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# 3-15 Infantry hosts MoH hero's Family

The Medal of Honor is the highest recognition for actions on the battlefield. It is awarded for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty. During World War II, Sgt. Sylvester Antolak, a Soldier assigned to 1st Platoon, Company B, 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment,

made the ultimate sacrifice for his men against the German enemy.

Last week, Bob Antolak, the nephew of Sgt. Antolak, and his wife Donna, visited the "China" Battalion to honor his memory and view the battalion in which he served. Lt. Col. Arthur McGrue, 3-15 Inf. Battalion commander, escorted the Antolaks to the China Room, where the history and achievements of the unit are held, on Fort Stewart, March 12.

Pfc. Joseph Miller and Staff Sgt. Tyrone Love guided the Antolaks through the storied room, explaining the historical significance of flags, awards, photos and artifacts held by the unit. The Antolaks gained further understanding of Sgt. Antolak's contribution to the history of 3-15 Inf. as the Soldiers gave detailed accounts of multiple artifacts from the era in which he served.

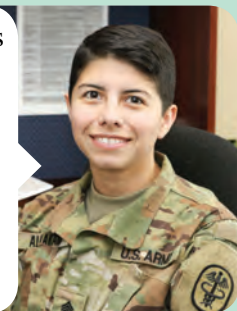

# Raiders focus on supporting Spartans

The Raider Brigade supported 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, during Marne Focus, March 10-15.

Marne Focus is a home-station training event that validated the mission readiness of the 2ABCT for their upcoming rotation at the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, California.

The 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd ID, conducted a week of training as both the opposition force and observers, coaching and training.

“Marne Focus was an outstanding exercise devoted to preparing 2ABCT for their upcoming NTC rotation, said Capt. Alexander W.D. Jenkins, electronic warfare officer, 1ABCT.

She said some best practices were captured during the force-on-force operations. She said after the training was completed, it was clear, the Spartans are prepared for the follow-on mission at the National Training Center.

The 1ABCT Raiders used their new Abrams tanks, Bradley fighting vehicles and Joint Light Tactical Vehicles for the first time in a field environment.

But one of the best parts of the exercise, expressed by some, was working with Spartan Soldiers.

“It was a great experience and opportunity for my team to work with the 2ABCT medic team,” said Staff Sgt. Kevin Querido, combat medic, 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry, 1ABCT. “We were glad to share with the Spartan Brigade regarding the lessons learned as combat medics.”

# Maintaining Spartan strength

In Greek mythology, Atlas holds the weight of the world on his shoulders. A familiar image shows Atlas crouching on a single knee, laboring to support his burden. It could be said Atlas and Lt. Col. Matthew Reynolds, battalion commander of 703rd Brigade Support Battalion, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, cast similar shadows. In many respects, the 703rd BSB holds a substantial weight of the Spartan Brigade's mission on its shoulders.

Known as the "Maintainers," the 703rd BSB's priorities are vehicle maintenance, providing fuel, ammunition and medical support.

"Every day I am focused on how I'm going to generate combat power to keep maintenance flowing throughout the brigade," said Reynolds. "The brigade commander looks to me to keep track of all the maintenance transactions flowing throughout our support supply activity shops. My job is to always have combat power in the fight."

Managing that mission is a tall order. To combat its complexity, Reynold's philosophy aims to simplify commands with clear communication.

For the battalion's mission to succeed, he must maintain confidence in 703rd BSB Soldiers' abilities to carry out the mission. For example, establishing a successful brigade support area requires well thought-out plans which not only subordinate leaders understand, but all Soldiers within the organization.

Clear communication allows each individual to know their job, task, and purpose in each operation.

"Due to our brigade commander sustaining such a high standard for our company com-

manders, I have full trust and confidence in them," said Reynolds. "703rd and the Spartan Brigade is a learning organization dedicated to hard work."

That hard work came in earnest as 703rd Soldiers built highly mobile tactical operation centers throughout Spartan Focus and Marne Focus, brigade and division-level force-on-force field exercises. TOCs contain specialized staff that help a commander shape the battlefield and must also be defended. These field training exercises allow leadership to identify weaknesses and learn from them.

"Conducting these training events builds trust and cohesion," continued Reynolds. "Solidifying that trust is the base foundation in everything we do."

During 2ABCT's conversion from a light brigade to the Army's 15th armored brigade, the 703rd has seen a large increase in mechanized equipment.

Servicing those platforms poses a new set of logistical challenges and maintenance requirements.

"A major difference I have noticed is the increased volume of fuel and ammunition now that we are an armored brigade," said Reynolds. "The bigger the tanks the bigger the bullets, which means more fuel required to remain in the sustainment fight."

Reynolds continued, "I will do everything I can to ensure our tanks are mission ready. Having the ability to supply parts and keep our equipment running is how we fight and win."

The Spartan Brigade will place even more weight on the 703rd's broad shoulders as 2ABCT prepares for its rotation at the National Training Center, in Fort Irwin, California.

# Soldier pay, quality of life, modernization among priorities in 2020 budget proposal

**WASHINGTON** -- With Soldiers increasingly being asked to shoulder heavier workloads, the Army hopes to compensate them for their efforts with a 3.1 percent pay raise.

The Army's \$182.3 billion budget proposal for fiscal year 2020 includes the highest pay increase for Soldiers in a decade. Additionally, the service plans to raise basic housing allowances by 3.2 percent and basic subsistence allowances by 2.4 percent.

After launching a new recruiting initiative this year, the Army is aiming for a modest end-strength target next year, hoping to have 480,000 active-duty Soldiers, 336,000 National Guard members and 189,500 reservists by 2020.

While much of the Army's fiscal year 2020 budget focus has centered on modernization efforts, Under Secretary of the Army Ryan D. McCarthy and Lt. Gen. Thomas Horlander, the military deputy for Financial Management and Comptroller, discussed the importance of readiness and quality of life during a budget briefing at the Pentagon Tuesday.

"Readiness will continue to be the number-one priority for the Army," McCarthy said.

McCarthy said two-thirds of the Army's brigade combat teams are at their "highest state of readiness." Army leaders have asked for steady and consistent funding to supplement its readiness efforts, which helped support 32 combat training center rotations this year.

"Because of the consistent funding that we've gotten at a higher level here over the last couple of years, [it] has really allowed us to make some readiness gains," Horlander said.

To meet its readiness goals, the Army proposes to increase its operations and maintenance budget to \$52.6 billion. The plan covers an increase to infantry one-station unit training from 14 to 22 weeks. It will also provide funding to train 58 brigade combat teams, six security force assistance brigades and 11 combat aviation brigades. The service additionally plans to increase spending for flight crew hours for both active-duty and National Guard members.

The operations budget funds multi-lateral exercises in the Pacific region and in Europe to help bolster partnerships with allies, a crucial element identified in the National Defense Strategy.

"There are a lot of efforts to strengthen the partnerships with our allies," Horlander said.

The service has prioritized improving housing standards, as senior leaders have visited post housing at different installations in recent months. The Army is asking for an additional \$600 million for the restoration and modernization of Soldiers' barracks and installation facilities. Some funding will go toward three new housing projects, Horlander said.

The Army is seeking \$34 billion for its research, development and acquisition funding that will go toward newer weapons systems.

The Army will cut funding from certain weapons platforms and legacy systems will be cut to funnel

more funding toward the Army's modernization efforts. McCarthy said that 93 programs were eliminated and an additional 93 will be reduced or delayed beginning in fiscal year 2020 to fiscal 2024.

"These choices were complex and difficult. At times people will focus in on ... winners and losers," McCarthy said. "But what we look at is the choices we had to make from a modernization standpoint to be the Army that we need by 2028."

While the Army will shift its focus from legacy programs, McCarthy said that some of the platforms will still be needed. Those programs will be gradually enhanced to bridge the gap between newer and older weapons systems.

The Army's FY20 budget request now awaits approval from Congress.

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# Combat colon cancer with early screening, reduce your risk through lifestyle changes

March is Colon Cancer Awareness Month. Colon cancer occurs in the colon or rectum. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention the risk increases as we get older. Data indicates that 90 percent of those diagnosed with colorectal cancer are 50-years-old and older. However, recent studies have shown an increase in the number of people under 50 years of age diagnosed with colorectal cancer.

Take this quick test and determine your risks.

1. Are you aged 50-years-old or older?
2. Have you had a colorectal polyp or cancer in the past?
3. Has anyone in your family had polyps or colorectal cancer?
4. Do you eat more fats than fiber?
5. Have you had inflammatory bowel disease, such as ulcerative colitis?

6. Have you noticed persistent changes in your bowel habits?

If you answered yes to one or more of the questions above, you are at risk for developing colorectal polyps or cancers.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force recommends screening for colorectal cancer using high-sensitivity fecal occult blood testing, sigmoidoscopy, or colonoscopy beginning at age 50 years and continuing until age 75 years. People at higher risk of developing colorectal cancer should begin screening at a younger age, and may need to be tested more frequently. Consult your primary care provider if you are at risk or 50-years-old or older and have not started screening. Your provider may recommended one or more of the following screening test: Every year a stool test, such as the fecal immunochemical or the fecal occult blood test; Every five years a sigmoidoscopy; Every 10 years a colonoscopy

According to the National Foundation for Cancer Research, you can reduce your risks of developing col-

orectal cancer by following some simple steps. If you're 50 or older, schedule a colon cancer screening. Eat a balanced diet. Maintain a healthy weight. Maintain an active lifestyle. Consider genetic counseling. Learn your family medical history. Talk to a doctor about your personal medical history. Don't smoke. Reduce radiation exposure.

The good news is that the CDC reports colon cancer survival rate has increased substantially at all stages of the disease with scientific advancements since the 1980s. However, early detection still gives you the best odds of survival with a 90 percent chance of five-year survival after localized detection of cancer, 70 percent after regional spread of cancer, and 10 percent survival after distant metastasis. With appropriate diet and lifestyle changes, timely screening, and early intervention, you can greatly reduce your risk of death from colon cancer.

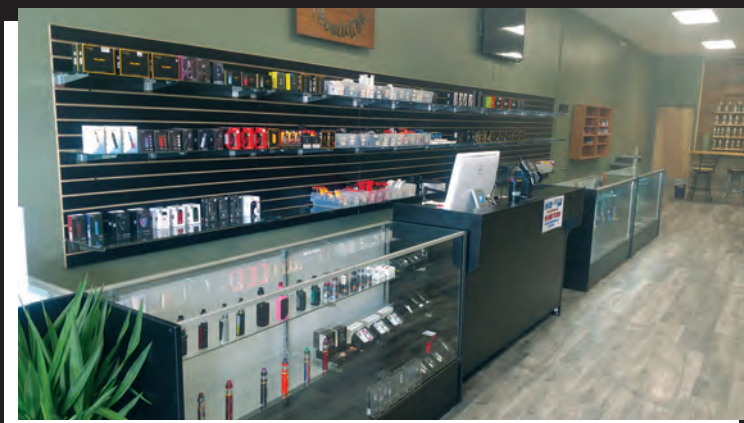

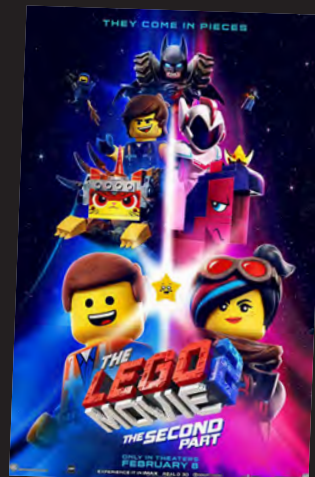

# Transitional care for service related conditions program

The Transitional Care for Service-Related Conditions program extends TRICARE coverage for qualified former active duty service members diagnosed with service-related conditions during their 180-day TAMP period.

To qualify for TCSRC, a TAMP eligible members medical condition must be:

- Service0-related
- Newly discovered or diagnosed during the 180 day TAMP period
- Able to be resolved within 180 days

- Validated by a Department of Defense physician

TCSRC benefit covers care only for the specific service-related conditions.

Preventive and health maintenance care is not covered. TCSRC beneficiaries may seek care at military hospitals or clinics or from TRICARE-authorized civilian providers if military hospital or clinic care is not available.

There are no copays or cost-shares under TCSRC, and providers must submit claims to Humana Military. The TCSRC benefit is available worldwide.

# Army reveals housing plans

**WASHINGTON** -- Army senior leaders introduced an action plan to lawmakers March 7 outlining steps to remedy military housing issues.

The plan includes a draft tenant bill of rights, which is a joint effort by all military services expected to be finalized in the coming weeks.

There are 12 rights intended to protect residents of privatized military housing.

"The recent reports of substandard conditions in some of our military housing units are deeply troubling," said Secretary of the Army Mark T. Esper. "It is unacceptable for our families who sacrifice so much for our country to endure these hardships in their homes."

Testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee on Capitol Hill, Esper said garrison leaders will soon be given more oversight to ensure housing companies on installations are held accountable.

Current proposals are for garrison staffs to conduct quality control checks on all life, health and safety work orders performed by contractors. They will also be present every time a resident moves. To better empower them, members of garrison staffs will even be trained on contracting and housing management, he added.

A reporting system, developed to allow residents to rate the timeliness, quality of work and customer service of contractors, to relay to garrison teams.

"Many Army families are concerned that they lack the ability to hold the privatized housing companies accountable for poorly performed services," Esper said, "and are inadequately protected from retaliation."

The Army has 111,000 housing units, 87,000 privatized under the Residential Communities Initiative in 1998.

Seven private companies manage the properties across 49 installations, he noted.

While the initiative helped tackle inadequate housing at the time, Esper said the Army eventually lost sufficient oversight.

"In too many cases, it is clear that privatized housing companies failed to uphold their end of the bargain, a failure that was enabled by the Army's insufficient oversight," he said.

Within hours of the first Congressional hearing to address housing concerns last

month, the Army took actions to fully understand the scope of the problems.

Senior leaders have since visited families in homes affected by lead paint, mold and other toxic hazards at Fort Meade, Maryland; Fort Bragg, North Carolina; Fort Campbell, Tennessee; Fort Jackson, South Carolina; Fort Belvoir, Virginia; and the U.S. Military Academy in New York.

Garrison commanders have been ordered to complete a 100 percent screening of installation housing by March 18. Town halls took place across the Army.

"This has provided families a forum to voice their concerns and to report problems directly to garrison commanders," the secretary said.

Army Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Milley also testified that chains of command need to step up to ensure their Soldiers have adequate housing.

"Our duty as commanders is to be responsible for everything our units fail to do or succeed at," he said.

"I want all of the Soldiers out there to know that their chain of command is now fully engaged," he added. "It is our personal responsibility and we will be held personally accountable for the condition of their living quarters or their houses."

Ongoing housing inspections also include barracks for single Soldiers, Esper said, adding that Soldiers and families living in off-base homes should be checked.

"We have a responsibility to take care of our Soldiers [and their dependents] wherever they live," he said.

Following meetings with senior leaders, housing companies also agreed to have a sufficient number of trained technicians and staff on installations to handle issues in a timely manner.

"All of the housing contractors are committed to working together to find ways to improve customer service and increase transparency," he said.

Senior leaders even ordered the Army inspector general to investigate the service's privatized housing to find the best way forward.

By 2021, plans call for the Army to eliminate its lowest level of military housing, known as Q4. Only 190 families are currently living in Q4 housing, Sgt. Maj. of the Army Daniel A. Dailey told lawmakers last month. Providing a safe, quality living environment, the secretary said, is critical to the readiness of the force.

I do think it is looking for a heart genuine enough to look evil square-in-the-face, and in the words of Gandalf say, "You shall go no further!"

Did I mention Bonhoeffer was arrested after he returned to Germany though he had the chance to stay safely in America? Did I mention he was executed mere hours before his concentration camp was liberated? True, not all stories have a happy ending, but are they meant to? Maybe this is what Jesus meant when he said if we were to follow him we must "take up our cross." Maybe taking up our cross begins small. Maybe Burke was right. Maybe I just need to do something. God almighty, give me your presence, strength, and wisdom to know when I should do something.

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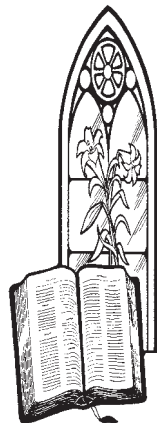

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The most decorated Soldier in U.S. history, Lt. Audie Murphy, also served in 3-15 Inf. during the siege of Italy, where Antolak earned his Medal of Honor. Murphy witnessed Antolak's heroic actions that earned him the Medal of Honor and referenced them in his memoir "To Hell and Back."

According to the official citation on ***honorstates.org***, "Sgt. Antolak charged 200 yards over flat, coverless terrain to destroy an enemy machinegun nest during the second day of the offensive which broke through the German cordon of steel around the Anzio beachhead. Fully 30 yards in advance of his squad, he ran into withering enemy machinegun, machine-pistol and rifle fire. Three times he was struck by bullets and knocked to the ground, but each time he struggled to his feet to continue his relentless advance."

Because of his willingness to sacrifice his own life, superb fighting courage, and heroic devotion to the attack, Antolak was directly responsible for eliminating 20 Germans, capturing an enemy machinegun, and clearing the path for his company to advance.

That legacy of bravery endures to this day.

"We've been trying to trace my uncle's steps to see if there was anything like we saw today, and this is where it all is," said Bob Antolak, referring to the China Room. "Growing up, you kind of heard the story. My father is a World War 2 vet, so [on] Memorial Day you would hear the story. In 1990, we got some records so I could see the diagram of what he had done. I think with age and time you appreciate and understand it more, and we're very proud."

Antolak's legacy continues to inspire family members since his actions in 1944. His nephew, Paul, spoke as a section of Interstate 70 was dedicated in his honor, and a statue pays homage to Antolak in his birthplace of St. Clairsville, Ohio. Through the years, Donna and Bob Antolak still pursue and discover more information, painting a canvas both large and extraordinary.

"Our son did more research into it and we said, 'Wow, it really happened this way and it's really awe inspiring and amazing- the dedication he had.' It's humbling to think that you are related to someone who did something as amazing as he did," explained Donna Antolak. "And the company he's in. The other

people are just amazing."

That heritage still beats in the heart of modern 3-15 Inf. Soldiers, including battalion commander Lt. Col. Arthur McGrue.

"His actions are essentially what I keep trying to drum into our junior leaders now. I want our team leaders to continue to close with and destroy the enemy, and as they do that, they have their Soldiers with them in tow," said McGrue. "And when you read his story, he does exactly just that, despite being wounded and shot multiple times. He continues to get up and move until he destroys the German machine gun nest.

"Although he was killed on that day, his actions inspired his men to move forward and [they] ended

up winning that battle. Those types of triumphs give others the courage to move forward and ensure victory."

McGrue hopes the family walked away knowing the mark Sgt. Antolak left, and the inspiration he is for others.

"The one thing I want them to be able to walk away with is neither his name nor his fame will ever perish as long as the regiment is around. He will always be on this wall and be remembered as one of the famous heroes of 3-15 Infantry."
