WASHINGTON -- The Installation Management Command will realign as a major subordinate command under the Army Materiel Command by March 1 in an effort to enhance readiness across Army installations, officials announced Friday.

"The Army is implementing aggressive reforms to free-up resources for readiness and modernization efforts and to improve overall efficiency," said Brig. Gen. Omar Jones, the Army's chief of public affairs.

Headquartered at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, IMCOM was created in 2002 to integrate and deliver base support to enable readiness for a globally-responsive Army.

IMCOM's 50,000-strong workforce will remain at their current locations, and no positions will be physically relocated or eliminated during the transition, officials said.

If a review later determines certain positions should be relocated or eliminated, no changes will occur until the incumbent either decides to leave the organization or is properly reassigned, they added.

AMC, a four-star command, currently performs installation support for depots, ammunition plants and other facilities. It provides service functions from management of installation power-projection platforms to installation contracting services.

The upcoming realignment will consolidate base operations and other similar support functions as well as leverage existing Army expertise in logistics, sustainment and services.

officials said.

The move is one of several ongoing management and headquarters reforms to ensure the Army is efficient and prioritizes resources to readiness and modernization -- the service's top priorities.

Last summer, the Army stood up the Army Futures Command to combine efforts on tackling modernization. The new four-star command represented the most significant Army reorganization effort since 1973.

Then in December, AFC took command of the Army Capabilities Integration Center, which was renamed the Futures and Concepts Center that is tasked to study and prepare the Army for future warfare.

Last month the Army's Research, Development and Engineering Command, came under

Futures Command. In the latest transition, IMCOM directorates will initially remain functionally aligned with their supported Army commands and Army service component commands.

AMC and IMCOM leadership will then conduct an assessment to ensure all IMCOM directorates are best aligned to effectively support senior commanders, officials said.

Realignment under one command, with continued oversight by the Army secretary, will increase advocacy within the Army for installation requirements.

"This transition establishes unity of command and effort on our installations, improves the readiness of our Soldiers and formations, and strengthens the well-being of our Soldiers, civilians, and Families," Jones said.

Raiders to host best squad competition

Soldiers from the 5th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment will host the 3rd Infantry Division's 2019 Best Scout Squad Competition at Fort Stewart, March 18–22, to determine which team will advance to represent the Marne Division during the Gainey Cup April 22 to May 3.

Lead planner for the event, 1st Lt. Bratton Benfield, said that each cavalry squadron in the division is invited to send two teams and each combined-arms battalion is invited to send one team from its scout platoons.

"The competition will include dismounted and mounted land navigation, virtual and real calls for fire, virtual and real vehicle identification, marksmanship, a written test on reconnaissance and security doctrinal knowledge and a full range of other scout-related tasks," said Benfield.

Staff Sgt. James Salvatore, squad leader in Troop A, 5-7 Cav. said he's been preparing his squad by conducting daily classroom and tactical training with a focus on recon and security missions. Physical fitness is also a crucial aspect of the competition and Salvatore and his squad have been preparing by doing challenging physical training sessions twice a day.

"We're looking forward to representing the troop, the squadron, the brigade, and hopefully the division," said Salvatore. "We want to be the best."

The chief of the Army's armor branch, Brig. Gen. David Lesperance, explained the intent behind the events in a message posted on the Gainey Cup website. "Scout squads conduct

reconnaissance and security in close proximity to enemy forces and civilian populations to provide commanders with fresh, accurate information about the terrain and the enemy," said Lesperance. "Scouts are experts in employing fires and other enablers, and can rapidly develop the situation allowing battalions and brigades to concentrate their combat power at the decisive time and place."

The Gainey Cup is held every two years at Fort Benning, and is open to all scouts serving in reconnaissance organizations in the active duty, Army National Guard and international teams.

In 2017, a team from the 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, represented 3rd ID and finished second out of 24 teams including teams from the United Kingdom, Canada and the Netherlands.

The competition is named after retired Command

Sgt. Maj. William "Joe" Gainey. Gainey, who served more than 33 years in the Army and was the first senior enlisted advisor to the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, a newly created position established to advise the chairman on matters of professional development of enlisted personnel assigned to joint billets.

Culinary kiosk makes for easy Soldier meals

The Army is rolling out programs to modernize aspects of lethality, including shooting, moving, communicating, training and sustaining. Part of that sustainment piece focuses on food operations by implementing culinary outpost kiosks at installations, starting with a pilot program at Fort Stewart.

On Feb. 4, the culinary outpost kiosk was opened to the public and marked the first attempt at modernizing garrison food operations. It featured food trucks staged in different areas throughout post and a grab-and-go kiosk similar to shoppettes.

"I think it's cool because the kiosk has things that we can get at the shoppette but with our meal cards," said Pfc. Jah-Amor Brito, a culinary specialist with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3rd Brigade Support Battalion, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division. "It is something quick so if you don't have time to sit down at the dining facility you can pick up salads, chips or whatever."

Fort Stewart is the first instillation to have kiosks due to its lack of easily accessible dining facilities within its large geographic footprint and the high operational tempo and mix of the various units, which include National Guard, reserve and various maneuver units. The Joint Culinary Center of Excellence is continuing to test the kiosks effectiveness and troubleshoot any issues thanks to the amount of diverse units using it.

"We look at the army food program and providing Soldiers with great and healthy foods," said Chief

Warrant Officer 5 Kenneth Hicks, the Army food advisor with the Sustainment Center of Excellence, Subsistence. "We're trying to look at new ways of delivering that service to a Soldier in a footprint that is convenient to them."

The JCCoE looked at practices used by civilian

industries to determine the best options for new types of dining facilities. Food trucks bring convenience by moving to different parts of the base where Soldiers can't easily access a DFAC and the kiosk gives Soldiers an option for prepackaged, healthy food to take back their barracks or work places.

"We're always in competition with industry so we looked at how they change their strategies at drawing customers in and took a page out of their book," said Hicks. "If we are going to retain our Soldiers, keep them healthy and keep them in our facilities then we need to change our ways."

Through innovative dining practices that cater to high operational tempos, new physical fitness standards and a nutritional diet that helps foster lethal and fit Soldiers, culinary outpost kiosks fuel the Army's dedication to tomorrow's modern fighting force.

Ready, set, resource!

If you saw your first sergeant hopping around in a potato sack at Winn Army Community Hospital, don't be alarmed! That was the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade's Amazing Resource Race.

Brigade leaders, along with their spouses, participated in the Amazing Resource Race on Fort Stewart, Feb. 8. The post-wide scavenger hunt raised awareness of resources available to Soldiers and their Families.

Teams consisting of first sergeants, commanders, and family readiness group members used clues to find different places across the installation. The points had representatives from programs such as Substance Use Disorder Clinical Care; the USO; the financial management and new parent support team from Army Community Service; and military police from the brigade.

"The point of the race was twofold; it was to bring our company commanders to do team building and bring the spouses who serve in dif-

ferent family readiness group capacities into the fold," said Mary Britton, the 3IDSB senior spouse advisor. "So, when Soldiers or Families have issues or questions, we can take command teams and bring them to these agencies so they can have face-to-face interaction with the people that could potentially help them down the line."

Teams were quizzed about details of the programs and played games at each station. For example, the Army Substance Abuse Program station had each member of a team wear drunk goggles and try to walk with a cup full of water. The race was a fun way for the command teams to learn the details of these programs and meet the people behind the acronyms.

"The main takeaway is the resources do in fact exist and knowing not only what it is, but having a point of contact to go to directly and know them by name and face," said Capt. Jonathan Liggitt, Headquarters and Headquarters company commander, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd IDSB. "It is building those networks of relationships."

Leaders train to retain

Staying Army isn't always easy and Soldiers want to know every option available to them so that they can continue to do what they love. "These retention NCOs are learning skills to help the Army keep its end strength," said Sgt. 1st Class Timothy Donahue, an instructor and writer with the Recruiting and Retention College at Fort Knox, Kentucky. "They're going to take the skills they learn this week to help keep the Army ready, so we have enough Soldiers to deploy when we need to."

Throughout the week, the class covered the Army's goals for retention and the NCO's role as an advisor to the commander, said Donahue. The retention NCOs learn what is available to them to give Soldiers the best options for reenlistment and understand the regulation that guides those options.

we're able to help with retaining them," said Sgt. Natashia Darden, a retention NCO with Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade. "We're giving the Army what it needs but we're also addressing what the Soldier and their families need."

"I like the class because it is not only helping me as a retention NCO, it helps with Soldiers' military careers," said Staff Sgt. Heevoung Shin, a retention NCO with 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team. "It is not only about having Soldiers sign a piece paper, it is about all the benefits that come with that decision."

Understanding regulations and benefits available to Soldiers helps retention NCOs meet the needs of the Army, the Soldiers and their Families.

Alligators always attract attention

As the weather warms up once again, many of the wetlands that Fort Stewart's alligators call home are drying up. As water holes disappear, many alligators are forced to relocate to other watery refuges. On the other hand, after a heavy rain, alligators may move to newly flooded areas in search of food. As a result, you may suddenly find an alligator in a pond, stream, or ditch that was alligator-free the day before.

Alligators are occasionally seen in the cantonment area after dark, or even in broad daylight. As winter draws to a close, water temperatures remain below 60 degrees, and alligators don't start feeding until water temperature reach about 70 degrees. But, you may to see one sunning on the bank on warm days. Alligator attacks on humans are very rare, but they do happen. The information provided in this article can help keep you, your Family and pets, safe this summer.

There are two species of alligators - the American and the Chinese. The American alligator is the larger of the two. Adult American alligator males average 10 to 15 feet in length, while females are generally less than 10 feet

long. Alligators reach sexual maturity at about 6- to 10years-old, and are usually around 6 to 7 feet in length. The largest alligator ever recorded was 19 feet 2 inches long and weighed 2,200 lbs. The American alligator, is found only in the southeastern U.S., from coastal North Carolina west to eastern Texas.

The American alligator is a wildlife management success story. Fifty years ago, alligator numbers plummeted as a result of market hunting and loss of habitat. In 1967 the alligator was listed as an endangered species. Through the combined efforts of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, state wildlife agencies across the south, and the protection offered by the Endangered Species Act, alligator populations rebounded. In 1987, the USFWS pronounced the American alligator fully recovered and removed it from the endangered species list.

The alligator now thrives throughout most of its range, and huntable populations exist in most states, including Georgia. Due to the fact that alligators are typically hunted at night, however, alligator hunting is not allowed on Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield. The American alligator is the official state reptile of three states: Florida, Louisiana, and Mississippi.

Adult alligators are apex predators. They are at the

top of the food chain. Adults have no natural predators, except man. They are critical to the biodiversity and long-term survival of wetlands. They help control the population of rodents and other animals that might otherwise overpopulate and overtax this fragile habitat. Small alligators feed on insects, amphibians, fish, snails, and other small prey. Adult alligators take larger prey including snakes, turtles and mammals like raccoons or opossums. However, they are opportunists, and an alligator will eat a wide variety of prey, including carrion, and in rare instances, humans.

There is little cause for concern on the installation, in regards to an alligator attack if a few basic guidelines.

• Never feed an alligator. Doing so not only endangers you, but also puts others at risk because it loses its fear of man. Most nuisance gators have been fed by humans.

• Don't swim in areas where alligators may be present. Swimming is prohibited in all installation ponds and rivers.

• Maintain a safe distance. Although they may appear clumsy on land, alligators can run very fast for short distances.

Panthers focus on training

Soldiers with 2nd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, finished a battalion-level training exercise this week--Panther Focus--at Fort Stewart, Feb. 8.

Panther Focus was a two-week training exercise meant to certify the battalion's ability to conduct company level maneuvers, and engage with a fictional enemy.

"[The exercise] teaches us how to maneuver on different terrain," said Spc. Deavon Delgado, a tanker with Company B, 2-69 Armor.

Tankers with 2-69 Armor had already completed gunnery training, which ensured their ability to shoot live ammunition accurately at different targets from a fixed position.

"It differs from gunnery by providing a combat reference; how to stay in cover and move when you need to," Delgado added. Tankers were not the only Panther Soldier's putting their skills to the test. While tankers were training on maneuvering in combat situations, medics were simulating taking casualties that might occur on that same battlefield.

The medics trained on nine-line radio calls, and how to evacuate casualties with aviation platoons from 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd ID.

"This is the first time we've incorporated track-to-bird medevac or hoist training," said 1st Lt. Patrick McHale, platoon leader and medical operations officer, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2-69 Armor.

McHale continued, the hoist exercise validated the medic's ability to move a casualty off the battlefield via helicopter. Nine-line radio calls provided higher headquarters all the information about the status and location of a casualty to coordinate their timely evacuation.

Next for the Panther battalion is a brigade-level training exercise, followed by a rotation at the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, California, this spring.

Ammo wrongly put in dumpster, evacuates recycling center

Two unexploded rounds of ammunition forced the evacuation of Fort Stewart's recycling center Jan. 25.

The ammunition was improperly disposed of in a recycling container on the installation and not discovered until arriving at the recycling center.

Processing center staff receive annual unexploded ordnance training and were therefore able to instantly recognize the danger. They took immediate action by calling 911 and having emergency personnel—including the installation's explosive ordnance disposal team—respond to the incident.

"We're thankful our processing center staff recognized the unexploded ordnance and took immediate action," said Tom Fry, Directorate of Public Works environmental division chief. "They avoided a potentially disastrous situation by reacting appropriately."

The Fort Stewart EOD team disposed of the two pieces of ammunition without further incident. The danger, however, is that no one would think to check the recycling containers for unexploded ordnance. That's because unused ammunition should be properly turned in, said Fry.

"All unit ammunition handling personnel should work with the ammunition supply point (ASP) to ensure that proper handling and turn-in procedures are followed for all ammunition," he said.

There are ways to dispose of ammunition properly that is found, misplaced, stolen, or incorrectly left in the possession of a unit following ammunition turn-in, Fry added.

"According to the ASP's standard operating procedure, 'the returns can be made without fear of prosecution. Therefore, amnesty turn-ins will not be the basis for initiation of an investigation of individuals making the turn-in,'" he said. "You can turn in ammunition with no questions asked."

The installation's amnesty box is located in the parking lot in front of the ASP field office, building 17003, and is available for turn-ins 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It can be used by Soldiers and civilians who live and work on post.

Off post, if unexploded ordnance is found, call 911. To turn in ammunition you might have, contact your local police via the non-emergency number for assistance.

Winn ACH preps for DHA transition via collaboration of efforts

U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield's Winn Army Community Hospital hosted former Winn ACH commander, Maj. Gen. Ronald Place, who now serves as the director of U.S. Army, Defense Health Agency, National Capital Region Medical Directorate. Place, as well as command teams from Naval Hospital Beaufort, South Carolina; Naval Health Clinic Charleston; and the U.S. Air Force's 628th Medical Group toured various MEDDAC departments and clinics February 6 and 7.

The visitors came to the MEDDAC footprint as part of a week-long tour of each of the military treatment facilities in the Defense Health Agency's Low Country market. Under the fiscal year 2017 National Defense Authorization Act, Congress called for alterations in the military health system. The various command teams came together to see what each other's capabilities are.

"As we transition military medicine into the Defense Health Agency, we're going to have to work together," Place said. "So, this is really just about achieving a shared understanding."

Place explained the importance of collaboration during the DHA transformation of the military health services is to ensure improvement processes are in place from an "efficiency perspective," but more importantly an "effectiveness perspective."

"Where across the entire spectrum, whether it's care of a Soldier, care for a Marine, care of an Airman care of a Sailor [is] that we work collaboratively first to achieve excellency," said Place.

Currently the system has more than nine million beneficiaries associated with it, and a 50 plus billion dollar budget, which makes the transition complex, yet impactful for patients.

"In other words the quality of care that we give continues to be excellent or better," Place said. "That the safety elements that we have within our systems ... from a patient safety and an organizational perspective... that it stays the same or gets better. In doing all that, our staff, our uniformed staff, our civilian staff, we all understand where we're going and why we're going. So that we can be a part of the process."

Medical treatment facilities serve as the training range for the uniformed personnel,

which helps to ensure the service members are medically ready at all times. Place said the MTFs are where ready medical forces are developed, serving as a live-fire range of sorts.

"The great thing about it is we recognize that Family Member care is often part of readiness," Place said. "It's that relationship that we in military medicine have with our Families that leads to that. Similarly, much of that training that we have to do, so skill sustainments, proficiency, currency that sort of thing, for the things that we are going to do in combat don't really happen to Soldiers and Family Members. So, we have those sorts of healthcare problems that gives us the best training environment for the things that we need to do in combat."

The transition to DHA should be transparent for the staff here, and invisible to the beneficiary population. The great care beneficiaries receive today should be the same next month, and next year, Place said.

For those who may be experiencing a sense of anxiety about what a DHA future looks like, Place sought to ally those concerns.

"The DHA is us," Place said. "More than anything I want people to feel comfortable that the impact that they're worried about will likely be significantly less than what they're actually going to experience."


As a divisional post, Place said the many transformations, renovations, and additions in infrastructure to Winn makes the importance and investment of the local community to the MTF obvious.

"It's great to see that better leadership than mine has existed after I left to make this organization an even better organization then when I was here," Place said. "I look forward to coming back again and again and seeing just how extraordinary this team can work together."

Hounds of Hell prove themselves 'Always Ready'

Soldiers from the 3rd Battalion, 67th Armored Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, returned from Hound Focus intent on recovering all vehicles and equipment Jan. 30 on Fort Stewart.

The Hounds of Hell conquered their battalion force-on-force exercise and now face a speedy turnaround into a joint operations gunnery on Feb. 10.

Recovery operations are vital to a battalion's success, ensuring assets are fully mission capable.

To some recovery may seem like it's not a big deal without realizing the tremendous impact inoperable equipment has on a commander's plan and on battlefield operations, said Capt. Matt Belcher, company commander of Company A, 3- 67 Armor, 2ABCT, 3ID.

"Proper maintenance on combat platforms is the basic driving force behind any successful commander's intent. Without attention-to-detail in our maintenance procedures, a company-size element can quickly be reduced to a platoon-size element, unable to succeed in the company's original mission," said Belcher.

After returning from Hound Focus, Soldiers conducted wash rack operations to clean their equipment and allow Soldiers to more easily spot deficiencies. Maintaining cleanliness helps Soldiers detect faults that may be hidden underneath mud, dirt, or road grime.

Once vehicles are cleaned to standard, crews begin layouts. Layouts are done to ensure equipment is still present, operable, and not damaged. Layouts allow new Soldiers to train and develop their knowledge and skills on weapons, equipment, and proper preventative maintenance checks and services.

PMCS are the checks, services, and maintenance performed before, during, and



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after any type of operation or before the use of all types of equipment. Doing a PMCS check reduces the number of failures and improves effectiveness of equipment.

"When maintenance is neglected after a field exercise, equipment can be damaged, resulting in dangerous conditions putting Soldiers in harm's way and potentially costing the Army millions," said Spc. Dylan Trahan, a mechanic assigned to Co. H, 3-67 Armor.

If faults are present, Soldiers will begin procedures to correct the discovered faults, prepare the equipment for turn-in, or receive new gear if available, all in an effort to remain fully mission capable.

In the coming weeks the Hounds of Hell will be continuing its training with support from the 9th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 2ABCT, in order to maintain its efficiency and lethality in preparation for Spartan Focus.

Spartan Focus is a brigade-echelon force-on-force exercise used to train and certify platoons, companies and battalions under live-fire conditions to support the brigade's rotation to the National Training Center later this year.

Blackhawks dominate aerial gunnery

Marne Air Soldiers from 4th Battalion. 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division completed an aerial gunnery at the Townsend bombing range in Eulonia, as part of their annual certification, Feb. 6.

The bombing range is a U.S. Marine Corps-owned training area which was recently expanded in October 2017 from 5,183 to 33,834 acres.

"This training area provided a great opportunity to train in a different environment and with additional help from the air traffic controllers to give us oversight in our training," said Capt. Cody Spiker, an assistant operations officer for 4-3 Avn. "The purpose of the training is to keep UH-60 Blackhawk crewmembers proficient in their weapon systems in order to protect the aircraft."

The UH-60 Blackhawk crewmember uses a M240H machine gun which

mounts inside the Blackhawk in order to provide security during missions. This is the primary weapon system to defend the aircraft. Staff Sgt. Joshua Ramos, a standardization instructor for 4-3 Avn., provided insight on gunnery tables.

"We are conducting gunnery tables III thru VI, which consist of day and night firing iterations," said Ramos. "Gunnery table III and IV are training tables which involves standardization instructors giving active instruction telling the gunner how to properly engage a target and policing their weapon fundamentals with on the spot corrections."

Gunnery table III is used to engage short range targets while gunnery table IV is used for long-range target engagement. Gunnery table V is the practice qualification; this where the standardization instructor takes a hands-off approach by not providing on-the-spot corrections.

The gunneries are conducted in order to prepare Marne Air Dogface Soldiers

for their upcoming rotations at the Joint Readiness Training Center in Fort Polk, Louisiana, and the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, California.


"Overall, the training is going well and

the Soldiers are getting after the training by maintaining their proficiency to protect the aircraft," said Ramos. "The training area is providing good insight to better our Soldiers to fight."

• Be especially cautious with small children around pond edges. Alligators assess the suitability of potential prey based on size, and attacks on children are therefore more common than attacks on adults.

• Alligators will readily prey on dogs. Never allow your pet to swim during warm weather unless you are sure there are no alligators present.

Nuisance alligators - those considered to be large enough to pose a threat to humans, are removed from the installation's recreational lakes when warranted. The same goes for those that find their way into heavily populated areas of the installation.

If you find an alligator wandering through your yard or neighborhood, leave it alone! It is probably just looking for a new home, and will continue on its way if left undisturbed. If an alligator takes up residence in your pool or neighborhood pond, do not attempt to remove it yourself. Leave that task to experts. You can report a nuisance alligator on Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield during working hours by calling the Directorate of Public Works, Environmental Division's Fish

and Wildlife Branch at 767-2584 or 767-9040.

For emergencies involving dangerous wildlife after hours or off-post, call 911. However, it is important to remember that alligators are a natural and important part of our aquatic ecosystems, so always assume that they may be present around any body of water, and take reasonable precautions as described above. If you see one, it should always be treated with the utmost respect - maintain a safe distance, never taunt or feed an alligator, and report it.

Forward support companies sustain training

When people think of the Army, a certain picture comes to mind. The combat arms Soldiers are off in some far away land, engaging the enemy with their weapons, tanks and field artillery. While combat arms military occupational specialties are a big part of the Army, other careers are often less talked about. Specifically, the careers of Soldiers in our forward support companies.

A forward support company is comprised of Soldiers who are equally important to mission success by providing key services that keep our units running strong such as, maintaining vehicles, providing Soldiers with medical care, fuel for vehicles, and distribution of ammunition.

To make sure the Spartan brigade is ready for their rotation to the National Training Center in May, all 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team's FSCs came together under the 703rd Brigade Support Battalion to conduct a sustainment field training exercise starting Feb. 4 on Fort Stewart.

During a sustainment FTX, the training focuses on vital tasks that allow the FSCs to be self-sufficient while forward deployed. These tasks are area defense, movement to contact, support in an attack, and area security.

While FSC Soldiers train with these objectives in mind, they also perform their primary military occupational specialty.

One component of support is maintenance. Maintenance works along-side ammunition Soldiers, medical specialists and ammunition supply to support the unit mission.

"Every support MOS (military occupational specialty) has its role in maintaining the fleet," said Staff Sgt. Cole Wenzel, a tank mechanic assigned to Company B, 703rd BSB, 2nd ABCT. "Our focus is to maintain and operate vehicles, including the M88A2 and provide security. We have to work with other support MOSs to be able to fix the equipment and complete our mission as maintainers to support the brigade mission."

In order to complete the overall mission, another integral part of the FSC are the medics. With their support, all Soldiers have effective medical care and are trained on how to prevent serious injury while in the field.

"Our main objective is to train to enhance our capabilities to provide medical care, and see how we align with the other battalions within the brigade," said 1st Sgt. Tyrone Thompson, a medic assigned to Company C, 703rd BSB, 2nd ABCT. "We work to prevent various hazards to Soldiers' health and make sure there are no serious injuries. By supporting the warfighters within 2 ABCT with medical care, it allows for other Soldiers to complete their mission."

Ammunition specialists are responsible for the management of ordnance (ammunition and explosives). They are tasked with receiving, storing and issuing conventional ammunition, guided missiles, large rockets, explosives and other ammunition and explosive related items. Without the support of these Soldiers, combat troops would lack the means necessary to defeat the enemy.

"Our job is to issue, turn in and take ammo accountability," said Staff Sgt Leroy Newsome, an ammo specialist assigned to Company A, 703rd BSB, 2nd ABCT. "We work with all the other MOSs and if you don't have ammo, you can't fire any weapons. But everything has to interchange and if you don't have all the FSC MOSs working together, the brigade can't complete its' mission. We are all necessary."

All Soldiers must work together as a team to accomplish the mission. The more field training exercises they complete, the better they become at their individual pieces to the overarching mission, the more the entire Spartan team will benefit.
