SUBJECT: GO1 UPDATE: 1st Infantry Division and Fort Riley Commanding General's Stay at Home Directive in Response to Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19)

1. PURPOSE. To inform all personnel under the authority of the Commanding General, 1st Infantry Division and Fort Riley, of the Commanding General's Stay at Home Directive in response to Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19).
2. AUTHORITY. Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), 10 U.S.C. Chapter 47 and Army Regulation 600-20. This Directive supersedes the previous version of the 1st Infantry Division Commanding General's Stay at Home Order. It remains in effect until 3 May 2020, unless rescinded, extended, or superseded.
3. APPLICABILITY. This Directive is applicable to all Service Members and DA Civilians (DAC), assigned or attached to the 1st Infantry Division and Fort Riley, to include tenant units, and all other military and civilian personnel on Fort Riley under the command and control of the Senior Commander. Civilians and Family members are also highly encouraged to adhere to this Directive. Civilians and Family members who do not comply with this Directive may be barred or denied access to the installation.
4. REFERENCES. Governor Laura Kelly's Executive Order 20-24, "Extending Executive Order 20-16 to May 3, 2020," dated 16 April 2020; Governor Laura Kelly's Executive Order 20-16 "Establishing a statewide 'Stay home'" order in conjunction with the Kansas Essential Function Framework for COVID-19 response efforts," dated 28 March 2020.
5. PUNITIVE ORDER. The provisions contained in paragraph 6.b. and paragraph 8 and its subparagraphs constitute a punitive order for Service Members. Violations may be punished with appropriate administrative, non-judicial, and/or judicial action under the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ).
6. GENERAL GUIDANCE.
 - a. All persons will adhere to FRKS COVID mitigation measures including the wearing of face coverings, sanitation protocols, and social distancing requirements. All persons entering or exiting Fort Riley may be required to submit to a physical examination or testing, as necessary, to detect and prevent the transmission of COVID-19 and enhance public health and safety. Qualified clinical personnel will perform examinations and testing.
 - b. Curfew. Service Members living on Fort Riley, in the barracks or on-post housing, are prohibited from pedestrian or vehicular movement between 2200-0500. Service

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Members living off post and Family members living on or off post are strongly encouraged to abide by the same restrictions. Authorized exceptions are: (1) medical emergencies; (2) caring for children, Family members, friends, pets; or (3) going to and from a place of employment or unit area to perform mission essential functions.

7. DEFINITIONS.

a. The term "home" as used in this Directive encompasses an individual's residence—to include an individual's barracks, family residence, or other living arrangement.

b. The term "stay at home" as used in this Directive means immediately ceasing departure from a home or place of residence except when performing essential activities or essential business services.

c. The term "essential activities" is defined as follows: (1) obtaining food, medicine, and other household necessities; (2) performing an essential function or going to and from work at a business or organization to perform an essential function; (3) seeking medical care; (4) caring for children, Family members, friends, or pets in another household or residence; and (5) engaging in outdoor activity that promotes health and wellness.

d. The term "essential business services" means, employees who support the essential services required to meet national security commitments to the federal government and U.S. Military, such as support to COVID-19 operations, minimum manning functions to preserve mission essential combat readiness, and those activities required to maintain good order and discipline. Under Governor Laura Kelly's Executive Order Nos. 20-16 and 20-24, military personnel, including DACs and contractors, may continue to work and perform the essential business services necessary to ensure continuity of the military's functions.

e. The term "visitor(s)" is defined as any person who does not reside in the home of the Service Member.

8. PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES. In light of the recent stay at home orders issued by civilian local governments and the State of Kansas in response to COVID-19, and in order to ensure the health, safety, and wellbeing of Service Members, civilian employees, their Families, and the community, I HEREBY ORDER THAT:

a. All Service Members, DACs, and contractors will comply with all applicable provisions of local authority public health orders.

b. Travel. Travel for Service Members is restricted to essential activities and essential business services within the local area (70 mile radius of Fort Riley) unless an exception to policy is granted in writing by the first O-6 level commander.

c. Home Visitation. Service Members on and off the installation are prohibited from having visitors in their home or entering another person's home unless it is to conduct an essential activity (e.g. a work order in the house, a nanny caring for children, a social well-being check that lasts 10 minutes or less). Visitors conducting essential activities will

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continue to practice social distancing as necessary. Family members and DACs, on and off the installation, are discouraged from having visitors in their homes or entering another person's home unless it is for an essential activity. This does not apply to the chain of command conducting essential business such as health and welfare inspections in the barracks or similar activities.

d. Outside Social Gatherings. For Service Members, all non-duty public and private gatherings on or off the installation of more than 5 personnel are strictly prohibited. Family members and DACs are strongly encouraged to limit social gatherings as well. This limitation does not apply to interactions between individuals living within the same home. During any outside social gathering, individuals will maintain a distance of six feet from one another. Service Members are prohibited from drinking alcohol during outside social gatherings with individuals living in a different home.

e. Physical Fitness. Service Members are authorized to perform physical readiness training (PRT), individually or at the buddy-team level, indoors or outdoors. Units are authorized to execute PRT in groups up to five Service Members under the following guidelines: (1) O-5 level commander approved, (2) Service Members maintain social distancing, (3) Service Members wear appropriate PPE, and (4) Service Members will sanitize the equipment and area used IOT prevent the spread of the virus and protect others (before, during, and after use).

f. Quarantine and Isolation. All Service Members must follow the directives of medical personnel and/or commanders ordering them into quarantine or isolation. Civilians and Family members are also highly encouraged to adhere to these directives. Civilians and Family members living on the installation who do not comply with quarantine or isolation instructions may be barred from Fort Riley. Civilians and Family members living off post who do not comply may be denied access to the installation.

9. COORDINATING INSTRUCTIONS.

a. The decision as to whether a Service Member will remain at home during all or part of the duty day will be made by the first O-5 level commander or higher in each Service Member's chain-of-command. Personnel designated as "mission essential" are those in support of mission essential activities, to include: (1) operations necessary for the continued operation of Fort Riley; (2) operations actively supporting or preparing to support COVID-19 response missions across CONUS; (3) all required maintenance and individual / crew training to meet requirements for units with assigned missions or CTC rotation within 180 days; or (4) those activities to promote good order, discipline, health, and welfare.

b. The decision as to whether a DAC will continue to report to their traditional worksite will be made by their supervisor after considering any guidance or directives put out by the first O-6 level commander, or higher, in the organization.

c. Commanders will minimize the number of employees required to report to a government controlled facility, while ensuring that no manning decision made pursuant to

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this Directive will adversely impact the readiness of 1ID and Fort Riley, its subordinate and tenant units in Kansas, or mission essential support services for Service Members, DACs, and their Families.

d. Although not required by Kansas Executive Order Nos. 20-16 and 20-24, Service Members, DACs, and contractors continuing to perform work at a government controlled facility will show local law enforcement their Common Access Card and explain the general nature of their work if stopped while en route to or from work.

e. Non-DoD On-Post Visitation. All personnel that are non-DoD ID cardholders who are currently on the installation visiting a Service Member or who want to visit a Service Member on the installation will require a memo/waiver from the first O-5 in the Service Member's chain of command to determine if the visit is an essential activity. Spouses of deployed Service Members should contact their Service Member's unit if they need to acquire such a memo. The individual needing the pass will take the approved memo to the Fort Riley Visitor Control Center to receive a pass form.

10. COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITIES. All commanders, leaders, and military and DoD supervisors are expected to support their Service Members and DACs ordered into quarantine or isolation. Support includes assisting the quarantined/isolated individual in obtaining necessary comfort, food, entertainment, or personal services while the individual remains in quarantine or isolation. Additionally, all unit commanders shall ensure all of their personnel and Soldier Family Readiness Group (SFRG) leaders are briefed on the prohibitions and requirements of this Directive. This includes the spouses of deployed military personnel.

11. WAIVERS AND ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS. Requests for waivers of any provision of this Directive must be submitted by the endorsing commander and routed through the chain of command to me for decision. Subordinate commanders may impose additional restrictions consistent with this Directive if necessary for good order and discipline. Any additional restrictions imposed by a commander will be forwarded to the Chief of Staff, 1ID.

12. EFFECTIVE DATE. Effective date of this Directive is 20 April 2020 and remains in effect until 3 May 2020, unless rescinded by the Commanding General, 1ID and Fort Riley, or modified in conjunction with local, state, or DoD guidance.
