

25L Training at FHL Continues









A small "pop-up" 25L (Cable Systems Installer-Maintainer) reclassification course for deploying Soldiers is being held at Fort Hunter Liggett from May 8 to June 7. This course is normally conducted at the High Tech Regional Training Site – Maintenance (HTRTS-M) located in Sacramento, California. It is the job of the 25L to construct aerial tie offs of low voltage cable to prevent Fiber Optics from being trampled. The instruction is being provided and demonstrated by SSG Gillilan, Theodore. Soldiers carrying their Army Fiber Optic cable to their pole climbing site to review techniques and safety procedures. All Soldiers are wearing their PPE during the COVID-19 when they are in close proximity of each while receiving instruction. While on the pole (due to weather and climbing) the students were authorized to remove their masks as they were more than 6 feet from each other. This allowed the students to breathe better and prevent hyperventilation. (Courtesy photos)
