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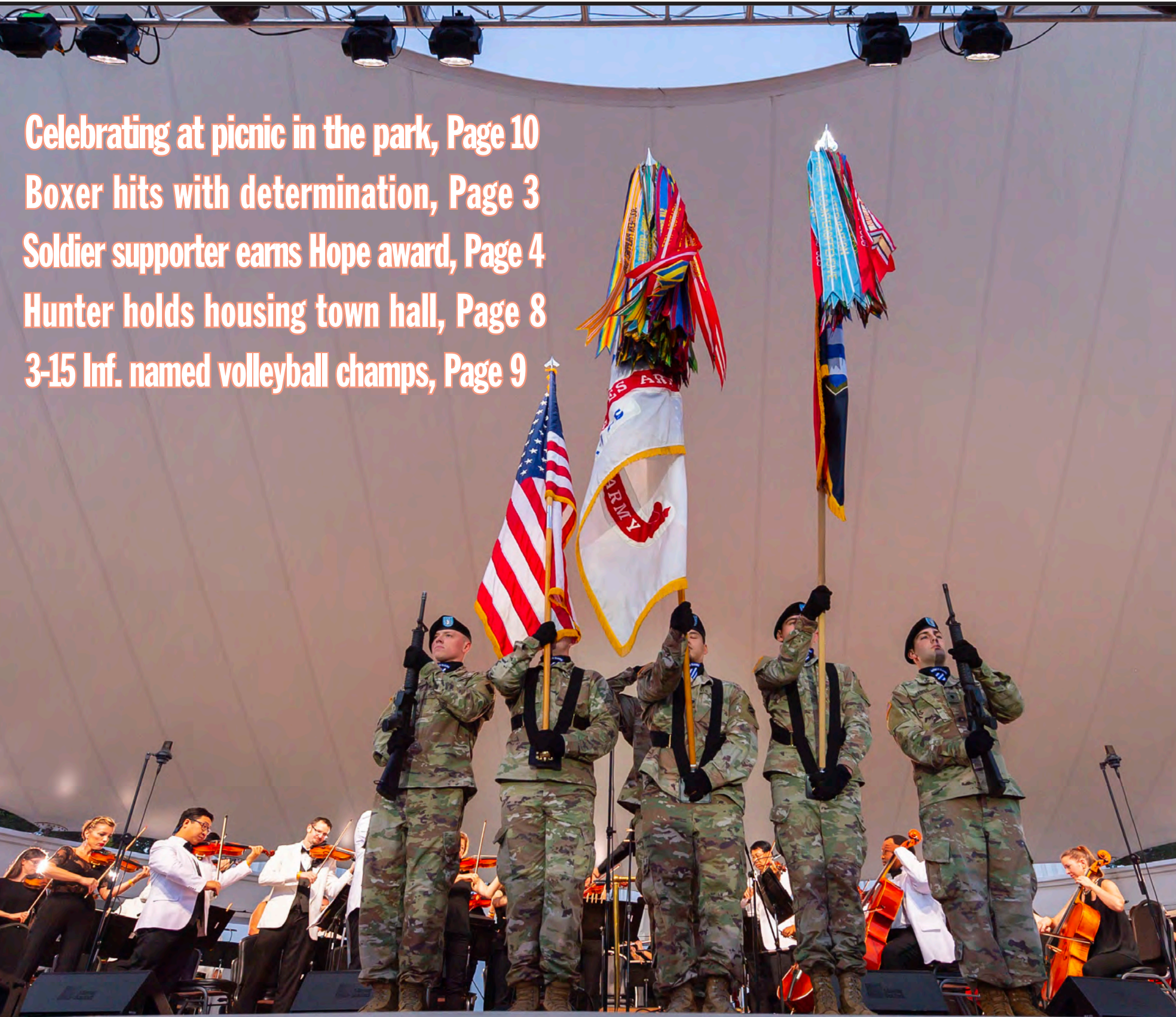

Matched with determination, success

Twelve-year-old Carlos Lebron's legs were shaking like maracas before his first boxing competition as he tried to climb through the white ropes and onto the bright red boxing ring floor embraced by fans, friends and family cheering him on.

He took a deep breath thinking to himself that he was the first athlete in the family and he had to come home as a champion.

With two committed years of rigorous training three to five hours a day and five times a week had transformed him from a chubby self-conscious 10-year-old boy to a slim, fit, determined athlete.

"I have to do great," Lebron chanted to himself to get his head in the game.

In the ring he felt a surge of adrenaline rush through his body and with the initial "ding" of the boxing bell Lebron drowned out the cacophony of admirers and focused on everything within the ring; the inhale and exhale of his breathing, the steady beating of his heart and his opponent.

Lebron began shy, being more defensive than offensive and his opponent won the first round, but Lebron made adjustments for the second and third round remembering the techniques from his training.

"My techniques and determination gave me the upper hand to be able to win the fight and bring home the trophy," said Lebron.

Growing up in Isabela, Puerto Rico, Lebron had the support of his father and the love from his mother who would walk him 40 minutes to school every day and made a place for him to sleep every night. Sometimes his parents would not eat just so that Lebron could eat.

"Seeing all the struggles my mom and my dad did for me I was very grateful," said Lebron. "My friends would want me to hang out with them but I always went to the gym and train because I wanted to be one of the best."

Lebron did everything he could to ensure he kept up with his boxing training.

"When I started boxing, we only had one car and my dad was always working so, I use to ride my bike 30 minutes to get

to the gym," said Lebron. "It was a struggle, but I was really focused on being an athlete."

He also watched videos on the internet to see the techniques of professional fighters to practice in the gym the next day. While watching videos, he came across videos of Soldiers representing the U.S. Army.

"I would always see Army Soldiers fighting so, I looked up more information about the program and I was able to see the U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program pop up," said Lebron. "The qualifications said 'if you're nationally ranked and you have experience boxing, you're able to be part of this team' and I realized 'hey' I'm qualified to join."

After Advanced Individual Training as a human resource specialist, 22-year-old Lebron was stationed at Fort Carson, Colorado, furthering his boxing career in the WCAP.

"I was ranked in 3rd national in Puerto Rico then ranked 6th national in the States and the training I had in the military has given me more maturity," said Lebron.

Training through the military offered Lebron more access to resources that he did not have in Puerto Rico.

"The difference between training with the military and training in Puerto Rico were the resources," said Lebron. "In Puerto Rico I didn't have the chance to have a strength and conditioning coach because that's money you have to spend and I did not have much money for that. Being an athlete in the Army athlete group was a tremendous experience having more high quality of training."

After being a military athlete Lebron received a call that his mother was diagnosed with cancer and he had to put his boxing career on hold and request a compassionate reassignment.

While on a compassionate reassignment Lebron's mother passed away. Faced with the hardship of losing his mother, Lebron still found the strength to pursue his dreams.

"Even though my mother is gone, I remember my mom telling me 'Ito no matter what happens be the person you want to be. If you want to follow your dream to be a boxer then be a boxer,'" said Lebron. "Now I have a bigger reason to

fight, a bigger reason to work hard and do better."

After Lebron's compassionate reassignment he arrived at his new unit 90th Human Resources Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, at Fort Stewart, Georgia.

"Now that I'm in my new unit I'm trying to get back on track as an athlete," said Lebron. "Sometimes it's hard because I see all the time I lost and I see how long it's going to take me to get back into the athlete shape, but I think of the reasons I let it go and the reasons I'm going to get it back."

Lebron is now preparing to get back into boxing shape to be a part of the Army boxing program so, that he can later pursue his dreams to become a professional boxer and strength and conditioning trainer.

"Not a lot of people get a chance to box for the military and I take it very seriously when I would train because I'm wasn't just representing myself, but I was also representing the Army," said Lebron. "Boxing for the Army has given me so much and I have the opportunity to show the experience I've gained and I can take what I learned and apply it when I go back to Puerto Rico."

Long-time supporter of Soldiers earns DoD recognition

The Spirit of Hope award was established in 1997 when Bob Hope received it for his contributions to U.S. Soldiers over five decades. The Department of Defense presents the award each year to individuals who display selfless service, boost the morale and well-being of Soldiers, and go to extraordinary measures to contribute to service members.

Cindy Boyd received the Spirit of Hope award Sept. 28, for the work she has done for the Army community.

“To be mentioned in the same sentence as Bob Hope is overwhelming,” said Boyd. “It is beyond anything I can imagine to be compared to somebody like that, to think I have those traits and I embody that character; it feels humbling. Ten of my Soldiers came to see me receive this award. To have their support and see how much they care about someone that isn’t their family is what keeps me going.”

It all began when her nephew joined the Army in 2007. She met a few of his “battle buddies” and began sponsoring them. She has followed them throughout their career for the last 12 years and gained more Soldiers along the way.

“I began sending care packages, hosting dinners and participating in Wreaths Across America every year in Arlington [Virginia],” said Boyd. “I’ve also bought plane tickets for Soldiers to return home and brought 37

Soldiers to NASCAR races in Tennessee since 2010.”

Sgt. 1st Class Brian Andrade, first sergeant of 5th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, submitted Boyd for the Spirit of Hope award. He has known Boyd since 2011 when they met through one of her nephew’s Soldiers. Andrade said she sent care packages while his unit was deployed and made handmade quilts for single Soldiers when they get home to their barracks room.

“She has become a part of our personal lives,” said Andrade. “She keeps track of big promotions and ceremonies, children’s births, weddings; any event that any of us have, she attends all of them. She’s a phenomenal person.”

Boyd said the thank you that touched her heart the most was a Soldier who was hit with an improvised explosive device in 2010. He came back and didn’t have anyone to come back to. She was there when he went to the hospital, when he was discharged and when he went through several surgeries.

“When he got out of the hospital and went back to Fort Campbell [Kentucky], he said, ‘I have something for you,’” said Boyd. “He gave me his Purple Heart. I was in tears and told him I could not

accept it. He told me I was the closest thing he had to a mother. I graciously took it and told him if you ever wanted it back, just ask. The Army ended up giving him another Purple Heart. But how do you replace that feeling, how do you justify ‘the closest thing I ever had to a mother?’ It spoke volumes to me.”

Boyd has been there for all her Soldiers. Andrade said he was able to take his Family to Disney World with the help of Boyd and she helps anyone else who may need it.

“I don’t ever plan to stop giving back to the Army community,” said Boyd. “The Soldiers have become a part of my life and many of them consider me part of their Family and they are part of mine. It’s a very humbling thing to do. It’s an honor to be in their presence and has become a huge part of my life.”

All actively serving members of the armed forces who have 16 or more years of service will no longer be able to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits to their dependents. This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated Friday. As a result of this change, Army National Guard Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged, have six or more years of service, and at least one eligible dependent in DEERS) to avoid missing out on this extremely generous family benefit. TRICARE holds open season

Tricare open season is the annual period when you can enroll in or change your health plan for the next year. The 2019 Tricare open season begins Nov. 11 and ends Dec. 9.

During Tricare open season, you can choose to do nothing. If you want to stay in your current Tricare health care plan, you don't have to take any action.

Enroll in a plan. If you're eligible for a Tricare Prime option or Tricare Select but not enrolled, you can enroll in a plan now.

Change plans. If you're already enrolled in a Tricare Prime option, or Tricare Select, you can switch plans and switch between individual and family enrollment.

What Happens if I Don't Take Any Action? If you aren't already in a plan and don't enroll in a plan, you'll only be eligible for care at a military hospital or clinic if space is available.

Outside of Tricare open season, you can enroll in or change enrollment to Tricare Prime or Tricare Select following a qualifying life event. A QLE is a certain change in your life, such as marriage, birth of a child, or retirement from active duty, which may mean different Tricare options are available to you. A Tricare QLE opens a 90-day period for you to make eligible enrollment changes. A QLE for one Family member means all Family members may make enrollment changes.

To learn more, visit www.tricare.mil/lifevents. Outside of the Federal Benefits Open Season, you may only make changes to your existing FEDVIP plan if you experience a FEDVIP QLE. Remember, FEDVIP QLEs may be different from the TRICARE QLEs.

Esper, service secretaries talk privatized housing reform

WASHINGTON -- Defense Secretary Dr. Mark T. Esper and the secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force met with privatized housing project owners at the Pentagon, Oct. 2, to discuss the status of actions being taken to reform the delivery of privatized housing under the Military Housing Privatization Initiative.

Defense officials said that the secretaries reinforced their commitment to working with MHPI partners to ensure resident concerns are addressed in a responsive, timely and professional manner, with an emphasis on potential health or safety issues. They also recognized the need for more consistent affirmation of military families' rights as residents of privatized housing, which, the officials noted, will be underscored in the soon-to-be-released MHPI Resident Bill of Rights.

The group discussed progress made on the collective actions established by the department and the partners to address concerns raised by some residents in MHPI housing, defense officials said.

These actions include:

- Establishing a resident bill of rights and common lease framework
- Increasing transparency and reporting of service

work orders

- Enhancing ongoing oversight and leader engagement on the program
- Improving communication with residents at all levels

One element of improved communication is already underway -- expanding the role of installation leaders for resident advocacy and dispute resolution, the defense officials noted.

The officials said the secretaries collectively share a commitment to ensure safe, high quality and affordable housing and communities where service members and their families will want -- and choose -- to live.

MHPI is the largest and one of the most mature public-private partnership efforts in DOD, officials said. The initiative has improved family housing on military installations in the U.S., they noted. There are about 80 privatized projects encompassing more than 204,000 units located on more than 150 installations.

Privatization was the right thing to do, defense officials said. It addressed DOD's \$20 billion maintenance backlog by leveraging private sector expertise and funding at a rapid pace, the officials said. It achieved more than \$32 billion in private development with about \$4 billion in DOD contributions, they said.

Privatized housing occupancy averaged 93% over the

last three years, defense officials added, which they said indicates that military families are choosing on-base privatized housing over off-base private sector choices.

Hunter holds housing town hall, requests community feedback

Hunter Army Airfield Garrison Commander, Lt. Col. Dave Escobar hosted the third in a series of housing town hall meetings at the Hunter Post Chapel Oct. 8.

The event, supported by garrison staff and Balfour Beatty Communities, was live streamed on Fort Stewart-Hunter's Facebook site, and provided community members an opportunity to learn about ongoing efforts to improve housing on Hunter and provide feedback to installation leadership.

Escobar said since the housing issue surfaced in February, the installation has visited each of the on-post housing units, which helped generate around 100 work orders. He said while those were addressed and progress continues they still need community member's feedback.

He said the last survey Hunter released identified three issues including appliances, parking and moving. He said the feedback helped make immediate improvements. He said broken appliances would be replaced. He said to address parking, a fresh coat of curb-side painting would help better identify no-parking areas. And to facilitate the moving process, the Directorate of Public Works Housing and BBC had three inspections to provide quality assurance.

The garrison commander reiterated the importance of feedback noting two other issues came to his attention through the process - landscaping and recycling. He said BBC has hired more employees and is working on improving landscaping. But for recycling, it was about getting the word out. He clarified recycling, for Hunter, was on Monday and trash pickup on Tuesdays.

One of the issues voiced in previous town halls was a plan to replace 170 roofs in Wilson Acres by May 2020. Escobar said the installation was on

the glide path noting about 72% of the roofs were upgraded to metal roofs. He also said they were about 38% complete in upgrading the houses to cordless blinds.

Representatives from BBC followed the commander and explained their efforts to improve the work-order process and customer service. They said, through use of the BBC housing app - Rent Café, community members could either pay their bill, initiate or check on an existing work orders, or learn more about upcoming housing events. The work order management number at Fort Stewart is 912-408-2467. The 24-hour maintenance number is 912-408-2466. The work order management and maintenance number at Hunter is 912-459-2147. Hunter Family Homes is 912-459-2133.

Community members were reminded the work order process has three categories routine work orders would be responded to within 48 hours; urgent work orders within four hours, and emergencies within 30 minutes.

Hunter's BBC housing manager, J.D. Miller said they were also working on upgrading the Heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems. He also said they were trying to coordinate with other agencies like the Directorate of Morale, Welfare and Recreation and Army Community Services to conduct more activities in the community.

"We are planning on a Family Fun Day, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Oct. 26 at the New Gannon Community Center," Miller said. "And in November, CEO and Associates will be sending out a new survey asking community members for their feedback.

Community members are encouraged to contact their housing representatives first; but if they feel something isn't being addressed by the local or regional levels, they have another venue. RHC-A leadership visits MEDDAC staff, voices transparency for transition

U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield staff had the opportunity to meet the new Region Healthcare Command-Atlantic Director, Brigadier General Michael Place and Command Sergeant Major Diamond Hough during their visit to Stewart-Hunter Oct. 3rd and 4th.

Place took command of RHC-A July 12 of this year during a ceremony held at Long Parade Field at Fort Belvoir, Virginia accepting command from Major General Telita Crosland, making him the commander of the Army's largest health command.

The visit began with Place holding in-person Town Halls with the MEDDAC staff at both Winn Army Community Hospital and Tuttle Army Health Clinic respectively, while the Warrior Transition Battalion, the Richmond Hill Medical Home and other local MEDDAC clinic staff were able to be present via the video tele-conferencing system.

Place said he came to visit and meet the staff and understand some of the challenges they may have as well as celebrate some of the staff's successes.

With readiness at the forefront for Army medicine, Place said it is imperative forces are prepared to deploy.

"The other aspect of readiness is to make sure we have a ready medical force," Place said.

Staff Sgt. William Manns III, a non-commissioned officer-in-charge for Winn's physical therapy department had the opportunity to brief Place on the various programs available here at Winn.

"I was very eager to brief Brig. Gen. Place directly on the career field I am so passionate about," Manns said. "He understood and spoke highly of Winn's commitment to 3ID readiness with our Stewart post-operative rehabilitative therapy program and ACFT familiarization briefs.

"So, our readiness is two-fold, one is for operational forces and one is for medical forces," said Place.

During the town halls, staff members were able to ask Place questions about the future of Army medicine with regards to the Defense Health Agency transition, which took place Oct. 1.

"It's interesting as we talk about this, a lot of people have been fearful of the transition, but the reality is that from Sept. 30 – Oct. 1 nothing really changed," Place said. "And that's how it's going to be. It should be completely invisible to our beneficiaries. The same people are going to be here working at Winn, they're going to deliver the same high-quality care that they have been known for a long time, and that's going to continue into the future."

Place said staff as well as patients should find the transition comforting because these changes across military medicine will mean having the same medical experience from post to post and base to base. The continuity of healthcare will look and feel similar across installations due to standardization efforts.

"So, it's not going to be like it is now for many of our folks who have moved around when they go to a new installation and it's very different," Place

explained. "How do you make an appointment? How long is the appointment? Do you see a doctor or a nurse practitioner, physician's assistant? All of those things will be much more standardized, so you will see the same sorts of things, the same sorts of paperwork. All of that will become more and more similar."

Throughout the visit, Winn and Tuttle MEDDAC Soldiers also had the opportunity to meet with and ask questions of Hough during group briefings. Many of the Soldiers said they found the visit beneficial.

"He opened our eyes to the truth about the Army's vision about us as Soldiers," said Sgt. Cassandra Louis, a labor and delivery technician here at Winn ACH. "Especially with the new ACFT and the alternate event for Soldiers who are unable to complete the sixth part of the ACFT. Now we just have to do our part to continue to train motivate and push, not only our subordinates, but ourselves too as leaders."

After two days of questions from the staff, tours and visits to the various MEDDAC clinics on the installation, Place ended his time here.

Place said overall what he most wanted the community to know is military healthcare is the best choice for service members and their Families.

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Know the facts about flu, act

Each year, the flu season results in millions of lost work days at a cost of billions of dollars. Although the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention says people should get a flu vaccine when available, many people never get it. Unfortunately, over 36,000 people die from flu each year and many of these deaths could be avoided.

How well did the flu vaccine work last year? The flu vaccine effectiveness went up last year during the 2018-2019 flu season, compared to the previous season.

According to the CDC, the flu vaccine reduced the risk of infection in adults by roughly 45 to 47% in 2018-2019. In children six-months to 17-years-old, the vaccine was effective in 61 to 62% of children. For comparison, in the 2017-2018 flu season, the flu vaccine was roughly 36% effective at preventing flu. The 2017-2018 season was a particularly severe season in the U.S.

It's important to know that each year the flu vaccine is never 100% effective in preventing flu. However, it drastically reduces your chances of getting it (and passing it on to others), and it lessens the severity of symptoms if you are infected with the virus. Regular hand washing and avoiding those with the flu, when possible, makes good sense, too.

Should most people consider getting vaccinated? If you've ever had the flu, you know it's not your average virus. The illness can keep you weak and bed bound for days and its effects can span two weeks or longer.

For children under two, seniors, and people with

chronic health conditions like asthma, heart disease, diabetes or any condition that causes reduced immune response like the flu can be especially severe or even fatal. Dehydration, worsening of health conditions, and pneumonia are just a few of the possible complications.

Flu vaccination reduces the risk of hospitalization from the virus by 40% and of those hospitalized for flu, there is a reduction of life threatening events by 59%.

Pregnant women who receive the flu vaccination can decrease the risk of serious respiratory events by 50% and their babies have immunity from the vaccination for several months after delivery.

The only people who should not receive the flu vaccine are those with a current fever higher than 100 Fahrenheit, severe chest congestion, or history of serious adverse reactions identified by your medical provider.

A World Series lesson with Sandy Koufax

How does one reconcile the demands of one's faith with the requirements of one's job? I think often times in our military culture the automatic answer, the mission comes first, is used to justify a spiritual and intellectual laziness that never adequately wrestles with the question.

If, however, faith deals with ultimate and eternal questions, it seems very important each person knows where he or she draws a line beyond which no compromise is acceptable. Such a decision faced one of the greatest pitchers in baseball history 54 years ago.

For Jews, this Wednesday was Yom Kippur, also known as the Day of Atonement. Back in 1965 this holiest day of the year coincided with game one of the World Series. The most famous Jewish athlete in American history, Sandy Koufax, was the Dodgers' ace that year. He chose to not take the ball in game one.

This decision drew a good deal of criticism from sports writers and fans. Koufax, while not nearly as devout in his faith as he was dominant on the mound, still knew where he drew the line regarding what he would not compromise in his commitment to God.

Perhaps he was also aware of his status as a role model for thousands of Jewish young people across the country and knew the message he would send if he pitched on Yom Kippur. Fidelity to his religious convictions took precedence over winning a game, even if it was a World Series game.

Sandy Koufax stands as an example I wish more Army leaders would follow. It is my job as a chaplain to perform or provide services giving Soldiers the opportunity to freely exercise their religion, the responsibility of demonstrating the importance of practicing one's faith falls upon all of us. In fact, I would argue this task is probably one in which the chaplain is the least effective in accomplishing.

If I talk to a Soldier about my relationship with God, I am simply doing my job. If another officer or NCO prioritizes worship attendance or speaks of how critical his or her faith is, however, the importance of spiritual fitness is powerfully communicated.

Think of it this way – there were plenty of rabbis in America who abstained from watching World Series game one in 1965. No one cared. But when Sandy Koufax sat the game out everyone took notice.

Incidentally, Koufax still started three games out of seven, pitching a shutout the final game on only two days rest. For his efforts he was named the MVP of the series.

My favorite part of the story, however, is the conversation that supposedly took place on the mound during game one.

Another future hall of fame pitcher, Don Drysdale, started the game for the Dodgers. But, the Minnesota Twins hit him hard. When manager Walter Alston came to the mound to take the ball from him, Drysdale quipped, "I guess right about now you were wishing I was Jewish too." Perhaps we could draw another lesson on using humor to deal with adversity – but we will save that thought for another week.

Ed Daly will co-lead a discussion with Jordan Gillis, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations, Energy and Environment on "Synchronizing Installation Readiness and Sustainment from the Strategic Support Area to the Tactical Point of Need" in a Contemporary Military Forum at the Association of the U.S. Army annual meeting and exposition Oct. 15 in Washington, D.C.

"Our installations are the Army's epicenter -- from where our military capabilities are projected to meet worldwide requirements" said Daly. "The strength of our installations resides with our ability to create and project combat power to the tactical point of need."

Installations are part of the Strategic Support Area, where military might is generated, projected and sustained during the fight, and the Army must take deliberate action to prepare for sustained conflict in the future, said Gillis.

"Our installations require quality infrastructure to support operations, protect Soldiers and families, equipment and our network," said Gillis. "The Army must be able to mitigate threats generated from our adversaries whether from land, sea, air or cyberspace -- and this contest begins with installation readiness."

This year brought many changes to Army Materiel Command, but none bigger than the addition of Installation Management Command as a major subordinate in March 2019.

"We can now integrate and synchronize all of the sustainment capabilities within the Strategic Support Area in order to generate, project, sustain and ensure opera-

tional reach and freedom of maneuver to forces throughout the battlespace during large scale combat operations and in a multi-domain environment," said Daly.

After nearly two decades of counterinsurgency warfare, the Army's materiel enterprise is focused on its critical role in the multi-domain operations concept, ensuring readiness in the Strategic Support Area and keeping pace with modernization'. This focus is driving the materiel enterprise to ensure the Army's installations have the infrastructure, facilities and equipment to meet future challenges.

"Installation sustainment is an Army issue. The threats are changing," Gillis said. "The National Defense Strategy tells us the homeland is no longer a sanctuary. Our installations must be resilient to challenges facing our infrastructure and services, and our policies and doctrine

must be updated to match the role of installations in the Strategic Support Area."

Daly and Gillis will be joined on the panel by the following leaders: Jordan Gillis, principal deputy, Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations, Energy and Environment; Lt. Gen. Duane Gamble deputy chief of staff, Army Logistics (G-4); Alan Estevez, national security and logistics executive, Deloitte Consulting; and moderator retired Lt. Gen. David Halverson, chief executive officer, Cypress International.

"The Army's strategic advantage has always been in its ability to quickly mobilize, project the force, and sustain that force on the battlefield," said Daly.

Raider fire supporters observe, play key role

Raider joint fire support specialists from the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, were at the pinnacle of support in maintaining lethality in the Fort Stewart training area, Sept. 30 through Oct. 4.

They trained at call for fire and observed for 1ABCT's 1st Battalion, 41st Artillery Regiment's live fire exercise, which is called Artillery Table XV. As artillery units train, they go through tables, which are training objectives that increase in difficulty and complexity as more and more echelons are involved, including fire supporters.

With a live fire exercise like this, there is always lessons to learn that help units and Soldiers maintain their lethality.

"The big thing here is communication, it's the most important thing when you're here on the observation

post," said Pvt 1st Class Kennedy Stead, a joint fire support specialist with 5-7 Cav. "We're definitely getting a lot of experience out here, and we're helping support the guns."

This level of training is designed to certify artillery units at the battery level. The next level is a battalion certification, but without the support from higher echelons, units cannot progress in training and certification. As 1-41FA continues their training, they will require support from higher echelons.

"Not only is this exercise training our batteries to perform better, but it's also helping all echelons exercise their battle drills and train to be more lethal," said 1st Lt. Matthew Jackson, a brigade assistant fire support officer with 1ABCT.

The Soldiers of 1-41FA, along with the rest of 1ABCT, will continue to hone their skills, in the near future, as they work together to ensure success in their upcoming endeavors.
