FORSCOM announces Fourth Estate Winners

Several public affairs Soldiers assigned to 3rd Infantry Division and the 50th Public Affairs Detachment, won the 2017 U.S. Army Forces Command Fourth Estate Award for journalistic excellence.

The award recipients were announced, March 15, 2018 and included Soldiers from the 3rd Infantry Division; Detachment Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion; 3rd Sustainment Brigade; 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade; 2nd Armor Brigade Combat Team and 50th Public Affairs Detachment.

"In total, Fort Stewart won 10 of the 64 Forth Estate awards out of a pool of more than 330 submissions from all FORSCOM units," said Master Sgt. Erick Ritterby, public affairs noncommissioned officer in charge,

3rd ID.

The winners of the Fourth Estate Award will move on to compete in the Department of the Army Maj. Gen. Keith L. Ware Competition, which recognizes military and civilian-employee public affairs practitioners. The Secretary of the Army sponsors the competition annually.

"The Keith L. Ware competition will recognize Soldiers and civilians for their outstanding competence, creativity and technical ability in 48 categories in a variety of skill sets," Ritterby said. "The Office of the Chief of Public Affairs conducts the judging with the goal of ensuring the best internal information products receive recognition for professional excellence and outstanding achieve-

The 50th Public Affairs Detachment won first place in the media campaign category for their

coverage of the 1st Security Force Assistance Brigade in October 2017.

The unit went to Fort Benning, Georgia for 30 days to tackle the complex task of highlighting the 1st SFAB's mission and help recruit Soldiers to fill the many available positions in the upcoming six SFABs.

This mission required the right information campaign to inform the public of the Army's newest asset.

The media campaign was developed in collaboration with the 1st Security Force Assistance Brigade public affairs office, FORSCOM and XVIII Airborne Corps, said Capt. John L. May, commander of the 50th PAD. We were given broad guidance, and my team and I developed and refined our plan to tackle this mission. We told a continuous story over the next 30 days. Each article, video and photo led into the next. They all tied together, he added.

How to beat bullying

Bullying. We have all heard the word, but do we really know what it means? The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (2018) vaguely defines bullying as unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance that causes distress or harm in the child being bullied. In reading that definition, we may conclude that bullying is some form of aggressive physical behavior towards another.

Maybe some of the confusion originates in our own very basic understanding of the topic. Let's think outside of those constraints that often limit our ability to interpret more complexity in a given situation. If you do a quick internet search you will find information on verbal, social, relational, and physical bullying.

It appears that bullying takes many different forms and there are many layers making bullying more complex than previously thought. In reality, bullying can happen anywhere, at any time, and to anyone.

In looking at the prevalence of bullying, the majority of bullying occurs between school age children within the school setting. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, approximately one in three children report being bullied at school. Unfortunately, with the availability of cell phones, computers, the internet, and social media children can no longer escape the torment that occurs at school. It follows them to what we perceive is the safest place for our children. It comes home with them, occurring at the dinner table, during Family movie night, and in the comfort

and privacy of their own bedrooms.

Our children no longer have a reprieve from bullying and often times we don't even know it is happening. Statistics show that only about 20 to 30 percent of those children notify an adult that they are being bullied.

If bullying is so common then why don't we remember bullying being an issue when we were in school and why is it so prevalent now? The simple answer is that bullying has been around for as long as any of us has been alive, we just didn't have a word to classify those behaviors when we were children. At that time, adults often dismissed bullying between children, minimizing or excusing the harmful behaviors as age appropriate and a normal part of growing

According to 2014 research by the American Psychological Association, these assumptions simply are not true. Bullying has been found to be related to negative psychosocial functioning among children who are victimized increasing rates of lowered self-esteem, depression, anxiety, feelings of loneliness, suicidal ideations and higher rates of school absenteeism.

Now that we know how serious bullying is, how can we fully understand the negative implications of bullying on our children? Put yourself in your child's shoes. Bullying is not a new phenomenon. I'll bet that if we take a trip back in time we will all remember some pretty unpleasant experiences as children. I am sure that at some point in our lives we have all experienced bullying in some form or another. Think about your adult interactions. Did you know adults can be bullies, also? It is possible that we have all experienced bullying in our workplace and didn't even know what to call it at the time. We don't classify adult behaviors as bullying, but it happens! Remember how bad it made you feel? How stressed out you were? How much you dreaded going to school or work?

So, how do you beat a bully without using your fists? The answer to the proposed question is actually quite simple. Educate. Educate yourself and your children. There is no shortage of information and research out there on bullying, the impact of bullying, how to prevent it and how to stop it.

Stopbullying.gov provides information, resources, and guidance on bullying. Communicate. Talk to your children and others about bullying. Speak out! The two largest barriers to addressing bullying is fear of the bully or the consequences of bringing that person's actions to light and the shame or embarrassment of being a victim. The bully feels empowered through intimidation of others, but when the victim(s) take the power back then the bully loses their strength and influence. Talking about it and speaking out against it will help to destigmatize bullying because without that imbalance of power the behavior eventually stops. Together we can beat bullying.

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



RSSB planners set theater for SFAB

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan -

The 1St Security Force Assistance Brigade has landed in Afghanistan, marking a significant shift in the US Military's mission to support the Afghan National Defense Security Forces.

The SFAB is a brand new unit within the US Army, activated last month, specially prepared to train, advise and assist the ANDSF as they develop into a force capable of defending their country.

The SFAB is made up of more than 1,200 Soldiers who will be spread across several operating bases throughout Afghanistan. The unit also has "enablers" or support personnel that ensures the SFAB Soldiers are able to conduct their mission. Enablers include military and civilian personnel to provide food service, surveillance and force protection in support of the SFAB.

This massive influx of personnel into Afghanistan required enormous planning and preparation, and was supported by the Soldiers of the 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade. This required coordination between many different agencies and units throughout the Combined Joint Operations Area – Afghanistan.

"We linked up with US Forces -Afghanistan, Resolute Support, and different branches within the Armed Forces in order to set the CJOA-A," said Capt. Homir Batalla, the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB Operations Planner, who oversaw much of the planning and coordination to bring the SFAB into theater.

Since the 3rd ID RSSB arrived in theater last October, setting the theater for the SFAB's arrival has been one of their top priorities.

Batalla said that he has been attending several meetings each week with military personnel stationed throughout the country. During these meeting they discuss where the SFAB personnel will go and what needs to be done at those locations to make sure there's space and infrastructure for them.

"The number one priority for the Resolute Support commander is force protection," said Batalla. "That had to be established before sending any new servicemembers or civilians anywhere."

In addition to security, planners had to ensure all basic life support needs like shelter and food would be met.

"Once [force protection] was set, we could send in engineers to build up the bases," said Batalla. Engineers built and expanded barracks and ensured there was enough power and running water for the new occupants.

The RSSB's Supply Operations section is broken down by commodities and classes of supply. For example, one section handles all food and drinking water, while another handles ammunition and a third handles fuel. All these different sections worked together to make sure the bases were able to expand enough to support more personnel.

Capt. Ashley Mabry, the RSSB's SPO officer in charge of distribution, worked alongside Batalla to make sure all the requirements met by the respective commodities sections within the SPO.

"There was a multitude of supply requirements," said Mabry. "We couldn't have done it without the subject matter experts from each of the commodities sections."

"We had to bring in tents and generators," said Master Sgt. Barbara Taylor, RSSB SPO noncommissioned officer in charge of distribution, who worked handin-hand with Mabry in making sure the SPO section got every required piece of equipment or vehicle where it needed to be. "Also, we had to coordinate to bring in weapon systems like artillery and aircraft from Iraq."

Since the 1st SFAB is the first unit of its kind, planners couldn't necessarily look to previous cases to see what to

expect. There were a lot of questions at first with few answers and everything from incoming troop numbers to protection requirements were in a constant state of flux.

"You had to be flexible," said Taylor. "You could plan for one situation and the next thing you know it changed. Everything was always changing."

With most of the movement happening in late winter, the country and environment tested the resiliency of the planners and movers during the set up operation.

"Weather has been challenging," said Batalla. "It slowed movement down and made it difficult to ensure all locations are fully prepared in time for the arrival."

The challenges our sustainers face will not end once the SFAB is settled either. All told, the SFAB and their enablers will add more than a thousand people into theater, said Batalla. The RSSB, who oversee all sustainment operations throughout Afghanistan, will have to ensure they are fed and supplied, as well as the rest of theater.

"There's going to be a need for additional support requirements," said Mabry. "You need more food, more fuel, more billeting space for these people on the ground. Our RSSB will be heavily relied upon to support these new personnel."

All the difficulties aside, though, the sustainment planners are excited and relieved to see the Soldiers and enablers of the 1st SFAB getting settled into theater. And they're honored to be a part of this important shift in strategy

"I'm just excited to see them come in," said Taylor, "to see all your planning come to light, and to be a part of history.'

1st SFAB uncases colors, partners with ANDSF

ADVISOR PLATFORM LIGHTNING, Afghanistan

– The 1st Security Force Assistance Brigade and its six battalions uncased their colors across Afghanistan Mar 15, symbolically beginning their mission to train, advise and assist the Afghan National Defense and Security Forces.

The deployment of the 1st SFAB marks the first time the Army's newest unit — specially designed to partner with and enable allied conventional forces — is operationally employed by a combatant command.

The 1st SFAB's headquarters uncased their colors during a ceremony at Advisor Platform Lightning in the Southeastern province of Paktiya. An uncasing ceremony is an Army tradition in which a unit removes their colors from a protective case symbolizing their readiness to begin their mission in a deployed location.

The brigade's six battalions, which are spread all across Afghanistan in seven of the NATO Resolute Support Mission's Train, Advise, Assist Commands and Task Forces, uncased their colors the same day.

"I couldn't be more proud of this great team of combat advisors," said Col. Scott Jackson, the 1st SFAB Commander. "In less than a year, these outstanding professionals came together and built a brigade from

the ground up, completed an intense training program and deployed to Afghanistan, fully ready to partner with the ANDSF."

The unit's advising capacity represents an augmentation of the existing capability that exists across the seven facets of advising already resident in the Resolute Support Mission. 1st SFAB takes advising to a lower tactical level to expand the advising effort across the

The majority of SFAB Soldiers have Afghanistan combat deployments under their belts, are culturally astute and after undergoing special training, have now volunteered to return. What differentiates the SFAB from other RS elements is not just the U.S. Soldiers' experience, but the fact they will be working closer to the conflict's front lines than trainers have done in recent years. With focused teams dedicated to specific units, commanders will be able to tailor support to the ANA for a specific situation.

Advisors in 1st SFAB will partner with Afghan National Army kandaks – the ANA equivalent of a battalion - in each of the TAACs and Task Forces in Afghanistan. Conventional force advising at this level of operation has not been seen for several years.

The advisors will also partner with several ANA brigade headquarters, and the 1st SFAB brigade headquarters will partner with the ANA's 203rd Corps headquarters in Task Force Southeast.

In addition to the advisors from 1st SFAB, several hundred soldiers from 1st Battalion, 28th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division, deployed with 1st SFAB to serve as their security force element. The security force helps the advisors focus on their partners while keeping both advisors and their Afghan partners

The 1st SFAB, which activated in August and cased its colors in February at Fort Benning, conducted an extensive training program to prepare for this mission. The training included the newly formed Military Advisor Training Academy and culminated in a unique security force assistance-focused mission readiness exercise at the Joint Readiness Training Center at Fort

The SFAB concept comes directly from Army Chief of Staff, Gen. Mark Milley, who envisioned new, specially-trained formations built to enable combatant commanders to accomplish theater security objectives by, with and through allied and partnered indigenous

The SFAB will enable offensive operations in multiple ANA corps simultaneously. As such, they will serve as a key element of the Resolute Support campaign to apply constant military pressure against the enemy. It is a full, integrated approach to the battle space, which will drive us and the Afghan military to attain our objectives.

Sgt. First Class Randall Pike, the public affairs operations noncommissioned officer with the 3rd ID, won two first place awards in the news and feature photo catego-

Pike, who is currently deployed to Afghanistan with the Marne division headquarters, said he submitted three photos to the competition. One photo was included in the Army's 2017 year in photos. Pike has discovered a passion for photography.

DES CORNER:Distracted driving increases with technology

We have all experienced it one way or another: You are at a red light, and when the light turns green, two or three vehicles proceed forward, but one car remains; it might as well be parked there. The driver was so involved in texting that he or she did not realize the light was green and was now impeding traffic flow. Not only can impeding traffic instigate road rage, but texting while driving is against the law on the installation. Fort Stewart 32 CFR 634.25 (c) (3) prohibits the use of cell phone and other electronic devices while operating a motor vehicle. The information is at each gate.

There are three types of distracted driving:

Visual: Taking your eyes off the

road

Manual: Taking your hands off the wheel.

<u>Cognitive</u>: Taking your mind off what you're doing.

Distracted driver accidents. com notes some of the chief causes for accidents. The site

notes:
 • Over 2.5 million people in the United States are involved in road accidents each year. The population of the US is just 318.9 mil-

- Of these, 1.6 million have a cell phone involved. That is 64 percent of all the road accidents in the United States. Over half the road accidents in the United States have cell phones involved, and if this doesn't make you realize just how potent it is, what will?
- Every year, about 421,000 people are injured in crashes that have involved a driver who was

distracted in some way.

- Each year, over 330,000 accidents caused by texting while driving lead to severe injuries. This means that over 78 percent of all distracted drivers are distracted because they have been texting while driving.
- One out of four car accidents in the U.S. is caused by texting while driving.
- Texting and driving are six times more likely to get you in an accident than drunk driving. That's right; it is actually safer for someone to get drunk and get behind the wheel than to text and do it

Please think about and discuss with any new drivers in your family. Set the example for them if you need to answer your phone (without hands-free devices); pull over to a safe place and stop your vehicle.





Red Cross drivers give selfless services

"On an average, we pick up anywhere from 36 to 60, depending on the day," King said. "So, that's 60 people that we pick up on a daily basis, and give them a ride up to the hospital."

King is just one of the many members who make up

King is just one of the many members who make up the volunteer transportation team at Winn. The transportation program is the brainchild of retired Col. Dick Webb.

"Colonel Webb called me up at my house and said 'Sergeant major, what are you doing these days?' I told him that I was looking for a position to do some volunteering, and I started with him, and I've been out here ever since," King said.

The innovative program began in 2007, and at that time King was the first recruit. As the program continued to grow, so did the interest from other individuals looking to make a difference for the beneficiaries at Winn.

"When I started, I had a strong feeling that everybody has to have a mission," Webb said. "This program, the golf cart transportation program, was my mission." King's mission and the golf cart program, as a whole, took on a different meaning during the early December 2017 mass casualty event involving a school bus crash. During that time, the Red Cross utilized King and the other volunteers to transport Family members who were

desperately searching to find their children.

"We were picking up people in the parking lot that weren't familiar with Winn ACH," King said. "More than one said how much they appreciated having somebody meet them in the parking lot."

For King, this program allows him the opportunity to provide a valuable service to Soldiers and their Families. Whether it's a mother and child or someone just looking for lunch at the dining facility, King believes each passenger has value, and it is his job to get them to their destination.

"If I pick up one mother with three kids in the back parking lot and give her a ride up to the

done something for that day," King said.

Webb and the army of volunteers said they happily provide transportation services to the beneficiaries at Winn Army Community Hospital, and they don't have plans of stopping anytime soon.



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

Pregnancy program earns certification

The nation-wide Centering Pregnancy program has been in full operation since March 28, 2017, at U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, at Winn Army Community Hospital. Winn ACH and the OB/GYN department received their official certification from the Centering Healthcare Institute for the centering program in 11 months, which is a milestone for the center-

"We've been doing this for less than a year," MEDDAC Chief, OB/GYN, Maj. Mariann Fark said. "This is what we were striving for, [yet] not anticipating getting it so soon, but the program is thriving, so we're very excited we got the certification early."

Throughout the first year of the program the centering team enhanced the patient experience by building lasting relationships with providers and their beneficiaries.

"I have women that email me for any questions they have instead of calling the clinic and trying to book an appointment," said Nancy Guzman, MEDDAC, licensed practical nurse. "It's just so close knit and up close and personal with each individual patient and amongst the group."

First time mother, Pfc. Lauren Lowe, appreciated having the support net-

work during her pregnancy journey.

"I've bonded with a lot of people here because my boyfriend is deployed right now," Lowe said. "I don't really have anybody here with me because my Family is so far away, so some of the girls have been really supportive and always there."

Most of the women who have participated in the centering program are bonded by their shared experiences and stand ready to provide meaningful support for their fellow mothers.

"You can call me if you need someone to come to the delivery room for you," expectant mother, Holly Barnes said. "We are there for you. We know what you are going through."

For the Centering team the ties these women build is the foundation of a lasting relationship between patients and providers.

"Most of them have just bonded so well," MEDDAC, Centering Pregnancy Coordinator, Starr Rivera said. "They've just become great friends. I know one of our first groups they meet monthly now

Besides providing an open environment where expectant parents can build a lasting support network, the evidenced based centering pregnancy program also improves breastfeeding rates, decreases preterm labor and fosters a decrease

still, after the babies are almost six-months-old."



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CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Following the Bergamini Family in WWII

Our influence in the South Pacific is hotly contested. The United States has been involved militarily in this region three times during the last century.

The United States remains involved today because more than one trillion dollars of trade transits the shipping corridors of the South China Sea annually. The United States' interests in the region goes back to 1898 when the Treaty of Paris ended the Spanish-American War. This treaty granted the United States sovereignty over a number of former Spanish colonies. These former colonies include Puerto Rico, the Philippines, and Guam. Today, the region of the South Pacific is once again in the news cycle.

The United States, China, Russia, Japan, and South Korea all pursue their own national interests while dealing with the current North Korean wildcard. Army Chaplains like to tell stories.

Let me tell you a story about an American boy named David Bergamini. Bergamini was a boy living with his parents in the Chinese city of Hankow in 1937. He was born in Japan, but had lived throughout Asia. His father was an engineer and architect. When the Japanese invaded China, the Bergamini family was forced to flee.

Bergamini remembers saying to an English boy: "Of course I want the Japanese to win, the Japanese are clean and the Chinese are dirty. The Japanese work and the Chinese beg. The Japs make machines and the Chinese only break them." The other boy replied, "I should say you're a bloody Nazi." With this the two boys exchanged blows; this fistfight occurred one week before the first Japanese raid on China in 1937. The boys were nine years old.

Eventually the Bergamini family and other Westerners were evacuated through Japanese and Chinese lines to Shanghai. From Shanghai, they traveled to the United States' possession of the Philippines.

War in the South Pacific followed the Bergamini family. Japan's intention was to become

the major, dominant power in the South Pacific. The United States intended to remain a major power in the South Pacific.

On Dec. 7, 1941 Japan brought war to the United States by attacking Pearl Harbor. The United States lost 3,581 persons; these were all killed or wounded.

Two military chaplains died at Pearl Harbor. Father Aloysius Schmitt died when the USS Oklahoma capsized after three torpedoes ripped her underside.

Survivors of the Oklahoma reported that Chaplain Schmitt died "assisting several other sailors to get through a porthole before he drowned.' Chaplain Thomas Kirkpatrick

died when the USS Arizona went down; there is no record of his last few minutes. On Dec. 27, 1941, the American




