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Net Zero nets big bucks for units

Twenty units received some extra cash in their Morale, Welfare and Recreation fund accounts last week, just by making their workplace and operations more sustainable.

The winners of the sixth Net Zero Contest were announced and some units earned up to \$10,000.

The Net Zero competition provides a monetary incentive to demonstrate more sustainable behaviors. This money came from the Joint Base Lewis-McChord Qualified Recycling Program.

"Recycling proceeds goes into the QRP and is then used for projects related to recycling, sustainability and morale, welfare and recreation,"said Tammy Shoop, recycling outreach coordinator and one of the staff that helps run the contest.

Commanders registered their units and had four months to meet certain requirements that support the sustainability of JBLM.

Actions related to affecting positive behavior change in the areas of energy, recycling, sustainable acquisition, training areas, transportation, water and outreach education included having a comprehensive recycling program, appointing building energy monitors for each

building to ensure energy conservation is taking place, providing environmental training to the entire unit and encouraging service members to take alternate modes of transportation.

The units were then scored by subject matter experts and an executive judging panel comprised of JBLM leadership provided their recommendation to the joint base commander.

Units were also given the opportunity to create their own Net Zero initiative. 62nd Operations Support Squadron reduced the amount of runway lighting used while still complying with mandatory runway lighting, resulting in a 27 percent energy reduction.

Madigan Army Medical Center constantly looks for ways to reduce waste and recycle, often overcoming obstacles for difficult to recycle medical equipment.

373rd Training Squadron, Detachment 12 continues to help expand the bicycle sharing program they've been a part of for years.

"Ultimately, these actions help save money, protect training lands and enhance air and water quality in the JBLM community," Shoop said. "In addition, it also ensures that the military of tomorrow has the same access to energy, water, air, land and natural resources as we do today."
