DES answers important questions about firearm registration

FORT JOHNSON, La. — Many Soldiers and civilians know about registering their firearms on Fort Johnson and have begun the process of compliance.

However, there are still some personnel unsure if weapons registration applies to them, according to Gregory W. Funderburk, deputy director, of Fort Johnson's Directorate of Emergency Services.

"If you bring a weapon onto the installation, the Fort Johnson policies governing weapons registration apply to you," Funderburk said.

Weapons registration applies to all personnel who live, frequent, visit or are passing through the installation. The requirement to register weapons transported on the installation applies to Soldiers, civilians, family members and personnel not affiliated with the installation in any way.

Funderburk said Fort Johnson's registration policy mirrors the requirements outlined in Army Regulations 190-13 and 190-11, which most installations follow.

"There are a few procedural differences, but the basic requirements are the same," he said. Many residents have asked why they must

register their weapons on the installation. Funderburk said aside from being regulatory

compliant, there are other reasons to register firearms.

 Commanders are required to assess all personnel who possess weapons on the installation for Violation of the Federal Gun Control Act of 1996, which makes it a felony to own, sell or possess a firearm after being convicted of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence.

•Commanders are required to prevent Soldiers from possessing firearms on the installation if they have been convicted of possession. use, or sale of marijuana and dangerous or nartion. cotic drugs. This includes non-judicial punish-Military Justice.

 Commanders are also required to prevent firearms from being registered on the installation by personnel who have been declared as mentally incompetent. This assessment process is key to keeping Soldiers, family members and civilians safe.

Here are some of the other common guestions DES has been asked:

- Q. Where can I get the Weapons Registra-
- A. Gun owners can follow the link to the Visitors Center for more information and the at any time on post. weapons registration form 563.
- Q. I filled out the registration form at the AAFES gun counter, so I'm registered, right?
- **A**. Not exactly. The registration filled out at the point of sale at AAFES is a temporary registration that is good for 24 hours and provides



the gun owner with a legal means to transport the weapon on post until a commander validates the registration and it's dropped off at the visitors center. This applies to weapons purchased at other locations as well. Gun owners have 24 hours to register their weapon once it is brought on post.

- Q. I live in the barracks. Can I keep my weapon in my room?
- A. No, AR 190-11 and Fort Johnson Regulation 190-3 state that Soldiers living in the barracks are required to store their firearms in the unit arms room.
- **Q**. Are firearms allowed in family housing?
- A. No. They may only be stored in family housing with an exception from the installation commander. Weapons registration and the commander's evaluation serve as that excep-
- Q. I only come on post to shoot at the MWR ment under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of shooting range. Do I have to register my weap-
 - A. Yes, if the weapon is on post it must be registered. Patrons of the MWR shooting range can complete the registration form 563 at the MWR range prior to using the range.
 - **Q**. Once registered on post, can I carry my weapon in my vehicle all the time?
 - A. No, IAW AR 190-11 and Fort Johnson Regulation 190-3 states weapons are only to be transported on post for authorized purposes such as hunting, ranges, etc. Remember also, that a weapon may not be transported loaded
 - with Fort Johnson?
 - **A**. No, only those that are transported onto Fort Johnson.
 - Q. I have a Louisiana concealed carry permit. Do I have to register my weapon?

- A. Yes. Remember concealed carry permits do not apply on Fort Johnson.
- Q. I am a frequent hunter in the box when it is open, do I have to register my weapon to hunt in the box?
- A. If the weapon does not come on the installation, it does not have to be registered. For the purposes of weapons registration, the training area or "Box" is considered off post.
- Q. How serious is the Army about weapons registration?
- A. Very serious. In fact, an incident involving an unregistered weapon is now a Class II Serious Incident Report (SIR) that must be reported to the Department of the Army.

Funderburk said one of the most interesting questions came from a 1st Sergeant. He asked how his unit could get a handle on weapons registration.

"I told him to designate a day in his company area where both he and the commander would be available for weapons registration. Then publicize it, and have his Soldiers bring in their weapons information on the designated day. Have the unit personnel fill out the registration forms. Once completed, the forms can be dropped off in mass at the Visitor Control Center. DES can do the rest," Funderburk said.

He encouraged all units and Directorates to do likewise.

"Directors and commanders can use this time to incentivize weapons registration with passes, time off awards, or 59 minute rule. Weapons registration is an individual responsi-Q. Do I have to register all of my weapons bility that comes with bringing a weapon on the installation," Funderburk said.






HOW TO GET STARTED WITH SCHEDULED VIRTUAL VISITS

Do you need to schedule a virtual health appointment? Follow these five steps and get started with Scheduled Virtual Visits.

1. Schedule your appointment:

Call your military hospital or clinic to schedule a virtual visit or submit a request via the MHS GENESIS Patient Portal. Once the appointment is scheduled, you'll receive a confirmation email. The session link will be provided 72 hours prior to the appointment.



3. Choose your device:

Ensure your chosen device has audio and video capability. Please ensure this device has a strong internet connection to avoid connectivity issues.

4. Begin the check-in process:

We recommend you join your session 15 minutes prior to the appointment start time to begin the check-in process with clinical staff. Click the session link you received via text or email or join from the MHS GENESIS Patient Portal.

5. Start your session:

Come prepared to discuss your questions and concerns to ensure you receive the care you need.



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Preventive Medicine Food Sanitation Inspectors keeping Fort Johnson healthy

FORT JOHNSON, La. - Have you ever wondered what the letter grades posted outside the Joint Readiness Training Center and Fort Johnson dining facilities, food trucks, concessions, homebased cottage food operations and restaurants mean?

Bayne-Jones Army Community Hospital's Department of Public Health inspect these establishments quarterly to ensure U.S. Army food sanitation compliance.

"My team ensures the community has safe food and drinking water," said 1st Lt. Niala Bryant, chief of environmental health for BJACH. "We conduct studies on vector-borne illnesses carried by mosquitoes, swimming pool inspections, and heat stress studies. We also provide the daily heat category status of the installa-

Bryant said the veterinarians at Fort Johnson and her team work closely on food safety related inspections with the vets focusing on farm to food storage. Her team focuses on "food storage to the forks" of the dining facility and restaurant patrons across post.

"The grades we use indicate each facility's level of sanitation," she said.

Pfc. Christina Braham, preventive medicine specialist, with the BJACH DPH conducts inspections regularly.

Department of Public Health is made up of five distinct sections: the Army Hearing program, industrial hygiene, occupational health, public health nursing and epidemiology, and environmental health.

"The Department of Public Health has many different sections, but we all assist in the well-being of our community," she said. "Environmental Health, where I work, specifically tries to prevent sicknesses and diseases, whether that be food-borne, bacteriological quantities in water (recreational or potable), vector-borne diseases, hazardous waste, CYS inspections, gym inspections, barbershop inspections, and more."

Braham said she inspects all dining establishments quarterly and works closely with the veterinary team on post.

"The food inspections we do are to ensure that all facilities maintain the highest standards of cleanliness," she said. "As a 68S, I check the sanitary aspect of the kitchen, the employees, and make sure food is not spoiled or in the danger zone, which can put individuals at risk for foodborne illnesses. Whereas the veterinary food inspection specialists (68R) focus on the expiration dates and time of temperature-controlled foods."

Braham said the veterinary inspectors focus on where the food comes from, while she focuses on the conditions where the food is pre-

"An A rating means the establishment is fully compliant, a B rating means substantially compliant with no imminent health hazards present, a C rating means the establishment has three or more critical violations and six or more noncritical violations,

along with no imminent health hazards pres-

Braham said anything less than a C rating suggests the establishment is noncompliant and imminent health hazards exist.

















Exterior Grounds:

- ☐ If you have a fence or tight hedge, have you evaluated it as a defense against intrusion?
- ☐ Is your fence or wall in good repair?
- ☐ Are the gates solid and in good repair?
- ☐ Are the gates properly locked during the day and at night?
- ☐ Do you check regularly to see that your gates are locked? ☐ Have you eliminated trees, poles, ladders, boxes, etc., that
- may help an intruder to scale the fence, wall, or hedge? ☐ Have you removed shrubbery near your gate, garage, or
- front door that could conceal an intruder? ☐ Do you have lights to illuminate all sides of your residence, garage area, patio, etc.?
- ☐ Do you leave your lights on during hours of darkness?
- ☐ Do you check regularly to see that the lights are working?
- ☐ If your residence is guarded, does his/her post properly position him/her to have the best possible view of your grounds and residence?
- ☐ If applicable, does your guard patrol your grounds during the hours of darkness?
- ☐ If applicable, has your guard been given verbal or written instructions and does he/she understand them?
- Do you have dogs or other pets that will sound an alarm if they spot an intruder?
- ☐ Have you considered installation of a camera system with recording capabilities or a dummy camera system as a deterrent?

Interior Features:

- ☐ Are your perimeter doors made of metal or solid wood? ☐ Are the doorframes of good solid construction?
- ☐ Do you have an interview grill or optical viewer in your main entrance door?
- ☐ Do you use the interview grill or optical viewer?
- ☐ Are your perimeter doors properly secured with good heavy-duty deadbolt locks?
- ☐ Are the locks in good working order?
- ☐ Can any of your door locks be bypassed by breaking the glass or a panel of lightwood?
- ☐ Have you permanently secured all unused doors?
