First Operation Stand Down reaches 500-plus in Liberty

The Liberty Regional Homeless Coalition wants to prevent homelessness, a goal it shares with the local community and larger military community, as it is an issue faced by a growing number of veterans.

According to the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans website, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development estimates an average of more than 40,000 veterans were homeless "any given night" in 2017. The Department of Veterans Affairs estimates 11 percent of the adult homeless people are veterans. About 1.4 million veterans are considered to be at risk for homelessness, according to nchv.org.

As a way to reach veterans who might be at risk, and to provide services to area service members and

their families, the LRHC held its first Operation Stand Down Saturday, in partnership with the Fort Stewart garrison command, the VA and the Georgia Department of Veteran Services. More than 30 organizations, including Army Community Services, the Atlantic Judicial Circuit Veterans Court, and businesses and schools that offer services to the military participated. They provided information on health care, education, counseling, and job training and placement services.

"We processed about 500 people by noon today," the Rev. Jim McIntosh, head of the coalition, said. He said his group strives to address the underlying issues that cause individuals to "lose everything" and become homeless. Issues such as job loss, inability to hold a job, substance abuse and mental health problems that should be examined in each client's case, he said.

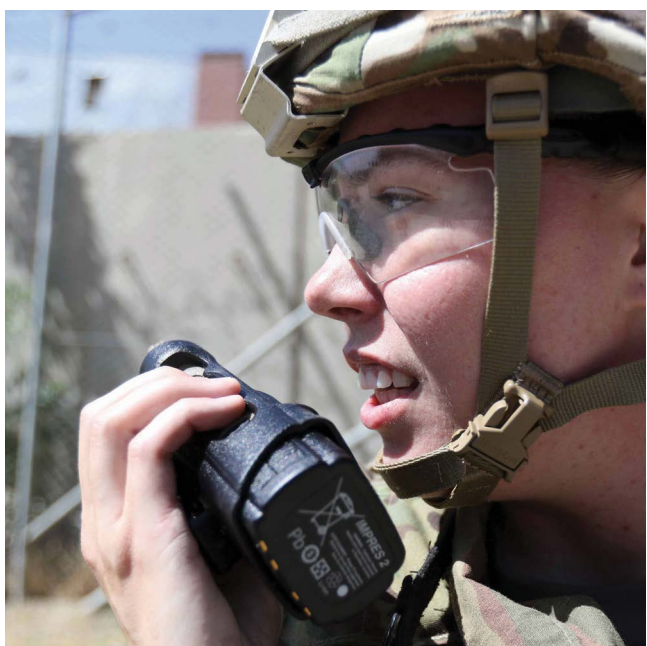

“The goal is to bring them to self-sustainability,” he said.

Once clients can sustain themselves, they require fewer services, McIntosh added.

In addition to serving homeless individuals, the coalition is finding families needing assistance with short-term and chronic homelessness, he said. Often these families are in and out of housing because they need assistance.

The coalition has also provided school uniforms to homeless families with children in Liberty County schools.

Coalition Vice President Jodee Adams said the organization initiated its school uniform drive last year, and will start another drive on July 1. This year, school supplies will also be collected.

“Last year we delivered 80 boxes of clothing,” McIntosh said.

Representatives of organizations that consistently work with veterans and their families also braved hot temperatures Saturday.

Larry Stanley, who works with the ACS family advocacy program, said his agency serves civilian spouses of soldiers, and those who live with or have had a child with a service member.

“We’re here for all of the soldiers’ family members and the retirees as well,” Stanley said.

ACS has programs that focus on employment and relocation readiness, services to assist with exceptional dependents, help during deployments and resilience training so family members can learn to face life’s challenges.

John Ely, chief assistant public defender with the Atlantic Judicial Circuit, and Della Martin Horner, administrator with the Veterans Treatment Court, handed out information about the treatment court. Ely explained the veterans’ treatment court is similar to civilian drug courts, linking veterans with substance abuse or trauma related issues with treatment, he said.

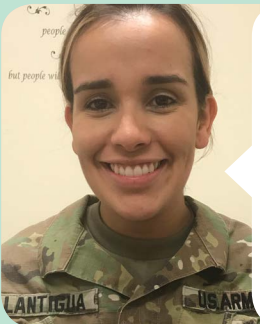

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan - The 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade held a Soldier and non-commissioned officer of the quarter board June 13 at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan.

The Soldiers competed in a physical fitness test, situational training exercise and a board comprised of senior noncommissioned officers within the RSSB.

Spc. Nicholas Smith, human resources specialist, Special Troops Battalion, and Spc. Kevin Moore, contracting officer’s representative, 304th Movement Control Team, both with the 3rdID RSSB, competed in the Soldier of the Quarter board. While both Soldiers gave their best, Moore was victorious that day.

Sgt. Caroline Robinson-Gray, senior information technician, 3rd ID RSSB, won the NCO of the Quarter board. To prepare for the board, Robinson-Gray said she has been studying and practicing in between accomplishing her primary mission in the sustainment automation support management office.

“I spent numerous hours of my personal time studying regulations, warrior tasks and battle drills and working on my physical fitness,” she said. “It was challenging but well worth it in the long run.”

The STX lane was comprised of different combat-like exercises that the competitors were graded on. They had to react to simulated indirect fire, a gas attack, treat and transport a casualty and call up a nine-line medical evacuation request. In the board, the senior NCOs were firing off question after question on 25 different Army regulations.

Moore and Robinson-Gray will go on to compete in the Soldier and NCO of the Year board later this year.

Camp Casey one day English camp

The United States Army Garrison Camp Casey held a “Camp Casey One Day English camp” on June 6, and invited approximately 40 Korean students from Dongduchen to visit Camp Casey, South Korea.

The English Camp is a good neighbor program for the Army and Dongduchen citizens as they continue to strengthen their relationship with the community.

Soldiers and KATUSAs from 3rd Battalion, 69th Armor Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division facilitated this year’s English Camp. The Soldiers from 3-69 Armor showed the students their M1 Abrams tanks and M2 Bradley fighting vehicles.

Communicating in English, the KATUSAs and Soldiers explained how they operated each piece of equipment, and how they conduct prevention maintenance checks and services before operating military equipment.

After explaining to the students about the .50 caliber machine gun, the Soldiers and KATUSAs asked the students questions about the different type of equipment and let them conducted a hands-on operations on the equipment.

The students also climbed in the Abrams and Bradleys to get an understanding on how it feels to sit while driving military vehicle. They also were able to get a close-up of the machine gun and learned how many rounds it shot a minute, how to focus on a target, and breathing techniques for firing the weapon systems.

“I am glad we got the opportunity to invite our neighbors to Camp Casey and show the community how we work as a team in Korea,” said Capt. Ronald Feher, HHC commander, 3-69th Armor, 1ABCT, 3rd ID.

After leaving the motor pool, the students received a tour of Camp Casey before entering Casey Gym. There, the students, Soldiers and KATUSAs played basketball and had an opportunity to get to know each other and ask questions.

“The excitement that I saw from the students, Soldiers and KATUSAs lets me know that we will continue to build a stronger relationship with our community and continue to help support the English Camp,” said Feher.

Before closing the camp the 3-69 Armor battalion commander, Lt. Col. William Coryell, talked with each individual student at Casey Theater and asked him or her questions about the camp before presenting them with their certificate of attendance.

“I am glad my battalion got the opportunity to show you how we operate equipment on the peninsula,” said Coryell. “Thanks for participating in the English camp, and we really appreciate being apart of the community.”

Hellhound medics to the rescue

Combat medics assigned to 3rd Battalion, 67th Armored Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, “Hellhounds” used training and experience gained during military service to save a Soldier suffering from heat stroke, May 18, at Fort Stewart.

Given the morning temperatures and high humidity at Fort Stewart, Soldiers can be at increased risk for heat injuries during physical training. Untreated heat stroke can quickly damage the brain, heart, kidneys and muscles. The damage worsens the longer treatment is delayed, increasing the risk of serious complications or death. Recently, one such incident almost cost a Soldier his life, had it not been for the actions of a few fellow Soldiers.

Sgt. Anthony Beaudry and Pfc. Samantha Hulen were inside the 3-67 Armor aid station when they were notified of a B Company Soldier suffering from a severe heat injury. The two combat medics immediately gathered their needed equipment and rushed toward the casualty.

Hulen said, “We rehearse these scenarios so we are always ready to react. We know every second counts.”

Upon reaching the casualty, lessons learned during their training scenarios enabled the medics to quickly assess the Soldier’s condition.

“Training is very important in our ability to react quickly and correctly,” said Beaudry. “Every year before the start of summer, we have classes and simulation training in order to be ready for the summer months here at Fort Stewart.”

Beaudry took charge of the care and attempted communicating with the Soldier. The casualty was unresponsive, hot to the touch and breathing rapidly--all signs of a

heat injury.

Hulen prepared the litter while Beaudry assessed the core temperature.

The patient’s core temperature had risen to 108 degrees. A core temperature that high places a Soldier’s health and life in serious jeopardy. Due to the dangerous temperatures here at Fort Stewart, medics often have sheets packed in ice and water on standby to assist them to rapidly cool victims of heat injury. The two experienced professionals began packing them into the casualty’s neck, armpits, and groin regions in an attempt to cool him down.

“We knew with a core temperature that high the patient was in extreme danger,” said Beaudry. “At 108 degrees there is a real risk for brain damage; it was the highest core temperature I have ever seen.”

Treatment continued as they desperately tried to lower the Soldier’s body temperature to a more acceptable level. As word of the emergency spread, more Hellhound medics arrived to assist with care.

“I didn’t know the Soldier prior to the incident, but I am so proud of being able to help him,” said Hulen.

Beaudry and Hulen, with help from other medics and Soldiers within the battalion, continued to pack ice, apply cold water, and reassure the casualty for approximately 15 minutes until emergency medical services arrived.

“I heard that the Soldier has recovered from the incident,” said Beaudry. “It’s a great feeling when you’re able to save someone’s life, but I would rather incidents like this never happen.”

DOD partners with LinkedIn, offers military spouses free membership

WASHINGTON - The Defense Department's Spouse Education and Career Opportunities program is launching a new partnership with LinkedIn -- the virtual professional networking platform.

Military spouses will soon have access to a free LinkedIn Premium membership, valid for one year, every time they have a permanent-change-of-station move, including access to more than 12,000 online professional courses through LinkedIn Learning, as well as access to LinkedIn's military and veterans resource portal. The membership is also available for the spouse of a service member who is within six months of separation from the military.

"The partnership with LinkedIn will offer military spouses a great opportunity to advance their careers during their times of transition," said Eddy Mentzer, associate director of family readiness and well-being in DOD's Office of Military Community and Family Policy. "Spouses will be able to access a global network of professionals any time, from any place. They can plan their next career step before they move, as soon as they have orders [for a permanent change of station]."

More than networking

A premium account includes enhanced insights comparing users to other applicants, on-demand learning,

and use of the InMail feature, where users can send direct messages to LinkedIn members they're not connected to. As corporate interest in hiring military spouses steps up, DOD and LinkedIn will be using the military spouse LinkedIn group to connect spouses to each other and employers.

"It is important for military spouses to see LinkedIn Premium as more than just enhanced networking. LinkedIn has developed a learning path specific to military spouses to help them find and succeed in remote, flexible, and freelance work opportunities," Mentzer said. "Additionally, LinkedIn provides enhanced resources for spouses that own and operate their own business as well as for employers to search the military spouse community for potential employees."

The LinkedIn partnership is designed to help military spouses overcome a common challenge -- sustaining steady employment. The number one contributing factor to military spouse unemployment is continual relocation from duty station to duty station. On average, active-duty military personnel move once every two to three years, more than twice as often as civilian families, and military spouses move across state lines 10 times more frequently than their civilian counterparts.

Empowering spouses

"Empowering our community of military spouses to reach their personal and professional goals is part of

maintaining a healthy military community," said A.T. Johnston, deputy assistant secretary of defense for military community and family policy. "We encourage military spouses to take advantage of the LinkedIn Premium membership opportunity as just one of many tools available to them through the SECO program."

Military spouses interested in the LinkedIn Premium upgrade can visit MySECO for more information and to learn how best to maximize this new service. Eligible military spouses are expected to have access to the LinkedIn Premium membership later this summer.

The DoD established the SECO program to provide education and career guidance to military spouses worldwide, offering free comprehensive resources and tools related to career exploration, education, training and licensing, employment readiness and career connections. This program also offers free career coaching services six days a week. This program may further develop partnership with private sector firms such as LinkedIn for purposes of enhancing employment opportunities for military spouses pursuant to authority in Section 1784 of Title 10, United States Code. The formation of such partnerships does not signify official DoD endorsement of any such private-sector entity or its products or services.

No phone calls please

Beware of virtual kidnapping scam

QUANTICO, VA. – The U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command’s Computer Crime Investigative Unit (CCIU) is warning the Army community to be on the lookout for the “Virtual Kidnapping” hoax.

The scam occurs when an unsuspecting person receives a call and the caller immediately says, “I’ve kidnapped your kid. Send money or the kid dies,” or some similar version of the call.

Although this is not a new scam, it recently happened to a member of the Army Family. It was quickly confirmed to be a scam because the victim called their child’s school and confirmed that the child was safe in class.

“Often, victims of the virtual kidnapping fraud are chosen randomly. The person who answers the telephone is the victim, and no one has been kidnapped,” CID officials said. “Sometimes criminals target a block of telephone numbers in known affluent area codes. They dial sequential numbers until the call is answered by someone they can shock into believing that their child has been kidnaped. The caller’s approach is forceful, well scripted and can be very convincing.”

Recipients of the call report hearing screaming in the background and desperate pleas for help, a crying child and other equally frightening sounds. The caller is loud, abrasive, abrupt, and demanding.

When the “kidnapper” uses the child’s name, it will cause the victim to panic and become more compliant. But keep in mind that the caller might have found the child’s name on social media or the parent might have inadvertently told the caller the child’s name during the course of the call.

What to Do

If you receive a phone call from someone demanding ransom for an alleged kidnap victim, consider the following:

- In most cases, the best course of action is to hang up the phone.
- If you engage the caller, don’t confirm or acknowledge your loved one’s name.
- Try to slow the interaction. Request to speak with your family member directly by saying “how do I know

my loved one is OK?

- Ask questions only the alleged kidnap victim would know such as the name of a pet. Avoid sharing information about yourself or your family.



- Attempt to contact the “kidnapped” victim via phone, text, or social media, and request they call back from their own cell phone.

- To buy time, repeat the caller’s requests and tell them you are writing down the demand or tell the caller you need time to get things moving.

- If you suspect a real kidnapping is taking place, immediately contact the nearest FBI office, CID office, or local law enforcement agency.

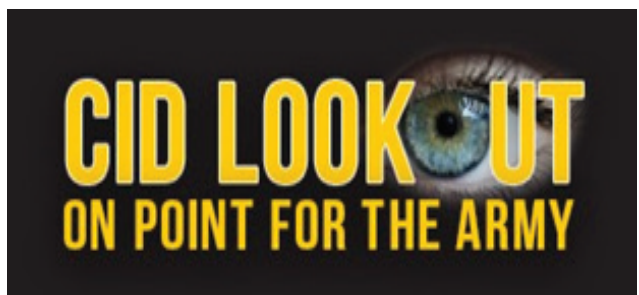
Don’t be a victim

To avoid becoming a victim, look for these possible indicators:

- The call does not originate from the “kidnapped” person’s phone.
- The caller goes to great lengths to keep you on the line so you can’t make calls or verify their claims.
- Ransom money must be paid by wire, PayPal, Moneygram or similar service.
- Ransom amount quickly decreases if the parent resists.

Remember that the fraudster relies on shock, speed and fear. Criminals know they have a small window of opportunity to extract a ransom before the victim realizes the scam or authorities become involved, officials warned.

SAFETY SPOTLIGHT: Poisonous Spiders in Georgia

Many people in Georgia love the outdoors. During the summer popular activities may include a visit the beach, park, a sporting events, or just barbecuing and picnicking with family and friends.

Each also bring their own challenge, but I wanted to take a moment and warn you about spiders.

The Center for Disease Control, <https://www.cdc.gov/niosh/topics/spiders/types.html>, notes among the venomous spiders, two commonly found in Georgia are the black widow and brown recluse.

The black widow is one of the most poisonous spiders in North America they are a glossy black with a red hour glass design on its stomach. The bite of a black widow is identified by two small fang

marks with is followed by a sharp pain and will become red and swollen, you might experience muscle cramps, chills, fever, nausea and severe body pain if so contact a doctor quickly. Their poison has a protein that attacks your nervous system.

The brown recluse is about the size of a quarter and their bite doesn’t always hurt. But the site may itch or become red and swollen. It may later turn into a blister, or after about a week - an ulcer. If this happens seek medical attention immediately.

The Centers for Disease Control and National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, offer additional information, including symptoms and first aid, employer and worker recommendations and more.



Installation learns from power outage

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield held a power outage exercise on June 15 to test the installation's crisis management system and critical infrastructure. The exercise was held to determine the installation's capabilities and needs in the event of an actual emergency.

"Without a sustained power outage, it is impossible to assess critical infrastructure systems," said Will Ingram, chief of Operations and Maintenance Division at the garrison's Directorate of Public Works. "Although the exercise went very well, we did identify some key areas for improvement."

During the three and a half hour outage, the team was able to check communications infrastructure, generator support at critical facilities and contingency plans. The exercise also allowed the

installation to work closely with its electrical utility partner, Canoochee Electric Membership Corporation. "This exercise was a great opportunity to strengthen our relationship with the Fort Stewart team, while also having the ability for Canoochee to test the strength of our electrical distribution system. I believe that much was gained through this exercise," said Bobby Ryon, Military Project manager for Canoochee EMC.

The installation will complete a number of improvements over the next few months as a result of the exercise. Additionally, the findings will support infrastructure investments in energy resiliency in the coming years.

During the exercise the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Garrison Commander, Col. Jason Wolter, maintained open communication with community members – talking and responding to questions on the garrison facebook site at www.facebook.com/ForStewartHunterArmyAirfield. That site is always available to community members to post questions or concerns – or to find out the latest news and information from Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield.

The installation plans to continue to look at ways to prepare the installation for all contingencies. However, with the area now in hurricane season, community members are encouraged to learn what they can do in case of severe weather. 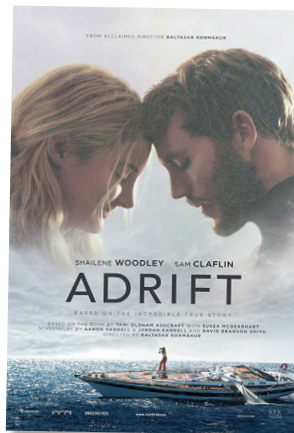

This plan extends TRICARE benefits to certain family members under the age of 26 who have lost or will lose TRICARE eligibility due to age. Qualified adult children can purchase TYA after "regular" TRICARE coverage ends at either age 21 (or age 23 if enrolled in college fulltime or at college graduation, whichever comes first). TYA beneficiaries can enroll in either TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select. There are monthly premium with each of the mentioned plans. U.S. Army MEDDAC dedicates troop clinic to fallen Soldiers at Stewart

Fort Stewart leadership, U.S. Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Winn Army Community Hospital staff and local community members attended a dedication ceremony at the former North Troop Medical Clinic, which is now dedicated and renamed, focused on the Soldiers served there as the Marne Medic Troop Medical Clinic June 25.

Many months of hard work and dedication from Dr. W. Sanders Marble, the senior historian, at the U.S. Army Medical Department Center of History and Heritage, 3rd Infantry Division Museum Curator, John Potter, a former combat medic, the Winn ACH team, to include the diligent planning of Maj. Michael Brown, Winn ACH Plans, Training, Maneuver and Security chief, went into bringing this day to fruition and Warner thanked them for their commitment to the day's event.

"Seven months ago, I outlined to him a vision for renaming and dedicating this clinic," Warner said of Brown. "He spent countless hours with the history team planning its execution, to make today possible."

The Marne Medic TMC is dedicated, in part, to the Soldiers who displayed extraordinary heroism and gallantry in action against enemy forces on July 15, 1918 during the Second Battle of the Marne during WWI. The battle took place in Germany on the Marne River when

Germany launched its last offensive in WWI when it met with the 3rd Infantry Division. USA MEDDAC Winn Army Community Hospital Commander-Fort Stewart, Col. Christopher Warner, spoke in varied detail about the nine Soldiers who earned the Distinguished Service Cross and the 11 Soldiers who earned the Silver Star Medal during the battle.

"The importance of this dedication cannot be overstated as it ties the current staff and Soldiers who receive care here to the very origins and fundamental core of our purpose in military medicine and as the premier division in the United States Army," Warner said. "This continues to strengthen our commitment and partnership with the Soldiers on this installation and furthers our efforts of establishing Fort Stewart as a premier health readiness platform."

Warner said the MMTMC joins the other multiple TMCs in the MEDDAC footprint such as Hawks Troop Medical Clinic, Tuttle Army Health Clinic, and the Richmond Hill Medical Home. These clinics are designed to provide primary care and patient services where Soldiers and Families live and work.

"It's important for us to remember the sacrifices and the service of those that come before us," Warner said. "To tie it to our history allows us to remember those acts of heroism, those brave service [members] and those lives that were saved. And specifically for us in the medical field it helps us tie to those who we

serve."

The MMTMC provides primary care, a full behavioral health clinic, physical therapy, radiology, lab and a pharmacy for Soldiers.

Winn suspends enrollment for 65, older beneficiaries

Effective immediately, U.S. Army Medical Department Activity, Winn Army Community Hospital-Fort Stewart will temporarily suspend its future enrollment of Medicare eligible TRICARE For Life beneficiaries at all of its locations. Medicare eligible beneficiaries are defined as patients who are age 65 and older. When retired service members

and their families become eligible for TRICARE For Life, typically at 65, they are no longer able to enroll in TRICARE Prime.

Winn Army Community Hospital made this tough decision due to a variety of factors, such as: (1) We have reached our enrollment capacity, (2) We have had an extremely high turnover of medical providers due to Permanent Change of Station and deployments, and (3) This

high turnover of medical providers has impacted our ability to provide timely access in addressing the medical readiness needs of our Soldiers and our eligible TRICARE Prime beneficiaries.

Reflect on Independence Day

242 years ago, our founding fathers put their names on a document that marked them as traitors. Fifty-six men courageously put their lives on the line for their

are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor” (1 Peter 2:16-17).

Peter lived under the supreme rule of a Roman emperor. He certainly did not have the rights and freedoms that we as Americans enjoy today. And yet, he offers this as a prescription for living. I think that it is pretty sound advice. Live as free people without using your “freedom” to hurt another person. Honor all people—regardless of class, race, or creed. Love one another; show kindness to all. Fear God, whatever your concept may be of Him. Honor political leaders, which is best accomplished by praying for them. This Fourth of July, let us remember that we are more than what divides us.
