Stewart holds safety, security town hall

More than 70 people attended a safety and security town hall held at Fort Stewart's Main Post Chapel on Tuesday to get updates on current investigations occurring on the installation and to voice their public safety concerns.

The town hall, scheduled for 30 minutes, ended up running for an hour. Attendees included several spouses and their children, Soldiers, and installation representatives—the garrison command team, Fort Stewart military police, housing, the 911 dispatch center, and U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command.

Garrison commander Col. Jason Wolter opened the town hall by addressing the ongoing homicide investigation on post.

"Last week's homicide is an open investigation and we will respect the family and the process," Wolter said. "Additionally, the victims and accused have rights. We do not wish to violate or impede the investigation in anyway."

Director of Emergency Services and installation provost marshal Lt. Col. Martin Schmidt said the military police Soldiers patrolling Fort Stewart are fully trained and well educated. He also said the installation's security process works.

"Our access control points are well-manned and people coming

into the installation are vetted," he said.

Attendees took advantage of having the garrison command team and emergency services representatives on-hand and asked about 12 questions during the town hall. The area of concern voiced the loudest was military police response times to calls, especially to reports of attempted break-ins while residents are home. Residents said MPs take as long as an hour to respond.

Mia Moore, a Fort Stewart 911 dispatcher, explained the 911 center prioritizes calls based on the nature of the call. While every call is important, some calls require a more rapid response than other calls. The bottom line, though, is a report of a break-in

in progress is a priority call, she said. Calling 911 also guarantees an MP will respond.

"There's no way it's going to take an hour for us to get to your house," Moore said. "I'll stand on that."

Moore's response prompted a housing block coordinator attending the town hall to ask attendees what number they are calling to report incidents. All the residents that responded to her question said they are calling the MP desk. The block coordinator reminded residents to call 911 to report incidents.

Attendees asked about increasing military police patrols on the installation. They also asked about what MPs are doing during patrols.

The 3rd Sustainment Brigade hosted a Women's Mentorship Network at Fort Stewart, July 13, where females from all branches of military service gathered at the Provider Brigade to discuss what being a female in the military means to them.

Capt. Jackeline Velazquez, commander of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, said she has hosted the Women's Mentorship Network seminars since she started commanding HHC in 2017.

"The reason I like to do these events is to network," Velazquez said. "You meet people you don't know and realize that your weakness could be someone else's strength and vice versa."

The event kicked off with a physical training session to build camaraderie. Then the brigade and guests gathered at Club Stewart for an open panel where they discussed the importance of being a female

leader.

Air Force Master Sgt. Kenyatta Williams, an aviation operations section chief for Detachment 3, 18th Weather Squadron, Hunter Army Airfield, explained to young female service members how diverse yet similar women are in each branch of service.

"You get to choose your own path, and you also get the opportunity to make the most of it," Williams said.

Marine Sgt. Ivana Davis, a supply, admin and operations specialist, and recruiter in Statesboro, said she enjoys sharing positive stories about being a recruiter at events like WMN.

"I was recruiting at a high school one day and this girl looked interested," Davis said. "Her parents told her that the military shouldn't be her focus and that her focus should be to find a husband, have kids and stay home. I let her know all her benefits and she ended up joining the Marines. Now, she loves it."

Since Velazquez has hosted several WMN events, she said her fondest memory is from the first one she held.

It struck in the Marne River area along the road to Paris, and the weight of the blow fell on the 30th and 38th U.S. Infantry Regiments of the 3rd Division. This was their first fight. Firing in three directions, blasted by artillery fire, taking all flesh and blood could stand, the regiments held on doggedly and threw the enemy back across the Marne. This defense checked the Germans' assault and made an Allied offensive possible.

3rd ID Senior Enlisted Leader reflects on service

As a young sergeant in 3rd Infantry Division I was mostly unaware of the history that surrounded us every day. Outside of singing the Dogface Soldier every morning (poorly I might add) and learning about Audie Murphy (5 foot, 6 inches, and 110 pounds), it was oblivious to most of us. We were more concerned with how to get to Savannah and back for a night on River Street.

Since my return to 3rd ID, and the division headquarters' return from Afghanistan in May, I have had the opportunity (and honor) to gain a greater appreciation of the 3rd ID history and the Soldiers who have left a lasting legacy upon it. It has truly been humbling to understand the sacrifice that so many Soldiers and Families have endured over the last century. Those roots are the very foundation of this division and are as true today as they were when the division first stood up to answer the nation's call in World War I.

In the last three months I have also come to realize that we truly walk in the shadows of heroes.

Why the realization? I have several reasons. I got to experience the battlefields of WWI in France with 30 of our best Dogface Soldiers, and walked the cemeteries of the Somme, Meuse-Argonne, and monument at Chateau-Thierry.

We climbed the hillside in the Champagne Region of France near a little town called Moulin, where the 30th and 38th Infantry Regiments of the newly formed 3rd ID held fast along the Marne River, and became forever known as the "Rock of the Marne."

We visited Greves Farms in France and saw where young Lt. Hayes, a field artillery Soldier with the 3rd ID, would ride horse after horse between the Artillery Headquarters to the front lines keeping two French batteries in the fight by providing accurate fires and ultimately turned the tide of the advancing German Army. He had seven horses shot out from underneath him that day and would become the first recipient of the Medal of Honor for 3rd ID.

These experiences gave me an appreciation for our forefathers that I never really grasped before.

Additionally, watching this year's Sullivan Cup

winners (top tank crew in the Army) get promoted by the Marne River, that hallowed ground, was inspirational and something I am sure they will never forget.

Here at home, having my Family participate in the Fort Stewart Remembrance Run 5K to honor the 468 fallen Dogface Soldiers commemorated at Warriors Walk. Meeting the Ramirez and Lamies Families was humbling. They are two Gold Star Families who were there to pay tribute to their sons.

Then having the opportunity to meet and spend time with Pauline Conner and her family in Washington, D.C. to posthumously honor 1st Lt. Garlin Conner for his actions in WWII. It was truly humbling to witness President Donald Trump honored his actions and present the Medal of Honor to the Family, making Conner the 56th MoH awardee within the 3rd ID.

I got to personally welcome home the final flights for the 3rd ID Sustainment Brigade and Combat Aviation Brigade. Each unit had theater wide responsibilities, and was critical to the overall success of Operation Freedom Sentinel. After nine hard months it was a true honor to shake each of their hands and share in their elation as they stepped off their planes.

Finally, I attended a memorial for our most recent fallen Soldier. On July 7 Cpl. Joseph Maciel, a member of Task Force 1-28 Infantry, was killed in action in Uruzgan Province, Afghanistan. Maciel was a Grenadier in support of the 1st Security Force Assistance Brigade. His memorial was held at Fort Benning.

I am again humbled by the continued sacrifice of our Soldiers and Families. Our thoughts and prayers are with the Soldiers, Family and friends of Cpl. Maciel.



Hatch Act applies to social media too

The U.S. Office of Special Counsel routinely receives questions from federal employees and others about when the use of social media could violate the Hatch Act. Social media platforms are easily accessible to most employees while at work—on computers, smart-phones, or other devices. OSC has created this guidance to help federal employees understand what the Hatch Act does and does not allow when using social media.

In general, all federal employees may use social media and comply with the Hatch Act if they remember the following three prohibitions:

(1) On-duty or workplace prohibition. Employees may not engage in political activity while on duty or in the federal workplace.

(2) 24/7 prohibition. Employees may not knowingly solicit, accept, or receive a political contribution for a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group.

(3) 24/7 prohibition. Employees may not use their official authority or influence to affect the outcome of an election.

Some employees are considered “further restricted” under the Hatch Act. In addition to the three prohibitions above, further restricted employees are subject to a fourth prohibition:

(4) 24/7 prohibition. Further restricted employees may not take an active part in partisan political management or campaigning.

As such, further restricted employees may not engage in political activity on behalf of or in concert with a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group. For instance, taking an “active part” would include: distributing material created by a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group; speaking at

a political rally organized or sponsored by such entities; or serving as a campaign volunteer.

This guidance will discuss each of the above prohibitions in turn. The last prohibition discussed is applicable only to further restricted employees. There are some very limited exceptions to these prohibitions for certain employees in specific positions at OSC at hatchact@osc.gov or (202) 804-7002 with any additional questions.

(1) On-duty or workplace prohibition. Employees may not engage in political activity while on duty or in the workplace. Political activity is an activity directed at the success or failure of a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group.

(A) Posting, liking, sharing, or retweeting partisan messages. Rule: Employees may not post, like, share, or retweet a message or comment in support of or opposition to a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group while on duty or in the workplace, even if their social media account is private.

Example 1: You are at home after work. You may like or tweet a message encouraging others to vote for your favored candidate in a partisan race.

Example 2: You are on duty and looking at Facebook on your personal cell phone. You see that a friend posted a message encouraging others to vote for members of a certain political party. You may not like or share that message while you are on duty.

Example 3: You stay at work during your lunch break and check Facebook on your personal cell phone. A Facebook friend posted a message about an upcoming event supporting a candidate in a partisan race. Even if you are not in a pay status during your lunch break, you may not like or share that post while you are in the workplace.

Example 4: You are teleworking from home and on your lunch break in which you are not in a pay status. You are looking at Facebook on your personal iPad and see that a friend posted a message about an upcoming event supporting a political party. Because you are on your lunch break and not in a federal building, you may like or share that post.

Example 5: You are teleworking from home and looking at Twitter on your personal computer. You see that the President tweeted an endorsement of a congressional candidate. You may not like or retweet that message while on duty.

Example 6: You are teleworking and looking at Facebook on your personal cell phone. You see that a Senate candidate posted a message asking for votes on Election Day. You may not post a comment in support while on duty.

(B) Liking, following, or friending candidates or partisan groups. Rule: Employees may not like, follow, or friend the social media account of a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group while on duty or in the workplace.

Example 1: You are at home after work and find the Instagram account of a partisan political group. You may follow them on Instagram and like their posts.

Example 2: You are at work and looking at your private Facebook account on your personal iPad. A Facebook friend shared the post of a candidate in a partisan race announcing that he or she received an endorsement. You may not like, follow, or friend the candidate's Facebook page while on duty or in the workplace.

(C) Liking, following, or friending the official social media of government officials. Rule: Employees may continue to follow, be friends with, or like the official social media accounts of govern-

ment officials after those officials become candidates for reelection.

Example 1: You follow the official government Twitter account of the President or a Member of Congress, who has just announced their candidacy for reelection. You may continue to follow these accounts.

(D) Using an alias on social media. Rule: Employees may not use an alias on social media to engage in any activity that is directed at the success or failure of a political party, candidate in a partisan race, or partisan political group while on duty or in the workplace.

Example 1: Your name is John Smith, but you create a Facebook profile as John Jones. You are at home after work and see that a Facebook friend posted a negative message about a candidate in a partisan race. You may share or like that post.

Example 2: Your name is Jane Smith, but you create a Twitter account as Jane Jones. You are at home after work and looking at your alias Twitter account on your personal cell phone. An actor you follow on Twitter posted a negative message about a political party. You may not like or retweet that message either as Jane Smith or Jane Jones while on duty or in the workplace.

(E) Profile pictures on social media. Rule: Employees may display a political party or current campaign logo or the photograph of a candidate in a partisan race as a profile picture on personal Facebook or Twitter accounts; however, they may not post, share, tweet, or retweet on those accounts while on duty or in the workplace.

(F) Cover and header photographs on social media. Rule: Employees may display a political party or campaign logo or photograph of a candidate in a partisan race as a cover or header photograph on their personal Twitter or Facebook accounts.

“We see MPs not doing anything,” said an attendee. “Why?”

Schmidt responded that the question provided good feedback for him to look into what MPs are doing during duty hours. He also said that at any given time, there is one MP patrol on duty for every 2.5 square miles of the installation.

“We’re saturated,” Schmidt said.

Another resident voiced her concerns about feeling safe on the installation and that her family is considering moving off post. Her concerns also stemmed from MPs not taking reports and responding to calls quickly enough. Residents sometimes do not even call the Military

Police because they do not respond.

“I don’t have faith in the MPs,” she said. “I should, but I don’t.”

Schmidt said he would look into the matter and stressed any and all incidents need to be reported to MPs. Doing so helps feed where patrols need to be and what to be on the lookout for.

“We need reporting to see that pattern, to connect the dots,” he said.

Wolter said he would prefer residents over-report instead of choosing not to report incidents. He also said Fort Stewart is safe.

“You’re safer living on Fort Stewart than anywhere else,” he said.

Residents also asked what steps it

takes to get additional traffic control devices like speed bumps installed in housing areas. Garrison Command Sgt. Maj. Rebecca Myers said the housing mayors are an excellent resource to use to bring matters like that to the garrison’s attention.

“Every housing area has a mayor,” she said. “They can help address the problem.”

A lighter-but-still-important moment occurred when a resident asked what could be done about an alligator living in a pond near housing. She expressed concern for children’s safety and asked if a fence could be built around the pond. Wolter said a fence would most likely not solve the problem and instead said he would have wildlife experts look into trapping and relocating the alligator.

“Alligators don’t have a purpose on the installation,” Wolter said, chuckling. “We will bar that alligator from the installation.”

SAFETY SPOTLIGHT:

Stay informed, unleash your defenses against animal bites

We have all heard the expression, “The bark is worse than the bite.” This however, is untrue when it comes to the risk for rabies. Even though rabies is an illness that is 100 percent vaccine preventable, one person dies every 10 minutes due to rabies complications. According to the Center for Disease Control, the most important global source of rabies in humans is from uncontrolled rabies in dogs. Children are often at greatest risk from rabies. They are more likely to be bitten by dogs, and are also more likely to be more exposed through multiple bites in high-risk sites on the body. Extensive exposures make it more difficult to prevent rabies unless access to good medical care is immediately available. The rabies virus infects the central nervous system, ultimately causing disease in the brain and death. The early symptoms of rabies in people are similar to that of many other illnesses, including fever, headache, and general weakness or discomfort. As the disease progresses, more specific symptoms appear and may include insomnia, anxiety, confusion, slight or partial paralysis, excitation, hallucinations, agitation, hyper salivation (increase in saliva), difficulty swallowing, and hydrophobia (fear of water). Death usually occurs within days of the onset of these symptoms. Rabies can be avoided by knowing the information listed below:

What pets are at risk

Any animal bitten or scratched by either a wild, carnivorous mammal or a bat that is not available for testing should be regarded as having been exposed to rabies. Unvaccinated dogs, cats, and ferrets exposed to a rabid animal should be euthanized immediately. If the owner is unwilling to have this done, the animal should be placed in strict isolation for 6 months and vaccinated 1 month before being released. Animals with expired vaccinations need to be evaluated on a case-by-case basis. Dogs and cats that are currently vaccinated are kept under observation for 45 days.

Small mammals such as squirrels, rats, mice, hamsters, guinea pigs, gerbils, chipmunks, rabbits, and hares are almost never found to be infected with rabies and have not been known to cause rabies among humans in the United States. Bites by these animals are usually not considered a risk of rabies unless the animal was sick or behaving in any unusual manner and rabies is widespread in your area. However, from 1985 through 1994, woodchucks accounted for 86 percent of the 368 cases of rabies among rodents reported to CDC. Woodchucks or groundhogs (*Marmota monax*) are the only rodents that may be frequently submitted to state health department because of a suspicion of rabies. In all cases involving rodents, the state or local health department should be consulted before a decision is made to initiate post exposure prophylaxis.

How to protect my Pet

There are several things you can do to protect your pet from rabies. First, visit your veterinarian with your pet on a regular basis and keep rabies vaccinations up-to-date for all cats, ferrets, and dogs. Second, maintain control of your pets by keeping cats and ferrets indoors and keeping dogs under direct supervision. Third, spay or neuter your pets to help reduce the number of unwanted pets that may not be properly cared for or vaccinated regularly. Finally, call animal control to remove all stray animals from your neighborhood since these animals may be unvaccinated or ill.

The importance of vaccinating your pet

Although the majority of rabies cases occur in wildlife, most humans are given rabies vaccine as a result of exposure to domestic animals. This explains the tremendous cost of rabies prevention in domestic animals in the United States. While wildlife are more likely to be rabid than are domestic animals in the United States, the amount of human contact with domestic animals greatly exceeds the amount of contact with wildlife. Your pets and other domestic animals can be infect-

ed when they are bitten by rabid wild animals. When “spillover” rabies occurs in domestic animals, the risk to humans is increased. Pets are vaccinated by your veterinarian to prevent them from acquiring the disease from wildlife, and thereby transmitting it to humans. What to do if bitten by an animal It’s important to remember that rabies is a medical urgency but not an emergency. Decisions should not be delayed. Wash any wounds immediately. One of the most effective ways to decrease the chance for infection is to wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water. See your doctor for attention for any trauma due to an animal attack before considering the need for rabies vaccination. Your doctor, possibly in consultation with your state or local health department, will decide if you need a rabies vaccination. Decisions to start vaccination, known as post exposure prophylaxis, will be based on your type of exposure and the animal you were exposed to, as well as laboratory and surveillance information for the geographic area where the exposure occurred. In the United States, post exposure prophylaxis consists of a regimen of one dose of immune globulin and four doses of rabies vaccine over a 14-day period. Rabies immune globulin and the first dose of rabies vaccine should be given by your health care provider as soon as possible after exposure. Additional doses or rabies vaccine should be given on days 3, 7, and 14 after the first vaccination. Current vaccines are relatively painless and are given in your arm, like a flu or tetanus vaccine. If you are a military beneficiary, you should go to your respective Troop Medical Clinic during duty hours or Emergency Department after hours for evaluation and treatment. If you are unable to obtain valid information regarding the vaccination status of the biting animal, you should actively pursue receiving rabies prophylactic vaccination for yourself. If you would like more information regarding animal bite prevention or rabies information, please contact Winn Army Public Health at 435-5071. By following proper prevention and early intervention, we can lower our risks and take the “bite” out of rabies.



Winn's new commander makes history

During the July heat and humidity of the South Georgia region, Brig. Gen. Telita Crosland, commanding general at Regional Health Command-Atlantic gave a warm welcome to incoming U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Winn Army Community Hospital Commander, Col. Michelle Munroe, as outgoing commander, Col. Christopher Warner, said his goodbyes during a change of command ceremony held at Fort Stewart's Marne Garden, July 13.

For the first time in the 36-year MEDDAC-Fort Stewart Winn Army Community Hospital history, the commander, command sergeant major, executive officer, company commander, and first sergeant are all women.

Yet, often times before moving forward, dividends are paid in reflection.

Crosland gave the opening remarks during the ceremony, which shined a light on what is already a bright past for Warner. Crosland stressed the importance of matching what one says to what one does. Two years ago when Warner took command of Winn ACH, he promised to leverage his experience as a physician and a healthcare administrator by bringing innovative improvements to Winn, and he did. Under Warner's command many firms were accomplished at Winn.

"His comptroller was the [2017] Comptroller of the Year and Department

of the Army Comptroller of the Year, and his Decision Support Team was the Comptroller Team of the Year," Crosland said. "The MEDCOM Lean Six Sigma project of the Year and the MEDCOM Pharmacy Tech of the Year and the MEDCOM base level Medical Logistician of the Year. All came from Chris's command and are a reflection of his leadership and dedication. His team has one of the highest healthcare effectiveness scores in the Army."

Also under Warner's leadership, the level 4 trauma designation was established as well as the Stewart Post-Operative Rehabilitation Training or SPORT program, which helps Soldiers recover more quickly after surgery, were among countless other accomplishments. For Warner's impact on the MEDDAC-Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield Team, Crosland acknowledged his resolve.

"You have excelled across a very broad and diverse mission set while maintaining the proper priority," Crosland said. "Thank you for a job well done."

In the presence of family, close friends and MEDDAC staff, Warner said returning to Winn as the commander was like coming home, because Winn was he and his wife Carolyn's first duty station coming out of residency training. Warner thanked his staff and community partners for their role in his successful command. He also turned the attention of the audience to the Soldiers lining the field in front of them.

"This formation before you represents the more than 400 Soldiers and 1,500 DA Civilians who currently serve, and the more than 3,000 Soldiers who have served over the last two years at Winn Army Community Hospital, Tuttle Army Health Clinic and the Warrior Transition Battalion, Fort Stewart," Warner said. "The proud and stellar performing Soldiers you see, present the pride heart and desire that we expect within our MEDDAC Family and routinely set and exceeded the standard."

In a literal sense, Warner weathered many storms while at Winn. During his tenure, a tornado, two major hurricanes and a rare snow storm now line the pages of his portfolio, but it was the impact of the required quarterly staff training that proved his team lives the readiness mission.

"As others evacuated from this region, our staff dug in and enacted well-rehearsed, established drills, ensuring not only Fort Stewart, but the surrounding community, continued to have the medical support and care they needed," Warner said. "Our teams ensured the evacuated community received their medications, support and care ... this success comes from a unified team."

In parting words Warner gave one last directive to his staff.

"Maintain that drive, heart and desire in all that you do, and remember, we always play to Winn," Warner said.

Munroe said she accepts the challenge to lead the MEDDAC team to the next level

and looks onward to working with the leaders here at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield and beyond.

"I look forward to working with the 3rd ID and our installation partners," Munroe said, "and continue in the readiness mission to ensure that all Soldiers are medically ready to fight tonight."

Gold Star Spouse joins community

Arriving in Hinesville at 3 a.m. after a three and a half day trip — 45 hours driving — probably won't be the part of Thursday that Shanna Whitney remembers the most.

The most memorable part of the day is likely to be about eight hours later when she received the keys to her new mortgage-free home, thanks to Wells Fargo and Military Warriors Support Foundation.

"It was surreal," the Gold Star wife said about receiving the keys.

"And this house, I could literally fit my old home in one of the bedrooms. It's just so... I'm overwhelmed.

Whitney's husband, U.S. Army Sgt. Brian Pedro, was deployed from White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, when he was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2010. His vehicle was hit by a rocket-propelled grenade, according to a news release from the bank. Pedro was able to move the vehicle some, and cover fellow soldiers from small-arms fire before he was

killed.

Sandra Ignaszewski, director of transition and mentoring for MWSF, said Whitney was selected to receive the three-bedroom, two and a half bath house through an application process.

"It's a lovely home," she said, adding that the foundation provides help to Gold Star and wounded veterans' families. Part of that is its Homes4WoundedHeroes program.

Whitney said she applied for foundation help about three years ago because her family was struggling to live in Oceanside, California, near San Diego. She received a Ford Explorer from the foundation last year and, as they worked on her budget she said, they saw further need and she learned of the home in Hinesville.

Robert Horn, regional president for Wells Fargo, said the bank donated the foreclosed home as part of its partnership with MWSF to support military families.

"It's a commitment," he said. "I'm a veteran, spent 13 years on active duty. It's a way for us to give back

and support our military veterans and families."

Ignaszewski said Property Masters renovated the Anzio Avenue home.

Whitney called moving to Georgia a "leap of faith." "I just feel I've been cared for in a way that is beyond anything that a human could possibly do," she said. "I know I'm being watched over."

She said her first impression of Hinesville was "perfect."

"This is so different from the big city ... There are people mowing their lawns right now. It's so different," she said, noting she wanted to be near a military base and a coast.

She currently works in property management, according to the news release, and said she would like to return to her previous career of providing educational and enrichment programming for at-risk youth.

Since 2012, Wells Fargo said in its release that it has donated more than 350 homes, valued at over \$55 million, to veterans and Gold Star families in all 50 states.

Summer Travel: Getting Care While Overseas

Summer vacation is the start of travel season for many military Families. TRICARE covers you when you travel on business or take a vacation with family. When traveling overseas, you should know what to do in the event of illness or other health issues.

Before you leave

You should get routine and specialty care before you leave for your trip. Otherwise, your care may not be authorized when you're on your trip. When overseas, you can seek urgent and emergency care from any host nation provider. However, your rules for getting care depend on your plan and travel destination. Before you travel, follow these steps:

- 1. Get Prescriptions filled or refilled
 - Pack prescription medications in your carry-on luggage.
 - Find a network pharmacy where you're traveling, just in case.
- 2. Pack a list of phone numbers
 - See the list of overseas numbers for the Military Health System Nurse Advice Line.

- View the list of TRICARE numbers.
- Download the TRICARE Overseas Contact Wallet Card.
- 3. Update your information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System, a database of information on uniformed services members (sponsors), U.S.-sponsored foreign military, DoD and uniformed services civilians, other personnel as directed by the DoD, and their family members. You need to register in DEERS to get TRICARE.

- Log into milConnect.
- Call 1-800-538-9552 (TTY/TDD: 1-866-363-2883).

While you're away To get help or to find a provider when traveling, contact the appropriate TRICARE overseas program regional call center. You may also call the medical assistance number for the area where you're located for assistance.

In an emergency, go to the nearest emergency care facility, or call the medical assistance number for the area where you are. When overseas, remember these additional points:

- You may need to pay upfront

for services and file a claim to get money back.

- Keep all receipts and file claims in the region where you live, not where you get the care.

•If you're admitted to a hospital, call your overseas regional call center before leaving the facility, preferably within 24 hours or on the next business day.

•If you're an active duty service member and admitted to a hospital, call your primary care manager or your overseas regional call center. You should do this before leaving the facility, preferably within 24 hours or on the next business day. This will help in the event that you need to coordinate authorization, continued care, and payment.

•TRICARE covers air evacuations to the closest safe location that can provide the required care when and appropriate.

•See specific rules for getting urgent care overseas based on your TRICARE plan.

Visit the TRICARE website and select your plan for more guidelines when traveling overseas.





Summer safety

Water safety - To prevent drowning, avoid alcohol when swimming or boating. Wear a lifejacket whenever you are on a boat. Make sure young children are supervised at all times when near the beach, on a boat, or by a pool or hot tub. Don't swim alone or in bad weather. Learn to swim and teach your children to swim. We also recommend that you learn CPR in case of an emergency.

Sun safety - Protect against sunburn and heat stroke. Wear sunscreen with at least a sun protection factor 15 or higher and apply it generously throughout the day. Wear a hat outdoors and a good pair of sunglasses to protect your eyes. Drink plenty of water, especially when in the sun or if you are sweating heavily. If you feel faint or nauseous, get into a cool place immediately.

Travel safety - Do not drink and drive or travel with anyone who has been drinking. Take along a first aid kit to help you be prepared for common emergencies. Wear your seatbelt at all times. Make sure your vehicle has been properly serviced and is in good working shape before a long road trip. Familiarize yourself with your surroundings if you are in an unfamiliar place and know where the nearest emergency room is. Also, avoid talking or texting on a cell phone while driving.

Post-9/11 GI Bill changes

The Department of Defense issued a change to Department of Defense Instruction 1341.13, "Post-9/11 GI Bill," updating policy on the transfer of Post-9/11 GI Bill educational benefits by service members to eligible family members. Effective one year from the date of this change, eligibility to transfer Post-9/11 GI Bill education benefits will be limited to service members with at least six years, but not more than 16 years, of total creditable service. There is no change to current provisions requiring service member to have at least six years of service to apply to transfer benefits, and making a four-year commitment in the Armed Forces.
