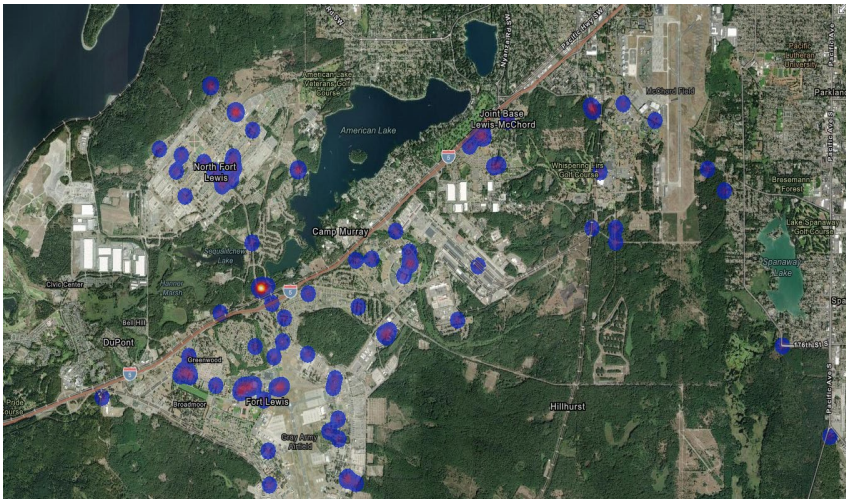

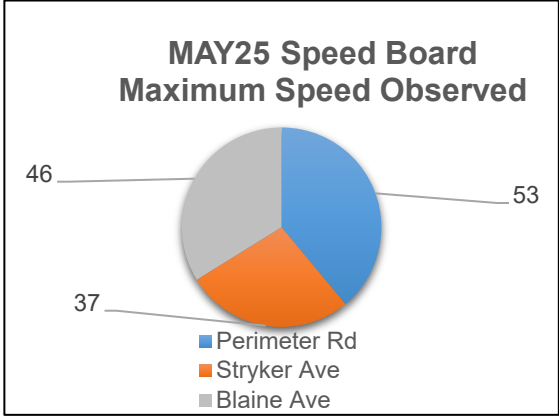
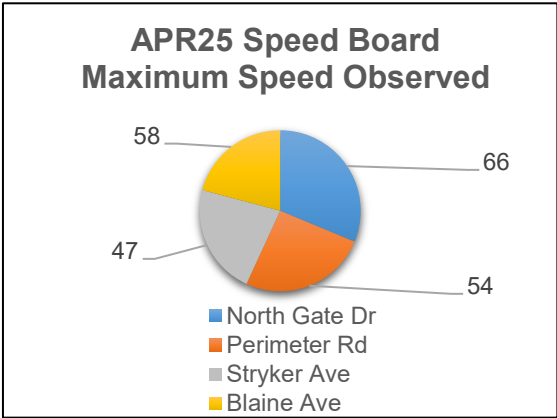

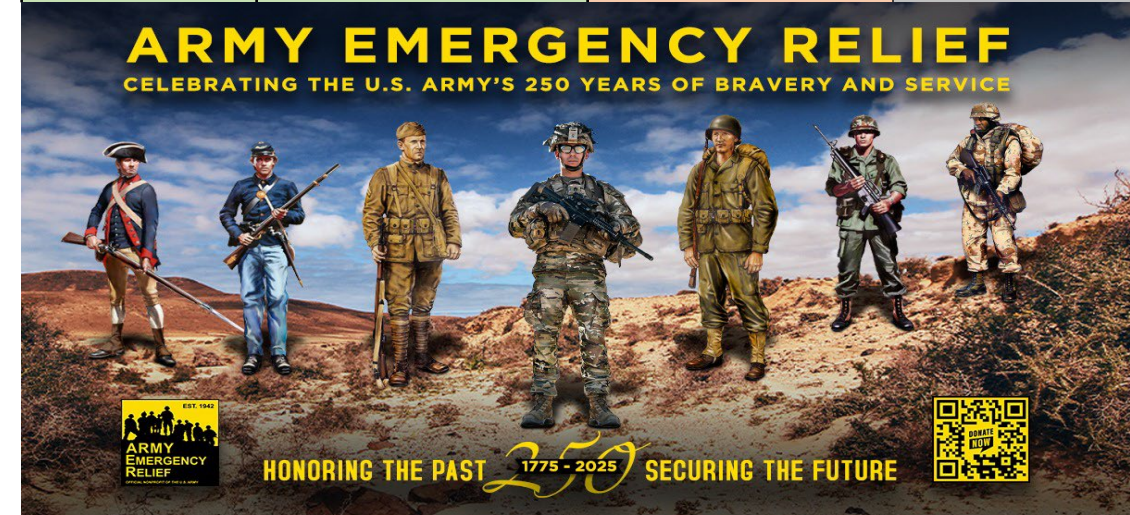

Participation is the key in the AER Campaign.

Overall, the Army goal is a 25% participation rate.

To receive a certificate of achievement and recognition, a unit must have a 25% participation rate.

Unit numbers feed up into Battalions; Battalions feed up into the Brigade. The more units that have a 25% or higher participation rate within a battalion, the higher the chances are the battalion will achieve a 25% or higher rate and the higher the chances are the brigade will achieve the 25% participation rate goal. .

In 2024:

39 units achieved the 25% or higher designation; 13 of those units achieved 91% or higher

7 Battalions obtained 25% or higher, with 3 of them achieving 75% or higher

2 Brigades achieved the goal: 1-2 SBCT @ 25% and 1MDTF @ 51%

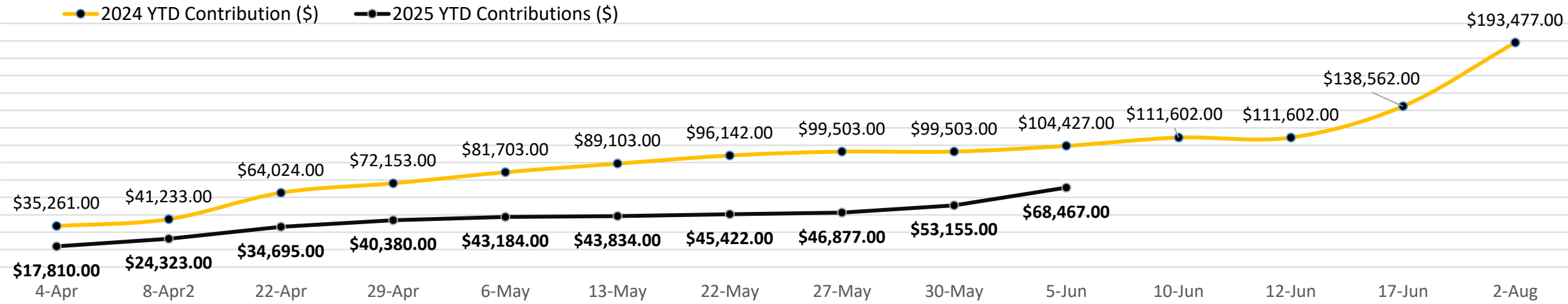

AER Campaign Dollar Contributions

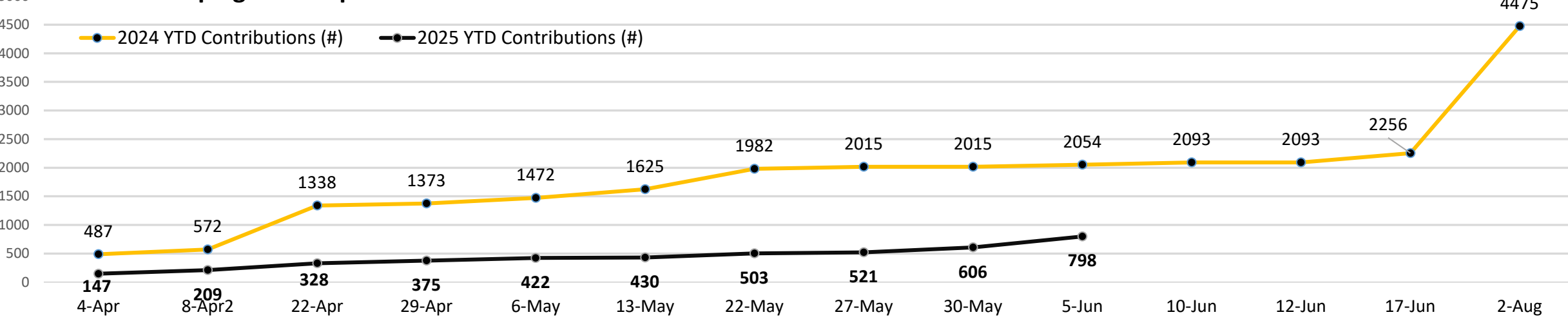

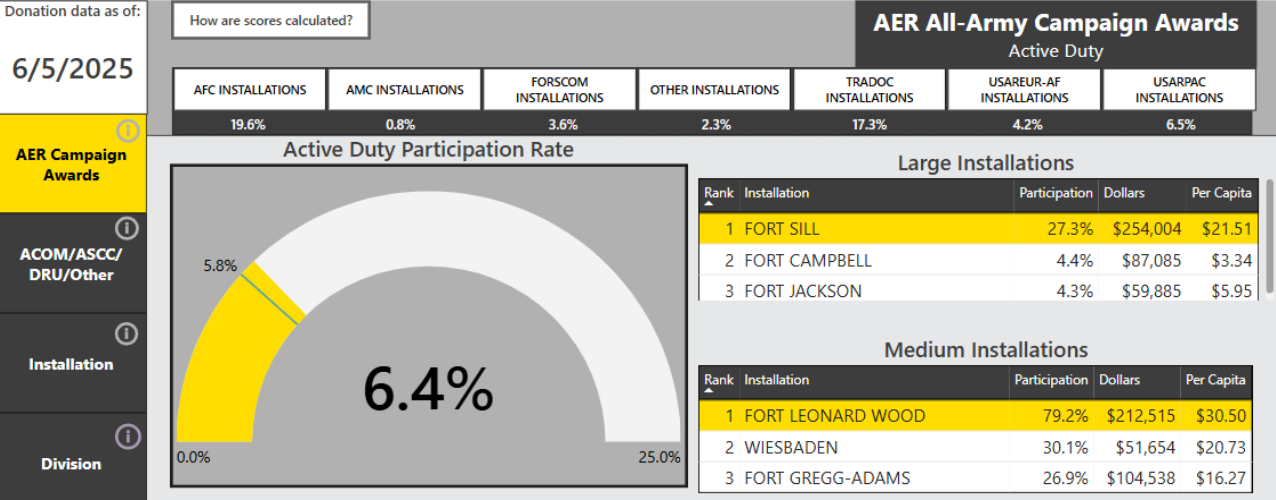

Ride Share - ACTIVE

JBLM has been selected to participate in a U.S. Army pilot program aimed at enhancing transportation options by collaborating with the ride-share companies.

This two-month pilot program will look at streamlining base access to procedures for approved ride-share drivers, making it easier for the JBLM community to utilize these services.

Individuals that call for rides originating from or ending at JBLM will be directed to one of the drivers with the installation access card.

- Rideshare sign-up numbers:
 - Uber: 129
 - Door Dash: 16 (2 are also Uber drivers)
 - Lyft: 1

WAY AHEAD:

- We will continue signing up people as they come in and advertise the opportunity.
- Only Uber is currently geo fenced at this time. As other companies show interest, we will work with them to establish similar geo fencing as Uber.

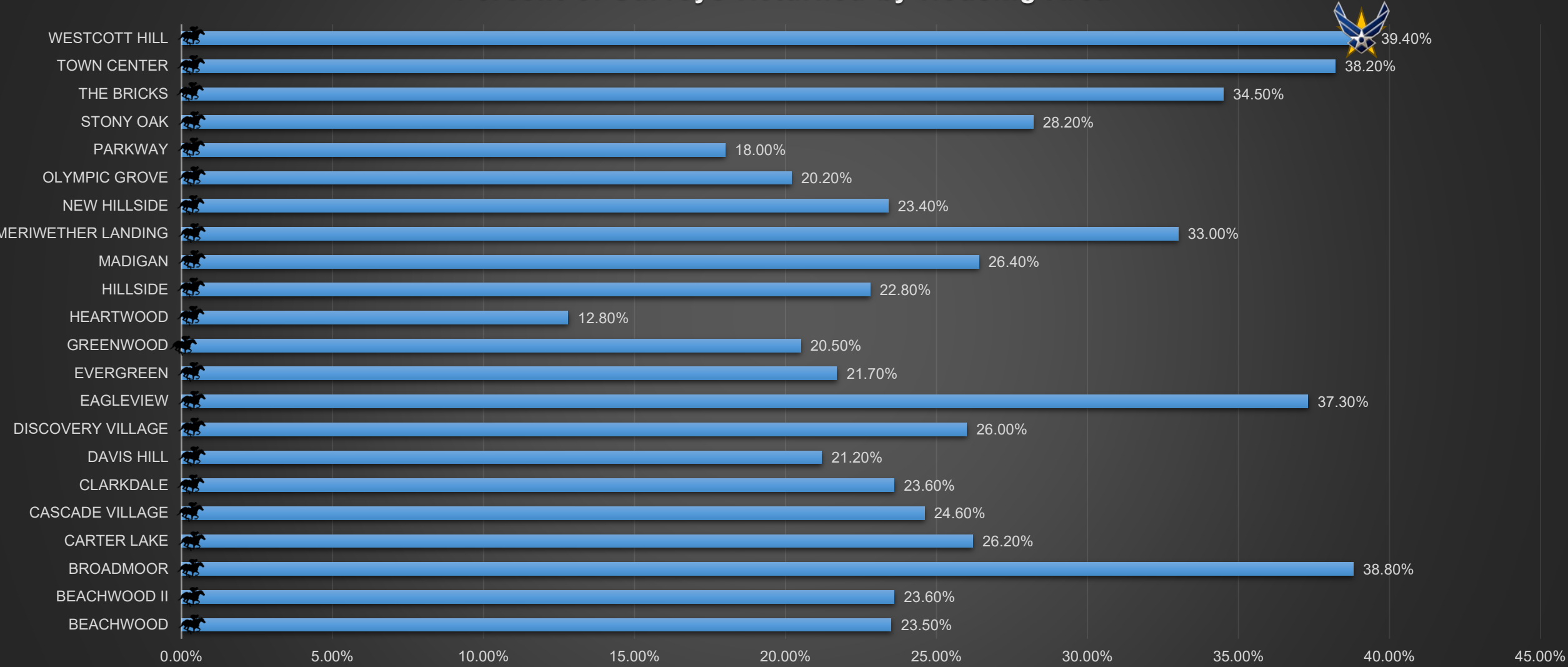

GHC Updates

- **UPDATE:** ASC APPLE guidance as of 04JUN. All PPM's will be moved into DPS with dates of 15 May - 30 SEP 2025. Any PPM's in the GHC queue will be removed out of MILMOVE and put into DPS. APPLE Advisory 25-008 is still in effect.
- **4 March:** HSA deactivated over 11,000 zip codes in the Sort Tool through Peak Season.
- **13 March:** USTRANSCOM updated Peak Season 2025 zip phase-in listing. Listings automatically loaded in Sort Tool.
- **28 March:** USTRANSCOM APPLE Advisory #25-0076
 - **MilMove (GHC):**
 - a. Domestic moves on GHC supported locations/channels with requested pick-up date greater than 28 days from the time of submission.
 - b. Domestic moves on GHC supported locations/channels with **a government arranged shipment and a full or partial Personally Procured Move (PPM), regardless of lead time. (USTRANSCOM PP Advisory #25-0076B)**
 - **DPS Move (Legacy):**
 - a. Domestic moves on a non-GHC supported location/channel.
 - b. Domestic moves on a GHC supported location/channel without a PPM and with a requested pick-up date of less than 28 days.
- **30 April:** US TRANSCOM APPLE Advisory #25-008 - All new GHC shipment booking on-hold until further notice pending Joint leadership review

Only a fraction of HHG moves have been processed under the GHC thus far; the legacy system remains active and continues to handle the majority of HHGs move globally (Total FY'25 42K (DPS: 40K (95%), GHC 2K (5%))

Are you moving from JBLM this Summer?

Bottom Line: The DoD is transitioning HHG movement to a new contractor Home Safe Alliance (HSA) who is struggling to meet performance requirements. Soldiers moving under this new contract have increased risk of delayed HHG movement.

Soldiers Need to Know:

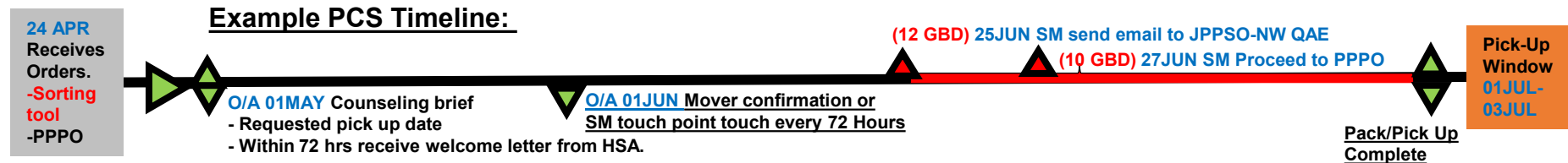
1. Upon receiving orders, initiate HHG actions in **sorting tool** and proceed to PPPO (Lewis/Mcchord) to initiate counseling.
2. SM needs to back brief leadership on HHG counseling and key dates
3. **DON'T initiate/terminate** current living status without moving company confirmed pack/pick dates.
4. **Be responsive** to phone calls/emails from PPPO / JPPSO / TSP / Prime Contractor and **proactively** engage these entities.
5. **GHC Conditions:** If your move is initially booked under GHC and you do not receive confirmation or assigned a mover from HSA of pack/pick up dates. And If Move mil Status is indicating - No assigned Service Provider and Missed pick up.

Do this:

1. At **12 Govt Business Day (GBD)** if no requested pick up-date/assigned local agent, call **JPPSO-NW QAE** and **520-706-8613 option 3**
2. At **10 GBD or less**, **JPPSO-NW will contact customer to confirm/deny HSA support, customer return to PPPO for counseling/re-booking in DPS**

Leadership Support:

1. Ensure Soldiers complete orders elections & leave form > 90 days prior to report date and HHG counseling >60 days prior to requested HHG Pick up Date. PPPO do not require leave form to initiate the move.
2. Direct Soldier to PPPO and schedule HHG.
 - A. Sorting tool will determine type of move. Track SM counseling appt and briefing date/time.
 - B. If Soldier does not have a firm scheduled pack/pick or service provider assigned 12 GBD prior, recommend to contact HSA and JPPSO QAE.

 - C. If pack/pick dates are confirmed and/or service provider assigned, continue to monitor
3. If a move is delayed, adjust the SM's report date and leave.
4. **HIGHLY RECOMMEND** Service Members allow JBLM – Quality Assurance Evaluators to inspect/evaluate moving company pack/pick of HHGs to ensure quality service.

Policy Information for the DD Form 214 and DD Form 214-1 Addendum:

The **DD Form 214 Series** has been integrated into **IPPS-A (Integrated Personnel and Pay System - Army)** to enhance accessibility and accuracy in processing service records. This modernization aligns with directives from the FY20 National Defense Authorization Act, requiring the forms to be electronically transferable and machine-readable.

- The integration of the DD Form 214 Series into IPPS-A streamlines the process of managing service records, ensuring better accessibility and accuracy.
- The update introduces the DD Form 214-1 Addendum, which is now used by the Reserve Component and replaces the NGB Form 22 for the Army National Guard.
- Through IPPS-A, service members and HR professionals can review, correct, and finalize these forms efficiently.
- Once a Separation or Transfer Assignment is approved, IPPS-A generates the necessary forms, marking them as drafts until signed.
- The finalized documents are then sent to the Defense Manpower Data Center (DMDC) and Interactive Personnel Electronic Records Management System (iPERMS) for record-keeping.

Problems: Additionally, the system mistakenly generates DD-214s for individuals in TDY or PCS status. To address these concerns, a new Army Directive mandates specific training for personnel handling the DD-214 process, ensuring proper implementation.

Note: Commanders face restrictions in approving awards once a soldier has left their unit, leading to time-sensitive pressures. Processing delays have disrupted access to VA and educational benefits, increased the workload of transition personnel, and caused backlogs, with reported data processing issues affecting thousands of soldiers.

Solution: The Army has also created a dedicated resource page and monitoring tools to assist commanders and HR professionals in tracking pending actions and mitigating disruptions. If you S1 having issues they can reach out to the JBLM PAS Team for assistance at the following:

- What is it? *Originally called “The Personnel Action Request (PAR) Pilot,” this is an effort to improve accuracy, timeliness, and transparency of finance actions. Ft. Meade was the first installation to launch the PAR Pilot in November 2023.*
- Why are we doing this? *Traditionally, HR Professionals and Soldiers route finance requests to their supporting Army Military Pay Office (AMPO) via email using Unit Transmittal Letters (UTLs). Soldiers and commanders often complain that the UTL routing process is not transparent outside of military pay (MILPAY) channels, hindering timely and accurate Soldier pay.*
- How does it work? *AMPOs are trained on how to use UDLs in IPPS-A, where their HR Professional counterparts already reside. Once credentialed, managing workflow of finance actions in IPPS-A look and feel like traditional HR actions in IPPS-A. Incorporating finance actions into IPPS-A requires significant effort for AMPO employees to train up, gain access, and learn how to use IPPS-A. In addition, this effort requires the creation of multiple distinct UDLs to organize the workflow.*
- What are the benefits? *Linking HR Professionals and Finance Professionals in IPPS-A helps improve timeliness and creates a more transparent process (if Soldiers created their own action, they can check on it, which helps minimize foot traffic in the AMPO).*
- Are there any drawbacks? *Yes, despite the usage of IPPS-A to route actions, AMPOs still need to manually code most transactions in Defense Joint Military Pay System (DJMS). Also, larger installations require extra care when creating multiple UDLs to support multiple large units.*
- Are other installations using it? *Yes, most CONUS installations are using the UDL, or are postured to execute soon. Recent success stories are Ft. Stewart and Ft. Riley.*
