MEDAL OF HONOR

First Lieutenant Garlin M. Conner distinguished himself by acts of gallantry and intrepidity while serving with Company K, 3d Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3d Infantry Division. On the morning of January 24, 1945, near the town of Houssen, France, German forces ferociously counterattacked the front left flank of the 7th Infantry Regiment with 600 infantry troops, six Mark VI tanks, and tank destroyers. Lieutenant Conner, having recently returned to his unit after recovering from a wound received in an earlier battle, was working as the Intelligence Officer in the 3d Battalion Command Post at the time of the attack. Understanding the devastating effect that the advancing enemy armor could have on the Battalion, Lieutenant Conner immediately volunteered to run straight into the heart of the enemy assault to get to a position from which he could direct friendly artillery on the advancing enemy forces. With complete disregard for his own safety, Lieutenant Conner maneuvered 400 yards through enemy artillery fire that destroyed trees in his path and rained shrapnel all around him, while unrolling telephone wire needed to communicate with the Battalion command post. Upon reaching the Battalion's front line, he continued to move forward under the enemy assault to a position 30 yards in front of the defending United States forces, where he plunged into a shallow ditch that provided minimal protection from the advancing enemy's heavy machine gun and small arms fire. With rounds impacting all around him, Lieutenant Conner calmly directed multiple fire missions, adjusting round after round of artillery from his prone position, until the enemy was forced to halt its advance and seek cover behind a nearby dike. For three hours, Lieutenant Conner remained in this compromised position, enduring the repeated onslaught of German infantry which, at one point, advanced to within five yards of his position. As German infantry regrouped and began to mass in an overwhelming assault, Lieutenant Conner ordered friendly artillery to concentrate directly on his own position, having resolved to die if necessary to destroy the enemy advance. Ignoring the friendly artillery shells blanketing his position and exploding mere feet from him, Lieutenant Conner continued to direct artillery fire on the enemy assault swarming around him until the German attack was finally broken. By his heroism and disregard for his own life, Lieutenant Conner stopped the enemy advance. The artillery he expertly directed, while under constant enemy fire, killed approximately fifty German soldiers and wounded an estimated one hundred more, preventing what would have undoubtedly been heavy friendly casualties. His actions are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and the United States Army.

Honoring 1st Lt. Conner, Family with dedication

Seventy-four years ago the heroic actions of a young 3rd Infantry Division first lieutenant helped the Allied Forces stymie a German advance on a French battlefield in early 1945. His gallant actions in Houssen, France on Jan. 24, 1945 won 1st Lt. Garlin "Murl" Conner the Distinguished Service Cross, the Army's second highest award for valor.

Seven decades later, President Donald Trump bestowed the Medal of Honor to Conner's widow, Pauline, during a White House ceremony. The upgrade to the nation's top award for heroism made Conner the 3rd Infantry Division's 56th recipient, the most across all active duty Army divisions. Realizing the significance of Conner's multiple valorous actions during WWII, the division began plans to honor the Soldier.

The tangible recognition of Conner took place on Dec. 7, at Fort Stewart during the division's annual Marne Week and featured the dedication of the "1st Lt. Garlin M. Conner Small Arms Range Complex."

Traveling from their home in Clinton County, Kentucky, Pauline and other members of the Conner Family were in attendance to witness the special honor.

"My only wish and regret would've been that Murl could've been here himself to accept the honor that has

been put on him. It would've been an honor for him," said Pauline.

The small arms range complex consists of 15 different individual venues that facilitate the training of all 3rd ID Soldiers on Fort Stewart. On these ranges, Soldiers train in the use of different weapon systems to include the M4 carbine, the M240 medium machine gun, the M67 grenade launcher and many other weapon systems.

The dedication of the range complex was chosen to serve as a living memorial to Conner's warrior spirit.

"1st Lt. Conner's legacy is his mastery of the fundamentals in lethality and leadership," Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, 3rd ID commanding general, said during the ceremony. "As we dedicate this range complex today, we challenge ourselves to build warfighting readiness in our units so that when called, we stand ready to fight with the skills and intrepidity that Murl Conner displayed more than 70 years ago."

The first weapon fired on the newly dedicated range was a Thompson sub-machine gun, a tribute showcasing the weapon Conner used during his service in WWII. Conner served in 10 campaigns during the war, received a battlefield commission and was awarded four Silver Stars in addition to the Medal of Honor.

"There is no better place to honor Conner's amazing service," said Quintas. "Hundreds of thousands of Soldiers and leaders will fire their weapons from this

range complex. Each will read of the accomplishments of 1st Lt. Conner, and will strive to live up to his example of lethality and leadership. Here, we train the Murl Conners of the future."

In addition to the range dedication, the 3rd ID Museum unveiled an exhibit featuring Conner's actual WWII uniform paired with the medal that was presented by President Donald Trump this past June.

Marne Air supports 48th IBCT

Soldiers from 2nd Battalion, 3rd Aviation regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, practiced sling load operations with 48th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, Dec 12 at Fort Stewart.

This training allows the 48th IBCT to meet the requirements for their upcoming mission to Afghanistan, while enabling Marne Air Soldier to maintain unit readiness.

"Our mission was an artillery raid, we provided heavy lift support for the 1st Battalion, 118th Field Artillery regiment in preparation for their deployment," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Timothy Stuart, a CH-47 Chinook pilot for Company B, 2-3 Avn. "This was my first opportunity lifting M777 howitzers as a Chinook pilot"

Marne Air Soldiers were tasked to lift and move, M777 and M119 Howitzer, with their CH-47 Chinook in the vast Fort Stewart training area to support the 127 "Hickory Howitzer" Soldiers in their Gunnery Table certifications.

Prior to any lift, the CH-47 Chinook pilots talked to the "Hickory Howitzer" Soldiers and discussed safety

and lift options.

"This is not my first time conducting sling load operations, however this is my first time moving four M777 howitzers in one day," said Spc. Duncan Beasley, a CH-47 Chinook crew chief for Co. B, 2-3 Avn. "It is my job to check their paperwork and inspect the load to ensure the safety of the aircraft, load and passenger if we are to have them on board."

This training is not only for the pilots but the entire crew as well. The manning for a CH-47 Chinook requires two pilots and two crew chiefs. As the CH-47 Chinook lifts off the crew chiefs positions themselves one at the side-door and the other at the hole where the load will hook up. The process of hovering under the equipment can be nerve-racking for both crew members on air and ground.

"The crew chief in the hole is calling for the pilots to maneuver in small increments under the load to get the aircraft in position, said Beasley. "The pilots have to maintain the hover factoring in the winds that could move it slightly out of place making it tedious for everyone in position."

Marne Air and "Hickory Howitzer" Soldiers were able to complete their missions quickly and efficiently maintaining mission readiness.

"The training has went great the hook-up crews have improved," said Beasley. "They continue to build the muscle memory for the upcoming mission as we get a chance to build our muscle memory being able to be a part of interactive training."

Soldiers with the 226th Composite Supply Company, 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division, held their first class on the turn-in process at the Supply Support Activity on Fort Stewart, Dec. 13. The purpose of the class was to teach Soldiers how to prevent errors during equipment turn in.

“The purpose of this class is to better inform all of the customers we have on how to properly make turn-ins and that will contribute to the better success of missions,” said Sgt. Richard Galashaw, an automated logistical specialist with 226th CSC. “Successfully turning in all of their items that they no longer need or are recoverable bring their units more money.”

Galashaw said the SSA typically serves seven or eight customers a day who normally turn in 20 to 30 items per person. They bring in tires, vehicles, weapons, masks and other pieces of military equipment.

Soldiers went through the steps the SSA personnel go through when inspecting equipment. They checked service tags that identify the item and compared it to a military form similar to a receipt that shows all of the items that were expected to be given to the SSA.

“We were going through a phase when we were getting a lot of false transactions,” said Galashaw. “Our chief thought it would be a good idea to educate Soldiers so that they have the tools they need to successfully complete their turn-in process.”

“I was doing sergeant’s time training internally and I decided that I wanted that to be open to all 235 customers that we have, so now it’s open to the entire division,” said Warrant Officer 1 Cindyannette Rojas, the accountable officer with 226th CSC. “Whoever we support, they are welcome to come when we do the classes every other week.”





Honoring fallen at Warriors Walk

Four hundred and sixty-eight trees align the sidewalks that surround Cottrell Field on Fort Stewart.

Although the grove of White Crape Myrtles might seem insignificant to some, to 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers and Families past and present, their roots are symbolic of a profound reverence.

This column of trees is aptly named Warriors Walk - each tree that stands was planted in remembrance and tribute of every Dogface Soldier that was killed in action during Operations Iraqi and Enduring Freedom since 2003. There are stones that lay at the foot of each truck with the name etched of the fallen Soldier which that tree represents.

With those 468 stones come thousands of Family Members and friends that have carried the pain of their absence day after day, month after month and year after year. The holiday season is a stark reminder of the life that was taken far too early from them.

Every year since 2007, Wreaths for Warriors Walk, Inc. - in conjunction with the 3rd Infantry Division, Gold Star Families and volunteers - hold a ceremony and lay a wreath at the stone of every tree as a small, albeit poignant, homage to the heroes that paid the ultimate sacrifice and the Families that bear the burden of that loss.

Barbara Bilbrey, whose son Spc. Charlie Bilbrey was killed in action in Iraq in 2007, echoed that sentiment.

"This is a hard time of year sometimes for people who have lost someone," said Bilbrey. "Not just for military lost but Families who have lost this is a hard time of year. It breaks your heart. And people wonder why I can't seem to get in the spirit, but when you feel like you are not alone, it helps. It really, really does."

This year's ceremony was held Dec. 15. The day before, hundreds of Soldiers and volunteers spent hours in the pouring rain to trim the trees with ornaments.

The 3rd ID Commander, Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, spoke during the ceremony.

Earlier in his career, Quintas was a battalion commander in the Marne Division and has a personal connection to Warriors Walk and the Soldiers memorialized there.

"This is personal for me not only as the commanding general of the 3rd Infantry Division but also as a former battalion commander who has seven trees here," said Quintas. "Seven trees for seven Soldiers who were lost under my command."

Quintas went on to name the seven Soldiers that were killed.

"I pass by their trees many times a day," said Quintas. "I know their trees are remembered at every ceremony, and I think of them often."

Many of the volunteers who participate year after year are former Dogface Soldiers who served alongside those that were killed.

Jeff Fornshell, the Wreath for Warriors Walk, Inc.

vice president of operations and retired Army sergeant first class, has been an integral member of the organization since its founding.

"Those of us that have been a part of this since the beginning were always inspired by the photos of the wreath laying ceremony that happens at Arlington National Cemetery," said Fornshell. "We decided that we needed to honor 3rd ID Soldiers in that same way."

Each Gold Star Family Member that was present had a current 3rd ID Soldier as an escort. Sgt. Natalie C. Mathena, a military police officer assigned to 139th Military Police Company, 385th Military Police Battalion, was the escort for the Family of Sgt. Timothy J. Conrad, who was killed in 2012 in Afghanistan. Conrad was also an MP.

While some of the Soldiers that were escorts were tasked, Mathena volunteered.

"I actually attended the memorial of Sgt. Conrad back in my hometown when I was still in school," said Mathena. "I really felt compelled to be a part of this and I wanted the opportunity to be able to speak with the Family. His death really hit home for me - literally."

Next year's ceremony is slated for Dec. 14, 2019.

"Our organization is so honored to be able to do this every year," said Fornshell. "We want to show the Soldiers and the Family Members that regardless of the years that past by and everyone who comes and goes, we will always be here to remember your Soldier."



WINN, ARMEDCOM helps 48th IBCT readiness

For the past few months Fort Stewart U.S. Army Medical Department, Winn Army Community Hospital has played host to three different battalions from the Army Reserve Medical Command. Their sole purpose is to help in the rapid medical readiness of over 2,000 Soldiers from the 48th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, a Modular Infantry Brigade of the Georgia Army National Guard and meet all requirements for their mission.

"The training that MEDCOM and the Military Treatment Facility provides is so crucial for the medically ready Soldiers and the ready medical force," U.S. Army Reserve Medical Command, Commanding General, Mary E. Link said.

The ARMEDCOM Soldiers trained for two days alongside the Fort Stewart MEDDAC nurses, medics and providers. This was an essential opportunity to receive real-world training at the Soldier Readiness Processing or SRP site at Fort Stewart.

"We sat them down right seat left seat with the providers, medics and nurses that have been working over at the SRP site," U.S. Army MEDDAC – Fort Stewart, Officer –in-Charge, SRP, Cpt. Daniel Johnson said.

After shadowing the MEDDAC – Fort Stewart nurses and providers and receiving access to the medical systems crucial for completing the SRP mission, these Reserve

Soldiers provided medical support for the units in the 48th IBCT.

"The training I received here was very valuable to me, because I don't do the same job in my civilian career as I do in the military," Spc. Tamara Thomas, ARMEDCOM, S, said. "As a patient administration specialist, I was able to act in real time and process Soldiers through the SRP site."

Besides providing a critical training tool for the Reserve Soldiers, the service members and staff from U.S. Army MEDDAC never lose sight of the Soldier Readiness Processing site's primary mission which is ensuring medical readiness to all Soldiers that rotate through.

"I want to make sure that we're giving the best care that we can to these Soldiers that are processing through making sure that they are ready for deployment," Johnson said.

For the Soldiers with the 48th, the SRP played a vital role in ensuring that each service member had the medical screenings necessary to ensure maximum medical readiness.

"You need to make sure every Soldier is medically ready to deploy," said Cpl. Toni Prows, 48th IBCT. "Make sure that they are not a liability to anybody else. That they don't get sick and that they are safe overseas."

After six days of collaboration with the medical support units, the MEDDAC SRP team successfully processed the 48th IBCT.

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Marne tax center offers free tax preparation services

The tax filing season is upon us and our Marne Tax Centers have been redesigned. The Marne tax centers offer free tax preparation services available at both Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield and you are entitled to receive this free service if you are an active duty service member, retired from active duty or a dependent of an active duty service member or retiree. If you have any questions about eligibility, please stop by and see us, and watch for more information in the Jan. 10 Frontline.

Question. What is new about the Marne tax centers?
Answer. The centers have been redesigned into three separate components:

1. Complete tax preparation services for individuals with complex and advanced filings.
2. Self-service kiosks for individuals with simple returns. Our tax professionals will assist individuals using the kiosks.
3. Tax education classes at the unit level to assist Soldiers in preparing their own taxes. Classes are available to FRGs and unit sponsored groups. Email with Capt. Laura S. Hernandez, Fort Stewart Legal Assistance Office, Laura.S.Hernandez6.mil@mail.mil, to schedule a class for your unit or smallgroup.

Q. When will the Marne tax centers open this year?
A. The Marne Tax Center opens Jan. 22.

Q. Where are the Marne tax centers located and hours.
Fort Stewart office in building 705. Hunter's office is in building 1211. Their office hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Wednesday; 1 -6 p.m. Thursday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday.

Q. Why choose the Marne Tax Center?
A. The Marne Tax Center provides quality tax preparation services to eligible individuals. With a focus on financial readiness, we are teaching Soldiers, dependents, and retirees how to file individual tax returns. This life-long skill saves money as commercial tax preparation services typically cost more than \$300 annually. Unlike commercial tax preparation services, the Marne tax centers have no fees. Whether you need to file one state return, or multiple state returns, the cost to you remains the same—zero.

Q. What kind of training do the tax preparers receive?
A. Our tax preparers are IRS-trained and certified as Volunteer Preparers. We also use TaxSlayer software, which is issued and endorsed by the IRS. We prepare federal and most state returns and provide electronic filing.

Q. Do I need to make an appointment?
A. No. Subject to tax preparers availability, both offic-

es accept walk-ins, first come, first serve. The kiosks is available on a walk-in basis during our office hours.

Q. Can my unit or Family Readiness Group reserve the kiosks?

A. Yes, email Laura.S.Hernandez6.mil@mail.mil to reserve kiosks.

Q. Do I need a Common Access Card to use the kiosks?

A. No, and the kiosks is free; however, retirees and their dependents may not be eligible for free tax preparation e-filing software. Active duty service members and their dependents are eligible for free tax preparation e-filing software.

Q: What are needed documents?

Documents include your Social Security Card; W2/1099misc or 1099SSA; family mortgage interest statement (1098); power of attorney if necessary (IRS Form 2848); prior year tax return; proof of dependent care expenses; interest income statement (e.g., 1099INT); identity theft pin; dividend income statement (e.g., 1099DIV); 1099B (for stocks/bonds); 1099 Misc (self employed worker; UBER/Lyft statements reflecting capital gains/loss; 1095 – proof of medical insurance coverage; photo identification; social security card for self and all members claiming on your return; student loan interest statement; divorce decree if applicable; proof of educational expenses; HUD 1 statement (if home purchased during the tax year; IRA/ Thrift Saving Plan contribution statements; educator expenses; account and routing number for direct deposit/debit or cancelled check. For taxpayers claiming domicile in states other than Georgia, you must have the city/county/ school district information for the state you are filing in. Additionally, bring any correspondence from the IRS you may have received during the year.

Q. I was deployed last year and still have not filed last year's tax return. Can the tax center help me file both returns?

A. Yes. If you were deployed during 2017, then the Marne Tax Center will

be able to file returns for 2017. If you were deployed or you are a Gold Star Family Member and have not filed your 2016 returns, please call the Fort Stewart Office at 767-1040 or the Hunter Army Airfield office at 315-3675 starting Jan. 22, or visit either for further guidance.

Q. If I do not have my or my Family member's social security card, can I bring my military ID card instead?

A. No. For your protection and to comply with IRS' regulations, you must bring your social security card with you to the Marne Tax Center. Before filing your tax return, we need to be certain that the name and social security number on your tax return exactly matches the information contained in the Social Security Administration's records. If the information does not match, then your taxes will not be properly filed, and this could lead to a delay in receiving any refund due. Alternatively, we will also accept a memorandum from the Social Security Administration identifying the taxpayer or family member. If you cannot find your social security card, please visit <http://www.ssa.gov/ask> or the Social Security Administration in Savannah, at 430 Mall Blvd.

Q. Are there any tax returns the Tax Center cannot prepare for me?

A. Yes. Some services are outside the scope of the program. Contact the Marne Tax Center if you have questions pertaining to your specific situation.



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Let light shine out of darkness

Paul was well acquainted with hardships and opposition. **2 Corinthians** contains Paul's defense of himself and of his work to the charges made against him by his enemies. This included the religious legalists who said that Paul was an impostor who had not been authorized by the proper authorities to work among the churches. Other charges of a similar nature were made in an all-out attempt to discredit the religious work that Paul was doing.

To summarize **2 Corinthians 4**, Paul defends himself and his ministry. With such a glorious ministry described in chapter three, he does not get discouraged. Instead he has renounced the use

of deceitful tactics of his enemies and openly proclaims the truth (**verses 1-2**). If the gospel seems obscured, it is only to those whom Satan has blinded so they might not see the light of the gospel (**vss. 3-4**). Paul is simply preaching Christ **Jesus** as Lord and considers himself as their servant for His sake. He humbly realizes that it is **God** who has shone light in his heart so he might share that light of the gospel with others (**vss. 5-6**).

As magnificent this "treasure" may be, he is simply an "earthen vessel." As such he experiences great suffering in his ministry, but he knows that God allows it so that the "life of Jesus" (the power of **God**) might be manifested in his mortal body by the way he endures it, and that such grace from **God** might cause thanksgiving for the glory of **God** (**vss. 7-15**). In

addition, he does not lose heart because his inward spirit is renewed daily by the knowledge that his affliction is light and temporary when compared to the eternal weight of the glory that awaits him, and by keeping his focus on things which are unseen and eternal (**vss. 16-18**).

In verse 6, it is God who commanded, "Let light shine out of darkness." Paul is saying, "the Lord God who created light in the physical world can fill your heart with spiritual light, even if you are blinded by the god of this age." Satan's work of blinding is great, but God's work of lighting is greater! The light that dispels darkness in the human heart is found in the face of Christ.

This is the treasure Paul talks about in verse 7. We have this "treasure in jars of clay." This is the point of this whole pas-

sage: God allows the miraculous power of **Jesus Christ** to reside within us. It is the greatness of the gospel of **Jesus Christ**, and the glory of **God** made evident through **Christ**. It is the very light of **God**, and the "light of the knowledge of the glory of God," that is reflected in the "face of Jesus Christ." This is the greatest treasure in all of creation!

Why does Paul put up with a life of hardship and trouble? It is "so that the life of **Jesus** may also be revealed in our body." Our christian reaction to adversity has tended to be "grin and bear it" or "keep a stiff upper lip." Paul's approach is to make clear that it is **God's** power (**v. 7**) and the life of Jesus (**v. 10**) that empower and sustain him, and not his own fortitude. Let US follow the example of Paul as we face our own hardships.
