3ID HQ, Rocky return home

The 3rd Infantry Division headquarters uncased its colors during a transfer of authority ceremony, signifying the unit's official return from Afghanistan, May 18 at Fort Stewart.

The unit deployed for nine months in support of Operation Resolute Support, the mission to train, advise and assist its Afghan partners. The division also served as the headquarters for U.S. Army Forces-Afghanistan to counter and prevent the spread of terrorism. The ceremony transferred command authority from the provisional headquarters, Task Force Marne, back to the 3rd ID. Task Force Marne ensured Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield provided the best support possible while the headquarters was deployed. the 3rd ID headquarters since 2003, and the third deployment to Afghanistan.

Speaking to reporters prior to the ceremony, Command Sgt. Maj. Daniel Hendrex, the 3rd ID senior enlisted advisor, said that since the division's last deployment, and even during the nine months the division spent in-country, things were changing for the better

"It's shifted tremendously," said Hendrex, "It's changed dramatically even from a year ago...there was a sense of movement, almost a window of opportunity that you felt. Not only with U.S. and coalition forces, but really the political climate within that country...we're now in a train, advise, and assist mission." In his remarks, Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, the 3rd ID commanding general, focused on the accomplishments of the Soldiers, Families, and civilians who supported the division, both at home and abroad. "We are back and so proud of what our Dog Face Soldiers have accomplished both in Afghanistan and here at Fort Stewart. This uncasing ceremony celebrates the dedication to mission success by so many people," said Quintas. "We could not do what we do, without the unwavering support of the coastal Georgia community. They play a critical role in taking care of our Soldiers and Families when we're deployed."

In support of the services' Voting Assistance Program, the U.S. Army has designated the June 25 through July 5 as Armed Forces Voters Week. During this week, commanders are encouraged to intensify efforts to contact all assigned personnel, ensure they are of aware of voting requirements and are provided the necessary information regarding voting resource. This effort will ensure all personnel are postured to vote in the upcoming 2018 midterm elections.

Armed Forces Voters Week provides the ideal opportunity for voter's to receive key materials such as the Federal Post Card Application. The FPCA can be used to register to vote while simultaneously requesting an absentee ballot. It can also be used to submit a change of address to your local election officials. You can now go online to *www.fvap.gov* External site and use the FPCA Wizard that will help you register, request your absentee ballot or change your address while providing you with all of your state-specific information and requirements to vote! The FPCA allows eligible U.S. citizens to apply to register to vote, request an absentee ballot and/or update their mailing addresses after you change stations, deployments and reintegration.

Voting is both a privilege and a responsibility of citizens in our great democracy. Your personal involvement will go a long way to ensuring the success and effectiveness of this important program.

During the period of June 27 through July 5, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. our key installation voting officers will have a voting assistance booth setup at the Main Post Exchange to assist and answer any questions you may have concerning voting assistance. Your unit voting assistance office can help you fill in and mail off your voting materials if you need the assistance.

IMCOM CG: The Value of Army Civilians

Lt. Gen. Kenneth R. Dahl Commanding General, U.S. IMCOM

FORT SAM HOUSTON TEXAS, - One of the great lessons I've learned as Commanding General of U.S. Army Installation Management Command is to value the diversity and contributions of Army civilians.

Before taking command of IMCOM and its 50,000 plus cohort of civilian professionals, I had little experience in leading or working alongside them. I was

ambivalent about their role in making our Army ready. I had no appreciation for how vital their leadership is to the continuity and success of everything we do. Now, after witnessing the wisdom, dedication, technical expertise and professionalism of Army civilians in a personal way, I feel obliged to champion their service.

After visiting 80 installation communities around the world, I am as familiar with today's Army as anyone. It is clear to me that our Army could not do all of what it is expected to do without civilians in nearly every command, in some cases side-by-side in theater.

Civilian professionals provide foundational con-



tinuity in times of turbulence; design, test and field our weapon systems; play critical roles in supporting Soldiers and their Families; maintain our training facilities; and myriad other critical tasks that give Soldiers the freedom to focus on warfighting. Army civilians are integral to readiness, and a part of the team I have grown to accurately value and appreciate.

Can we improve the system? You bet, but we should not paint all Army civilians with the same brush

based on limited experiences where a small number have made a bad impression or had a negative impact. Detractors of employing civilians should think through the alternatives. Totally contractors? Have Soldiers do everything? These solutions are often more expensive and can negatively impact Army readiness in serious ways.

Army Civilians are probably the most efficient and effective way to sustain readiness. Their contributions are priceless; our nation simply cannot purchase their level of loyalty and commitment. They are part of the Army's DNA. I encourage more Army leaders to learn and understand this important truth sooner than I did.

"I love it here in America, and I can tell my daughter loves it too," said ThuSang White.

Diana said coming from Vietnam, the U.S. has offered her a lot of opportunities since she naturalized and even more since she joined the military.

Students explore careers in medicine

A Georgia Liberty County School System bus pulled up to the curb at U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Winn Army Community Hospital, and 24 medical students disembarked for what the staff at Winn ACH hoped would be a life changing tour May 4.

Liberty College and Career Academy, along with local businesses provide students, from both Liberty County high schools, training and skills needed to find worthwhile work in Liberty County after graduation. According to Dr. Pamela Scott, LCCA's goal is to teach students the basic fundamental skills in healthcare in subjects of medical terminology, microbiology and basic life support.

The prospective medical students were greeted by Sgt. Joseph Drumgold and the Winn non-commissioned officer in charge of the Department of Pathology, Sgt. 1st Class Justin Auschwitz. Auschwitz said it was important for the students to take a tour of the pathology department, because many times the lab in most television and movies settings are often overlooked, which gives students a narrow view of the medical field.

"We're the unsung heroes... because without a laboratory you can't really conduct a lot of the operations that a hospital would normally be able to," Auschwitz said. "From blood banking, and hematology, well you need those in order to preform surgeries. Microbiology and chemistry, you need those to also help out with surgeries, but also help diagnose patients."

As the students toured the various parts of the pathology department, they were able to visit sections of the hospital not often, and most hope to never see, such as the morgue. Most of the students appeared highly interested in the various peutic services, nursing essentials and complete a nursing internship parts of the morgue.

found in the human body that are either naturally occurring or unnaturally occurring," Auschwitz said.

These findings help the pathologist determine not just cause of death or illness, but they are also able to help doctors evaluate and diagnose patients with various diseases.

LCCA Business and Community Coordinator, Connie Bragg, initiated the field trip. Bragg said she was excited for the opportunity to tour Winn ACH, because although students may think they are interested in a particular field of work, actually meeting the laboratory professionals is important.

"In the classroom they're taught, and they hear about these things, but going to Winn hospital gave them the opportunity to actually see some of it in action,' Bragg said. "A lot of times they think it's the nurses or doctors, no look at all these people who have degrees in the medical field and the different jobs and opportunities they have to work in that field."

Jada Naftzinger, a Bradwell Institute and LCCA student, said she found the tour exciting and fun because of her interest in the medical field.

"They just showed us the different slides and little plates of the different bacteria," Naftzinger said. "I know there's a lot of different kinds out there. They are totally different things and they have their own smells and characteristics.' Specialist Kiara Drumgold, a medical laboratory specialist at Winn, a selfproclaimed lover of microbiology, said she did not have an opportunity to tour a hospital in high school. Drumgold said she thought the tour is beneficial for the students because it helps them plan for the future.

Once the students complete their Allied Health curriculum at LCCA they would have taken classes in introduction to healthcare science, application of thera-

Brig. Gen. John B. Richardson IV, the 3rd ID deputy commanding general for maneuver and Brig. Gen. Sean C. Bernabe, the Task Force Marne commander were honored for their contributions and service to the division.

Today's farewell signifies the end of a tour of duty with the 3rd Infantry Division for two outstanding general officers and their families, said Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, the 3rd ID commanding general. "The ceremony today is an opportunity for the division to recognize the Bernabes and Richardsons for their amazing contributions to Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield, the 3rd Infantry Division, and the Army."

Bernabe served as the installation's senior commander during the division headquarters' nine-month deployment to Afghanistan.

Artillery SGM offers advice to the NCO Corps after 32 years of service

Johnson offered up professional development sessions conducted by senior leaders as a mean to combat that issue. He said he regularly expressed to sergeants first class

Sgt. Maj. Eugene Johnson III has an impressive career chock-full of accomplishments that stack up as high as his towering stature.

The Detroit native will be retiring this year from the United States Army after 32 years of service to the land of liberty.

"In my senior year of high school, I attended a career day," said Johnson. "A recruiter approached me and showed me all these cool posters and told me I could see the world."

"He got me," chuckled Johnson.

Shortly thereafter, Johnson said he found himself in Fort Sill, Oklahoma - home of the artillery – building the foundation for the start of his vocation as a fire control specialist.

"Honestly, I didn't look to make it a career," said Johnson. "In Detroit, there really wasn't any installations near me so the military life was very foreign to me. I had to give myself some time to figure out if it was really what I wanted."

Johnson said he was lucky enough to have Germany as his first assignment. He reminisced on the words of his recruiter in Detroit and how they came to fruition.

"Once I forced myself out of the barracks and began to see the world, I realized it wasn't that bad," said Johnson. "I began to really integrate myself with my unit and build relationships."

"After that, the rest is history," said Johnson. "I was hooked and knew this was absolutely what I wanted to do with my life."

Johnson reflected on the leadership he has had throughout his career, both beneficial and deficient, and attributes the experiences from both as the bedrock of his leadership style.

Johnson said he adopted a 'cafeteria' frame of thought by picking and choosing the characteristics he wanted to amass and throwing away those that he felt didn't reflect the type of leader he wanted to evolve into.

Johnson urges today's noncommissioned officers to do the same.

"I've been around for three decades, so I've seen some changes," said Johnson. "We talk about 'toxic' leaders, but I think at their core, they don't intend to be malicious. I believe they weren't developed right."

Johnson offered up some advice to both junior and senior NCOs on how to prevent that occurrence.

"The minute you get a Soldier fresh from basic training and AIT [advanced individual training], keep up their momentum," said Johnson. "They have spent the last few months with their sole focus on training. Sustain that momentum and take it to the next level."

Johnson said the profit of continuous training is two-fold. "It develops that individual – that future leader," said Johnson. "It also makes the organization more efficient whether it be a company or a platoon."

stop once a Soldier gains their stripes.

the urgent need to conduct NCO development programs at their level.

"When I first enlisted, the operational tempo was drastically different than what it is now," said Johnson. "Back then, rotations at training centers were our versions of deployments. Now you have young kids graduating basic training and going straight into combat. There is little room for error so we have to continue to train and develop."

Johnson said the high OPTEMPO can sometimes create stressful scenarios for Soldiers. He noted a pivotal moment in his career where a Soldier succumbed to the pressures and stressors of life.

"In addition to training, we have got to remain engaged with our Soldiers," said Johnson. "Before the modular barracks that we have today, we were each other's counselors. There were three or four of us to a room, we knew when something was up. We have to do better and talk to our Soldiers. Get to know them so we can recognize symptoms and indicators."

Johnson is rounding out his career in the 3rd Infantry Division at Fort Stewart, with his final assignment being the operations sergeant major for the 3rd Infantry Division Artillery.

'Time flew by," said Johnson. "I'm sad it is coming to an end, but I'm excited for this Army – my Army's – future."

MP company celebrates liberation of Berchtesgaden

BERCHTESGADEN, Germany- The 48-star flag is raised high above the town of Berchtesgaden, Germany, as the American and German national anthems are played.

The color guard stands with the American and German flags side by side. In 1945, no one could have imagined a time when these two countries would stand together to commemorate a significant event of World War II.

The U.S. 3rd Infantry Division liberated Berchtesgaden, May 4, 1945, receiving the formal surrender of the town on the Schlossplatz. The division conducted a flag-raising ceremony over Berchtesgaden the next day. This year marks the 73rd anniversary of the liberation, and Soldiers from the 529th Military Police Company Honor Guard, 709th Military Police Battalion, participated in the anniversary celebration.

"It was a defining moment for the war and for the 3rd Infantry Division," said retired Lt. Col. Timothy Stoy.

Stoy and retired Capt. Monika Stoy dedicated a plaque in 2008 on behalf of the Outpost International Society of the 3rd ID in the location of the liberation in 1945. The 48-star flag has been raised on May 5 every year since 2008, to commemorate this defining moment in WWII. This year, the honor guard presented the American and German colors side by side during the ceremony.

The ceremony may have been a small, private event, but the list of VIPs was extensive. Consul General Jenifer Gavito, the U.S. Consulate in Munich, Germany was one such VIP.

"It's amazing to see that 73 years later, we (Americans and Germans) can stand side by side and recognize the sacrifices that were made by individuals on both sides," Gavito said.





DES CORNER: Consider snake safety as warm weather approaches

Now that the weather is getting warmer with the approach of summer, there will be more people enjoying their favorite outdoor activities, such as hiking in our state parks. However, snakes are one of the outdoor dangers that we must be vigilant of as we move about since the warmer weather usually attracts snakes. While snakes are beneficial to our environment by helping keep the rodent population down, some snakes are very harmful to humans. These snakes are poisonous, and their venom can attack different organs in our bodies. In Georgia, we have several common snakes such as the dastern barter, brown water, scarlet king, hognose, eastern ribbon, crown, queen, earth, black swamp, pine woods, pine and rainbow snakes.

However, only the crown and the pine woods snakes are mildly venomous, causing just a mild irritation to human. The rest are all venomous and can cause severe pain or death. The eastern diamond back rattlesnake, cottonmouth (water moccasin), coral snake, copperhead, timber rattlesnake and the pigmy rattlesnake are all great at camouflaging themselves with the surroundings and will strike without hesitation. Some snakes are more active than others in the evening when it is a little cooler outside, but enjoy sunbathing during the day. You can find them everywhere from the woods and under leaves, to rocky hills and mountains. Some snakes spend most of their time in lakes and rivers catching frogs and lizards. So if you are going hiking, it is best to wear heavy leather or high-topped rubber boots and heavy gloves. Also, wear your trouser legs outside of your boots. • Be extremely careful around debris. Use rakes,

pry bars, or other long-handled tools when removing debris.

- Never expose your hands, feet, or other parts of your body in a place where a snake might hide.
- Always be on the lookout and if you realize you are near a snake, avoid sudden movement, which may cause the snake to strike. If you remain still, the snake may leave.
- If the snake does not move away from you, back away from it, slowly.
- If you kill a poisonous snake, use a stick, rake, or another long-handled tool to carry the snake away for disposal. Snakes may bite even when they appear dead.

These are just a few safety tips you can find more on the internet. It is best to know the basics about snakes before you find yourself or a family member in striking distance of a poisonous one.

Rodeos bring finance to Soldiers in Afghanistan

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan - A team of Soldiers with the 2153rd Financial Management Support Detachment, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade, are corralling finance issues during rodeos on bases around Afghanistan.

Since arriving in theater approximately two months ago, the finance team has traveled to various posts providing Soldiers and civilians with finance assistance.

"A lot of people don't have the time to get out to Bagram in order to take care of their financial needs," said Spc. Keon Sands, a finance management technician with the 2153rd FMSD, a Florida Army National Guard unit. "The rodeos are awesome because we get to bring finance to the Soldiers.

"Our mission is to provide financial services to troops, vendors and contractors all throughout northeastern Afghanistan," Sands said. "To pay these vendors, pay these Soldiers and put them in a position where they can take care of their finances, their families back home and give them some financial stability."


At each base, the team spends a few days helping as many Soldiers, contractors and vendors as possible. Large amounts of people take advantage of the short amount of time the team has, asking questions and filling out paperwork the team can process once they return to Bagram.

During their deployment, Sands and his team expect to visit 15 different locations to serve personnel.

During the rodeos, the team assists with cash exchanges, setting up or answering questions about the Savings Deposit Program and fixing pay issues, said Spc. James Lovett, another finance management technician with the 2153rd FMSD.



"We're just going out to a more remote location or a location that doesn't have a finance office so we are able to offer the services that all the Soldiers and contractors deserve," he said.

The team has traveled most of the time they've been in Afghanistan, Lovett said, and they spend the rest back at Bagram Airfield, processing the paperwork they received during the rodeos. But he wouldn't have it any other way. "To be honest, I thought I was going to be cooped up in an office, but it's been a nice change of pace," Lovett said. "I really enjoy getting out, meeting new people and being able to service the Soldiers."

Even though they travel constantly and handle a large amount of customers between a small team, these Soldiers give their all to the mission, Sands said. They are committed to ensuring that the Soldiers, vendors and contractors have all the finance assistance they need to accomplish their missions.

"It's a really rewarding feeling to be able to put a smile on these Soldiers faces or be able to help them out with things they've been trying to take care of for months," Sands said. "It makes me feel as though I've played a big role in this deployment."



"This obstacle course will enhance readiness and fitness for our service members," said Lt. Col. Ken Dwyer, Hunter garrison commander. "The Soldiers (of Equipment Platoon of the 530th Engineer Company, 92nd



Engineers) who constructed this demonstrated the versatility to overcome obstacles and adversity with their versatility to get the job done."

The Soldiers had to remove many trees from the wooded area and work around power lines and pipes throughout the area during the project.

"Our resiliency was definitely put to the test with these challenges combined with our peak optempo at Fort Stewart," said Staff Sgt. Mike Becker, platoon sergeant. "This was a great training opportunity for my Soldiers because they are horizontal engineers and this was a vertical construction project. It definitely brought up our precision engineering skills."

The Hunter Mile is similar to the Marne Mile that the 92nd Engineers built in 2015 except the Hunter Mile includes a 30-feet-long suspended cable bridge.

"We had a ditch that cut through the course that had to be dealt with," said Chief Warrant Officer Lynndon Vinyard, battalion S-3 construction technician. "We had to design the footers due to the ditch, pipes in the ground and the power lines. But this challenge forced us to use our horizontal and vertical construction skill sets to make us more well-rounded engineers."

There is another reason The Hunter Mile differs from Fort Stewart's Marne Mile.

"I think this one's better because we took the lessons learned from the first project and applied them to this one," said Lt. Col. Perry Stiemke, commander, 92 Engineer Battalion.

"With our current fiscally restrained environment, we were glad to take on this project (and save the installation some funds). It was a great opportunity to engage in realistic training to build something that can actually be used, as opposed to our building something for training purposes and then tearing it down."

Summer safety

Water safety - To prevent drowning, avoid alcohol when swimming or boating. Wear a lifejacket whenever you are on a boat. Make sure young children are supervised at all times when near the beach, on a boat, or by a pool or hot tub. Don't swim alone or in bad weather. Learn to swim and teach your children to swim. We also recommend that you learn CPR in case of an emergency.

Sun safety - Protect against sunburn and heat stroke. Wear sunscreen with at least a Sun Protection Factor 15 or higher and apply it generously throughout the day. Wear a hat outdoors and a good pair of sunglasses to protect your eyes. Drink plenty of water, especially when in the sun or if you are sweating heavily. If you feel faint or nauseous, get into a cool place immediately.

Travel safety - Do not drink and drive or travel with anyone who has been drinking. Take along a first aid kit to help you be prepared for common emergencies. Wear your seatbelt at all times. Make sure your vehicle has been properly serviced and is in good working shape before a long road trip. Familiarize yourself with your surroundings if you are in an unfamiliar place and know where the nearest emergency room is. Also, avoid talking or texting on a cell phone while driving.
