Marne air uncases colors

Future leaders now in Army CDCs

Toddlers playing in Army child development centers today are learning the cognitive, emotional and social skills that will equip them to succeed as America's future leaders. The Army doesn't merely provide daycare for our children and families, we provide our nation's best child development curri-

The Army's nationally recognized child development programs offer families quality, consistent and convenient services that enable Soldiers to focus on their mission and spouses to pursue professional ambitions. In the process, we're creating the next generation of American leaders. It is the Army civilian professionals in our Child and Youth Services system that make the difference.

Army child development services, managed and delivered by Installation Management Command professionals at 192 Child Development Centers around the world, are held up as a national model of what excellence looks like. Our services have evolved and improved across time in response to changes in the military force itself.

Following the move to an all-volunteer military force in 1973, the Army no longer consisted primarily of single men, but instead attracted married career-oriented personnel with families. Base commanders recognized that developing children was linked to military readiness and retention, allowed spouses to work, and contributed to families' financial stability. These programs were quickly faced with growing demand from families, including dual-mil-

The Military Child Care Act of 1989 directed the DoD to appropriate funds to each service to improve childcare staff training, compensation, child abuse prevention and safety measures, and to provide an age-appropriate curriculum that emphasized "development" over "daycare."

The Army's child development program is based on the premise that the best preparation for adulthood results from developing the social and emotional skills needed to succeed, rather than just being able to recite the alphabet at a young age. Since the 1997 White House Symposium on Childcare, the military's child development program has been seen as a national model.

CDCs on Army installations provide convenient access for Soldiers and their families, and to other groups on a space-available basis.

Local commanders factor in local considerations to decide how to best serve their populations. Army CDCs follow developmental curricula for each age group, and recordkeeping is consistent across the Army to facilitate changes of station.

Some parents, after seeing their children flourish in CDCs, decide to pursue child development as a profession themselves. The Army offers a professional pathway for certified providers, in essence "growing our own." These homegrown providers understand what it takes for family members to meet the unique demands of Army life. Their structured curricula and personal interactions with children naturally develop a resiliency that strengthens them for future challenges.

The intent is to raise happy, well-adjusted and confident children, and that does not occur by happenstance. The Army invests in the compensation and continuing development of a cadre of passionate, compassionate and dedicated professionals who offer regulated care options in safe, functional facilities. These professionals all pass stringent background checks, and all providers are certified and evaluated to ensure they meet training, health and safety standards. Centers and their staff are subject to four unannounced inspections per year.


Army CDCs must meet national accreditation standards through an external evaluation process. Programs are accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children for ages birth to five or by the Council on Accreditation for ages 6 to 12 years old. Army CDCs maintain a 98.8 percent accreditation rate compared to about 10 percent nationally. High quality child development is measured by ongoing compliance with defined program standards with clear and routinely measured metrics.

Simply stated, all these things work together to make Army childcare significantly better than what is available off the installation. It is this commitment to quality in people and programming that is producing our nation's next generation of leaders. As our children grow into adulthood, the head start they got at Army CDCs will position them ahead of peers who grew up in systems of ordinary

So, if you are one of the more than 200,000 children enrolled in an Army CDC or one of their parents, you should recognize the advantages you've been given as a result. The tiny hands which today finger paint or stack blocks, share toys with classmates, or count fingers to work out math problems will one day hold





On the third day physical training using boats, rappelling, and land navigation was the challenge. Day four included a confidence course, an introduction to patrolling, practical exercises and base operations.





"There is another group I wish to recognize that took care of sick children and made families run while spouses were away," said Johnson. "They are the Family and friends of 3rd CAB." Suicide Prevention: Affirmation of Life

Soldiers throughout the 3rd Infantry Division participated in an Affirmation of Life event hosted by the 3rd ID Artillery at Fort Stewart, Georgia, July

20.
Capt. Romia Freeman, a behavioral health officer from DIVARTY, said the idea for Affirmation of Life stemmed from a routine suicide prevention training plan but with a more positive twist. It focuses on the importance of life and why each

day is valuable.

The event kicked off with a physical training competition between companies. Each company wore

their unit training shirt to represent their unit.

"Soldiers build resilience through athleticism, and we wanted them to know it's more than just working out," Freeman said. "It's about coming together, building comradery and learning that you're not alone."

After the physical training session, everyone gathered at Newman Gym to discuss the meaning of life.

Spc. John Calderon, a fire control specialist from 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, DIVARTY and an attempted suicide survivor, spoke on how

his life-changing event changed him for the better. "If it were not for the noncommissioned officers above me, I would not be here," Calderon said. "A suicide prevented is a life extended. Since then, I found that my purpose is to help those who are struggling the same way I was."

Following the speeches, attendees were encouraged to play various sports. Kickball, ultimate frisbee, basketball and a bounce house for the military were available for Soldiers and their Families to enjoy.

"I really enjoyed today," said 1st Lt. Antoinette Wilson, a chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear officer from 83rd Chemical Battalion. "(Physical training) this morning boosted everyone's morale, and the speakers from earlier weren't strangers; they were people we interact with every day who felt comfortable enough to tell us their experi-

ences."
Wilson said the experience opened her eyes because appearances alone won't tell what's going on behind closed doors, so it's important to build healthy relationships with everyone you come

across.

"Problems are temporary; suicide is permanent,"
Calderon said. "You wouldn't know how many
opportunities you might miss or how many solutions you would have if you follow through with it."

Poole credits his company for working together to get the job done. "It tested their skills," Poole said. "I was among the first to arrive on the scene then the rest of the team showed up and took care of business."

Wolter expressed his gratitude to the group

for their commitment to public safety and affirmed their critical role in everyday life on the installation.

"Other than our deployed Soldiers, law enforcement and firefighters do the most important jobs (to keep us safe)," Wolter said.

Wolter also took the opportunity to recog-

Ashdown reflected on closing this chapter of his life and starting the next

"I'm excited to be retiring but I'm nervous too," Ashdown said, "It's been a good career."

He will take his knowledge and expertise to the Liberty County Sherriff's officewhere he will work in the narcotics unit as an investigator.

Over his career, several missions stood out.

"There have been some bad ones and some good ones," Ashdown said. "This last one, at Jasmine Court, was definitely a good memory because we saved all their stuff, all of their belongings. The guys, as a team, took the stuff out of the place and we were able to salvage computers, just everything."

"Personal belongings that couldn't be replaced, pictures. That's amazing to me because we normally lose structural fires that have been in the attic for a period of time."

Some of his fondest memories and what he will miss the most, according to Ashdown, have to do with the band of brothers, the family away from home that he has been a part of for the past 26 years.

"The guys, the team, the family," Ashdown said. "The relationships with everyone here -- we cook together, we play cards together, I mean, we're here 16 days a month with each other. Technically, we're almost more of a family here than at home. I'm just going to miss that."



Walking into the office of Jenny Walker, Army Community Service Exceptional Family Member Program you will be met with a contagious smile

and welcoming greeting.
Walker leads the EFMI

Walker leads the EFMP program at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. EFMP as described by Walker is a program designed to assist any DEERS enrolled Family Member with needs that extend past the range of a general practitioner. The reason for the need of EFMP is to protect Family members and Soldiers from being placed at a duty station that does not have the proper resources to accommodate them.

Walker has some deep personal relations to the EFMP, with her children having been a part of the program. Walker acknowledges that parts of the program may be tedious but ultimately appreciates the aid given by the program. A common misconception regarding EFMP is that it is a career killer; this is simply a falsehood created by a misunderstanding of the nature of the program.

EFMP is designed to protect to Families from being placed in a helpless situation. EFMP is comprised of three different pieces that all work together to provide the best service for Soldiers and their Families. EFMP medical handles medical enrollment and paperwork. EFMP human resources will coordinate with EFMP medical for placement to ensure that proper resources are available at selected duty stations for Exceptional Family members.

ACS EFMP provides case management and assistance in finding resources. ACS EFMP is also responsible for ensuring that activities and facilities on post are accessible for members of the Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield community. All three aspects of the EFMP program strive to create the best situation for Soldiers and their Families when moving between military bases.

Walker believes that the importance of the EFMP is ultimately tied to readiness. Navigating a deployment can be straining on a Family, the added stress of needing support when locating resources for an Exceptional Family Member can add tension

between spouses in an already apprehensive situation. EFMP can provide support through handling school related issues including individualized educational plans and preventing parental frustrations from rising to their peak if the goals given in an IEP are not being met.

Walker states that she is fortunate to be a part of an amazing team of professionals. Mavis Crowell is an essential part of the EFMP team and has been working for Fort Stewart's ACS EFMP for over 13 years.

Crowell said EFMP can alleviate stress from PCSing by giving Families the vital resources and information they need for their Exceptional Family Members. System navigators Mandy Wilson and Philisa Campbell provide the program with unchallenged support. The system navigators are non-clinical case managers whom asses the needs of Families and create a plan that identifies and satisfies the needs of the Family. Walker with Crowell and system navigators Wilson and Campbell handle cases not only from Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield but also MacDill Airforce Base in Tampa, Florida.

The dedication of Walker and her team to military families of this region are admirable and can be seen when they describe their favorite part of the job: the ability to provide an inclusive

environment for all members of a military family and ultimately the relieved faces of Spouses and



Record set for TKD Championships

The World Class Athlete program and All Army Sports' Taekwondo team beat an Army record this year after walking away from 2018 nationals with six medals, two gold and four silver.

The team has been training since June 5 at Fort Carson, Colorado. Every year Soldiers apply to the All Army Taekwondo team and the qualifiers train with the WCAP Soldiers on post. The group of athletes prepared with high intensity workouts for the 2018 Taekwondo National Championship in early July and their hard work paid off.

"I am very excited and impressed with our athletes. Looking back at my time with the team this is the best performance and medal count we have had in the history of Army Taekwondo. Last year we tied the most medal count from 1999 and this year we beat that," said All Army head coach Staff Sgt. Jonathan Fennell.

Fennell is also a drill sergeant at Fort Benning. He balanced his duties and the training camp in order to orchestrate success from his athletes. One of his athletes Spc. Nashayla Harper, a member of the New York Army National Guard, won second place in the women's light-weight group.

WCAP's head coach Master Sgt. David Bartlett expressed his satisfaction about Nashayla's performance at nationals.

"I was proud Nashayla Harper got to the finals. She was on fire; she did very well," Bartlett said.

Pfc. David Kim, a member of WCAP, was among the two gold medalists of the competition. Kim has been going to nationals since he was eight years old. After winning his final fight in the men's fin weight class, he discussed a key element of preparation and his emotions after winning.

"The most important thing is rehydration and putting the right stuff into your body throughout the day," Kim said. "I feel awesome, I feel like I was supposed to win."

As a member of WCAP, Kim takes part in Total Soldier Enhancement Training, a way for Soldier athletes to give back to the Army and help other Soldiers with their knowledge of sports and a winning mentality.

"TSET is good, we interact with the Soldiers. We start with a mental skill -- ours is imagining targets -- and we explain what that is like. We discuss how we mentally imagine our opponents before we fight and then we teach them some kicks, stretching drills, and we finish with sparring," Kim said

Kim plans to stay in the Army after /CAP and possibly join Special Forces or Involvement Recruit missions. TAIRs partake in the Ranger Assessment Selection program.

Spc. Terrance Jennings won the second gold medal of the tournament. Jennings, a member of WCAP, won first place in the light weight class. He has been in the program for two years and is grateful for the opportunity.

"To compete with U.S. Army on my uniform is a very proud moment for me, I've been on several national teams and an Olympic team but it is something different knowing you are representing your country and a great group of people who all have the same passion and drive toward the end goal," Jennings said.

Jennings faced WCAP member Pfc. Charles Buset, who has been practicing taekwondo for 17 years, in the third round.

Ultimately Jennings won the fight.

"Beating a teammate is bitter-sweet, our sport is an individual sport; someone has to lose and someone has to win. I would have preferred it not have been him but that's how the sport works," Jennings said.

Another medalist among the team was Spc. Devon Lewis, the only woman on the WCAP team. She won second place in the women's fly-weight class. Devon mentioned how WCAP and All Army athletes are different than the rest of the compet-

"As Soldiers, we have been through things no one here has been through. We've been through basic training, advanced individual training, and we have

daily missions so no one here can contest to that, and it makes us stronger mentally and physically," Devon said.

Like Kim, Lewis takes part in TEST missions as well as Total Army are designed to educate a community about the Army and what it has

to offer as a career. "We went to two schools in New York City where we talked to students about the Army in general. We all told them our stories and how they can apply for the Army, the National Guard

and Army Reserves," Lewis said. Kim mentioned the team goes to elementary, middle and high schools

and the kids really enjoy it. Other medalists included Pfc. Niklas Poland, a WCAP Soldier who placed second in the men's welter-Russel Gresham who placed second in the men's heavy-weight class.

After the completion of the camp

and national tournament, team members were selected by the coaches for the International Military World Council games, better known as CISM.

The following will be competing at the 2018 taekwondo CISM games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil in November: All Army Soldiers Pfc. Taylor McLeod, Spc. Nashayla Harper, Sgt. Kevin Prieto, 1st Lt. Ryan Kim, Spc. James Rohleder; and WCAP Soldiers Pfc. Devon Lewis, Pfc. David Kim, Spc. Terrence Jennings, Pfc. Charles Buset, Pfc. Miklas Poland and an Airforce airman, Tech. Sgt. Sara Sayles.

The athletes have started to prepare for CISM and hope to bring home medals for the United States while representing the

Post-9/11 GI Billl changes

The Department of Defense issued a change to Department of Defense Instruction 1341.13, "Post-9/11 GI Bill," updating policy on the transfer of Post-9/11 GI Bill educational benefits by service members to eligible family members. Effective one year from the date of this change, eligibility to transfer Post-9/11 GI Bill education benefits will be limited to service members with at least six years, but not more than 16 years, of total creditable service. There is no change to current provisions requiring service member to have at least six years of service to apply to transfer benefits, and making a four-year commitment in the Armed Forces. 
