# Fort Stewart launches new food truck, kiosk

Hungry? Why wait? Fort Stewart will launch a new Army food truck and kiosk program to strengthen the variety of dining options for Soldiers at Fort Stewart.

Fort Stewart is improving food programs, making food more accessible to Soldiers.

The food truck travels to multiple locations providing breakfast and lunch to Soldiers during their break hours.

It serves the barracks areas, in processing center and motor pools.

Food trucks are part of a larger modern feeding and campaign to improve the garrison feeding operations. The goal is to provide Soldiers with convenient and healthy meal options.

"Food here is more affordable and accessible than the shoppette. Come to the kiosk or you can wait for the food truck to come to you," said Spc. Oscar

Ayala Culinary Specialist for 1st Battalion, 41st Field Artillery Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division. "I can't wait to serve troops at the revamped food truck and kiosk."

The outpost kiosk is a Soldier-operated program that extends the garrison dining facilities to where Soldiers work and live. The new kiosk will be located at the dining facility administration center in building 207, across from the Marne Reception Center.

"Troops can use their meal card three times a day at the kiosk and we're opening it up to the community," said," Spc. David Armstrong, culinary specialist with Headquarters Company, 3rd Brigade Support Battalion, 1ABCT, 3rd ID. "Even married or single Soldiers who receive basic allowance for substance are allowed to shop here."

# Raiders field JLTV at Stewart

The first 1st Armored (Raider) Brigade Combat Team Joint Light Tactical Vehicles began arriving on Fort Stewart two weeks ago and the first six trucks were delivered to their respective battalions Jan. 28.

"This program has been working towards fielding trucks to Soldiers for ten years," said Col. Shane Fullmer, project manager for the Joint Light Tactical Vehicles program office. "The entire program office has been focused on getting Soldiers improved tactical mobility, with better off-road, better cross-country, higher reliability, more comfort inside the vehicle, and significantly higher protection."

Even before the first of the brigade's trucks arrived, Raider Soldiers have been learning how to take care of and drive the Army's newest vehicle during field level maintenance and operator's new equipment training.

Sgt. Brian Wise, from Company B, 1st Battalion, 41st Field Artillery, was one of the first Soldiers in the brigade to go through the operator training and said he enjoys the new features and capabilities of the JLTV and is looking forward to training the rest of his company.

"It will be different for Soldiers, it's something new and unique," said Wise. "I see us getting stuck in the mud way less than we usually do."

The JLTV program is a U.S. Army-led, joint modernization program to replace many existing HMMWVs. The JLTV family of vehicles is designed to provide a leap ahead in protection, payload, and per-

formance to meet the warfighters needs.

Sgt. 1st Class Randall Archie, the JLTV fielding lead for the 10th Engineer Battalion, said he especially likes being able to adjust the vehicle ride height on the move to adapt to different terrain and the numerous comfort features that make it easier for operators to focus on doing their job.

"There is a ton of leg room and head room and it's easier to get in and out of the vehicle," said Archie. "You also don't have to lean forward in the

seat when you wear a CamelBak since the seat is designed with a spot cut out for it."

A team from Oshkosh Defense has been working with Raider Brigade Soldiers harvesting communication equipment from turn-in vehicles and installing them into the ILTVs. The first six to complete the process were signed over to battalion representatives after the final inventories and paperwork were completed.

While the fielding will continue through spring, Fullmer said that seeing the first JLTV in the unit's hand was a significant moment that his team has been working towards for quite a while.

"We're just so glad we're finally going to have these in the hands of Soldiers so we can improve some of their ability to do their job."

The Director of Emergency Services Physical Security Chief Donnie Daughtery said the exercise was held to test the ability to help mitigate a threat in case there ever was a real incident and to confirm the coordination between the installation's Logistics Readiness Center, the Directorate of Public Works, and DES.

Testing portions of the installations security plan is only part of the effort to remain ready for contingencies. Community members are also encouraged to keep an eye out.

Once they get that initial alert, the unit has a small window of time to have everything ready. 24th FMSU is part of the global response force that gives support to civilians, contractors or other U.S. service members in an emergency situation domestic or abroad.

"The purpose of the exercise was to get a realistic view of what it would be like if we were to deploy," said Staff Sgt. Bianca Rodriguez, a dispersing agent with 24th FMSU, STB, 3IDSB. "We are currently on a GRF mission, so out of nowhere we could get that call at 4 o'clock in the morning to deploy."

Over three days, Soldiers gathered their bags, went through SRP to receive immunizations, drew weapons and boarded a CH-47 Chinook on the final day to 'deploy' to a field site on Fort Stewart. Their EDRE was complete once they deployed, but Liggitt saw an opportunity for the Soldiers to train in their core functions as a Financial Management Support Team.

"The end goal was to make sure we hit all of our EDRE III tasks, make sure that we get out to the field," said Liggitt. "In addition to that, we added one of our mission essential task list tasks: perform dispersing operations. I figured if we were going to go out to the field, we might as well do some training exercises."

They set up a financial management training platform, the 'bank,' the headquarters for pay operations in an austere environment, and distributed notional funds to teams of cashiers. Those cashiers, or 'bank tellers,' then went out and set up financial management support teams and performed manual dispersing operations.

"We usually have our main forward operating base

and our FMSTs go out to do dispersing, that's how we would do it on deployment," said Rodriguez. "The FMST will do dispersing, or do exchange transactions with Eagle Cash cards. They'll take money off the card, cash checks, manage saving programs or fix pay on FOBs."

By adding on pay operation training to the rapid deployment exercise, the 24th FMSU Soldiers have a better understanding of what to expect during a GRF mission or going downrange and this gave Liggitt the chance to see any short falls that could be corrected.

The Super Bowl is Sunday. Many sport fans plan on traveling to see the game, if not to Atlanta, than to either friends or families to celebrate with a traditional tailgate party to kick things off.

Whether you plan on dressing in your favorite team's colors or dying your hair, don't forget to make safety part of the event. When cooking hotdogs, chili, hamburgers and chicken, remember to cook them to the right temperature. Before cooking, keep perishable food cold. This an important part of avoiding food-borne illness.

When you transport raw meat and poultry and other perishable foods, store them in a cooler with ice or frozen gel packs.

During the party, keep cold foods (like potato salad, guacamole, or cut fruit and veggies) cold by nesting serving dishes in beds of ice.

After the tailgate party, before heading to the game, ensure the leftovers stay fresh. Pack them in clean containers and place them in a cooler with ice.

Some resources you'll want to keep handy include paper towels, moist towelette or hand sanitizer, multiple coolers to separate food and beverages; ice, frozen gel packs, multiple sets of cooking utensils, paper plates and disposable silverware, a food thermometer and clean containers for leftovers.

## Thousands apply for Army esports

**FORT MEADE, Maryland.** -- Over 6,500 Soldiers are already hoping to be part of a new Army esports team that will compete in video game tournaments nationwide in an effort to attract potential recruits.

"It's essentially connecting America to its Army through the passion of the gaming community," said Sgt. 1st Class Christopher Jones, NCO-in-charge of the budding team.

About 30 Soldiers are expected to be picked for the team and some of the first positions could be filled this summer. Only active-duty and Reserve Soldiers are currently allowed

Those chosen will be assigned to the Marketing and Engagement Brigade for three years at Fort Knox, Kentucky, where the Army Recruiting Command is headquartered.

While they will not become recruiters, team members will receive a crash course on Army enlistment programs to answer questions from those interested in learning about the ser-

Once built up, the team will fall under an outreach company that will also include an Army rock band and a functional fitness team.

Not everyone on the team will compete. Those who will may train up to six hours per day on video games, Jones said, adding that gameplay sessions would be live streamed or recorded for spectators to watch.

While on the team, Soldiers will still conduct physical training, weapons qualifications and other responsibilities that come with being a Soldier. They will also have to maintain certifications in their military occupational specialty.

# Preparing to go live on the range

The videos often seen as "cool" when pertaining to the military are usually the ones with big guns, huge explosions and lots of action. Before all the "cool" stuff happens though, there are factors behind the scenes that aren't normally talked about. There are multiple stages of preparations to be made before a Battalion is even allowed to fire one round.

Headquarters Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, held a mortar live-fire exercise at Fort Stewart Jan. 22-26.

Mortars are suppressive indirect fire weapons. They can be employed to neutralize, suppress, or destroy area or point targets, screen large areas with smoke, and provide illumination or coordinated high explosive/illumination. The mortar platoon's mission is to provide close and immediate indirect fire support to all maneuver units on the battlefield. That means a good size explosion at the target site. First though, they had to prepare.

In preparation for a live fire, the unit leader ensures his Soldiers are proficient in individual weapons knowledge, qualification, range determination and target identification. Soldiers must also know the basics of fire control measures and movement techniques.

Once all Soldiers have proficient knowledge in all the objectives, they move out to their predetermined range. While engaged in the exercise, training should be executed as if the unit were going to

war. Movement, ammunition, distribution, sleep/rest plans, and feeding plans should all be conducted tactically.

In this exercise, 3-15 Inf. had a support battalion assist them with the movement and distribution of ammunition.

"The distro platoon helps get the ammo to the range and helps out the battalion who is firing by setting up ammo points and the security barrier," said 1st Lt. Larry Penrod, a distribution Soldier from Co. H, 3rd Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment, 2nd ABCT. "We also make sure the ammo is signed for by the right person."

While the ammo points are completed, Soldiers set up the fire direction center and ensure that radio checks with forward observers are completed and communications are established.

"Before anything else happens, we have to set up the communications between all the track vehicles and the fire direction center," said Spc. Rayquan Rodgers, an infantryman from HHC, 3-15, 2ABCT. "The fire direction center tells us where and when to fire."

After communications are set to go, crews must use the bore sight to calculate where their target is and make any adjustments before firing. Boresighting is a vital measure to enhance accuracy that be conducted. Procedures include manual and digital boresighting, depending on the equipment assigned.

Once all the mission objectives are prepped, the unit does a dry run concentrating on maneuver, communications, command and control, and safety. Then the live firing can begin.

# Using simulators to increase battlefield lethality

Technology can be used in many ways. The Army has begun to use advances in technology to train Soldiers.

Part of the new technology it uses is the Engagement Skills Trainer. According to the U.S. Army Acquistion Support Center, the EST simulates weapons training events that lead to live-fire qualifications for individual or crew-served weapons. The second iteration of this training, or EST II, started prototype evaluation in 2016.

The military is continually testing and improving upon this technology.

The EST provides weapons training in a controlled environment that reduces range and live-fire fees and provides the Soldier with more trigger time.

Units use EST to improve and excel at marksmanship skills.

Soldiers from the 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, conducted training using the EST II Ian, 23 at Fort Stewart. By using these weapon simulators, Soldiers gain more time training on their weapons. That produces a more prepared and efficient Soldier on live fire ranges and the battlefield.

"The more time Soldiers have behind a weapon, the more effective they will be when it comes time for war," said 3-15 Inf. executive officer, 1st Lt. Alexander Sargeant. "Whether it be dime drills on the EST, or actual live fire, the more repetitions, the more effective that Soldier will be. The EST allows Soldiers and leaders to get training without the strains of worrying about range resources."

Sgt. Phillip Palmieri, Bradley fighting vehicle gunner from Company B, 3-15 Inf. also believes simulators help prepare their crews for real combat situations.

"Simulation training definitely helps crews become more proficient with their platform," Palmieri said. "The simulators help give crews a near real experience, which allows them to become more comfortable. It helps them to react to various situations calmly and efficiently."

Spc. Jason Morse, a Bradley fighting vehicle systems maintainer, is 20 years old. He grew up playing video

games that simulate combat situations. He attributes his success with weapons marksmanship to seeing the same types of visualization in video games as he does during EST.

"I believe that playing video games that use weapon simulators such as Call of Duty, Modern Warfare, etc., gave me a firm understanding of handling different weapons that the Army uses today," Morse said. "In my perspective, video games and EST helps people understand the fundamentals of marksmanship before even handling a real weapon."

The use of simulators have been shown to improve weapons training in the military.

According to "Changing the Army's Weapon Training Strategies to Meet Operational Requirements More Efficiently and Effectively," a study by the RAND Corp., "simulators can allow problem shooters and crews to be identified early and receive focused training. They can also support engagement skill sustainment. As a result, fewer Soldiers and crews would need to re-fire to qualify and higher overall live-fire performance could be achieved. Finally, simulators have the potential to replace some live-fire training."

# Marne tax centers open for business

Designed to help Soldiers, retirees and eligible Family members save money in legal fees, the 2019 Marne Tax center opened its doors Jan. 22.

The Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield garrison commander, Col. Jason Wolter, was on-hand to help cut the ribbon to the new Marne Tax Center with the support of the garrison senior enlisted leader, Command Sgt. Maj. Rebecca Myers; the installation Staff Judge Advocate, Col. Steve Ranieri; and the tax center's Janthan Gibson, Capt. Laura Hernandez and Master Sgt. Vernell Davis.

Wolter said the tax center staff should be proud of the service they provide, noting the Fort Stewart site alone helped provide nearly 2,000 clients with about \$5 million in refunds and saving about \$6,000 in preparation fees.

He said this year he expected an even greater return on investment as the center now offers kiosks and an education component.

"It's all about taking care of Soldiers and their Families," Wolter said. He said if you look across the community, financial readiness is paramount to individual and Family readiness and resiliency.

Hunter Army Airfield garrison commander Lt. Col. Ken Dwyer said at the Hunter ribbon cutting Jan. 22 that the Hunter tax center showed similar results in 2018. "Last year, the Hunter tax center processed 1,000 returns for the Hunter Army Airfield military community, saving its customers \$300,000 in tax-filing fees," Dwyer said. "That is an amazing service to our community."

Capt. Laura Hernandez, Marne tax center officer-incharge, confirmed the tax centers combined serviced more than 2,800 clients with nearly 2,700 refunds totaling nearly \$8 million. She noted the cost avoidance for tax preparation fees was nearly \$865,000.

She reminded community members the Marne tax centers offers free tax preparation services available if you are an active-duty service member, are retired from active duty or if you are a dependent of an active-duty service member or a retiree.

In addition, she said education services are available. "(We offer) tax education classes at the unit level to further assist Soldiers in preparing their own taxes," she said. "Classes are available to (family readiness groups) and other unit sponsored groups as well."

The Marne tax center on Hunter is located in building 1211 in the Hunter Army Airfield legal assistance office. The Fort Stewart center is in the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team classroom on the corner of Wilson Avenue and West 15th Street – next to the Caro Fitness Center. Hours of operation at both locations are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Wednesday; 1 to 6 p.m. Thursday; and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. each Friday.

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### Chaplain's Corner: Character and Heart

The scriptures contain many lessons for leadership, both positive and negative. For example, a contrast between the first two kings of the united tribes of Israel offers a fascinating study.

Quite honestly, I find very several elements in the comparison difficult to explain. Why, for example, does God strip the kingdom away from Saul as punishment for conducting an unauthorized worship service, while David can sleep with a Soldier's wife and subsequently have him murdered, yet God leaves his dynasty intact? At first glance, God seems to have a very bizarre perspective on the relative seriousness of different sins.

Upon closer study, however, I think we learn something about God's perspective which might provide a timeless lesson for leaders. It starts with the contrast between the respective callings of Saul and

David. Saul is selected King in large part because of his outward impressive image. We are told that he is head and shoulders taller and better looking than everyone else. He's the perfect guy to become the face of the new confederacy. When we are first introduced to David, on the other hand, it seems that his own father has almost forgotten he was part of the family. Samuel the prophet is likewise much more impressed by David's older brother, but God reminds him, "Do not look at his appearance or at his physical stature. For the Lord does not see as man sees; for man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart."

The lesson the scriptures would teach us in comparing Saul to David is that what is inside matters much more than what is outside. Though David's sin does indeed seem many times worse than Saul's, when confronted with the fact, David humbly repents. Saul makes excuses. Another great contrast between the

two men is seen in their reverence for that which is sacred. Saul is willing to compromise in order to suit his own needs. David's respect for that which God has deemed holy remains unshakable. Saul possessed the appearance of a leader, but David had the character of a leader.

General Norman Schwarzkopf once said, "Leadership is a potent combination of strategy and character. But if you must be without one, be without the strategy." I have no idea what Schwarzkopf's faith perspective was, but on this topic he certainly is agreement with God. Throughout the remainder of the Bible, David is known as the man after God's own heart. Though it is much harder for us to see a person's heart than it is for God, we would do well to emphasize its importance in comparison to all other qualities of leadership. Character is always the most important thing. The inside matters more than the

January is Glaucoma Awareness Month, but half of people with glaucoma don't know they have it. Get a healthy start this year by learning about glaucoma and taking steps to reduce your risk of vision loss. According to the Centers for Disease Control, it is of utmost importance to know the facts, risk, and to take action to guard your vision health.

Know the Facts: Glaucoma is a group of diseases that damage the eye's optic nerve and can result in vision loss and even blind-

ness. About three million Americans have glaucoma. It is the second leading cause of blindness worldwide. Open-angle glaucoma, the most common form, results in increased eye pressure. There are often no early symptoms, which is why 50 percent of people with glaucoma don't know they have the disease. There is no cure for glaucoma, but if it's caught early, you can preserve your vision and prevent vision loss.

Know Your Risk: Anyone can get glaucoma, but certain groups are at higher risk including African Americans over age 40. African Americans are six to eight times more likely to get glaucoma than whites.

Persons over the age of 60 are also at risk. Individuals with a family history of glaucoma are at risk, too. In addition, people with diabetes are two times more likely to get glaucoma than people without diabe-

**Take Action:** If you are in a high-risk group, get a comprehensive dilated eye exam. Try to identify the issue and start treatment early. Prescription eye drops can stop glaucoma from progressing. Even if you are not in a high-risk group, getting a comprehensive dilated eye exam by the age of 40 can help catch glaucoma and other eye diseases early. Maintaining a healthy weight, controlling your blood pressure, being physically active and avoiding smoking will help you avoid vision loss from glaucoma. These healthy behaviors will also help prevent Type 2 diabetes and other chronic conditions.

This year, take steps towards protecting your eyes and the vision health of your loved ones by learning about glaucoma and other eye diseases. Make plans today to see your eye care specialist. # Marne Air Soldiers get back-to-basics

Marne Air Soldiers from 4th Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, engaged in basic soldier fundamental skills at Fort Stewart Jan. 24 as part of their preparation for the Joint Readiness Training Center.

The JRTC at Fort Polk, Louisiana, provides realistic combat training that helps prepare Soldiers for operations around the world

"The Soldiers took part in convoy operations, established a fighting position, defended a forward operating base, and chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear response," said Pfc. Cameron Bogle, a CBRN specialist for Co. E, 4-3 Avn. "The Soldiers were trained on masking procedures and how to properly put on the Joint Service Lightweight Integrated Suit Technology."

The JSLIST is a common chemical protective clothing ensemble including a lightweight chemical and biological protective garment, multi-purpose over-boots and gloves.

Along with the JSLIST, Soldiers are assigned a protective mask with hood and carrier, a canteen with an M1 canteen cap, M291 skin decontamination kit, M295 decontamination kit, M8 detector paper, and applicable technical mannals

"The Soldiers were taught various ways to decontaminate and how to use their equipment in order to identify if an object or space has been contaminated." said Bogle. "Using the radiological detection system, Soldiers were able to identify and classify threats."

The radiological detection system and a joint personal detector are used to detect radiological contaminants. Soldiers were tested on their knowledge with a simulated chemical attack and reacted to their chemical/biological situation.

"We were attacked with gas and ensured that everybody knew the proper procedures for how to react and reporting it up to the battalion tactical operation center," said Capt. William "Bill" Webb, commander for Co. E, 4-3 Avn. "JRTC prepares the Soldiers prior to deploying. We could not do training like this enough. The more repetitions we get and the more opportunities to train in a tough environment is great."

Marne Air Soldiers continue to train to ensure they maintain unit readiness no matter the situation. Marne Air Soldiers will leave to JRTC in the near future.
