Hospital earns 2023 Leapfrog Top Hospital Award for outstanding quality, safety

FORT JOHNSON, La. - Highlighting its nationally recognized achievements in patient safety and quality, Bayne-Jones Army Community Hospital was named a Top Rural Hospital by The Leapfrog Group, a national watchdog organization known as the toughest standard-setters for health care safety and quality. The Leapfrog Top Hospital award is widely acknowledged as one of the most competitive awards American hospitals can receive. Top Hospitals were honored Dec. 5 at the 2023 Leapfrog annual meeting and awards dinner in Washington, D.C.

Col. Takako Barrell, acting hospital commander, said BJACH was one of two in the state of Louisiana to achieve the Top Rural Hospital designation and the only military medical treatment facility in the Defense Health Agency to be recognized by the Leapfrog Group.

"Patient safety is our number one priority, and this recognition means a lot," she said. "Our staff and beneficiaries should be proud. This award signifies how well BJACH compares to similar facilities across the nation and highlights our commitment to providing the best care to our beneficiaries."

More than 2,100 hospitals were considered for the award. A total of 132 Top Hospitals were selected, including eight children's, 35 general, 15 rural and 74 teaching hospitals.

The quality of patient care across many areas of hospital performance is considered when establishing the qualifications for the award, including infection rates, practices for safer surgery, maternity care and the hospital's capacity to prevent medication errors. The rigorous standards are defined in each year's Top Hospital Methodology.

"Protecting patients from preventable harm is the cornerstone of The Leapfrog Group's mission," said Leah Binder, president, and CEO of The Leapfrog Group. "BJACH has demonstrated that patient safety is their top priority, and we're truly pleased to recognize them as a Top Hospital again this year. Congratulations to hospital staff at all levels who made this national recognition possible."

Stacy Hall, chief of quality management at BJACH, said this recognition demonstrates the military medical treatment facility at the Joint Readiness Training Center and Fort Johnson provides safe, quality-driven care to active-duty Soldiers, retirees and their Families.

"Achieving this award, for the second year in a row, shows a strong commitment from our team to protect our patients," she said. "We are committed to a transparent culture of patient safety and process improvement. At BJACH we create an environment conducive to compassionate, patient centered, safe care."

Soldiers travel to Fort Johnson to leverage resources, improve patient care

FORT JOHNSON, La. — William Beaumont Army Medical Center, Fort Bliss, Texas, answered the call for assistance by providing two respiratory specialists, Staff Sgt. Adolfo Uribe and Sgt. Christopher Allen, to support patient care at Bayne-Jones Army Community Hospital, Fort Johnson.

Uribe, outpatient pulmonary services noncommissioned officer in charge for WBAMC, volunteered to help in the spirit of teamwork.

"This is the second hospital I've had the opportunity to help out like this," he said. "I enjoy it. As the NCOIC, I am focused more on administrative tasks than patient care. This gives me an opportunity to stay fresh and up to date on my skills."

Allen, a former Geronimo with 1st Battalion, 509th Infantry Regiment at Fort Johnson, reclassed to 68V (respiratory specialist) a year ago and is the inpatient services respiratory NCO at WBAMC.

"I love taking care of Soldiers," Allen said. "Coming back to Fort Johnson to help out makes me proud. I know I'm helping the Army provide better patient care."

Both Uribe and Allen agreed the experience has been great and the team at BJACH has been welcoming and supportive.

Lt. Col. Grigory Charny, deputy commander of clinical services for BJACH, said it's important to have a strong respiratory team on staff.

"It is crucial to have respiratory services in both the outpatient and inpatient setting," Charny said. "Especially now, during the season of increased likelihood of respiratory illness. Without these respiratory specialists, everything becomes more difficult whether it's a breathing treatment in the clinic, an intubation in the emergency room, or continued respiratory and pulmonary care on the wards when a patient is admitted."

Col. Stephen Tanner, deputy commanding officer, WBAMC, said his military medical treatment facilities was happy to support the request.

"One of the strengths of the military health system is our ability to reach out across the enterprise to support each other in times of need," Tanner said. "It is important that military treatment facilities support one another because we all go through periods of time when we have shortages of personnel due to a myriad of factors. Supporting each other in this manner helps us all meet the healthcare needs of our beneficiaries and aids in the health readiness of our service members and their Families."

Capt. Kelvin Cook, chief of operations for BJACH, said partnerships like this with WBAMC illustrate the collaborative efforts MTFs have across the enterprise to ensure the best access and quality of care to beneficiaries.

"Through shared resources our network is

synced in providing top quality patient care under a joint model that ties together all mission partners," Cook said. "While mission and requirements evolve and develop continuously, flexibility is key in managing our personnel assets. The ability for us to extend our personnel to other agencies and vice versa shows that the system is built to support and provide the best care to our beneficiaries."

Cook said BJACH has and will continue to support backfill requests of medical doctors, biomedical maintenance specialists, behavioral health technicians, combat medics and more

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for missions overseas and in the continental United States.

Charny said leveraging personnel assets is the key to success.

"We are all part of one healthcare network who serve the same population and we rely on each other to get through difficult times," he said. "A portion of our staff is always at risk of deployment, training, or attending school away from the hospital. MTF collaboration during staffing shortages and mutual support is extremely important in maintaining good quality care for our patients."



Access control point holiday hours

The Fort Johnson Visitor Control Center and access control points 2 (Parkway Elementary), 5 (Post Office) and 6 (Chaffee Avenue) will be closed Dec. 23-26. They will resume normal operations Dec. 27.

The same locations will be closed Dec. 30-Jan. 2. They will resume normal operations Jan 3. Personnel and their guests are encouraged to use either ACP 1 (main gate) or ACP 7 (Alligator Lake) during these closures.

Sponsors and visitors are encouraged to obtain passes prior to closures by visiting the VCC or using online pass request at <u>https://visit.gvt.</u> <u>us/steps/installation_selection</u>. VCC standard hours are Monday-Friday from 5 a.m.-9 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Sponsors may also escort guests onto the installation if the sponsor has a DoD common access card, retiree card or dependent card and is 18 years or older. Finally, visitors with a valid driver license can be vetted for one-day access onto the installation, at ACP 1 or ACP 7.



Prohibiting alcohol purchasing hours

Beginning Jan. 1, alcohol sales at the South Main Express will be prohibited during the hours of 10 p.m.-11 p.m. No other Fort Johnson retail outlets will affected.

Starting in 2024, AAFES, which runs hundreds of retail outlets on Air Force and Army bases worldwide, will cut the hours it sells alcohol at all of its stores. Beer, wine and spirits will only be sold between 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. at all Base Exchanges, Shoppettes, Express shops, Class Six and other stores run by AAFES."

- When you leave the heater alone, turn it off and unplug it
- Don't try to warm anything but the room
- Don't combine heaters and moisture in any way
- Remember any ventilation requirements

Follow these tips to keep your water pipes from freezing: set faucets to a slow drip; disconnect hoses attached to outdoor plumbing; open cabinet doors under kitchen and bathroom sinks and ensure you know where water shutoff valves are.



Follow these tips to winterize your facilities: leave heat on in office/building; leave water dripping in facilities with exposed piping; check outside faucets and submit demand maintenance orders in case of need for wrapping exposed pipes and report any heat-related issues immediately.

All residents living in South Fort & North Fort military housing are authorized to dispose of bulk items into the roll off located at Corvias Warehouse site marked **"RESIDENTIAL WASTE ONLY"**. This is for "Housing Residents Only" not from barracks, Garrison entities or from off post. The site is located @ 6528 Holmlund Street next to the Dogwood "Bark Park". Operating hours are M-F 0800-1700.

KEYS TO SOLID WASTE SUCCESS

• Keep dumpster lids and doors closed to comply with Louisiana regulations to avoid state action (Title 33, Part VII, ref. 507.D).

- Don't bury, burn, or dispose of waste in the field or garrison.
- Sort hazardous and regulated waste from insert waste at the point of generation.
- Purge refrigerators, ACs, and freezers with freon before disposal at QRP Recycling Center.

Personal appliance DMOs are not accepted.

(FAQ) FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How do I request a roll-off for a large amount of scrap wood and how long can my unit keep it?

Call (337) 535-1155 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. with your facility number or location, name, phone number. POC is responsible for items and other materials that are placed inside roll-off. Wood only. No trash or debris.

Where do I deliver scrap metal?

QRP recycling center, building 3620. Call (337) 531-7556 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Can my unit dispose of bread racks in dumpsters from our field training exercises?

No. Deliver to building 4366 cold storage facility on Virginia Avenue for reuse.

Can my unit deliver used/damaged furniture to the CSWCP 8300 block?

Yes, but furniture must not be on the organization's hand receipt, and units must provide a detail to unload.

How does my unit request solid waste support for upcoming training or ranges?

Call (337) 535-1155 and provide unit name, POC, grid location or range number and dates needed.

Why didn't my unit or facility dumpsters didn't get serviced today?

The dumpster was blocked by a vehicle or equipment, too heavy from unauthorized items, had safety issues or contained a restricted item.

Where can my unit dispose of bags of leaves, pine straw, tree limbs and other yard waste from unit area cleanup? The 8300 block on North Fort. All plastic bags must be emptied into the roll-off. For assistance call (337) 535-1155 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Where can I dispose of clean cardboard?

Any green dumpster, building 3620 (QRP) or building 830 north of the Thrift Shop (old commissary) parking area.









Road work begins on Texas Avenue

Repairs to Texas Avenue are in progress. The project will require approximately nine months to complete. Phase one is approximately 45 days and will require the complete closure of the intersection of Texas and Pennsylvania avenues. Non-hazardous cargo and Non-commercial traffic are encouraged to use alternate routes such as 4th Street in advance of the closure. Commercial traffic, tactical traffic and hazardous cargo will be directed to follow the posted detour. The posted detour will be restricted during PT hours (6:30-8 a.m.). Plan movements before or after PT hours to avoid delays. Motorists should anticipate traffic delays. Pedestrians are encouraged to stay clear of the work zone.



Fort Johnson Soldier completes degree with 'traditional' college experience

Darren Polk has had an unconventional academic career that included online classes, a U.S. Army deployment and getting married. But this past semester, he was able to be a man about campus at Northwestern State University, taking face-to-face classes and participating in student life. Polk graduated Dec. 14 with an Associate of General Studies degree.

A native of Pensacola, Florida, Polk joined the U.S. Army as an active-duty military police soldier in 2018, two years after graduating high school. After completing training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, he was stationed at Fort Johnson in the 204th Military Police Company. He is currently a staff sergeant and during his time in the Army has been around the U.S. for several military and training events.

Polk took online college courses through Purdue University Global, and in October 2020 he was deployed to the Middle East to support Operation Enduring Freedom.

"This entailed waking up at 3 a.m. for the hour seminars presented by my instructors," he said. "Once I returned to Fort Johnson in July 2021, I took a break from school with the idea of continuing in the future. Once it came time for me to reenlist, I chose to take part in the college option that my battalion offers, where I am allowed to attend in-person classes for a single semester. During this time, my goal was to graduate so I could get the 'full experience' of college, and as it comes to a close, I'm thankful I chose this path."

Polk took classes at NSU's Leesville/Fort Johnson campus and the main campus in Natchitoches, attended football games and maintained good academic standing. His goal in completing the degree was to get the experience and stay competitive for his next promotion.

"My past platoon sergeant offered excellent advice leading up to me making the choice of going back to school and gave me the idea of going for a general studies degree that could be better used for branching off of instead of other degrees that people in my job over saturate," he said.

SRS (Recognize, Retreat, Report) Explosives Safety Education Program

All individuals who discover abandoned, unattended or discarded ammunition and explosives, potential unexploded ordnance or a potential explosive hazard should use the Army's 3R process:

1 - **RECOGNIZE**: When you may have encountered a munition or potential unexploded ordnance and recognize it is dangerous

2 - **RETREAT:** Do not touch, move or disturb the munition or unexploded ordnance. Carefully leave the area, informing other personnel in the area of the situation and evacuating the area

3 - REPORT: Report any and all ammunition, explosives and suspected unexploded ordnances immediately to the Directorate of Emergency
