SUBJECT: Fort Rucker Child Supervision Policy

1. Reference. Army Regulation 608-18 (The Army Family Advocacy Program).
2. Purpose. This policy imposes requirements for the supervision of children.
3. Discussion.
 - a. AR 608-18 defines "lack of supervision" as a type of child neglect characterized by the absence or inattention of the parent, guardian, foster parent, or other caregiver that results in injury to the child, in the child being unable to care for himself or herself, or in injury or serious threat of injury to another person because the child's behavior was not properly monitored.
 - b. Sponsors or designated care providers who leave children unattended in violation of this policy may be investigated under the Uniform Code of Military Justice and applicable state and federal laws by the installation police, Criminal Investigation Division, and Family Advocacy Program Treatment Services.
 - c. The Child Supervision Matrix (enclosed) is provided as guidance.

5. This memorandum supersedes GC Policy Memo 23-39, dated 29 June 2023, and will remain in effect until changed or formally rescinded.

The Child Supervision Matrix

USAG Fort Rucker CHILD SUPERVISION MATRIX									
Sponsors and parents are responsible for the welfare and safety of children in the military community. Each child is unique, personality, environment, developmental progress, and maturity level are factors used to determine when children are ready to accomplish activities with little or no supervision. Sponsors and parents are responsible for making this decision. The following are minimum community standards. These guidelines apply to all military, Department of Defense, and invited contractor personnel living on post.

Newborn - 5 years old (Kindergarten)	Requires direct supervision at all times	NO	NO	NO	NO	NO	NO	NO	
6-7 years old (1 st - 2 nd Grades)	Direct Supervision Children begin to explore their environment under supervision.	NO	NO	YES With immediate access (visual sight and hearing) of adult supervision. Children 6 and 7 years of age are not exempt from "out of unattended" rule when walking to and from school or to the school bus stop. They may not walk alone and must be accompanied by an adult or sibling that is 10 years or older.	NO	NO	NO	NO	
8-9 years old (3 rd - 4 th Grades)	Direct Supervision Children begin to explore their environment under supervision.	NO	NO	YES With ready access to an adult supervisor who is in the immediate area in case of an emergency and the parent knowing the location and activity of the child. May walk to and from school or to the school bus stop with a buddy.	NO	NO	NO	NO	
10-11 years old (5 th - 6 th Grades)	Indirect Supervision This is a transition time and children are developing more responsibility; however, they continue to require indirect supervision. Parents know child's location and activities. Emergency contact available.	YES 10-year-olds for up to 1 hour, 11-year-olds up to 2 hours (locally only, not daily). Must have access to indirect supervision (neighbor, checking with parent by phone).	NO	YES With ready access to an adult supervisor who is in the immediate area in case of an emergency and the parent knowing the location of the child. Parent or supervisor makes hourly checks on the child. Child may walk or ride bike to and from school unaccompanied. Ready access may be accomplished with a cell phone. Home- Alone course is recommended.	NO	NO	YES 11-year-olds may sit a string order for up to 1 hour, 10-year-olds may sit a string.	NO	
12-13 years old (7 th - 8 th Grades)	Indirect Supervision Children are approaching the adolescent years when there is a need for increased responsibility. The amount of responsibility should be carefully evaluated.	For up to 6 hours with ready access to adult supervision and intermittent contact with a parent.	NO	YES With access to adult supervision. Parent checks on the child or has the child check in at parent's or caregiver's location every 2 hours. Parent must know child's location and activity.	YES	YES	YES 13-year-olds may baby sit 5 hours with ready access to adult supervision during daylight hours. Access to adult supervision. Babysitter course is recommended.	YES 13-year-olds may baby sit 5 hours with ready access to adult supervision. Babysitter course is required.	
14-16 years old (9 th - 11 th Grades)	Indirect Supervision Children continue to need to know how to access parents or guardians for emergency assistance. Parents are responsible for their children and their actions.	No longer than 6 hours with ready access to adult supervision. At least minimum of 15 minutes of contact during the time alone.	NO	YES With access to adult supervision by phone or a designated caregiver within 2 hours. Parent must know child's location and activity of the youth. Contact must be made every 2 hours.	YES	YES	YES	YES May sit up to 2 hours with ready access to adult supervision. Babysitter course is required.	
17-18 years old (12 th Grade)	Indirect Supervision Parents are responsible for their children and their actions as long as family member status is maintained.	No more than 2 consecutive overnight periods with access to adult supervision.	YES Indirect Supervision	YES	YES	YES	YES	YES Babysitter course is required.
