Gate locations

It is open 5 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. and is closed weekends, training and federal holidays. Gate 5 is the back gate or north gate. It is located past the golf course. It is open 24 hours/ day, 7 days/week Gate 7, called the west gate, is located on West 15th St. and 6th St. It is open 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. And is closed weekends, training and federal holidays. Gate 7C is the commercial gate. It is located on West 15th St. it is open 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. and is closed weekends, training and federal holidays. Gate 8 is located on Veterans Parkway, it comes out near Ranger Joes. It is open 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. and is closed weekends, training and federal holidays. Gate 9 is near Wright Army Airfield. It is open 24 hours/day, 7 days a week.

The Hunter Army Airfield main gate is located on Montgomery St. and is open, 24 hours, 7 days a week. Wilson Gate is on Wilson. It is open 5 a.m. to 9 p.m., closed weekends, training and federal holidays. Rio Gate comes out to Hero Way, 24 hours, 7 days a week. Please call (912) 767-1883 for more information.

Bradleys arrive, drive Spartan transition

Troopers of 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, received their M3 Cavalry Fighting Vehicles Jan. 11, at Fort

As the brigade's reconnaissance squadron, this gives 6-8 Cav their first combat platforms to begin training. The cavalry fighting vehicles (CFV) entering 6-8 Cav's motorpool also marks the first combat vehicles fielded to the Spartan Brigade since the announcement that it would convert to the Army's 15th armored brigade combat team in late 2016.

The M3 Cavalry Fighting Vehicle (CFV) falls in the family of the Bradley Fighting Vehicles and is the reconnaissance variant fielded to armored cavalry units. The brigade will sequentially field the various Bradley variants

over the next couple of months to include the M2A2, infantry fighting vehicle (IFV), the Bradley fire support vehicles (B-FiST), and the engineer squad vehicle (ESV).

The M3 is an armored fighting vehicle equipped with a 25mm main gun, a Tubelaunched, Optically tracked, Wire-guided (TOW) missile and a 600hp Cummins diesel engine. This allows the Bradley to drive through mud, sand, and small trees while engaging targets 2,500 meters away, while being able to destroy heavily armored vehicles two miles away.

"As part of converting into the Army's 15th armored brigade combat team, we repurposed all of our light vehicles to various units within 3ID in 2017," said 1st Lt. Andrew Clanton of

The repurposing of light vehicles gives 2ABCT room for the incoming armored vehicles and establishes the foundation for an armored brigade.

Before driving the vehicles to the 2nd ABCT compound, the Soldiers were tasked with inspecting all equipment essential to the vehicles and conducting preventive maintenance checks and services on the Bradleys.

"Now that we have received our combat tracked vehicles, we will be setting our sights on gunnery, which is slated to take place this Spring," said Clanton.

Gunnery is designed to train scout crews, sections, and platoons to employ their weapon systems effectively in a combat environ-

"We will conduct troop gunnery, then go straight into squadron gunnery," said Clanton. "There's really no breaks in between repurposing our vehicles, troop gunnery, and squadron gunnery."







WWII Veteran returns to France

The 3rd Infantry Division began its distiguished combat history in France, 1917. A 100 years later, a former Army captain represented the Marne Division during a liberation celebration in the French town of Solliès-Pont on August

In August of 1944, Soldiers from the 3rd Inf. Div., serving under the 7th Army, landed in Cavalaire, France as part of Operation Dragoon. In only four weeks, the combined allied forces were able to defeat the opposing German forces and liberate most of southern France.

James Miller, a Bluffton, SC resident, served in Europe from 1967 – 1969 as an Army captain. During his service in Europe he became good friends with a French army officer who later retired to Solliès-Pont. Last year Miller was contacted by his French army counterpart who invited him to represent the U.S. Army at the 73rd Anniversary Celebration of the Liberation of Solliès-Pont.


While researching the event, Miller discovered that it was 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers who liberated the town. Miller contacted the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division "Raider Brigade" here on Fort Stewart to offer to take a proclamation from the unit to be read at the celebration.

At the request of Solliès-Pont officials. Miller wore his dress uniform but with the awards and campaign ribbons from the World War II operation which freed their town. After configuring his uniform and purchasing a division flag from the museum, Miller traveled in August to France where he participated in the

Miller said that the reception from the town and its citizens was beyond his expectations and that he could not have been better received as the American representative.

"I could not have imagined how appreciative the French citizens were for this event," said Miller. "They have not forgotten their gratitude to the American military, as well as the other allies."

The Mayor of Solliès-Pont, Dr. Andre Garron, read remarks Miller delivered on behalf of Colonel Mike Adams, com-

mander of the Raider Brigade. In the remarks, Adams thanked the officials for allowing 3ID to be part of the event and paid tribute to the 3ID Soldiers and allies who liberated the town and Southern France.

"We are here today bound by the events of 1944," said Adams. "The French, U.S., British, and Canadian forces of the Allied Seventh Army were separated by language and culture but united by shared loyalties and beliefs."

After the remarks, town officials presented Mr. Miller with a medal from the city in honor of all American Soldiers of the 7th Army who gave their lives during the campaign. A second medal was mailed to Fort Stewart with a letter from

"The commemoration was an opportunity to honor the brilliant participation of the Soldiers of the 3rd Infantry Division who landed in Cavalaire on 15 August, 1944 and would go on to liberate France," said Garron. "Please accept the Sollies-Pont Medal of Honor in tribute of all the American Soldiers of the 7th Army who gave their lives to liberate a country that is not theirs."

Supporting the team at FOB Fenty

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan

- A common theme for sustainment operations in the Combined Joint Operations Area - Afghanistan is maximizing output with minimal assets. Small teams accomplish tremendous amounts of work so quickly that they make their jobs look easy.

Four Soldiers from various companies under the 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade are packed into a tight garage and surrounded by crates of mail going to all corners of Forward Operating Base Fenty. The members of mail teams are constantly pushing themselves to ensure that Soldiers, coalition forces, civilians and Department of Defense contractors are able to ship and receive their mail in a safe and timely manner.

Postal Soldiers start their day at the cargo yard retrieving mail brought in by flights or sling load crews from Bagram Airfield. They bring back pallets of mail, consisting of eight crates, or 'kicker boxes' that weigh thousands of pounds, to sort at their facility. The team will then begin to pitch the mail, separating the packages into their specific

units or contracting companies. Once all of the mail is separated, they scan and organize the boxes to be prepared for unit clerks to pick up.

"We open up at 9 a.m. to start inprocessing packages and letters in the customer service area and usually end the day at 5 p.m.," said Staff Sgt. Melanie Franklin, the military postal custodian of postal effects with the 408th Human Resources Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB. "We pitch mail in the mornings, middle of the day or in the afternoon depending on flights. During the holidays we got five times the normal amount of mail."

Since Franklin arrived to Fenty in August 2017, she and her team have processed approximately 100,000 pounds of mail. They process about 10,000 pounds of mail every month, whether it is in-processing mail from the states or delivering packages to forces on post.

Every Soldier can understand the importance of mail in maintaining the morale of troops. There is something so satisfying about being able to receive and send packages to loved ones back in the states. To keep morale high, the postal Soldiers put their all into ensuring packages get

can accomplish this task," said Spc. Donovan Stewart, a military postal clerk with the Headquarters and Headquarters Co., 1st Battalion, 501st Airborne Infantry Regiment. "It's shown me that I'm able to push more, that I have more in me than I real-

run post office in the CJOA-A, maintaining Army standards is an important aspect for these postal Soldiers. Since they took over, the team has improved community relations through town hall appearances as well as providing mail handler certification classes. Through their efforts, people are able to better understand the function of the post office as well as the rules for what can and can't be mailed. When the team eventually heads home, Franklin would like the post office to maintain its high operational efficiency.

"I'd like to know that Soldiers continue to do a great job and teach the new Soldiers the same standards," she said. "I want this to be the best military-run post office."

Marne Tax Center offers free service Ask the Judge--

The tax filing season is upon us. Did you know that there are free tax preparation services available at both Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield? If you are an active duty Service Members, or Retired from active duty, or are a Family Member of an active duty Soldier or a retiree, you are entitled to receive this free service.

Question. When will the Marne Tax

Center open this year? Answer. The Marne Tax Center will be opened for business on Jan. 23. Fort Stewart will open at 9:30 a.m. after the grand opening ceremony, and Hunter Army Airfield will open at 11:30 a.m. after the grand opening ceremony.

Q. Where is the Marne Tax Center located?

A. The Fort Stewart office is located in Building 816E, 2233 Gulick Ave. The Hunter Army Airfield office is located in Building 1211, 638 Horace Emmet Wilson Boulevard, (the Hunter Army Airfield legal assistance office).

Q. What are the hours of the Marne Tax Center?

A. The Marne Tax Center will be open as follows:

Monday, Wednesday, 10 a.m. to 6:15

Thurday, 1 p.m.. – 6:15 p.m. Friday, 10 a.m. to 6:15 p.m.

Q. Why choose the Marne Tax Center?

A. The Marne Tax Center provides quality, free tax preparation services to eligible individuals. All of our tax preparers are IRS-trained and certified as Volunteer Preparers and use TaxSlayer software, issued and endorsed by the IRS. We prepare federal and most state returns and provide electronic filing. There are absolutely no fees, hidden gimmicks, or any other costs associated with the Marne Tax Center. Whether you need to file a 1040-EZ, or a 1040 with numerous attached schedules, it is a free service; eligible clients do not have to pay to have their returns whether you need to file one state return, or multiple state returns, the cost to you remains the same

Q. Can I make an appointment?

A. No, both offices will be accepting walk-in clients on a first come, first serve

Q.What do I need to bring with me?

A. In order for our tax preparers to provide customers with the best service and assistance, you will need to bring all of the proper documents and a little bit of patience. You will need to bring the following documents as they apply to your situation:

Q. When should I bring my taxes in for filing?

A. Although the earlier you file, the sooner you can receive your refund, you must have all necessary documents before you can file your taxes. You may not have all the documents available to file for several weeks after the tax season begins. If you own a personal residence, you need to wait until you receive your 1098 Mortgage Interest Statement(s) in order to take advantage of deductions/ credits that may be available. If you have taxable interest or dividends that you receive, you will need to wait until you receive your 1099 INT or 1099 DIV prior to filing so that the correct amount is included and you won't have to needlessly amend the original return. If you don't have all your necessary documents when the tax season opens (e.g. social security cards, all W2s, 1099s), you will be told to wait and will need to come back to the Tax Center at a later date. Rental property returns will be accepted starting on 1 March for only one rental property. Please ensure that all of your expenses are organized before you arrive at the Tax Center as our preparers cannot organize your receipts for

able to file any returns for previous years (other than 2017 returns). If you need assistance in filing these returns within your extension timeline, please call the Fort Stewart Office at 912-767-1040 or the Hunter Army Airfield Office at 912-315-3675 starting on January 23rd, or visit either location for guidance on how to file those returns.

Q.What if I can't find my or my family member's social security card? Can't I just bring my military ID card?

A. It is essential that you bring your social security card with you to the Marne Tax Center. Before filing your tax return, we need to be certain that the name and social security number on your tax return exactly matches the information contained in the Social Security Administration's records. If the information does not match, your taxes will not properly be filed, and this could lead to a delay in receiving any refund due.

Alternatively, we will also accept a memorandum from the Social Security Administration identifying the taxpayer or family member. If you cannot find your social security card, please visit http://www.ssa.gov/ask or the Social Security Administration in Savannah, Ga at 430 Mall Blvd #1, Savannah, Ga

Q. Are there any tax returns the Tax Center cannot prepare for me?

A. Yes, the Tax Center cannot help prepare taxes that fall under the following categories: Business/Self Employment; sale of rental properties, day trading activities; and other situations that may be outside the scope of the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program. Contact the Marne Tax Center if you have questions pertaining to your specific situa-

Q. Are there other options available to me for free or at a reduced cost?

A. Yes, there are several options that you can use to prepare your taxes other than the Marne Tax Centers.

The Savannah VITA Center is located at Neighborhood Improvement Association, 1816 Abercorn Street, Savannah, Ga 31401. They can be reached at 912-447-5577. They provide the same service that the Marne Tax Centers do, but certain income limits may apply.

Military OneSource offers free tax preparation software at http://www. militaryonesource.mil/-/miltax-freetax-services-from-military-onesource.

Their phone number for assistance while filing is 800-342-9647. This service is provided to Service members, their Families, and Retirees who have left the service within 180 days. Access is granted once users have registered on the site, no CAC required.

Finally, you can use commercial tax preparation software at low cost, or utilize a commercial tax preparation business to file your returns for a fee.

Are you concerned about the status of your driver's license? Do you wonder about how to check your driver's license status? Do not stay in the dark and ensure you are driving in compliance with the law. It is now easier than ever to check your status and all you need is a computer with internet access. Several states now allow checking the status of driver's licenses on-line. To conduct the on-line check you will need the driver's license number, and in some states additional information such as the licensee's name and date of birth. None of these web-sites return personal identifying information. You are required to have that information to run the driver's license status check, but they do return the license status information (i.e.valid, expired, suspended). For example, If you have a Georgia driver's license the web site is *https://online.dds*. ga.gov/DLStatus/default.aspx.

Winn Stops-the-Bleed, instructs LCSS staff

In 2017 there were more than 60 school-related shootings nationwide. With an uptick in trauma violence not only in the nation, but particularly in the school system, U. S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Winn Army Community Hospital Emergency Department soldiers and staff partnered with Liberty Regional Medical Center, Memorial Health University Medical Center and the Department of Homeland Security to instruct teachers, faculty, coaches and staff with the Liberty County School System during a Stop the Bleed training class Jan. 2 at the LCSS board of education.

The Winn ACH Trauma team has spent the past few years prepping for a Level IV Trauma Center Designation. With that, the importance of teaching others in the community how to help stabilize a bleeding victim becomes more vital. Currently there is only one Level IV Trauma Center within a 50-mile radius of Fort Stewart, but once Winn becomes designated, the local community will benefit from this valued resource. The Stop the Bleed program is one of the steps moving Winn closer to its designation goal.

The Stop the Bleed campaign was initiated by a federal interagency workgroup convened by the National Security Council Staff. Locally, the Georgia Trauma Commission regionally funded the Stop the Bleed project 100 percent, and the program was implemented region-wide by the Regional Trauma Advisory Committee IX.

A grassroots effort is being made state-wide in Georgia to teach as many people as possible the correct way to help someone who has received an injury with uncontrolled bleeding. Winn assistant head nurse Michele Evans, who serves as the trauma manager in the emergency department at Winn, explained how important the Stop the Bleed program is to the school systems.

"I would tell teachers, it's not if it happens, it's when it happens," Evans said. "Schools are the most vulnerable places for mass shootings and we always need to be prepared and know how to respond in emergency situations."

Although the program is not being taught to students, the teachers were able to use simulated hands on learning tools, which may help save a students' life in the future. Throughout the boardroom, pool noodle

covered PVC pipes with holes strategically cut in them sat on the various tables, simulating arms and legs, upon which tourniquets and bandages were applied during the trainings.

"It's important to have the teachers know how to respond in an emergency," Evans said, "In case there is ever a mass shooting ... in the school system, they know how to respond for preventable deaths."

Participants were taught the importance of ensuring their own safety first, especially in a situation such as that of an active-shooter. The teachers, staff and coaches were taught to first call 9-1-1, then find the bleeding injury, compress by applying pressure to stop the bleeding.

Sincere Drake a paraprofessional at Waldo Pafford Elementary School in Hinesville, Georgia said she found the training interesting, yet saddened because of the necessity.

Evans stressed the amount of time it takes before a trauma becomes a tragedy.

"It takes seconds, even minutes for someone to bleed out," Evans said, "and we need to be able to prepare for that. So we are implementing this program so that we can save a life. First responders can take anywhere from five to ten minutes \dots to get on scene."

Anna Anderson an Emergency Medical Service technician and chairperson for the Regional Trauma Commission Education Committee said it is important to implement the training into all parts of the community. As Winn works toward a Level IV Trauma Designation, training others in the Fort Stewart and surrounding communities will become even more important.

"Winn Army is an integral part of the community here in Hinesville and Liberty County," Anderson said. "We also need to make sure that this training is integrated into all levels of the community. This is a grassroots program that is not only taught to healthcare professionals, and law enforcement, we also teach it to Boy Scout, and Girl Scout groups. This is a program that everybody needs to be aware of and everybody needs to function in a lifesaving capacity if needed."

To date, the Winn Stop the Bleed team have trained more than 160 educators in the Liberty and Evans County school systems and the entire MEDDAC staff during an annual skills fair.

Winn ambassadors become mentors

More than seven U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Winn Army Community Hospital Soldiers and DA Civilian Ambassadors signed up for the 2017-2018 Button Gwinnett MindShift Mentorship Program late last year to help at-risk students strive for excellence; while realizing their academic potential. BGE's MindShift team piloted the program and organized to help these students foster a positive selfidentity through social, emotional learn-

During the last academic year, the MindShift mentors spent approximately 255 hours of their time with their assigned mentees. This year Winn gets to be involved. The program requires the mentors to spend a minimum of one hour a week with their mentee, which many of the mentors exceed.

As a father of two, Calvin Glover who works as a Patient Advocate at Winn and mentor at BGE said although the saying, "children are our future," may seem cliché', rings true to him.

"If we don't prepare them for the future, then what is our future going to look like," Glover asked. "We need to have these people in our community, our cities, our states in our country that want to help other kids."

Glover said as hands on dad himself, he is active in his children's lives."

"I use that same mentality when I'm dealing with the mentees," Glover said. "I just try to be whoever they need me to be in their life. I try to be that adult that I wanted someone to be for me when I was their age. Someone that's understanding; someone that's going to listen; someone that's not going to be too hard on them, but still be firm; hold them accountable for their actions like I do my own children."

The MindShift program follows the guidelines and research taken from the book "The Seven Mindsets," which the authors define as the four essential elements that are critical to creating a

happy life.

BGE Principal, Dolores Crawford, said 30 students were targeted to participate in the program and she has a transparent approach with the children and their parents, but said expectation management is important for all involved.

"I don't want the students to feel like they can run over their mentors,' Crawford said. "That they can tell them anything and use this as an opportunity to get something .What they're getting is the opportunity to have someone outside of their teacher, outside of their parents, to come into their lives and make a positive difference."

MEDDAC Company Commander, Capt. Alexander Stodola agrees and has served as a mentor in some capacity for the past 10 years, said he started mentoring as a freshman in college.

"I remember when I was a kid, kind

of throughout my life I wasn't really sure what I wanted to do," Stodola said. "I kind of always did what I wanted ... what I thought was the right thing, [I] was kind of aimless. I had a mentor who kind of showed me kind of how to act, kind of how to plan, how to set goals. I know it had an instrumental role in my life so I kind of always wanted to pay it forward."

Although Stodola said the hardest part may be the first time he met his mentee, but said he found a great way to break the ice.

"I find the best interaction is to do it during an activity whether it's playing sports, whether it's going hiking for a walk, or at BGE I just went to his class and just sat down with him during reading class, and like 'hey...what are you reading? Why don't you tell me about it,"

Stodola said. Stodola was instrumental in introducing others to the program such as Sgt. Tierra Rivers, who was a little reluctant to join at first, yet she took time to reflect on her past, then joined the program herself.

"I remember when I was in elementary school and I was going through a lot and I didn't have anybody to look to or anybody to talk to, and I just felt really alone and weird like I went through a world wind of things and I didn't have anybody to show me the right way," Rivers said.

Crawford said the impact the mentors have had on the program has been significant and invites others in the community to apply for the mentorship pro-

"I want people to know that a little bit of time of their busy schedule out of their day can make a life time of difference in a life of a child," Crawford said.

Fees for an Individual are Annual: \$289.08, Quarterly: \$72.27 and Monthly: \$24.09. For Families: the annual cost is \$578.16; quarterly the cost is \$144.54 and monthly, \$48.18.

For calendar year 2018, Tricare Prime retiree enrollment fees in Group B; which represent retired Service members who initially enlists or are commissioned in a Uniformed Service on or after January 1, 2018, the fees for an Individual are \$350 for the annual fee; or a quarterly fee of \$87.50; monthly at \$29.17. For Families:, the annual cost is \$700; or the quarterly cost is \$175, or monthly at \$58.33. These fees were established by the National Defense Authorization Act.





Girls on the Run program may expand

Girls on the Run of Coastal Georgia is gearing up for 2018, which will include the program's regular spring season and summer day camps.

Girls on the Run is a physical activity-based, youth development program that teaches key skills to girls in grades 3-8 through discussions and games that integrate running. Girls on the Run of Coastal Georgia has been serving Chatham, Bryan, Effingham and Liberty counties since 1996. The program started with 30 girls in four sites and now serves over 1,000 girls in 30 sites.

According to a Girls on the Run press release, research, program implementation and evaluation went into designing a program that addresses the challenges that girls typically encounter during adolescence.

The program has proven to be rewarding for girls, families, coaches and educators, according to Rebecca Mock, principal of Joseph Martin Elementary in Hinesville.

"We had 39 girls in the program in the fall, and we love the results we are seeing in our girls," she said. "We had a number of coaches from our teaching staff who got as much out of it as the girls. Feedback from parents has been great, and I would love to see more girls from Liberty County being served by this outstanding program."

One of Mock's teachers who served as a coach is Sarah Trawick, who recieved the United Way volunteer of the year award.

"From a teacher's perspective, I found the experience to be very rewarding," Trawick said. "Girls on the Run is not a graded activity, and so there is no pressure. Girls open up and are receptive to what is being offered. To me, the most important lesson is avoiding negative self-talk. The program teaches positivity in all interactions and gives the girls the tools to deal with negative emotions.

"We all deal with people who are not nice throughout our lives. Girls on the Run teaches how to be nice to yourself and to others, while still standing up for yourself. I can't tell you how much I love this program. I recently had two fifth-graders tell me they used Girls on the Run lessons to manage difficult situations. I have seen how these girls take the lessons back home and to school."

Liberty County native Mea Wilson, parent of a 9-year-old in the Joseph Martin Elementary program, has a similar take.

"My daughter, who has ADHD and low self-esteem, blossomed in Girls on the Run. She worked hard to keep up her grades so she could stay in the program," Wilson said. "It has turned her around academically and has given her the desire to be healthy and strong. She refers to her Girls on the Run team members as 'sisters' and the program has been a life-changer and motivator for my child and my familia."

Girls on the Run has also expanded to include middle school girls through Heart and Soul, a program dedicated to the needs of adolescent girls. Heart and Soul creates a structured space for girls to learn about themselves, explore ideas, cultivate empathy, strengthen connections and develop life skills.

The program meets after school twice a week for 10 weeks, for a total of 30 hours of programming. The programs address bullying, gossiping, peer pressure, body image and negative media messages, among other challenges faced by girls. At the end of the session, the girls participate in a Girls on the Run 5K.

The cost of the 30-hour program is \$175 and includes supplies and materials, snacks, medal and T-shirt. Girls on the Run will also provide 5K medals to siblings who run with participants.

Scholarships are available and no girl has ever been turned away, organizers said, estimating that 60 percent of participants are on financial aid. The scholarships are underwritten by individuals, businesses, organizations and grants. Shoes for girls who can't afford them are provided by national Girls on the Run partner, Asics.

The spring 2018 program starts Feb. 5 and ends in early May. The 5K celebrating the end of the season will be April 28 on the campus of Savannah State University. Community runners can register for \$25 by April 26 or \$35 \$35 the morning of the great

"A core value of our organization is inclusion and access. We serve girls from all walks of life and from all socioeconomic backgrounds, shapes and sizes," said Maria Center, the newly-appointed executive director of Girls of the Run-Coastal Georgia. "When you are at the finish line, you will see kids from private schools and Title 1 schools. You will see urban kids, rural kids, kids using walkers. We celebrate diversity and what makes each child unique and special.

"It's a moving experience to be at that finish line and to see the joy on each child's face as they cross to be given their medal. And you also see pride in the faces of family members. I would encourage anyone who cares about developing leadership and character in girls to get involved with Girls on the Run, these kids are the future."

Girls on the Run of Coastal Georgia is currently accepting new sites to host teams for the spring season and provide program opportunities to more girls. Each site must have a volunteer site liaison, a safe space for physical activity and be able to provide both outdoor and indoor meeting locations. Both schools and nonschool sites are encouraged to find out how to host Girls on the Run.

Girls on the Run will also offer weeklong summer day camps, Camp GOTR: Girls Have Heart, for rising third- through fifth-graders. The five-day camps, is also looking for host sites. They run 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. The fee is \$100 and includes all materials and supplies, snacks and T-shirt. Financial aid is available.



BAH recertification policy explained

The Fort Stewart Defense Military Pay Office has been inundated with requests from Soldiers for a copy of their DA Form 5960. In order to recertify Basic Allowance for Housing Soldiers need to see their Battalion S1, not the Fort Stewart Defense Military Pay Office. The S1 will validate all supporting documents are loaded into IPERMS. Soldiers will need to complete a DA Form 5960 and have it certified by their company level commander. If designated by the company commander, the first commissioned officer in the Soldier's chain of command can certify. Then the S1 will upload the DA Form 5960 into IPERMS. The Fort Stewart Defense Military Pay Office will only be involved in the recertification if there is a change to be made in the payment of the BAH entitlement.
