SUPPORT TO TRAINING Combat Casualty Care at PRFTA





A team from Medical Simulation Center (PdM MedSim) executed a Tactical Combat Casualty Care Exportable (TC3X) Fielding at Parks Reserve Forces Training Center, Feb. 24-27, 2020. Working with the Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization, and Security, two teams of senior trainers learned the TC3X system, which provides Warfighters and medical personnel the ability to save more Soldiers' lives on the battlefield. Teams gained proficiency in treating the three preventable causes of combat deaths: traumatic hemorrhage, tension pneumothorax, and obstructed airway. (Courtesy photo)

FHL is in the process of building alliances with local amateur (ham) radio organizations to assist with crisis communications in the event of an emergency such as an earthquake that could disrupt normal communications. Bell and several FHL employees are taking a class to qualify them at the Basic Technical Level to become an Amateur Radio Operator. The classes are given at St. Luke's Hall in Jolon over seven evenings. Ham operators no longer need to learn Morse code to obtain a basic license.
