manner.
- j. Register all war trophies with [Director of Emergency Services \(DES\) Form 694 \(Weapons Registration Form\)](#) within 96 hours of bringing weapons or war trophies onto Fort Gregg-Adams.

3-2. Civilians Visiting Fort Gregg-Adams. Civilians visiting Fort Gregg-Adams for the sole purpose to engage in authorized activities must register their weapons with [Director of Emergency Services \(DES\) Form 694-1 \(Civilian Weapons Registration Form\)](#) prior to entering the installation. Registration will be completed at the Weapons Registration Office, located at the Visitor Control Center (VCC), Building 5228. Registration period is between 0800 and 1600, Monday through Friday. Do NOT bring weapons into the VCC for registration. Online weapons registration is available at: <https://home.army.mil/greggadams/my-fort/all-services/weapon-registration>. POW registrations are valid for a period of four years.

3-3. Firearms Permanently Stored Off Installation. Firearms which are legally and permanently stored off the installation are not required to be registered on Fort Gregg-Adams; however, weapons brought onto the installation for any reason will be

registered on Fort Gregg-Adams. In accordance with Public Law 111-383, section 1062, commanders shall not require the registration of POWs by Service Members or DoD civilian employees who lawfully maintain their POWs off post, nor shall commanders issue any requirement relating to the lawful acquisition, possession, ownership, carry, or use of a POW or privately owned ammunition by a Service Member or DoD civilian employee while off post. However, nothing in the regulation shall be construed to prohibit or limit the authority of commanders and DoD law enforcement agencies to create and maintain records pertaining to weapons and ammunition maintained off post by Service Members or DoD civilian employees when said records relate to an investigation, prosecution, or adjudication of an alleged violation of law or regulation, or when said records relate to matters where a Service Member is reasonably believed to constitute a threat to them self or others (see Public Law 111-383, section 1062).

3-4. Prohibition to Register POWs. The registration of POWs by person(s) described below is prohibited:

- a. Any person convicted of a felony (The Federal Gun Control Act of 1968, as amended in 1996).
- b. Any person convicted in any court of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence or a felony (the Lautenberg Amendment to the Federal Gun Control Act of 1968, as amended in 1996).
- c. Any person who is a fugitive from justice.
- d. Any person who is presently declared as mentally incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction and/or a mental health physician OR who is presently committed to any mental institution.
- e. Any civilian or Family member under the age of 18 is prohibited from the use of weapons, unless accompanied and supervised by a parent or legal guardian over the age of 18

3-5. Personnel Departing Fort Gregg-Adams Permanently. Personnel departing Fort Gregg-Adams on Permanent Change of Station (PCS) will clear registered weapons as part of normal installation clearance procedures.

3-6. Ownership changes of POWs. Changes of ownership of POWs currently registered on post by military / civilians will be reported to the Weapons Registration Office located at building 5228 within 96 hours, and the weapon's new owner will register each weapon in his or her name as applicable.

Chapter 4

Storage.

4-1. Authorized Storage Area on Fort Gregg-Adams

a. Firearms, ammunition and authorized war trophies will not be stored in unit barracks rooms or Fort Gregg-Adams lodging facilities, including the hotel. These Service members weapons and war trophies will be stored in the unit arms room IAW AR 190-11.

b. Firearms, ammunition and authorized war trophies will not be stored in on-post quarters of others service members to avoid the requirements of this regulation.

c. Service Members residing in Unaccompanied Personnel Housing in the rank of Sergeant First Class or higher are authorized storage of POWs within their quarters once they have met the registration requirement of this regulation.

4-2. SC Authorization of Storage. The SC authorizes storage of firearms, ammunition and authorized war trophies at a Service member's on-post quarters provided they are properly documented and registered IAW Chapter 3 of this regulation. All firearms will be secured in locking gun cabinets, safes or equivalent.

4-3. Storage During TDY

a. Firearms, ammunition and authorized war trophies belonging to service members who are here on temporary duty may store these items within on post quarters once approved by their local commander.

b. Firearms and ammunition will not be stored in the on-post quarters of others to avoid this requirement.

4-4. Storage in On-Post Quarters. Firearms, ammunition and authorized war trophies stored in on-post quarters will be kept unloaded and secured within an approved container: Examples of storage containers are: A locking gun cabinet, safe, or other secure container of sufficient weight (over 100 pounds gross weight) or size to deter easy removal, theft, and tampering.

4-5. Ammunition Storage

Privately-owned ammunition will be stored in a locked container. If a gun safe is being utilized, ammunition can be secured within this also. Ammunition stored shall not exceed 2,000 rounds.

4-6. Storage of POWs in Privately Owned Vehicles

POWs will not be stored in privately owned vehicles.

Chapter 5

Transportation, Possession, and Use.

5-1. Purpose for Possession of POW. No person will possess or bring a firearm or other weapon onto the installation for any criminal, unlawful, or prohibited purpose.

5-2. Transporting of POWs. POWs will be transported in vehicles only while traveling in a direct route to and from hunting areas, target ranges, or other locations authorized by the Senior Commander. No stops are authorized. Personnel who reside on post and are transporting weapons to engage in authorized activities on the installation are required to present the registration document when asked to present proof of registration by Security Guards at access control points, Law Enforcement, Game Warden, Range Control, and/or Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR) officials prior to obtaining authorization to conduct activities using a firearm or when asked to present registration documents.

a. POWs while being transported in a vehicle will be locked in the vehicle and out of public view.

b. POWs transported in vehicles will be unloaded with ammunition and weapons separated by at least one locking mechanism.

c. Individuals hunting in designated hunting areas on the installation will carry POWs unloaded and in plain view when moving in and out of their designated areas.

d. Hunters will not carry POWs within the cantonment area. Weapons will not be left unsecured or unattended inside of vehicles.

e. Ammunition transported in the vehicle will also be locked in the trunk and physically separated from the weapon. The ammunition will be secured within a separate locked container so the weapon cannot be easily loaded while in the vehicle.

5-4. Transporting Loaded POWs. The carrying of a loaded firearm in a vehicle is prohibited. Personnel listed in paragraph 3-5 above, or others as permitted by the Senior Commander through the Director of Emergency Services / Provost Marshal, are exempt.

5-5. Securing POWs for Transportation. POWs carried in a vehicle will be secured in the trunk. For vehicles without a trunk, firearms will be encased in a container other than the glove compartment and carried in such a manner that they will not be readily available to the driver or passengers. Commercially available trigger locks and other security devices are strongly recommended to deter and prevent loss and theft.

5-6. Removal of POWs from Installation. Personnel who remove POWs from the installation will comply with applicable Federal, state and local laws pertaining to

ownership, possession, and registration.

5-7. Complying Federal and Virginia Laws. No person will use, transport, buy, sell, transfer, or possess a firearm in violation of Federal or Virginia law.

5-8. Discharging of POWs on Installation. Weapons including rifles, handguns, shotguns, BB guns, pellet guns, paintball guns, slingshots, and bows will not be discharged on the Installation except at designated locations during specific times.

5-9. Discharging locations for POWs. POWs can be discharged on Fort Gregg-Adams only at the following locations:

- a. Outdoor Recreation trap and skeet ranges (shotguns only).
- b. Bows will be shot only at the Outdoor Recreation archery range or by properly licensed hunters in designated hunting areas during specific seasons.
- c. In authorized hunting areas, by properly licensed hunters, during designated hunting seasons. This will be further restricted to specific types of POWs as announced in hunting regulations.
- d. Range 8 (POW).

5-10. Authorization for Law Enforcement Officers to Carry Privately Owned Firearms on Army Fort Gregg-Adams

a. The SC may approve qualified, actively serving, Army law enforcement professionals who possess a valid credential, pursuant to the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act (LEOSA), to carry a concealed POF (handgun only) while off duty, for personal protection, not in the performance of official duties on Fort Gregg-Adams to which they are assigned within the United States.

b. For the purpose of the entirety of paragraph 5–10, “qualified, actively serving, Army law enforcement professionals” are defined as Soldiers or DA Civilians authorized by law to engage in or supervise the prevention, detection, investigation, or prosecution (or incarceration) of any person for any violation of law, who have statutory powers of arrest or apprehension under Title 10, U.S. Code, section 807(b) (Article 7(b) of the UCMJ), regardless of the individual’s current assignment. This includes MP (all 31 military occupational specialty series, regardless of current assignment), DACP, Army Criminal Investigative Division Special Agents, and Army Counterintelligence Agents who have been issued badges and credentials to conduct counterintelligence investigations.

c. In addition to meeting all existing section 926B LEOSA requirements, the individual must not be the subject of any disciplinary action by the organization, must

meet the organization's standards for regularly qualifying in the use of the same type of weapon as the concealed firearm (such as a revolver or semiautomatic pistol), and must not be under the influence of alcohol, other intoxicants, or any hallucinatory drug or substance while carrying a firearm.

d. All section 926B LEOSA credential holders requesting authorization to carry a concealed POF on an Fort Gregg-Adams must submit a memorandum request through the Director of Emergency Services/Provost Marshal to the senior commander with the following information:

(1) A specific description of the POF to be carried, including the make/model, serial number, caliber (not to exceed .45 caliber), type (such as revolver, semiautomatic, or single shot), and number of rounds (not to exceed 30, or the maximum allowed by Federal, State, and local law and regulation).

(2) An affirmation that they—

(a) Will comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws to possess, carry, and conceal a firearm.

(b) Will transport on an Army installation only the POF for which the arming authority provides approval.

(c) May be personally liable for injuries, death, and property damage proximately caused by their actions connected with the possession or use of a POF.

(d) Will inform the arming authority of any change in circumstances that could affect authorization to carry a POF.

(e) Will comply with Federal, State, and local laws for the possession and use of POFs, including laws for the reasonable use of deadly force, self-defense, and related to accidental discharge.

(3) A copy of their current section 926B LEOSA credential to establish eligibility.

e. Approved authorizations are not transferable. At change of duty station, section 926B LEOSA credential holders seeking authorization to carry a concealed POF must obtain approval by the gaining chain of command and senior commander before carrying the POF at the gaining installation.

f. Section 926B LEOSA credential holders requesting permission to carry a POF on a joint base must obtain approval from the lead Service arming authority for that base.

g. The SC may authorize firearm storage for on-post quarters, privatized housing, and for non-standard installation facilities or leased facilities. Firearms will be secured (unloaded) in a lockable gun storage container or have a trigger locking device. Storage of POFs in temporary quarters, billeting, or barracks is prohibited, unless specifically authorized on a case-by-case basis by the SC.

h. The SC may authorize storage of POFs in unit arms rooms or other authorized facilities

with appropriate storage (such as a General Services Administration Class-5 security container) in accordance with AR 190–11. POFs will be strictly controlled. Sign-out and turn-in of a POF will be maintained with a DA Form 3749 (Equipment Receipt).

i. The SC may approve vehicle storage of POFs for personnel carrying under these special provisions for section 926B LEOSA credential holders if unit storage is not practical, not available, or has limited capacity. Individuals staying on post in camping/recreation areas with motor coaches/camping trailers may also be authorized vehicle storage. POFs will be secured (unloaded) in a lockable gun storage container, or have a trigger locking device, and will be concealed from public view. Installation residents are not authorized vehicle storage of firearms unless specifically authorized by the SC.

j. Servicemembers who violate this policy may be subject to punishment under the UCMJ. Even if certain acts do not specifically violate the provisions of this regulation, they may be inappropriate or violate relevant civilian personnel guidance. The Director of Emergency Services/Provost Marshal and Garrison Commander must seek the advice and counsel of their legal advisors when taking actions pursuant to this paragraph.

5-13. Age Requirement – Handgun. No person under the age of 21 years may register, own, buy, or sell a handgun on the installation.

5-14. Age Requirement – Rifle and/or Shotgun. No person under the age of 18 years may register, own, buy, or sell a rifle or shotgun on the installation. Persons under 18 years of age may possess a shotgun while on the trap/skeet range during designated range hours and while under the supervision of a parent or legal guardian over the age of 18.

Chapter 6

Lost, Stolen and Recovered Firearms

6-1. If a POW is lost or stolen, it will be reported to the Provost Marshal Office immediately. The Provost Marshal Office will enter the lost or stolen weapon data in the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and initiate an investigation if the theft or loss occurred on the installation.

6-2. Persons who find, or otherwise come into possession of firearms believed to be lost or stolen, will report this immediately to the Provost Marshal Office, (804) 734-7400.

Chapter 7

Limitation of Purchases by Students in Training

A Service Member who is present for duty at FGAV because of Temporary Duty, Active Duty for Training, temporary orders, Advanced Individual Training, Officer Basic Course, or NCOEs shall not purchase a firearm at the FGAV Post Exchange. Army & Air Force Exchange (AAFES) staff shall not transfer a firearm to these Service Members unless presented with a valid waiver memorandum signed by the company commander.

Violation of this rule by a Service Member is punishable under the UCMJ.

Chapter 8

Prohibited Items. The following items will not be stored, possessed, bought, sold, or used on the installation:

- a. Any plain view or concealed, two-sided knife having a switchblade, automatic opener or spring-loaded blade, or having a blade of more than 2 ½ inches (unless meeting the exemption listed in 18 U.S.C. § 930(d)).
- b. Blackjacks, sappers, nunchaku, cudgel type weapons or clubs, night sticks, riot batons, homemade clubs, kung Fu sticks, garrotes, or other related martial arts weapons. Persons may possess or use nunchaku and kung Fu sticks only in connection with martial arts training, practice, and exhibitions. They will not be used in a threatening manner towards any non-participant and may never be carried in a concealed manner. Persons residing in the barracks will store item(s) in the unit arms room.
- c. Brass knuckles, "sap gloves," "knuckles," or any other device fitting over or inside of the hand which may be used for the purpose of striking another person, or to amplify the effect of a bare-handed blow.
- d. Homemade percussion-type weapons. Exceptions: percussion-type weapons sold in kit form for assembly and legal for hunting, gun shows or displays. These weapons, if in firing condition, must be registered by those who reside on Fort Gregg-Adams on a permanent or temporary basis.
- e. Pyrotechnics and explosives of any type (other than ammunition for firearms and handguns), including simulators and grenades, except when authorized for military use. Exception: gunpowder and primers for legitimate reloading or muzzle weapons, however, these items will not be maintained in barracks or on post lodging facilities.
- f. Any rifle with a barrel length of less than 16 inches or a shotgun with a barrel length of less than 18 inches, or any firearm made from a rifle or shotgun which, as modified, has an overall length less than 26 inches unless such firearm is registered in the national firearms registry and transfer records of the US Treasury Department or is classified as a curio or relic by the US Department of Treasury.
- g. Armor-piercing ammunition. Any ammunition that has been designed, manufactured, or adapted for the purpose of defeating metal armor of any type or soft body armor, such as worn by law enforcement personnel. However, controlled expanding ammunition is allowable when used for hunting purposes.
- h. Automatic weapons and suppressors. Any firearm capable of firing continuously with only one application of the trigger mechanism using any form of mechanical or gas energy or suppressing sound.

i. Any weapon, including a firearm, on which the name of the manufacturer, serial number, or identification number has been changed, altered, removed, or obliterated.

j. A shooting pen or any other weapon capable of discharging a chemical agent. Self-defense mechanisms such as mace or pepper spray dispensers (3 oz or less) and weapons that discharge only water or blanks are authorized.

k. Any shooting weapon with mounted spotlight or night vision scope.

l. Government weapons or ammunition, except when authorized.

m. Other devices. At their discretion, CDRs can further restrict and/or remove any device intended to function as a weapon but designed or modified in such a way as to conceal its purpose as such.

Chapter 9

War Trophies and Memorabilia.

9-1. War trophies that are legally possessed and registered may be stored on post so long as they meet Federal and state statutes pertaining to weapons in general and were originally acquired in a legal manner. Examples:

a. An AKM assault rifle acquired during Desert Storm is not allowed because it is an automatic weapon prohibited by Federal law and was acquired in violation of general orders pertaining to war trophies during Desert Storm.

b. A German K-98 rifle acquired legally by a relative in WWII is allowed because it was legally acquired initially and meets federal and state laws pertaining to rifles in general.

9-2. Swords and sabers may be possessed as items of memorabilia and worn for ceremonial purposes. Swords and sabers will not be carried concealed at any time or in a manner for other than ceremonial purposes.

Chapter 10

Waivers.

Requests for waivers of any portion of this regulation will be submitted through the Directorate of Emergency Services to the Fort Gregg-Adams Garrison Commander.

Chapter 11

Violations

A Service Member found in violation of this regulation is subject to administrative and/or

judicial action under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Other persons are subject to administrative actions or prosecution in federal court.

Section II

Terms

Automatic weapon

Any weapon which shoots, is designed to shoot, or can be readily restored to shoot automatically, more than one shot, without manual reloading, by a single functioning of the trigger.

Dangerous articles

Items that are likely to cause death or serious bodily harm if used as a weapon.

Privately owned weapons (POW)

Those weapons that are owned by private individuals (Service members, Family members and Civilians).

Prohibited items

Items prohibited by this regulation for the safety and well-being of all personnel.

War trophies

Any item of the enemy (public or private property) used as war materiel (i.e., arms, military accouterments) acquired in a combat area or zone within a prescribed period of time, IAW Title 10 USC & 2579 procedures for handling and retaining battlefield objects.
