Raiders take charge

Camp Humphreys, South Korea – The 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division assumed responsibility as the rotational armored brigade combat team in the Republic of Korea during a transfer of authority ceremony, Feb. 23.

Soldiers from the Raider Brigade started arriving in late January to begin a nine-month rotation. Raider Soldiers replaced the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team "Black Jack," 1st Cavalry Division, the first U.S. armored brigade to complete a rotation in the Korean peninsula.

The ceremony was presided over by Maj. Gen. Scott McKean, commander of the 2nd Infantry Division ROK-U.S. Combined Division.

"The strength of our Army is the ability to produce well-trained and well-led units," said McKean. "We are very fortunate to welcome the Raider Brigade of the 3rd Infantry Division, Rock of the Marne."

The ceremony was the final step in the month-long transition between the brigades.

"I would like to thank the 2nd Infantry ROK-U.S. Combined Division, our Republic of Korea Army counterparts, the cities of Dongducheon and Pyeongteak, for all their support and coordination that has contributed to making this transition successful," said Col. Mike Adams,

commander, 1st ABCT. "To the Black Jack team, thank you for the seamless transition, your candor and for absolutely setting the Raider Brigade on the path to mission accomplishment."

The deployment marks a historic return of 3rd ID Soldiers to South Korea. This is the first time Soldiers bearing the Marne Division patch have served on the Korean Peninsula since the Korean War. During the war, 3rd ID had 13 Medal of Honor recipients, received eight Battle Stars and was awarded The Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation. The 7th Infantry Regiment of 3rd ID recorded more combat time than any other infantry unit in South Korea.

The 2018 Army Emergency Relief Campaign kicked off at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, Feb. 27 at Club Stewart during the Community Leaders Information Forum. The Task Force Marne Senior Enlisted Advisor, Command Sgt. Maj. John Johnson, and Fort Stewart Garrison Commander, Col. 

Helicopters swapped at gate

Fort Stewart's main gate static display was updated on Feb. 26 with an OH-58 Kiowa. The AH-1 Cobra that was on display is now at the 3rd Infantry Division Museum. Swapping the helicopters on the static display brings it more up-to-date with vehicles that have recently served or continue to serve in the division's formations. The Kiowa was retired from service at Hunter Army Airfield's 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade in May 2015. The helicopter swap was a unified effort between several installation units, including the aviation brigade, the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, and the Directorate of Public Works.

5-7 CAV holds KATUSA Patching Ceremony

CAMP CASEY, Republic of Korea—The 5th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division conducted a patching ceremony, Feb. 21, to pin the 3rd ID unit patch on the Korean Augmentation to the United States Army Soldiers assigned to the Squadron.

The ceremony was part of the month-long transition between rotational armored brigade combat teams as 1st ABCT replaced the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division from Fort Hood, Texas.

KATUSAs are members of the Republic of Korea Army and partner with U.S. Soldiers. They provide the U.S. military with Korean-speaking Soldiers, which improves capabilities across the Peninsula.

The program was established in 1950 at the outbreak of the Korean War. The South Korean Soldiers provided the U.S. Army units with knowledge of the terrain, the ability to distinguish between North and allied South Korean troops, and improved communications between the U.S. and Korean units.

Lt. Col. Stephen Fairless, commander, 4th Squadron, 9th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd ABCT, spoke on the relationships the Dark

Horse Squadron built with the KATUSA Soldiers. He thanked them for their service over the last nine months and praised the functionality of the KATUSA program.

“The Korean Augmentation to the United States Army program provides an invaluable and unique relationship between our two armies,” Fairless said.

Lt. Col. John Horning, commander, 5th Squadron, 7th Cav., welcomed the KATUSA Soldiers, evoked the long and storied history of the 7th Cav. in South Korea, and honored the bravery of the Dog Faced Soldiers who earned Medals of Honor during the Korean War.

“From the very beginning, the 7th Cavalry, part of the 1st Cavalry Division

at the time, took part in the United Nations Defensive starting in June of 1950. The UN Offensive following is where we fought North Korea and captured Pyongyang,” said Horning. “We were here when the communist Chinese intervened and we are once again part of the counteroffensive. The 7th Cavalry fought in Korea until the final winter and armistice in 1953.”

Horning concluded his comments with a message of brotherhood and a call to remain steadfast.

“To our Korean brothers, we are proud to have you join our ranks as we join your cause,” said Horning. “Katchi Kapshida! We go together!”

The Raider Brigade has a storied history including four deployments to Iraq and, most recently, to Europe in 2015 as part of Operation Atlantic Resolve. While this is a new mission for the Raider Brigade and 3rd ID, it is the Army’s fifth rotation to South Korea. The rotations began in 2015 after the 2nd ID’s last organic combat brigade was deactivated.

In South Korea, the Raider Brigade will be supporting the 2nd ID in deterring aggression

from The Peoples Democratic Republic of Korea and maintaining peace on the Peninsula.

“The seriousness of this mission is paramount, because forces that don’t have the skill to win cannot deter,” said Adams. “Every Raider Soldier, NCO and Officer represented on the field today is ready to maintain themselves and their equipment at the highest state of readiness.”

Tool helps 'see' the battlefield

What if you could visualize your unit's movements on the battlefield, like a min-map in a video game? That is exactly the purpose of the Joint Battle Command-Platform, a computer system that visually communicates battlefield changes.

Soldiers from 2nd Combined Arms Battalion, 69th Armor Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Comwbat Team, 3rd Infantry Division spent a week of mastering the basics of this system at Fort Stewart, Feb. 19-23.

According to the Army's JBC-P website, this new capability is the Army's next generation force tracking system, equipping Soldiers with secure data encryption, free draw, text and messaging, delivering situational awareness to Soldiers at all levels on the battlefield.

"The system allows Soldiers to have a shared map and see movements and updates on that map," said Anthony Kempson, general dynamics training integrator for the JBC-P system. It should seem familiar to computer savvy Soldiers, with its tablet-like interface, touch-to-zoom maps, and drag-and-drop icons.

Stan Garden, Kempson's colleague, added that the GPS on the system tracks and updates positions every 100 meters, in real-time.

As Spartan Soldiers become proficient with JBC-P, they can directly feed new information ranging from enemy activities to terrain changes to the chain of command. Soldiers regularly contribute information from the battlefield, allowing commanders to make more informed decisions with their assets during war.

"The JBC-P provides commanders at all levels a communication tool that helps them see the battlefield and helps inform

decision making," said Capt. Elise Neel, brigade signal officer. "This is one of many mission command systems we leverage to see ourselves, the enemy and the terrain."

As the Army's 15th and newest ABCT, the Spartan Brigade has begun fielding their ground combat vehicles and will begin crew and collective training this spring. Part of the fielding and training includes the installation of the JBC-P system on all three of the brigade's primary combat equipment: the Abrams main battle tank, Bradley fighting vehicle and the Paladin self-propelled howitzer.

Purple Heart awarded to World War II veteran 74 years later

On April 11, 1944, the “Kansas City Kitty”, a B-24 Liberator bomber assigned to the 566th Bombardment Squadron of the 8th Army Air Force out of Hethel, England, was shot down by enemy aircraft over Germany during World War II.

On February 23, nearly 74 years later, Edward H. Mims was presented the Purple Heart Medal for the wounds he received in the crashing bomber. He was 20 years old that fateful day; he's now 83 and living in The Villages—a retirement community roughly an hour northwestern of Orlando—with his wife, Sandi.

“I’m thankful that I’m here,” Mims said. “It was unbelievable that I was spared.”

Mims was the top turret gunner on the bomber, serving alongside 10 men. Seven men, including Mims, bailed out of the aircraft after it was hit by enemy fighter fire. One man's parachute did not open. Mims and the surviving five men were captured and held as prisoners of war in Stalag 17B in Austria. He spent 390 days in the camp, where 4,000 others were held. Mims was liberated by U.S. forces on May 3, 1945, after enduring a westward 300-mile march after the stalag was evacuated in the face of oncoming Soviet forces encroaching from the east. Being a POW “wasn’t a picnic,” Mims said.

“It was something I didn’t want to go through,” he said. “But most of us managed.”

Gene Parent, a military veteran and resident of The Villages and Mrs. Mims were instrumental in securing Mims’ Purple Heart.

“We had to follow procedures to make a request to

change military documents to include all military medals not yet awarded to him for World War II action in Europe,” said Parent during the Purple Heart Medal ceremony held in the Villages’ Eisenhower Recreation Center. “After filling out all the paperwork... (he was) denied the Purple Heart because the review board said they could not be sure his injuries were sustained by enemy action. You see, his military records were destroyed in the St. Louis fire back in 1973.”

It took seven years of hard work and social media sleuthing to ensure Mims was awarded the medal he deserved.

“There was enough eye witness documentation to show that Sgt. Mims received injuries from the fire that went up through his top turret position and burned his face, head, and hands,” Parent said.

It also took the support of the Trump administration, Mrs. Mims said.

“I am overwhelmed and have abundant joy and appreciation that my husband can be honored the way he should be honored,” she said.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield garrison command team Col. Jason Wolter and Command Sgt. Maj. Marty Conroy presented the Purple Heart to Mims in the community’s Eisenhower Recreation Center. It was a fitting location for the ceremony, with its museum vibe, showcasing artifacts from throughout the nation’s military history.

“This is long overdue,” Col. Wolter said. “Thank you for your service and sacrifice.”

Although long overdue, Mrs. Mims said her husband still endures the unseen wounds the war left behind.

“He has post-traumatic stress disorder,” she said. “He has nightmares, continual nightmares, where he

is in the plane. And he’ll wake me and he says ‘would you please see if we’re on land or in the sky.’ It’s an everlasting effect. For so long, he kept it in, didn’t want to share it with his family. They kept on saying ‘Ed, our children need to know what you and others have done for our county. Talk about it.’ And he began to talk about.”

Mims started to open up about his service about eight years ago, roughly the same time Mrs. Mims bought tickets for him and her to fly in a restored B-24 on Father’s Day. Mims eyes’ lit up and he chuckled as Mrs. Mims described the experience.

““It was so barbaric and so cold and smelled like gasoline,” Mrs. Mims said.

Mims said he was amazed people made an effort to restore a B-24.

“I was just surprised,” he said. “I appreciated it.”

As part of the ceremony, Parent asked for a moment of silence to honor the crew of Mims’ Liberator.

The names of the crew are:

Pilot, 1st Lt. Jack Wyatt, killed in action.

Co-pilot, 2nd Lt. David Stiner, prisoner of war.

Navigator, 2nd Lt. Richard Gustafson, killed in action.

Bombardier, 2nd Lt. George Sherry, killed in action.

Nose turret gunner, Staff Sgt. Robert Tackett, killed in action.



Bank on it: Military Saves Week encourages saving over spending

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO, FORT SAM HOUSTON, TEXAS - Unless you have a money tree in your backyard, it's likely that growing your personal finances from a tiny acorn to a mighty oak takes constant vigilance. Just like providing water and food to the garden, Soldiers and family members must employ tactics such as saving regularly and avoiding too much debt.

"The financial readiness of Soldiers and their families is a priority for the Army because it has a direct effect on mission readiness," Lt. Gen. Kenneth R. Dahl, Commanding General, U.S. Army Installation Management Command, said while signing a proclamation noting the Feb. 26 to March 3 observance of Military Saves Week.

"Soldiers and their families who manage their finances successfully have less stress and worry over bills, and are better equipped to withstand the unique demands of Army life," Dahl said. "Sound money management also helps them protect themselves against predatory lending and financial fraud."

This year's Military Saves theme is "Set a Goal. Make a Plan. Save Automatically."

The Military Saves proclamation, which Dahl signed Feb. 20 while accompanied

by IMCOM Command Sgt. Maj. Melissa A. Judkins, states the importance of personal and household savings, calling it "fundamental to America's stability and vitality."

Soldiers and their families are encouraged to save regularly, set aside funds for retirement and pay off debt quickly. "The knowledge that personal finances are secure at home facilitates Soldier readiness," Dahl said.

After the signing, Dahl informally asked some of his staff members, "Are you saving money?" All replied affirmatively.

Dahl also recommended that Soldiers, families, civilians and retirees take the Military Saves pledge at <https://militarysaves.org/for-savers/savings-tools-and-resources/take-the-pledge> to save money, reduce debt and build wealth over time.

The pledge allows participants to choose a goal, such as creating an emergency fund, saving for retirement or a special trip, repaying debt, financing education, or building a transition fund for moves due to permanent change of station, temporary duty or

shifting to civilian life.

WTB civilian mentors young basketball players

In a crowded locker room, the Bradwell Tigers Varsity Girls Basketball team receives their last words of wisdom before heading out onto the court. Leading the charge is Assistant Coach, U.S. Army MEDDAC – Fort Stewart Warrior Transition Battalion, Victim Advocate, and former Army Sgt. Major, Dana King. King relies on the training and discipline that he received in his 25 years in the Army to keep the Lady Tigers ready and vigilant.

King, has spent over 10 years of his life as the assistant coach for the Lady Tigers, and understands the importance of providing his young team with a foundation in self-restraint.

“That’s our future,” King said. “The kids are our future, so we [have] to mentor them, to put them on the right track. So, this is going to be their world. We’re going to be gone one day, and we want to set the perfect example, the right example, for them to succeed in this world.”

Discipline and duty are principals that King understands well. King’s position as a victim advocate for the WTB, which involves counseling young Soldiers daily, has helped provide him with the necessary tools he needs when mentoring his young players on the court.

“Coach King has made a big impact on me,” Bradwell point guard Re’aja Depriest said. “When I first started, I didn’t have everything, but as a coach, he makes sure he’s going to get us there.”

King’s military training and discipline as a retired senior non-commissioned officer helps the players see the importance of preparing for the big challenges in life.

“He trains us really hard, and makes sure we have heart, and we never give up,” Depriest said. Head Varsity Girls’ Basketball Coach, Faye Baker has

spent over 10 years alongside the retired senior NCO and understands the value he brings to the team.

“He brings discipline,” Baker said. “I mean, that’s one thing, one capacity that I don’t have to worry about, you know, as far as, training and getting the girls in the best shape possible to be ready to execute on the floor. So, he brings so much to our program, and I couldn’t do this without him.”

For Baker and King, keeping their team prepared for any contingency on the court is important, but they never lose sight of what really matters: providing the young girls on the team with a foundation for success.

“It’s more than winning basketball games,” Baker said. “It’s making these girls into productive citizens. So, we want them to work hard in all aspects of their life.”

At press time, the Lady Tigers were preparing to continue in the Georgia High School Association playoffs

for the win. Even though King is focused on the Lady Tiger’s next victory he never lets that get in the way of his primary mission - providing the Soldiers of the WTB with a healing environment, so they can focus on what’s important, their mission to heal.

The flowers have wilted and been thrown away. The chocolates have all been eaten and the box is gone. That special dress has been dry-cleaned and is hanging in a plastic bag in the closet.

Since Valentine's Day loving couples have had disagreements, spats and even arguments. What happened to the happy feelings and undying love celebrated a few weeks ago? What happened to "I love you"?

Life's what happened.

Love is emotional, but it's not just about emotions. Love generates powerful feelings, but we can get very confused by our feelings. Mature love is far more than flowers and chocolates. Mature love is about commitment, not simply pleasure, connection or companionship.

Have you ever known a couple who has been married fifty years or more? They don't act like kids. Sometimes they may even sound harsh or angry when they talk to each other. They get excited about other things than romance or fun.

They can often finish each other's sentences with 100% accuracy. They see or hear something and, without either speaking a word, they're smiling to each other or sharing a silent tear because of a shared memory.



Ready for battle: 3rd ID heads to invitational

The 3rd Infantry Division finalized its combatives team roster on Feb. 16 with five fighters from various units across Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield.

Closing out the final training week at the Spartan Combatives Facility, the team readied its participants for the Combatives Tournament Invitational taking place Feb. 28-Mar. 3 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

"The concept of Army combatives is not mixed martial arts," said Staff Sgt. Thomas J. Housewright, combatives coach, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd ID. "You take some of the fundamentals of MMA and apply tactical uses, with and without weapons. That is what you get with combatives."

He added it's tactical extreme-close-quarters combat in a controlled environment.

Housewright has always been a fighter. Hailing from Gloucester City, New Jersey, he felt his surroundings growing up bred him to be the fighter he considers himself today.

It was an amateur match against one of his former Soldiers that humbled and motivated him to learn combatives and eventually compete in Army tournaments.

"He was really into MMA," Housewright said of his competitor. "He kicked my behind, but I didn't take it lying down. I couldn't accept losing, so I had to learn combatives to prevent myself from losing again."

Housewright stated he was determined to improve

and maximize his skill level, so he attended the Tactical Army Combatives Instructor Course located in Fort Benning.

Competing in numerous tournaments and being a combatives instructor at both Fort Drum, New York and in Germany, led him to develop a Marne combatives program for Dog Face Soldiers.

Pfc. Michael Roberts, assigned to 3rd Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment, 2nd ABCT and a Houston, Texas native, said he jumped at the chance to join the team when his first sergeant asked if he was interested.

"Two years ago, when I first arrived at Stewart, I learned a bit more about combatives and tried out for the team because it was something I felt passionate about," Roberts said. "When I heard about Staff Sgt. Housewright's program, I immediately made it known that I wanted to be on the team."

Roberts said his down time is training time. Stretching to keep his body limber, cardio workouts to increase endurance and meditation to rid himself of any jitters are all a part of his regimen to be a stronger competitor at the tournament, he added.

"I'm working to be the best version of myself that I can be, plain and simple," Roberts said. "I have to push past my limits and outdo my fellow competitors."

Roberts was referring to Pfc. Jordan Dunn, assigned to 3rd Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment. Dunn also considers his biggest competition and rival to be Roberts.

"Roberts and I are in the same unit, so I want to be the best fighter coming out of H Co.," said Dunn. "It's healthy competition and pushes both of us to be better Soldiers altogether."

Dunn said his approach to the training led him to discover his flaws, ways to improve and strengths he can refine to use throughout the competition.

"There's no way you're always going to win," he said. "You have to learn what you can as you go, and having little experience in something like this makes me more determined to go and show everyone my efforts."

While managing to recruit five fighters for the team, Housewright is still struggling to fill slots due to misconceptions about the training.

"There is this fear amongst some leaders that their Soldiers will get injured and miss duty at a critical time if they join the combatives team," Housewright said. "I can honestly tell you that the training is done in a controlled environment where the basics and fundamentals are drilled into each fighter, which helps prevent injury."

He wants 3rd ID leadership to feel confident their Soldiers are in good hands - learning how to be tactful and aware of what they can do to mitigate serious injury.

For Housewright's program to draw in more members, he needs leadership across Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield to communicate to their Soldiers that 3rd ID has a combatives team and all are welcome to try out.

"The most important thing for me outside of getting my team ready to compete at Bragg is getting the leadership to understand that this is not a fight-house system. This isn't MMA," Housewright said. "These

In order to recertify Basic Allowance for Housing, Soldiers need to see their Battalion S1, not the Fort Stewart Defense Military Pay Office. The S1 will validate all supporting documents are loaded into IPERMS. Soldiers will need to complete a DA Form 5960 and have it certified by their company level commander. If designated by the company commander, the first commissioned officer in the Soldier's chain of command can certify. Then the S1 will upload the DA Form 5960 into IPERMS. The Fort Stewart Defense Military Pay Office will only be involved in the recertification if there is a change.
