## Fort Benning hosts Sullivan Cup

Four-person tank crews from across the U.S. Army, U.S. Marine Corps and partner nations met at Fort Benning, to take part in the Sullivan Cup April 30 through Fridav. The Sullivan Cup is a biennial competition to determine the best tank crew through a series of scored tests.

The Maneuver Center of Excellence, the U.S. Army Armor School, and the 316th Cavalry Brigade host the competition, and invited the public to observe.

At a demonstration at Red Cloud Range at Fort Benning April 27, Col. Thomas Feltev. 316th Cavalry Brigade commander, talked about the competition.

"You're going to see a demonstration of our Army's tank crews' proficiency, conducting both live fire and maneuver exercises," said Feltey. "What we're putting together is a series of arduous testing -it's both technical and tactical -- to get the most out of our Soldiers in this competition."

Feltey stressed the complexity of the tank crew's performance.

"There's a lot of activity that goes on inside these tanks, so they've got to synchronize the actions of the driver, the loader, the gunner and the tank commander," he said. "Then they've

got to understand the terrain so they can move their vehicle tactically ... while taking into account what the enemy is doing."

One of the goals of the Sullivan

Cup, according to Feltey, is the demonstration of good doctrinal technique, which begins at the Maneuver Center of Excellence and Fort Benning. "We're following our doctrinal foundation of our integrated

weapons training strategy," he said. "And we're modeling exactly what these tank crews and these units can do back at their home station."

Throughout the week, the crews are scheduled to perform a gunnery skills test, engage targets with their tanks' weapon systems, call for fire, take written exams, perform tank-related physical fitness tasks, conduct a competitive combat maneuver exercise, conduct a timed stress shoot, and more.

The weeklong competition is open to members of the public, whom Felty welcomed so they might witness the difficult work that goes into tank operation.

"This is their Army, so it's a great opportunity for them to come out and see what we do on preparation that goes into being Fort Benning, Ga., May 1.

able to fire these tanks."

The first big event of the Sullivan Cup was Operation Thunderbolt, which took place in the afternoon of April 30 at Red Cloud Range.

"If they come to the demonstration on Monday, they're not only going to get to see a tank, but arguably they're going to feel the power of the 120mm main gun and also our mortars that are out here," said

"My preparation for brigade NCO of the year has been an ongoing process. I trained everyday, three times a day, so when I got the opportunity to compete, I was ready." said Travis.

Twelve Spartans assembled early on Wednesday morning, six Soldiers, six NCO's, to conduct a modified version of the Soldier Readiness Test, the first event of the competition. The SRT is the Army's new physical fitness test, it is gender neutral and consists of six events that closely simulate physical tasks Soldiers conduct on the battlefield.

Each event was timed and point values were assigned, completing events quicker granted the Soldiers more points to increase their standing in the overall competition.



## 703rd Maintainers conduct BSA live-fire

Maintainers with 703rd Brigade Support Battalion, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, established a brigade support area and conducted a base defense live fire exercise, April 25, at Fort Stewart.

The "Maintain" Battalion utilized the Fort Stewart training area to simulate an operational environment and neutralize "threats" intended to disrupt the unit's logistical operations.

Occupying and defending a BSA is a core task for the support battalion. A BSA is the hub for all the brigade's logistical activities. In addition to providing critical sustainment, the BSB must be able to secure and defend its position.

Occupation of a BSA occupation is a deliberate process. After occupation, the BSB must develop a defense plan that secures and protects the BSA activities during decisive action operations.

Now as an armored brigade combat team the Spartan Brigade has a larger logistical footprint than when they were an infantry brigade combat team, the increased size offers different and unique challenges.

Maj. Benjamin T Nakamura, the 2nd ABCT logistical officer in charge, spoke on the importance of a BSA by explaining.

"A brigade support area is where we coordinate support that's going to go out to the units while they are fighting, it's our central hub. The BSB log assets are there making it accessible for them to take out to their units. Supplies are pushed out from the BSA and forward to the fight."

Nakamura went on to talk about finding a viable location to centralize the BSA. Giving our front line a direct access to supplies.

"It needs to be an area that's easily defendable, but can't be too close to the forward line of troops where the battle will take place. You want it to be accessible to high speed avenues of approach allowing you to get to areas where you will be linking up with troops and pushing logistical packages"

All Soldiers arriving at the BSA have an understood task and purpose, setting up the BSA, conducting maintenance on military vehicles and equipment, supporting 2nd ABCT with fuel, ammo, and medical tents are all part of the "Maintainers" mission.

"Taking us from the shop environment back into the field is a good feeling," said Spc. Jorge Medina, a radio comsec security repairer with B. Co. 703rd BSB. "The process of the exercise is something a lot of junior enlisted Soldiers never learned, and receiving this training for future deployments makes us more confident in our abilities to support the brigade mission."

Competitors then donned rucksacks and weapons for a three mile timed ruck march.

Upon arrival, competitors zeroed and qualified on their M4 carbine rifles. Soldiers needed to hit a minimum of 23 targets out of 40 to qualify and move on to the weapon lanes, which consisted of an M9 pistol, an M249 squad automatic weapon, and an M240 machine gun. Soldiers had to disassemble, reassemble, and conduct function checks on each weapon as fast as possible.

"The most challenging event for me was the weapons disassembly/reassembly lane," said Travis.

The event then moved to the Fort Stewart obstacle course where Soldiers executed timed runs, which consisted of numerous log and rope obstacles, and several tunnel and wire obstacles. Soldiers fought against the clock to finish the course as fast as possible, to have a shot at the land navigation challenge.

The land navigation challenge event consisted

of two iterations, day and night.

"The heat coupled with the heavy gear we wore made it difficult to navigate the dense vegetation," said Clark

Soldiers had four hours to find as many points as possible during the day and night portion.

On day two, contestants had to appear in front of a military board. The Soldiers were grilled on everything from the appearance of their uniforms to subjects such as the Constitution, military law, and Army regulations.

"The board itself was the most challenging aspect of this competition for me," said Clark.

The two Soldiers said they will spend the weekend studying board topics and refreshing their marksmanship skills, so that they are ready to represent the Spartan Brigade at the division-level competition.

"I am proud of my brigade and its accomplishments," said Clark, "I feel honored and thankful for the opportunity to represent all Spartans."





## Marne leaders learn about available helping resources

Marne Leaders learn more about Fort Stewart's Helping Resources

Various leaders of the 3rd Infantry Division participated in a tour of Fort Stewart helping resources with an emphasis on behavioral health assets on April 26.

Battalion and company level leadership toured 10 agencies and met with program managers to gain better insight into the resources they provide to Soldiers and Families.

"The goal was to familiarize commanders, first sergeants and senior leaders with helping resources and ways these resources can assist Soldiers," said Marji Freeze, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield ready and resilient integrator.

"It is important to educate ourselves on all the resources, what they offer and how they strengthen the force," said Jacqueline Auberger, behavioral health outreach coordinator for Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield.

Auberger said learning about the different types of resources and assistance they provide helps leaders

identify possible risk factors in Soldiers and Family members, and apply intervention techniques need at the right time.

The leaders learned helping resources can offer assistance beyond crisis intervention.

Maj. Andrew Nix, Fort Stewart Garrison Family Life Chaplain said that in moments of crisis there are specific steps leaders must take, but leaders need to know helping resources can aid in the prevention of those moments.

"There are more resources than people realize," Nix said. "Some agencies have specialties, but all agencies work together cooperatively to assist Soldiers.'

The tour gave leaders a chance to see where agencies are located, and learn more about the specific assistance they offer to Soldiers and their families.

"I have been in command for 14 months, and thought I knew everything about suicide prevention and behavioral health," said Capt. Bryan Neal, commander, headquarters and headquarters battery, 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment. "I was able to see some locations I had not been to, met some people that can provide assistance to Soldiers in need and learned a little more about the services these resources provide."


#### TRICARE after retirement

Retiring from active duty, whether a medical retirement or a regular retirement, is a significant life event. You should know before you retire which TRICARE programs best suit your and your family's needs.

Once you retire, you'll only have 90 days from your retirement date to enroll in a TRICARE plan to continue TRICARE coverage. During the time without selection of plan coverage (TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select) you will be eligible in DEERS as "Direct Care."

This term only means "access to use the Military Healthhcare System(MHS)," but with limitations. "Direct Care" should never be considered as insurance.



## RSSB cooks: Feeding an Army

**BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan** - In the desert of southern Afghanistan, a tiny base hosts hundreds of military personnel, civilians and contractors. The cooks of the 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade work long hours every day to provide quality food for them in spite of the austere conditions in the field dining facility.

For a time, one dining facility on Camp Shorab served all of the personnel stationed there. As missions changed and more military personnel were sent to the camp, that facility could barely keep up with the influx.

"Task Force Southwest requested assistance for validating requirements for renovating the DFAC," said Chief Warrant Officer 3 Yessenia Johnson, the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB food advisor. "They were operating a 1000 man facility and we decided they need a 1500 man facility."

The DynCorp International DFAC prepares food for its patrons, but even adding an outdoor seating area couldn't mitigate the large amount of customers that relied on the facility. The RSSB food advisory team saw a need to assist with feeding the populous of Shorab and reduce the load on DynCorp employees.

"To make up for the Security Forces Assistance Brigade's increase in personnel, additional field feeding equipment was needed," Johnson said. "The RSSB was tasked to operate Expeditionary TRICON Kitchen Systems and feed 400 people per meal."

Now, a small team from the RSSB mans the Field Feeding Mess tent, providing breakfast and dinner all week. The team consists of Soldiers who cook, serve food and manage rations.

"At first, you never know what you're going to get coming to a new place," said Spc. Keshone Lisbon, a culinary specialist assigned to the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB. "I feel like being out here these last couple of months has turned me into a good cook."

When they first deployed to Afghanistan, these cooks were part of the security platoon for the brigade. For five months, they worked outside of their occupational specialty to protect the United States Forces - Afghanistan compound. When they were called back to their original job, it was a chance to improve themselves in their original specialty.

"I was cooking well in garrison, but I never had the opportunity to cook on a deployment," Lisbon said. "So having that experience, I know it is going to make me a better culinary specialist in the long run."

A primary difference between cooking in garrison versus a deployment is the amount of resources available for meal production. The Soldiers cook out of ETKS,

roughly half the size of a shipping container, to produce meals for the hundreds of patrons that frequent their feed tent.

While it is a far cry from the functionality of a DFAC, the cooks continue to prepare high-quality meals for the patrons of the ETKS. The RSSB Soldiers make the most out of their situation, knowing that this is an experience they can take back to the states.

Lisbon said that they try to give out the best food in this austere situation. He said that every day they get stronger as a team, and he looks forward to his team being stronger as a whole when they get back to garrison.

**BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan** - To continue to bring awareness to the Army's Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention Program (SHARP), Soldiers with the 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade conducted events throughout April for Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month. Events included spin classes, painting, self-defense classes and solariums.

"All these events are geared towards preventing sexual assault," said Sgt. 1st Class Jennifer Darling, the sexual assault response coordinator for the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB. "Since sexual assault does happen, regardless if you are down range or back home, I think it's a great idea to bring awareness while we are out here."

Building awareness goes both ways for preventing sexual assault. Darling planned solariums to effectively get a pulse on Soldiers' perspectives on SHARP.

"Solariums are discussions to get feedback from the Soldiers to see how the programs are working and what the command can do to improve the program," Darling said. "Rather than take a big class, we take a small group so we can hear the voice of the Soldiers."

Darling went around the Combined Joint Operations Area – Afghanistan, conducting these solariums. She gathered groups ranging from all females to all males, lower and senior enlisted and officers to get a broader perspective on potential improvements they'd like to see to the program.

"I think it's working, looking at it from 16 years ago when I joined to where we're at now," said Darling. "Back then we were in the reactive phase, but right now we are trying to be proactive."

To help Soldiers be proactive, the brigade put on a self-defense class. During this class, groups of Soldiers could practice escaping from an assault in a safe environment.

"We educated them on the realism on what can happen and provided the class self-defense knowledge through a training environment," said Sgt. Corey Sones, the 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB network operations noncommissioned officer, who taught the self-defense class. "We prepare them against sexual predators and potential dangers while we're out here."

The class included a variety of potential threats, including being pushed to the ground, being choked from behind or from the front, as well as being bear-hugged. Sones ran through each attack, demonstrated how to escape them and concluded the class by doing all the attacks at random to simulate a real threat.

"We did 100 percent drills where the trainer would choke the trainee," he said. "People are not used to being attacked so we wanted to make sure they were knowledgeable on how to escape in a safe manner."

As April comes to a close, deployed Soldiers have been taught sexual assault response and prevention, through both physical protection with self-defense and increasing overall awareness of the resources available to them.

"I hope that they did get something out of it this month, however my hope is that sexual assault, sexual harassment awareness isn't only during this month, but every single day they are being proactive in preventing sexual assault in our formation," Darling said.

The Army SHARP continues to develop to combat threats to our Soldiers, civilians and coalition partners, to provide the resources so people can take a stand against sexual assault and harassment.

## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

## Views on war in the Pacific, Part 4

The standing US Army and Navy prior to December 1941 were insufficient to conduct offensive operations. Until training was complete and many new vessels were built, those already present in the South Pacific had drawn the short straw. This included Chaplain Joseph V. La Fleur who was stationed at Bataan when it fell, April 9, 1942. La Fleur was placed with 300 other prisoners of war and they were loaded into the holds of a Japanese cargo ship.

On the way to the Japanese home islands, this ship was hit by U.S. naval forces. As this Japanese ship was sinking, La Fleur helped the POWs get out of the hold and onto the deck.

Daniel Jorgensen writes "The Japanese shot at them and only two or three survived. La Fleur died as he lived, serving his men."

On May 27, 1942 Japan celebrated Navy Day, and a Japanese English newspaper wrote the following editorial: Today, Britain's control over the seas has vanished, thanks to the work of the German and Italian submarines and more to the work of the Japanese Navy. Britain's auxiliary, the United States, has likewise

had her navy practically destroyed by the Japanese Navy. As a result, Japan stands today as the premier naval power of the world. It may well presage the rise of Japan to the future history of the world to a position comparable to that which Britain has occupied in the

No American carriers had been at Pearl Harbor.

On May 18, 1942, the Halsey-Doolittle raid sent sixteen B-25 (Mitchell) bombers flying off the deck of the USS Hornet on a one way mission to firebomb the Japanese home islands. Fifteen of the B-25s crash landed in China when they ran out of fuel. One landed in the Soviet Union. Some damage was done, but mainly the Halsey-Doolittle raid was a psychological operation which demonstrated to the Japanese that their home islands were not "safe". The Japanese high command became preoccupied with the question of how to draw out Nimitz's remaining aircraft carriers. Their solution was to invade

The Japanese High Command expected Admiral Nimitz to respond forcefully to the Japanese invasion and seizure of United States territory. The Japanese wanted to draw the remaining American aircraft carriers into the North Pacific area, away from the

South Pacific. This would allow the Japanese to seize Midway Island, a feat which they had previously attempted one year prior.

The Army previously had ordered Colonel Simon Buckner to Anchorage and given him the responsibility of the defense of Alaska. The Alaska Territory was understood to be valuable, but it stood more or less defenseless. Alaska had little defense except for fog, ice, snow, and rough terrain. Buckner had to build everything that he needed. There were no roads or electricity, and very poor communications. On May 28, 1942, Japanese Vice Admiral Hosogaya began to move north with orders to "assault and seize the islands of Attu and Kiska and to divert United States naval attention to this northern theater and away from the main thrust at Midway, which would come one day later."

By the spring of 1942, Buckner (now a Major General) had 30 airfields built. There were fourteen military bases, and five air combat squadrons. His combined force totaled almost 25,000 personnel.

Buckner told a reporter "If the Japanese come, they may get a foothold. But it will be their children who will get as far as Anchorage, and their grandchildren who will make it to the States. And by then they will be American citizens."

## Safety Spotlight: Learn how to protect yourself, Family, friends from the heat

With summer approaching, so is the expectation for using sunscreen to protect yourself from sunburn caused by Georgia's "hot" weather. However, sunburn is not the only concern; you will need to protect yourself and your families from heat-related illness.

The at risk group of our population includes infants, small children, older adults; pets; individuals with heart or circulatory problems; or who participate in outdoor activities for extended periods of time.

The three critical heat-related illnesses are heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

Heat cramps are muscle spasms that usually affect

the legs or abdominal muscles, often after physical activity. Excessive sweating reduces salt levels in the body, which can result in heat cramps. Workers or athletes with pain or spasms in the abdomen, arms or legs should not return to work for a few hours. Instead, they

should sit or lie down in the shade, drink cool water or a sports drink, stretch affected muscles and seek medical attention if you have heart problems or if the cramps don't get better in an hour.

Heat exhaustion can be a sign of heatstroke. Symptoms include heavy sweating, rapid breathing, and a fast, weak pulse. These symptoms occur when the body loses an excessive amount of salt and water, and as a result, people who work outdoors and athletes are particularly susceptible. Additionally, these warning signs are similar to those of the flu and can include severe thirst, fatigue, headache, nausea, vomiting and, sometimes, diarrhea. Other symptoms include profuse sweating, clammy or pale skin, dizziness, rapid pulse and normal or slightly elevated body temperature. Uncontrolled heat exhaustion can evolve into heatstroke, so make sure to treat the victim quickly. First, move the individual to a shaded or air-conditioned area. Second, give them water or other cool, nonalcoholic beverages. Third, apply wet towels or having them take a refreshing shower.

Heatstroke can occur when the ability to sweat fails, and body temperature rises quickly. The brain and vital organs are essentially being "cooked" as body temperature rises to a dangerous level in a matter of minutes. Heatstroke is often fatal, and those who do survive may have permanent damage to their organs. Someone experiencing heatstroke will have extremely hot skin, and an altered mental state, ranging from slight confusion to coma. As such, seizures also can result. Therefore, ridding the body of excess heat is crucial for survival. First, move the person into a half-sitting position in the shade. Second, call for emergency medical help immediately. Additionally, if humidity is below 75 percent; then spray the patient with water and fan them vigorously, but if humidity is above 75 percent; then apply ice to neck, armpits or groin. Most importantly, do not give aspirin or acetaminophen and do not give the patient anything to drink.

## Scams continue to occur; don't give into scammer's demands

**QUANTICO, VA.** – The U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command's Computer Crime Investigative Unit continues to caution the Army community to be on the lookout for all types of "sextortion scams" where criminals will use any dishonest method to make contact with potential victims and then attempt to blackmail

"To avoid falling prey to a sextortionist never send compromising photos or videos of yourself to anyone, whether you know them or think you know them," said Special Agent Daniel Andrews, director of CCIU. "Turn off your electronic devices and physically block web cameras when you are not using them."

Officials describe "sextortion scams" as cyber sexual extortion where perpetrators conduct schemes that leverage online sexual acts for financial gain or other forms of blackmail. In addition, when using a legitimate online dating site, victims are more apt to provide personal information and or participate in online "compromising acts;" however, CID officials are warning the Army community to be very cautious of their online communications activity and not share intimate, personal information with strangers or people you have never met in person.

"These criminals will try to get unsuspecting service members to engage in online sexual activities and then demand money or favors in exchange for not publicizing potentially embarrassing information or turning them over to law enforcement," said Andrews.

Once the Soldier sends a compromising photo or participates in a video chat, the perpetrator threatens to send those images to the Soldier's command, family, and friends unless "ransom money" is paid, according to CCIU officials. One recent scam is where the criminal will claim that the Soldier sent sexual images to a minor, who has now become the alleged victim, and threaten to report the Soldier to law enforcement unless a monetary fee is paid.

"If you meet a person on a legitimate online dating site there is very little chance that you are actually communicating with an underage person,"

Andrews said. "It is therefore very unlikely that you sent or received child pornography or provided your images/ videos to a minor. If you met someone online who later claims to be underage you should immediately cease all communications with that person and notify Army CID."

"It is important to also keep in mind that law enforcement, to include Army CID, will never agree not to take legal action if you agree to pay [ransom] money to the alleged victim or to the

alleged victim's family," he said. "If law enforcement gets involved early on, there are investigative steps that may help identify the perpetrators responsible for victimizing Army personnel."

Another way that the criminals attempt to extort money is to claim that they are a lawyer working on

behalf of the alleged victim. The scammer will request payments are made for things such as counseling for the alleged victim and to replace electronic devices that now contain child pornography. If these demands are not met the person alleging to be the lawyer threatens to report the incident to law enforcement. Andrews said legitimate organizations will not contact you and ask for money in lieu of reporting you to law enforcement and typically law enforcement will not attempt to make contact with you over the phone.

If you are contacted via telephone, always request validating information such as an agency email address and offer to meet in person at a law enforcement facility before proceeding with giving out your personal information.

"Stop communication immediately with these individuals and do not send money because it will not stop the criminal from demanding more money from you," CCIU officials said. "CCIU is aware of instances where scammers threatened to release videos unless a second or even a third payment is made."

Unfortunately, these incidents continue to occur on the internet across the globe, and sextortion victims are encouraged to seek the assistance of law enforcement. Army CID agents say they can help if you find yourself in any

of these types of predicaments. "Victims are at risk of further exploitation, that can include demands for additional payments, more sexual images, sensitive military information, or access to U.S. Army systems and facilities, so early notification to law enforcement is important," CID agents emphasized.

- If victims are not eligible for military services, or where military services are not available, the VWL can provide liaison assistance in seeking any available nonmilitary services within the civilian community.
