Farewell Dinner for FHL Leaders





















Prescribed burns keep training on task



FHL has conducted a series of prescribed burns in the last few weeks, and Moira Trevisan, Special Projects Officer, went with them one day to learn why they are necessary. The result is a video where Assistant Fire Chief Mike Hewston describes some of the reasons controlled burns are necessary. By reducing a buildup of vegetation fuel, these burns help keep a wildfire from going out-of-control, and also reduce the likelihood of hot ammunition during training starting a fire that would set back training hours or days. Testing for Depleted Uranium









Dr. Tara Schoenwetter of Leidos conducts quarterly testing of soil and water to record levels of depleted uranium (DU) at Fort Hunter Liggett June 13, 2020. While it is not known for sure, weapons using DU may have been used on FHL between 1961 and 1971. That's when the Davy Crocket Weapon System was tested at various installations. The Army and the Army Corps of Engineers are trying to determine where these radioactive rounds were used, and to monitor the environment effects it may pose, if present. Schoenwetter takes soil and water samples at FHL to determine if any ammunition from these nuclear-capable recoilless weapons exists on the installation. According to Health Physicist Dr. Bob Cherry with IMCOM, natural uranium can be found throughout the country, has the same toxic properties as DU and has a greater specific radioactivity than DU. Military Spouse Appreciation Day






