Fort Stewart holds its annual Hispanic Heritage observance 11: 30 a.m. Sept. 26, at Club Stewart. The theme is 'One Endless Voice to Enhance our Traditions.' The featured speaker is Lt. Col. Jeffrey R. Hernandez, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade.

Hispanic Heritage Week was established by legislation sponsored by Rep. Edward R. Roybal and was first proclaimed by President Lyndon B. Johnson in 1968. On Aug.17, 1988, President Ronald Reagan signed Public Law 100-402, which expanded Hispanic Heritage Week into a 31-day observance from Sept. 15 through Oct. 15, which is now recognized as "National Hispanic Heritage Month."

During Hispanic Heritage Month we take the opportunity to honor all Americans of Hispanic roots and to acknowledge their ongoing contributions to the success and development of our Nation. We celebrate the histo-

ries, cultures and contributions of American citizens with ancestors from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and from Central and South America. Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for Hispanic Heritage Month because it is the anniversary of independence for five Latin American countries - Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico declared its independence on September 16th and Chile on Sept. 18.

Throughout the decades, generations of Hispanics have profoundly influenced American history and culture through their dedication to family; devotion of faith; commitment to hard work; contributions in all aspects of American life; and selflessness in military service. They have contributed to our Nation's character through the sharing of centuries-old traditions, which stem from many global, multi-cultural communities.

Community members are invited to join the festivities at Club Stewart; which will include a demonstration by the Hinesville Hispanic Dance Group.



Maneuver Warfighter Conference focuses on readiness

The 2018 Maneuver Warfighter Conference continued into its second day Sept. 12 at the Maneuver Center of Excellence at Fort Benning, Georgia.

This year's conference theme is "Sharpening Our Craft," which, as MCoE Commanding General Maj. Gen. Gary M. Brito said, emphasizes the importance of basic Maneuver Force effectiveness in order to win in a battlespace that spans land, air, sea, space and cyberspace, and in order to improve within the Army's modernization effort.

Subject matter experts and Maneuver leadership from across the Army led discussions on various topics to support this theme.

One of the panel discussions during the morning sessions was on "Building Readiness." Maj. Gen. Paul Calvert, 1st Cavalry Division commanding general, spoke about promoting and fostering readiness at the division level. One of the most valuable resources Soldiers have, he said, is time, and it must be used effectively. To this end, he emphasized making priorities and making those priorities known to commanders at lower levels. Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, 3rd Infantry Division commanding general, went beyond building readiness to sustaining readiness. He said units, upon returning from deployments, should continue training within 10 days to ensure essential skills are not atrophied, and Soldiers will remain ready next time their skills are needed.

Command Sgt. Maj. Michael Grinston of U.S. Army Forces Command briefed about FORSCOM priorities. Grinston pointed out that the Army Chief of Staff's number one priority of readiness truly speaks to the conference theme, "Sharpening Our Craft." He expanded on this when listing FORSCOM priorities which include maximizing unit readiness, mastering the fundamentals and strengthening leader development.

The last panel was about NATO and coalition operations. German army Maj. Gen. Gert-Johannes Hagemann, deputy commanding general of Rapid Reaction Corps – France, and Polish army Brig. Gen. Jarosław Gromadzi ski, deputy commanding general of the Polish 12th Mechanized Division, spoke about their own experiences operating in coalition environments

overseas, including Iraq and Afghanistan, and how to maintain readiness in a multinational environment. NATO, which consists of 26 sovereign nations, includes more than 1.8 million non-U.S. active-duty Soldiers and more than 1.2 million non-U.S. reserve Soldiers. Hagemann said the key to finding solutions for the complex challenges encountered in a large multinational environment is to maintain cooperation, coordination and compromise to achieve unanimous decisions.

Airport runway extended

Fort Stewart Hunter Army Airfield and Liberty County held a ribbon cutting ceremony for the Mid-Coast Regional Airport at Wright Army Airfield, Sept. 14, celebrating the conclusion of a two year runway expansion project.

3rd Infantry Division Commander, Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas and the Fort Stewart Garrison command team, Col. Jason Wolter and Command Sgt. Maj. Rebecca Myers, joined state and local leaders to help cut the ribbon.

Extending the runway from 5007 to 6500 feet and upgrading the pavement to meet Unified Facilities Criteria, the runway increases it capabilities to land larger aircraft and support joint training across military services.

Wolter said the runway extension enhanced the installation's power projection ability; whether deploying tanks or conducting air drops.

"As we continue to change the way we conduct warfare and deployments," Wolter said. "We probably haven't even realized the full increase in capability. It's a significant change for Fort Stewart, the 3rd ID and really all the combat forma-

tions that train here."

Community pride was echoed among each of the guest speakers at the event, which included Georgia State Representative Al Williams; Hinesville Mayor Allen Brown; Liberty County Commission Chairman Donald Lovette; Liberty County Administrator Joey Brown and Georgia Department of Transportation Chairman Ann Purcell.

"Aside from the obvious benefits for our military and growing civilian community, the runway extension is also a testament of how well we all work together in this community." Brown said. "We could not have secured the \$13 million in state and federal funding without the teamwork."

"It is not an 'I'," Purcell said. "It is a 'we' and it starts at home. It starts here in our community."

The successful completion of this project will hopefully lead to more ventures that will benefit Liberty County and surrounding areas.

"We will continue to seek other opportunities that will serve the civilians and the military community," Lovette said. "And further strengthen the ties that bind us together as one family, one community."

Absentee Voters Week support available

In support of the Services' Voting Assistance Program, the U.S. Army has designated the week Oct. 1-8 as Absentee Voters Week.

During this week, commanders are encouraged to intensify efforts to contact all assigned personnel, to ensure they are aware of their voting requirements and are provided the necessary information regarding voting resource. This effort will ensure all personnel are postured to vote in the upcoming critical midterm elections, Nov. 6.

Department of Defense Instruction Manual and Army Regulation 608-20, notes every military personnel eligible to vote are required to submit a Special Form 76 Federal Postcard Application by Jan. 15 of each calendar year. Additionally, when a military personnel deploys for six months or longer, they are required to submit an SF 76.

Absentee Voters Week provides the ideal opportunity for voters to receive key materials such as the FPCA.

The FPCA can be used to register to vote while simultaneously requesting an absentee ballot. It can also be used to submit a change of address to your local election officials. You can now go online to www.fvap.gov External site and use the FPCA Wizard that will help you register, request your absentee ballot and/or change your address while providing you with all of your state-specific information and requirements to vote! Voting is both a privilege and a responsibility.

As a military spouse, you are

covered under the same law that protects military members' absentee voting rights. Regardless of where you and your Family are stationed, it is important to note there are offices, people and resources available to assist you.

During Oct. 1-4, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., the Installation Voting Officer will have a voting assistance booth setup at the Main and Hunter Exchanges to assist and answer questions. The booth will be operational at the Hunter PX Oct. 1 and 2; and at Fort Stewart on Oct. 3 and 4.

Your unit voter assistance officer can help you fill in and mail off your voting materials if you need further assistance. You can also call the Installation Voting Assistance Office at 767-7081 or email alvin.l.lundy.civ@mail.mil.



3rd Infantry Division supports hurricane response

High-water vehicles, helicopters, swift boats and service members leap into action to assist those affected by the flooding from Hurricane Florence. The Total Army Force -- U.S. Army, the U.S. Army National Guard, and the U.S. Army Reserve -- are actively supporting FEMA, local municipalities, and citizens, as creeks and rivers rise above flood stage, threatening homes and communities.

The 3rd Infantry Division joined the Total Army response effort to provide assistance to the American people impacted by Hurricane Florence.

Based on geographical location to the impacted area, and the ability to rapidly deploy, the division is uniquely qualified to support response efforts.

"The 3rd Infantry Division is part of a comprehensive response effort, partnered with local, state and federal agencies," said Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, commander of the 3rd ID and Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield. "Our Soldiers are actively assisting and postured to provide further support in the form of robust ground and aviation elements across a wide range of activities."

The 3rd ID remained focused on protecting Soldiers and Families as Hurricane Florence made landfall and dedicated efforts to providing forces to assist those affected in the Mid-Atlantic States.

"As Dogface Soldiers we pride ourselves on staying mission focused and ready; our mission includes assisting Americans in need of our help," Quintas said.

Current 3rd ID response missions:

- The 3rd Sustainment Brigade's 90th Human Resources Company is currently supporting response efforts at Fort Jackson, South Carolina and Fort Bragg, North Carolina.
- The 3rd Sustainment Brigade's 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion provided a sizable wheeled vehicle element that is capable of moving people and bulk logistical supplies.
- The 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade is providing a combination of UH-60 Blackhawk and CH-47 Chinook helicopters as part of an aviation task force capable of conducting operations spanning from search and rescue to aerial delivery of bulk logistical supplies.

Department of Defense Response:

- As of Sept. 18, there are more than 5650 active duty personnel, 6850 National Guard personnel, and nearly 225 Defense Logistics Agency and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers personnel, with more than 12,700 total DoD personnel in support of Tropical Storm Florence.
- As of the same time, more than 1430 High Water Capacity Trucks and nearly 100 swift water boats in support of Tropical Storm Florence are in support of the response. The National Guard has also conducted more than 20 rescues and 450 evacuations for more than 900 citizens; performed law enforcement and security assistance missions in about 30 locations, and continues to support more than 260 shelters for more than 12,200 evacuees.

TRICARE Retiree Dental Program to end

On Dec. 31, the Defense Health Agency's TRICARE Retiree Dental Program will end.

However, as directed in the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2017, retired uniformed service members and their Families, who were eligible for TRDP, will have the opportunity to enroll in the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program.

The end of TRDP is part of the historic reforms that began rolling out in the Military Health System on Jan. 1.

The implementation of the provisions under the 2017 NDAA and the beginning

of new TRICARE support contracts is meant to improve health and enhance medical readiness for the uniformed services.

The first opportunity to enroll in FEDVIP will be during the next Federal Benefits Open Season, which runs from Nov. 12 through Dec. 10, with coverage effective Jan. 1, 2019.

If you are currently enrolled in a TRDP plan, you will not be automatically enrolled in a FEDVIP plan for 2019. You must enroll during open season.

To get answers to frequently asked questions about the transition, go to the FAQs section of *www.trdp.org*.

Active duty uniformed service members: The TRDP transition to FEDVIP doesn't impact you.

There may be rough seas, storms

An old African Proverb says, "Smooth seas do not make skillful sailors." I have never claimed to know much about sailing, although I am partial to the occasional Jimmy Buffett song, this proverb still resonates with me.

Most of us live life with the expectation that nothing bad is going to happen to us today. While we still have problems, it is unlikely that any of us are worried about starving, famine, plagues, an enemy invasion, or being eaten by a predator. It is great that humanity, especially in America, has overcome so many of the dangers and concerns that inundated people in the past and it seems odd to find any negative aspect to this change. It is worth noting though, that as the African proverb describes, a life of smooth seas leads to a sailor who gives no experience or knowledge of how to maneuver through storms.

I believe that much of the lack of resilience found in America, today, is a direct result of lives that encounter very few significant storms. Now that we encounter very few life-or-death or fight-or-flight situations, we begin to treat smaller rain clouds as more significant than they are. I counsel Soldiers often who consider being reprimanded by a non-commissioned officer or having to replace an alternator in a vehicle as a major storm in life. I am not implying that those are not significant events, but due to the lack of true dangers in our lives, we escalate smaller problems to fill the void and we can lose all perspective.

As I write this, I realize that I risk sounding like an old man ranting about what is wrong with the "kids" today. Please believe that this is not my intent. My hope is that you take away two lessons from this discussion. First, as you encounter storms in life, strive fervently to keep the circumstance in proper perspective.

Take a deep breath and start thinking through the problem before it is treated as a disaster. Each time that you break through a storm in life you come out better prepared to take on the next storm, and to help others through similar struggles. This approach makes storms into challenges that test your ability to win at life. I am not implying that you should hope or look for storms, although there is great value in stretching and challenging yourself often. Just try to look at certain storms as growth opportunities. By approaching your storms with these two lessons, you will keep things in proper perspective and learn from the experience in a healthy way.

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

Be on the lookout for "Disaster Fraud," schemes

QUANTICO, VA. – The U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command is alerting the Army community to be on the lookout for "Disaster Fraud" charitable schemes and repair scams.

"Disaster Fraud occurs after man-made or natural catastrophes such as the recent damage, storm surge and flooding caused by Hurricane Florence. Often dishonest individuals or contractors will use this opportunity to inflate damage estimates, or swindle homeowners in home repair, debris removal and other cleanup scams," said Chris Grey, CID spokesman. "These scammers will also exploit the disaster by seeking out those wishing to support and assist affected victims by soliciting fictitious charitable donations, sending fraudulent e-mails or creating phony websites to solicit contributions or personal information resulting in identity theft."

CID agents warn that some of these organizations are fraudulent, or misleading at best because they do not have the infrastructure to support the affected disaster area. Do not respond to unsolicited email (spam), links or attachments from these fake groups because in addition to stealing your identity, these links may also contain computer viruses and/or hijack your computer files for ransom.

The scammers will also focus on getting their victims to become emotionally invested to help those in need. Special Agents from CID recommend that people who want to give do research before donating. Ask detailed questions about the charity or organization, which includes basic information such as their name, address, telephone number, and if the charity is registered. Also request proof that a contribution is tax deductible or if the organization is tax exempt. Be cautious of out of state organizations – especially if their address is a post office box.

Officials also urge would-be-givers to ensure monies are donated to trustworthy organizations and make contributions directly to known and verified organizations rather than relying on a third party to do so.

Experts also advise that copycat websites are very active during natural disasters. Copycat websites will have links that will appear authentic to similar known web addresses. It's the same for some social media platforms. An increased use of social media platforms using copycat websites and accounts of trusted organizations will be used to display devastating and emotional images combined with a link in an effort to get you to donate to those in need.

If you decide to donate, go directly to the organization's website and do not donate using a link that has been sent via email or social media, CID advises. Be sure to check the organization's verification. Most sites use a check mark behind the name to let you know that you are on or viewing a verified account.

Additionally, some crowdfunding and fundraising websites and accounts may not be used for the intended purpose of helping disaster victims, so beware of solicitations from these sites posing as legitimate and fake organizations. It is important to verify all organizations before donating.

In addition to charitable donations and email scams, victims should also beware of contractor and home repair fraud.

"Please keep in mind that legitimate and licensed repair contractors are quickly booked," said Special AgentWilliam Stakes Jr., CID's Economic Crime program manager. "Do not overlook normal precautions and do not hire an untrustworthy or questionable freelancing handyman because you are eager to start the repairs quickly. Do your research when hiring repair contractors."

Stakes provided some red flags and important points to consider when hiring a contractor:

- •Ensure contractor hired is legitimate. Seek companies licensed obtaining three itemized bids before choosing a contractor.
- •Contractor asks for cash up front (advanced fee scheme)
- •Get a written estimate and don't sign a blank contract. Get a second set of eyes to look over the contract. Always best to get a second opinion.
- •Don't sign over your insurance settlement check and don't pay with cash but by credit card or check and never the full amount up front.
- •Have the work inspected; holding the final payment until repair completed to your satisfaction.
- •Don't be pressured or fall for someone claiming to offer a "one-day-only" special or discount for hiring them on the spot. Often after disasters, disreputable contractors will solicit door to door offering to repair or clean up damage.
- •Beware swindlers peddling "Mold-Free" certificates there are no laws requiring homeowners to produce this credential.
- •Another good proactive measure is to take pictures with the contractor; business cards, contractor/vehicle licenses fraudsters are unlikely to cooperate.

If you think you've been the victim of any of these scams, you can file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.

People should use caution before entering flooded areas; which could lead to injury, illness or even death.


Many areas affected by flood waters become contaminated, and you often can't see below the surface. The chances on stepping on something or striking something can cause injuries or illness.

As little as six inches of moving water can knock you down. If your carrying supplies you could lose them and what's worst if you're carrying a small child and one foot of moving water can cause your vehicle to be sweep away.

If you are driving and are unfamiliar with the area and you see water across the rode don't just think you can drive through it. It is safer to turn around and find another route to get you where you are going.
