## Raider: Ready, Set, Home

The 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team will be the pilot brigade for the 3rd Infantry Division's most involved reintegration initiative as they welcome more than 4,000 Soldiers in the coming months from their deployment to Korea.

The Families of deployed Soldiers will be the first to take part in Ready, Set, Home – an initiative aimed at ensuing excitement for their Soldier's return.

"After having just gone through this with my own Soldier returning home a few weeks ago, I hope I can contribute to making it a smooth transition for others Families," said Anna Hagerty, military spouse vol-

unteer. "I encourage others to always continue learning, seek the help you need and be patient during the process."

The returning Soldiers will be the first within 3rd ID to experience reintegration as far out as 60 days after being back home, said Carly Michael, chief of non-appropriated funds support division, Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation.

"We are doing a deep-dive on reintegration to see how we're training the Soldiers, what we're offering to Family Members and to see where we could make some changes that might improve the process," said Marji Freeze, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield ready and resilient integrator. The Ready and Resilient Council, along with such organizations as the United Services Organization; DFMWR; and dozens of community organizations combined to best address the hope for a smoother transition of Soldiers back into their home lives.

"We're looking at the reintegration process and trying to improve it, so I think that 1st ABCT will benefit a lot from the process improvements we've made," Freeze said.

Michael said they planned on holding, in the near future, a Ready, Set, Home redeployment party for spouses and Families in September or October. The party will include music, food, prizes, children's crafts, demonstrations, recreation information and more.



## Private packs a punch

Pfc. Steven Cosme of 9th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, a combat engineer, father and husband, has boxed for more than seven years, but his journey started much earlier in life. Boxing intrigued the West New York, New Jersey native as he watched the sport on television alongside his father, Steven. What started as a passing interest quickly developed into an obsession after Cosme had trouble with other children in the area.

"I took up boxing after I was bullied as a kid and I wanted to learn to defend myself," said Cosme. "Since then, I fell in love with the sport."

Cosme started off with mixed martial arts, but realized his boxing skills developed at a much faster rate. He began training southpaw (left hand dominant), picking up his first pair of gloves at the age of 11, and fighting in his first preliminary bout at age 17.

Battling in the boxing ring primed Cosme for his next milestone, as he enlisted in the U.S. Army. He maintains a rigorous training regimen, despite 9th BEB's training cycle. After unit physical training, he trains after the duty day five days a week, all in hopes of securing a Soldier-Athlete slot through the All Army Sports Program.

"It takes a special type of person to get in the ring and do what I do," said Cosme.

Cosme ventures to training camp in Fort Huachuca, Arizona, starting Aug. 26, competing for a position on the 140-lb., light welterweight roster. If successful, his journey will continue through Tennessee, then culminate with a roster spot within the U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program in Fort Carson, Colorado. The Soldier-Athlete campaign will undoubtedly bear its share of hardships and challenges. Cosme welcomes them and draws motivation from Sgt. 1st Class Augusto Pineiro, a fellow combat engineer from his battalion killed in an automobile accident in 2017. Pineiro established a reputation for accomplishing legendary physical feats.

"When things are hard for me when I box, I think about, 'that man just ran 100 miles in a gas mask, nonstop'," said Cosme. "Why am I complaining about a nine minute fight?"

The annual competition determines the best boxers within the Army. Cosme aspires to join the ranks of the All Army Boxing Team, represent his unit proudly and use the opportunity to potentially become ranked on a national level. He competed and won the silver medal in last year's All Army Sports Program, but looks to take the gold this year and gain professional sponsorship in the future.

"I would like to be an Olympic gold medalist boxer, and world champion," declared Cosme.



## ACS offers hurricane financial assistance

The peak of hurricane season 2018 is rapidly approaching and Army Community Service will be standing by to help Soldiers and their Families prepare financially in the event a storm reaches hurricane status and impacts our area.

If a mandatory evacuation is ordered, Soldiers and their Families may come to ACS, building 86 to request financial assistance through the Army Emergency Relief program.

Pearson said individuals should bring an end of month leave and earning statement and power of attorney if a Family member's Soldier is deployed.

"A specific power of attorney that states Army Emergency Relief on it. If they do not have that, we can do an Army Regulation Form 55, but that would have to be emailed to the Soldier down range," said Pearson. "The Soldier will then sign it digitally and send that back but it will lengthen the process for the Family member receiving the assistance."

ACS usually extends their hours of operation during a mandatory evacuation to accommodate Soldiers and their Families who wish to apply for financial assistance. James Fleming, financial readiness program manager, urges those in need of financial assistance to speak to a financial counselor before they evacuate so they have money for food, gas and lodging.

After a hurricane, ACS coordinates an Emergency Family Assistance Center, a one stop, pop-up shop consisting of financial counselors, chaplains and other support agencies to aid Soldiers and Family members with damage claims and other community needs directly resulting from the crisis.

Hurricane season is June 1 to Nov. 30. Last year there were seventeen named storms and 10 hurricanes.

Six major (category 3 or stronger) hurricanes went thought the Atlantic basin; according to *weather.com*.

The Saffir Simpson Hurricane wind scale notes there are five categories based on wind strength.

Category 1, winds 74-95 mph. Category 2, winds 96-110 mph. Category 3, winds 111-129 mph. Category 4, winds 130-156 mph. Category 5, winds 157 mph or high-

Hurricanes are extremely dangerous to property and personnel, it is best to have a plan and practice it with your family so everyone knows what to do in case of a hurricane. The Fort Stewart website *www.stewart.army. mil/index.php/my-fort/community/ hurricane-center*, advises community members to make a survival kit and replace items as needed. Examples to consider, include:

Medication, to include prescription and non-prescription.

Extra clothing, shoes, glasses or contact lens, ID cards, important paperwork such as wills, insurances policies, birth certificates in a water proof case or bag, non- perishable food, water, flashlights with extra batteries, first aid kit, a camping stove, battery powered radio, activates books for the children, blankets etc..

You can find other suggested items online at American Red Cross, *redcross.org* or on Fort Stewart's website. You should also be familiar with the evacuation routes in your area in case there is an evacuation issued or you're simply what to get out before one is issued.

Do not load your vehicle with items you do not need you may end up having to sleep in your vehicle. Stay calm and think clearly, going into panic mode will only things worse.

When you get to a safe location. Make sure you visit the Army Disaster Personnel Accountability Assessment System, *https://adpaas.army.mil.*

#### Spouse's Corner: 3rd ID Spouse encourages others to get connected

Inga Cessna, from Lithuania, has been a military spouse for three years. Her rich b a c k g r o u n d

includes completing design school, a law degree and traveling around the country working for a makeup company.

Since she arrived at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield nearly three months ago, she learned getting involved with the community was one of the best things to help her integrate. She said while her Family Readiness Group was active at the time, the USO Coffee Connections was very helpful. She said she really needed help

during that time as she and her spouse were moving from overseas.

"It was complicated to move from Germany to here," Cessna said, adding it had a significant financial impact on them as they didn't draw advanced basic allowance for housing.

She said part of the bad experience involved transportation fees. They tried to save the government money during their move--renting a car rather than using a taxi--but later found out the rental wasn't reimbursable.

She said as a foreign-born spouse, trying to settle expenses and working with Visa documents was difficult. She said it was compounded as some of the people at finance weren't familiar with how do their refund.

Cessna said talking to people, sharing experiences and learning about available resources made a difference. She said ACS was very helpful, along with other available resources.

Cessna said one of them was the Army Spouse Facebook pages.

"They are hero mammas, they are able to answer any questions," she said.

Cessna said it would be good to have more events to establish connections and support small business opportunities. She said she would even consider offering free makeup classes for spouses.

"Go to the newcomers briefing, USO Coffee Connections, and meet people," Cessna said. "Especially if you are coming here for the first time and don't know the area. Closing yourself in the house and not interacting with others doesn't help. When you are far away from family it can get crazy."

## Fort Stewart tests emergency response capabilities

Flames and smoke roar from two burning cars crashed onto the side of the road. Thick white smoke shrouds a school bus flipped on its side. Cries for help come from the bus and from near the burning cars.

The accident scene at Fort Stewart's Holbrook Pond Aug. 22 was chaotic and horrific, but it wasn't real. Instead, it was the scenario for the installation's annual full-scale exercise. The wounded were role-players, the bus and cars pre-staged, and senior installation emergency personnel clustered across the road from the simulated accident, waiting to evaluate the first-responders arriving on-scene.

Fort Stewart Military Police arrived first at the simulated accident, followed quickly by the Fort Stewart Fire Department. Ambulances from Fort Stewart and Liberty and Bryan counties arrived, too.

For Wayne Parker, Fort Stewart Fire

Department station chief, the full-scale exercise was a chance to practice a worst-case scenario.

"It's one of the things that we never want to see happen, but we want to know that if it does happen we're going to be able to respond appropriately," Parker said.

Parker was the operations lead for the fire department at the simulated scene, keeping track of the assets committed to the response and the evacuation of the wounded. Parker annotated the numbers of casualties loaded into the ambulances, whether Fort Stewart or neighboring counties.

"We're testing not only ourselves, but the other agencies and how we interact," he said. "We'll use this today as an evaluation, not to criticize ourselves but to kind of analyze and learn from it."

Hunter Army Airfield also participated in the full-scale exercise. The scenario there was a simulated hard landing of an AH-64 Apache.

## National Immunization Awareness Month 2018

Immunization programs are one of the top public health achievements of the last century. Routine immunization leads to drastic reductions in the prevalence of common diseases, and has led to global eradication of smallpox and the elimination of polio in the U.S. There are 26 diseases that can be prevented through the use of FDA-licensed vaccines.

However, due to ease of international travel and vaccine hesitancy, we still see outbreaks of some vaccine preventable diseases, such as measles.

Military families who travel the world or are stationed abroad should inquire about recommended immunizations every time they travel. Certain diseases that are rare in the United States may be very common elsewhere in the world. The CDC Yellow Book for International Travel, and most travel clinics, provide the latest information on disease threats and immunizations available to protect your family. See also "Preparing for travel can prevent illness".

If you or your child go to a civilian health care provider to receive a vaccine, it is vital you get a record of it and share the information with your primary care manager or military hospital or clinic. This will ensure your family's immunization records are complete. Incomplete documentation can lead to receipt of duplicate immunizations or appearing to not meet immunization requirements for schools or day care facilities.

•Vaccines are thoroughly tested before licensing, and carefully monitored after they are licensed, to look for any rare safety risks.

•Vaccines are the safest and most cost-effective way to prevent several diseases. They not only protect vaccinated individuals but also help protect entire communities by preventing and reducing the spread of infectious diseases.

•Currently, the United States has the safest vaccine supply in its history. The country's long-standing vaccine safety system ensures vaccines are as safe as possible.



"It is geared toward the spouses in a way that it is going to drum up that excitement for getting their Soldiers back home," said Capt. Stephen Schutte, 1st ABCT reintegration officer-in-charge.

Schutte said these events are expected to help get the Soldiers to think about stressors that may come along with redeployment and reintegration and to help come up with secondary plans in the event; they come up short. In those cases, the team from Army Community Services and the Military Family Life Counselors are on standby the minute that these Soldiers get home.

"This is the time to not only capture that excitement through an event like Ready, Set, Home, but at the same time, present information that they can have access to," Schutte said.

Tickets for Ready, Set, Home will be free, Michael said. Michael, who is also a military spouse, said her and her husband's first deployment was 18 months long.

"It was like meeting my husband again for the first time; I remember how bumpy that was," Michael said. "It helps me understand what (these Families) might go through."

Reintegration is being brought to the forefront as an integral piece to readiness among redeploying troops, but what the Army is putting effort toward now is the days beyond the initial culture shock of coming home to combat those trends which ultimately hinder Soldier readiness.

"When you think about reintegration – that is when the Soldiers get back – you need to look at before they get back, like the Family Member prep, and that initial reintegration," Freeze said. "But, the thing we hadn't really focused on before is that after they finish the initial redeployment reintegration, all the way out to at least 120 days, probably further, we start to see that Soldiers and Family Members are stressed."

The stress includes or ultimately leads to high-risk situations like domestic violence, child abuse, suicidal

behaviors and driving under the influence offenses, Freeze said.

"Before you got home, you did the ceremony, you met with your Families, and then you had the next week to a week and a half of just administrative tasks, and they considered you integrated," Schutte said, referring to his redeployment from Afghanistan in 2013. "We are all really starting to learn that there is a whole emotional and relationship aspect to all of this that is still in play, that you're still making adjustments to when you come home."

With this in mind, the Ready and Resilient Council asked: "What are we providing to help the Soldiers and the Family Members and the commanders with all that stress?"

From that question, the Ready and Resilience Council developed commander products aimed at making integration for Soldiers and Families more seamless.


One product is the risk-reduction analysis, sent to the commander 120 days from their redeployment that shows trends of challenges faced based on similar units who've redeployed in the past.

Another product, which came about as a result of the working group's findings, was the Commander's Reintegration Training Catalogue.

"It gives the commander a snapshot of what the training is; it gives hyperlinks to videos about the training so he or she can really get an understanding of what it can do, and it talks about the end state of what the training can do for their unit," Freeze said.

The catalog includes a reintegration training timeline and events such as Warrior Adventure Quest, budgeting, buying a car, buying a house, RECON Challenge, Strong Bonds for Couples, a trip to Get Air, a Coming Home Tailgate, and an Amazing Race.

"You're never going to educate everybody on everything that could happen, but I think if you provide them with where the information and resources are, they know where to go when they come home," Michael said.



### **Army Emergency Relief awards \$8 million in scholarships**

**Arlington, VA.** – Three thousand four hundred and sixty-five U.S. Army Spouses and dependent children of active duty and retired Soldiers return to college this fall with 2018-2019 Army Emergency Relief scholarships. Fort Stewart was the recipient of 107 with another 27 at Hunter Army Airfield.

AER awarded \$8 million in scholarship grants based on the financial needs of the family, with an average award of \$2300.

The Maj. Gen. James Ursano Children's Scholarship Program is a need-based scholarship established to assist children of Army Soldiers in obtaining their first undergraduate degree. This program accepts applications between January and early April, and provided 2,861

scholarships to children of active duty and retired Soldiers this year.

"Thank you to the Army Emergency Relief Fund for awarding me a Maj. Gen. James Ursano Scholarship for the 2018-2019 academic year," said Emma Mulhern. "This scholarship will help me pay for my continued studies at the Carlson School of Management at the University of Minnesota. I look forward to putting this scholarship to good use!"

The Spouse Education Assistance Program is also a need-based scholarship program established to assist Spouses of active duty and retired Army Soldiers in obtaining their first undergraduate degree. This year, AER expanded the application window for Spouses to apply year-round to better accommodate the needs of Army Families. Six-hundred-and-four scholarships was awarded this year.

Both scholarship programs require that the student maintain a 2.0 average on a 4.0 grading scale. Scholarships are awarded for up to four academic years for full-time students or eight academic years for part-time students. Children must be enrolled full-time for the entire academic year (12 credit hours per semester) and Spouses may be enrolled part-time (6 credit hours per semester) or full-time and an accredited college or university.

In the last ten years, AER awarded over 41,000 scholarships totaling more than \$84M to Spouses and children of active duty and retired Soldiers. "Our scholarship programs help ease the financial burden Army Families face when paying for college," said Retired Lt. Gen. Mason, AER Director. "Military Spouses and children are an important part of the Army Team.

#### Wounded combat vet takes trek on hand cycle from ground zero to St. Pete

These are the statistics that accompany a trip from New York City to St. Petersburg, Florida. According to Google maps, that takes most vehicles - assuming the driver is doing the speed limit - approximately 17 hours and eight minutes.

Ricky Raley, a retired infantryman from the Indiana National Guard, paralyzed from the waist down, is wrapping up the final leg of this journey - done completely on a hand cycle - on Aug. 25.

Raley deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2007. During a convoy, his vehicle was struck by an improvised explosive device. Raley suffered traumatic brain injuries and was later awarded the Purple Heart.

Months after returning to the United States, Raley was involved in a near-fatal motor vehicle accident. The truck he was riding in flipped several times, and Raley was ejected. The truck rolled over him and crushed his back, rendering him paralyzed.

Following his accident and subsequent diagnosis, Raley said he didn't have the option to wallow in self-pity - his wife was four-months pregnant with their first child. With her tough support and the strong desire to set an example of a good man to his son, Raley persevered and begun to conjure up ways he could remain active.

"I was 23," said Raley. "I knew I still wanted to remain active, so I started looking into different avenues. That's when I found adaptive sports. It brought about a sense of community. When I was there hand-cycling with everyone else, I felt like I belonged and I wasn't just someone in a chair."

The comraderies built around those he played adaptive sports with was reminiscent of the bond he built with those he deployed to Iraq with.

While he still struggled with the physical effects of the accident, Raley said his invisible scars took a larger toll.

"The trauma from being paralyzed was nowhere near the isolation I felt from the traumatic brain injury and the mental cognition issues I was having," said Raley.

Raley found hope in the Boot Campaign, a non-profit organization aimed to assist veterans with holistic care for TBIs, post-traumatic stress disorder, and insomnia.

His stalwartness and fervor to help other veterans who suffer from afflictions from war like he did, led him to where he is today - at Hunter Army Airfield, Georgia to meet with active-duty Soldiers with the 3rd Infantry Division and 75th Ranger Regiment, one of many installations Raley is visiting along his journey to relay his message.

"Coming here to Savannah and Hunter is a full circle for me," said Raley. "Before I left for Iraq, my unit mobilized at Fort Stewart, and we flew out of Hunter."

He was escorted into the installation by the Savannah Police Department and behind him trailed dozens of local motorcyclists and touring cyclists to show their

support for him.

A patriotic celebration awaited Raley, who was met with music played by Savannah's Windsor Forest High School band and dance team and waves of applause by Soldiers, veterans, local community members, and key leaders from the Marne Division.

Lt. Col. Kenneth Dwyer, Hunter Army Airfield garrison commander, spoke on his awe of Raley and his mission to raise awareness for the mental battles Soldiers and veterans face.

"A lot of people would have given up," said Dwyer. "They would have been okay with just getting by and feeling sorry for themselves. You have all heard the saying, 'when life gives you lemons, make lemonade'."

"Ricky took lemons, and he learned to bake a choco-



late cake," said Dwyer.

Raley took to the stage to address the audience - primarily the Soldiers - to drive home his message.

"We're all just people," said Raley. "No matter what your life experience is, whatever your MOS [military occupational specialty] was, we all have these experiences that shape us. Use that to help the person next to you."
