## Newest ABCT earns Sullivan Cup

FORT BENNING, Ga. - The Sullivan Cup, a biennial competition to determine the best tank crew in the Army through a series of scored tests, finished today with Company B, 3rd Combined Arms Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division from Fort Stewart, Georgia, earning the top spot May 4 here.

After several days of competition, the tank crews performed one final timed event May 4.

Staggered by their points placement on the morning of the last day, the tank crews ran a of May 4. On the field, the crewmembers performed several tank-related physical and mental tasks. Crewmembers also completed five burpees between each station, and there was a five-burpee penalty for incorrect responses and failures on tasks.

After the completion of the final competitive event, tallies were made of the scores from throughout the competition. The top finishers in the Sullivan Cup were:

- 1st place: B Company, 3rd Battalion, 67th Armored Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, from Fort Stewart, Georgia
- 2nd place: C Company, 1st Battalion, 1.7-mile route to Brave Rifles Field the morning 16th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade

Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division from Fort Riley, Kansas 3rd place: 2nd Tank Battalion, 2nd

Marine Division from Camp Lejeune, North Brig. Gen. David A. Lesperance, comman-

dant of the U.S. Army Armor School at the Maneuver Center of Excellence, spoke at the competition's closing ceremony.

"Never in my wildest imagination would I have guessed that the competition would have delivered what it did for the army today," said Lesperance. "They truly have identified the best tank crew and tank crews the Army has to offer today."

### Aircraft crash investigated

An investigation is underway to determine what may have caused a Puerto Rico Air National Guard WC-130H "Hercules" cargo aircraft to crash May 2 about 11:30 a.m. near Savannah Hilton Head International Airport shortly after takeoff.

Nine airmen from the Puerto Rico ANG aboard the aircraft died as result of the crash.

People in the area at the time of the incident who may have witnessed the event or captured imagery are asked to email any information they have to the team of investigators at savsafetyboard@gmail.com.

"An investigation is currently in progress to determine the cause of this tragic event and ways to prevent such occurrences in the future," said Col. Pete Boone, 165th Airlift Wing vice commander. "It is extremely important to us to fully understand what has happened."

"I can assure you the United States Air Force will conduct a thorough investigation in hopes to minimize the chances of such occurrences from happening in the future," said Boone. "Any speculation at this point without having all the details could affect the outcome of the investigation."



### 24 local military veterans head to Nation's capital

**Hunter hosts CAB redeployment symposium**

For the 18th time since the inaugural Honor Flight on October 24, 2009, Honor Flight Savannah sponsored 24 military veterans from the local area with a trip to Washington, D.C. May 4 – 6 to see the various war memorials built and dedicated to honor their service and sacrifices in past wars. Veterans will also view the Changing of Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery.

The 24 veterans brings Honor Flight Savannah's total number of World War II and Korean and Vietnam War veterans being honored to more than 1,200, since the start of the program.

"This means a lot to a lot of people," said Sam Hollis, a 92-year-old veteran of World War II who is going on the trip. "I am looking forward to associating with some of these guys," added the former Soldier who served in Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army.

Veterans now travel by charter bus. Transportation, meals and lodging are free to participating veterans. Each veteran is assigned an escort.

"I/m proud to be here with other citizens who have come forward to support these veterans," said Bonnie Humphrey, an escort for a Vietnam Veteran.

"It's always humbling to stand in the presence of greatness," said Lt. Col. Ken Dwyer, in his remarks to the veterans and those in attendance to see the veterans off. "For the veterans that we honor today, there are no words to express the thanks that our country owes you. The freedoms we enjoy in this great nation exist because of your courage, because of your commitment and because of your sacrifice."

The Honor Flight Network has transported thousands of veterans from across the United States. Honor Flight Savannah's market includes Coastal Georgia and South Carolina's Low Country. Friday's trip includes one veteran of World War II, three from the Korean War and 20 from the Vietnam War.

The first day of competition included a stress shoot adapted specifically for tank crews and a ranked simulated combat maneuver exercise. On the second days, the crews conducted a live-fire exercise and a situational training exercise. The scored events were meant to represent both what tank crews trained on and what they could expect in combat.

"What do we expect of a tank crew in our Army today?" Lesperance asked rhetorically during the closing ceremony. "We expect that tank crew to be able to survive, maneuver to a point of positional advantage, to get our weapons into the fight and to deliver first-round lethality and have an effect on our target and have our target destroyed." Staff Sgt. Johnathan Werner, tank commander, Cpl. Justin Harris, gunner, Pvt.

Brandon Zacher, loader, and Pvt. Dekken Sanders, driver, the winning tank crew from 2nd ABCT, 3rd ID, had only worked together for a few months before joining the competition.

"It's pretty intense for the past roughly three months, but we gave it our all,"

said Harris. Werner described the competition as "fierce."

"This is stuff that we do on a day-to-day basis - tanker grade gunnery, maneuvering – this is our job," said Werner. "But when you put everyone in one area, the best of the best you possibly in the entire world, and then you compete and you have a bunch of alpha males, it kind of speaks for itself."

Werner echoed Lesperance's belief in the real-life use of the training they received during the competition.

"The way they facilitated the training, just by the book, the way they did the props for the gunnery, the way they did the STX training and the stress shoot, it was a little more realistic for combat engagement," said Werner. "We should be able to take that back to the units and implement that on a lower level, not necessarily just for competitors. But if we can do this worldwide and have the worldwide training, the way the Army can, it's what we really need to work toward."

Both Zacher and Sanders, who have been in the Army for less than a year, found it strange to return to Fort Benning after finishing their basic training here. Sanders described the experience as "surreal." Zacher appreciated seeing his trainers.

"It's been pretty great seeing some of our old drill sergeants and shaking their hands," said Zacher. "They've been rooting for us, so it feels great."


This term only means "access to use the Military Healthhcare System," but with limitations. "Direct Care" should never be considered as insurance.



### Sweat and grit: 3rd ID announces NCO and Soldier of the Year

Third Infantry Division announced the winners of this year's Noncommissioned Officer and Soldier of the Year Competition, May 7, at Fort Stewart, Georgia.

Staff Sgt. Joshua Jacques and Spc. Jamie Martinez-Feliciano, fire support specialists with 1st Battalion, 9th Artillery Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division Artillery, will go on to compete in the XVIII Airborne Corps Best Warrior competition in June.

The three-day competition consisted of events that measured the Soldiers physical and mental toughness, resilience and tactical proficiency.

A total of six NCOs and six Soldiers represented various units across the Marne Division.

"The Soldiers were put through the ringer to select the best and test their ability to perform at the next level," said Sgt. 1st Class Jeffery Johnson, operations sergeant for the 3rd ID and the noncommissioned officer in charge of the competition.

To test the bounds of each Soldier's ability, competitors had to go through an array of events including a physical fitness test, weapons qualifications, stress shoot, obstacle course, swim race, ruck march, land navigation course, written exam and a board.

"I needed to push past my limits," said Pfc. Sevon Blakney, a radio and communication security repairer with the 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd ID Sustainment Brigade. "You're competing against everybody to be the best."

Johnson said the competitors were judged on a point system for each event. First place received 100 points, second place received 90 points and third place received 80 points.

Some competitors use different motivators to carry them throughout the competition.

"My mom was my biggest motivation," Blakney said. "We grew up impoverished, with my mom raising eight kids on her own in a two-bedroom apartment while going to nursing school and working a job. She just kept driving on to keep us fed."

Equally determined - Cpl. Janelle Travis, a combat medic assigned to 2nd Combined Arms Battalion, 69th Armor Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, said she needed to treat this competition like her rigorous fitness regimen and fight through the pain.

"The ruck march was especially challenging because it came after a really physical day," Travis said. "With physical fitness being a top priority in my life, I used my training and embraced the suck."

Competitors like Travis, drew on the encouragement and faith leaders had in her to make it through the competition.

"To succeed, I really just kept thinking about how Command Sgt. Maj. Jonathan E. Reffeor encouraged me to compete and vouched for me. That carried me through," Travis said. "I didn't want to let him down."

Travis said her biggest lesson from this competition is how diverse a competitor has to be to successfully navigate through the challenges.

Blakney said he learned just how much it takes to go through a competition like this and will continue training to enhance his physical readiness and his capability.

"I think the Soldier's biggest takeaway from the competition is knowing what they have to shoot for in future NCO and Soldier of the year competitions," Johnson said. "They can talk about this competition with the Soldiers in their unit and motivate them to participate in the future."

Jacques and Martinez-Feliciano will spend the next few weeks preparing for the XIII Airborne Corps Best warrior competition.

"It's taking great Soldiers who are going to help great Soldiers," he said.







### DES CORNER:

### **All-terrain vehicle safety**

In Georgia, all-terrain vehicle (ATV) riding is an all-time favorite pastime, where most riders enjoy the experience of off-road activities such as trail riding and "mudding". ATVs are powerful equipment, with some weighing more than 800 pounds and having the ability to exceed 50 mph. To exacerbate the safety concerns is the ATV's high center of gravity and the lack of roll bars, safety cages, or seatbelts. Simply stated, ATVs roll easily and can throw riders or worse-roll onto riders; with the potential of causing serious inju-

AR 385-10, which also governs motorcycle safety, states that personnel who operate privately owned ATVs should complete appropriate operator safety training.

First, when operated on any DOD installation, in both on- and off-road modes, all Governmentowned or privately owned ATVs (when equipped) must have headlights turned on at all times, except where prohibited by military mission, the SOFAs, or local laws. As a result, Commanders must ensure that all individuals covered by this regulation are wearing the following PPE while operating ATVs or other of-road vehicles on the

installation and all Soldiers at any time on or off Army installations.

(1) Helmets. (a) For personnel riding motorcycles and ATVs in the United States, helmets must be certified to meet DOT Safety Standard No. 218, United Nations Economic Commission for Europe Standard 22-05, British Standard 6658, or Snell Standard M2005 according to DODI 6055.04, 20 April 2009, Change 2, references (w), (x), (y), and (z). (c) All helmets must be properly fastened under the chin.

(2) Eye protection. Eye protection must be designed to meet or exceed ANSI Z87.1, reference (z) for impact and shatter resistance which includes goggles, wraparound glasses, or a fullface shield (properly attached to a helmet). A windshield or fairing does not constitute eye protection.

(3) Foot protection. Foot protection includes sturdy over-the-ankle footwear that affords protection for the feet and ankles (durable leather or ballistic-type cloth athletic shoes that cover the ankles may be worn).

(4) Protective clothing. Protective clothing includes long-sleeved shirt or jacket, long trousers, and full-fingered gloves or mittens made from leather or other abrasion-resistant material. Motorcycles jackets and pants constructed of abrasion resistant materials (such as leather, Kevlar®, or Cordura®) and containing impactabsorbing padding are strongly encouraged. Riders are encouraged to select PPE that incorporates fluorescent colors and retro-reflective material.

(5) Government-owned ATVs. When riding Government-owned tactical ATVs, riders must wear additional PPE. As such, riders' PPE must include knee and shin guards and padded gloves. Additionally, Unit commanders may authorize using combat helmets for operating ATVs tactical vehicles during operations and training based on an operational risk assessment.

However, before any tactical ATV operations, operators must be trained on the tactical operations and on the controls that have been implemented to mitigate hazards. Curriculum and proficiency training Government-furnished (tactical and non- tactical) ATVs will be tailored to satisfy specific mission objectives. Consequently, riders must both motorcycle safety course and the Specialty Vehicle Institute of America-based course.

Remember PPE is a mandatory Always wear the required PPE as stated above and enjoy your trail blazing adventure, but please be safe and look out for others.

# Provider Stakes brings RSSB leadership together

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan - Leaders from across the 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade conducted Provider Stakes at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan, April 23-24.

Provider Stakes is a quarterly leader professional development session for command teams within the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB footprint. Unlike previous iterations held at the unit's home station of Fort Stewart, this is the first one conducted downrange, with task organized units not normally part of the 3rd Inf. Div. Sustainment Bde. footprint participating.

"This gives the command teams a chance to interact with each other," said 1st Lt. Jacob Diebel, the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB provost marshal who organized the two-day event, "and also offers a competitive forum where they can work through some tasks that they don't regularly

The first day of the event focused on testing the leaders' knowledge of basic warrior tasks and battle drills (WTBD). In mixed-gender teams of three, the participants strapped on their rucksacks and moved out to several stations on Bagram, where they were given a scenario and had to complete tasks including calling for fire and air support, reacting to a chemical attack, and first aid.

"These tasks are things that every Soldier in the Army should know, regardless of rank," said Diebel. "It's important that leaders retain that knowledge, so they better

understand what their Soldiers are doing."

Following the WTBD course, the teams moved out to the range, where they qualified on the M9 pistol and M4 rifle, and were also tasked to assemble and disassemble a 240B machine gun and M249 squad automatic weapon.

While these larger weapons aren't normally assigned to command teams or senior Soldiers, Diebel said it's important that they still understand the weapons because their junior Soldiers will be carrying them.

The following day started with another physical event, as the teams conducted the Army Combat Readiness Test, a proposed replacement for the traditional Army Physical Fitness Test, which is still in development.

The proposed ACRT does away with the pushups and situps of the APFT replacing them with deadlifts, sled drags and a medicine ball toss among other exercises, according to the Army Times. It's a noticeable departure from the traditional APFT that many of these Soldiers have been supervising for years.

"I'm very excited about the proposed ACRT," said Command Sgt. Maj. Toby Grisham, senior enlisted advisor to the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB. "It has one standard for all Soldiers, and is very doable to pass but extremely difficult to max, so Soldiers will have to really push themselves out of their comfort zones to achieve excellence."

Diebel said in addition to including a physical competition, his intent was to give the commanders and other leaders exposure to the proposed ACRT before it takes effect.

The final event of Provider Stakes was at the Bagram sling load yard, where the teams were shown how to packages bundles to be slung under aircraft. After the lesson, the teams each packed their own bundles from scratch, strapping the cargo nets on to the boxes and making sure the bundles would be ready for air travel.

The commander's intent for the exercise was to push leadership at all levels throughout the RSSB to reinforce basic skills that they may be rusty on. Grisham said the event did just that.

FORT SAM HOUSTON TEXAS - Get the crafting tools ready and the creative mind flowing, it is almost time for the 2018 Army Arts and Crafts contest.

The 2018 contest, held by the Morale, Welfare and Recreation G9 division of the U.S. Army Installation Management Command, will begin taking entries June 11 through Aug 13. Edmonds, a cost benefit analyst for the Army Capabilities Integration Center at Fort Lee, Virginia, and an operations officer at the 200th Military Police Command at Fort Meade, Maryland, attributes his interest in wood working to his family

"[My] interest is hereditary as my patriarchal lineage is littered with carpenters and builders, but I honestly did not get into it myself until my late 20's," Edmonds said. "My wife needed a scrapbooking cabinet to better house her supplies and books which got me off and running."

From permanent change of station to work, Edmonds has been creating art for the past six years as his schedule allows. His inspiration for his winning piece "Infant changing table" was his daughter-

"My wife was pregnant and doing all of

the heavy lifting making our daughter. As a father, there were limited things that I could do for her in the womb. I wanted to use the skills I have as a wood worker to make her some furniture that was not just to fill the immediate need, but something that she could pass on to her daughter someday," Edmonds said.

Edmonds enjoys woodworking because of its utility. He enjoy using a piece of rough wood to fill a need in his family.

"Instead of going out and buying something from Ikea, which would be much cheaper, I can build a custom piece that not only fills the required function, but can look beautiful in the process," Edmonds said. "There is no better feeling than when you can put that first coat of finish on a piece and see it come to life, transformed from raw dull wood to something living and color-

Contestants who have received a college degree or class credits in the arts or have received professional awards enter as an accomplished artist; those who have not enter as a novice artist.

Among the colorful works of winning art from the 2017 contest is Marie Powell's piece "Here Comes the Sun." Her mosaic tile work won first place for mixed media in the novice division. Powell entered as an MWR patron, her husband is an Army retiree. Powell who has been making mosaics

for 11 year, started while living in Vicenza, Italy, where she took a class. She then taught herself with books and years of practice. She said every time she makes a new piece she learns something new. The winning work of art displays a

bright sun surrounded by shades of blue and the appearance of a compass.

"'Here comes the sun' is a special piece, and one that shows my skill at using color, shapes and design after many years of creating mosaics. [It] is one of the best

mosaics I have made, and I thought it

could be recognized," Powell said. "It is a

hand-drawn design using ideas from many photos and the glass tiles I use come in beautiful bright colors perfect for the

Powell enjoys the craft because of its therapeutic qualities.

"Being a mosaic artist is relaxing, and the process itself is always interesting. Even when I am not happy with the result, I am always looking forward to starting again," Powell said.

Powell has entered the contest a total of three times. Among those retuning to the contest is Monica Dahl, spouse of retired Lt. Col David Dahl. She won first and third place in the painting category for the accomplished division in 2017.

Dahl, a veteran painter, also won third place for drawing in 2015, third place and honorable mention for drawing and painting in 2012, third place for drawing and second for painting in 2011.

Dahl's works "Gratitude" and "Retired at Last" landed her first and third place in the 2017 contest. Her inspiration for "Gratitude" came from a previous piece, "Danita's Children."

"Danita started her school, hospital and orphanage in Haiti. This was a photograph of a little girl who came with her father
