Garrison Commander Col. Charles Bell's vision is to create an Engineer Center of Excellence at Fort Hunter Liggett, hosting all engineer skills training. Working with the 80th Training Command and 102nd Training Division, the first-ever 12W Carpentry and Masonry Military Occupational Skills course began at the 80th Training Command TASS Training Center (TTC). The course has eight students and are operating as "bubble" to reduce risks of contracting COVID-19. They are currently learning crafts of their trade in a tent with base structures for them to work on. The garrison is renovating the former TTC facilities to accommodate this and future engineer courses. California Army National Guard Soldiers with the 1-185th Infantry Regiment conduct annual Stryker Gunnery Qualifications at Fort Hunter Liggett, August, 2020. About 34 Strykers will go through the firing range. Soldiers must successfully engage seven out of ten targets. The Stryker provides support by fire and serves as troop transport (max 8 Soldiers) to get them closer to the battle. The vehicle can be equipped with a M19 grenade launcher or a 50-Caliber machine gun.
