1st Lt. Garlin Conner earns MoH

WASHINGTON -- After more than 70 years, the late Garlin Conner, Kentucky farmer and World War II veteran, was finally awarded the medal that escaped him for so long.

President Donald Trump presented the Medal of Honor to Conner's widow, Pauline, in a White House Ceremony Tuesday, for acts of bravery during WWII. direct American artillery rounds. The first lieutenant's actions saved dozens of American lives in the Third Infantry Division, the president said.

Trump detailed Conner's bravery to family and friends in attendance, many of whom didn't know the extent of Conner's valor until after his death in 1998. Conner served in 10 campaigns while spending 28 months on the front lines.

"Lt. Garlin Murl Conner was indeed a giant," Trump said to an audience that included Conner's family and two other Medal of Honor recipients. "In his daring, his devotion, and his duty, he was larger than life. And that, he was. He will never, ever be forgotten. We will never forget his story."

Trump recalled the morning of Jan. 24, 1945, when Conner ran alone toward an attacking battalion of 600 German soldiers and six towering Panzer tanks in the frigid cold to

Pauline Conner, an 89-year old resident of Clinton County, Kentucky, cared for her husband in the later stages of his life, when he suffered from Parkinson's disease, diabetes and kidney failure. She also participated in the 22-year campaign that resulted in his service being recognized with the Medal of Honor.

"She hoped and prayed she would live to see this day," Trump said. "Pauline is truly a wonderful, incredible person. And it's my privilege to be with you today as we award your late husband our nation's highest military honor."

Sustainment Brigade returns

More than 200 Soldiers from Headquarters, Headquarters Company, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade returned home July 3 to Fort Stewart following a nine-month tour to Afghanistan.

The Soldiers led the 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade, overseeing all logistics operations in support of U.S. Afghan and Coalition Forces in Afghanistan. In addition to the 3rd ID, the RSSB comprised civilians, Army Reserve units, National Guard units, and active duty units from the 4th Infantry Division and 10th Mountain Division.

The 3rd ID RSSB supported 54,000 personnel spread across 24 installations throughout Afghanistan. They moved more than \$100 million worth of rations, on average issued out 2,500 gallons of fuel daily, managed more than 630 million rounds of ammunition, and oversaw the movement of more than 80 million pounds of cargo via airlift and ground transportation.

In addition to the supply operations of moving food, fuel, ammunition and other supplies throughout Afghanistan, RSSB units served as customs agents, delivered all mail within the country, trained the Afghan National Defense Forces, and assisted in security operations, among many other missions.

The 3rd ID Sustainment Brigade hosted a homecoming and uncasing of colors ceremony on Fort Stewart's Cottrell Field, Tuesday.

IMCOM welcomes two leaders

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-FORT SAM HOUSTON, Texas --U.S. Army Installation Management Command has two new Senior Executive Service leaders within its headquarters staff at Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston.

J. Randall Robinson and Delia Adams will fill new positions within the IMCOM headquarters staff, which will help drive enterprise strategies and operations that enable the command to support Army readiness initiatives and priorities into the future.

Robinson will serve as the executive deputy to the commanding general, while Adams will serve as the command's senior contracting executive.

Robinson has previously held positions within the installation management community at the installation level such as garrison plans and operations officer and deputy garrison commander provided opportunity to understand how IMCOM directly contributes to mission readiness. From there, Robinson served as an IMCOM region director and later as the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations, Energy and Environment.

At a recent ceremony at the Fort Sam Houston Theater to welcome the two new SES leaders, Lt. Gen. Kenneth Dahl, IMCOM commanding general, said Robinson's experience with the tactical, operational and strategic workings of installation management will help the executive deputy improve how IMCOM serves the Army.

"We're asking the executive deputy to strengthen and build those necessary relationships at the strategic level - at Headquarters Department of the Army," Dahl said. "It's also strengthening relationships laterally with the other service providers at the installation level. The third piece is strengthening relationships with the commands we support -- the warfighters."

As IMCOM's senior civilian, part of Robinson's job is helping the command's more than 50,000

civilian employees grow professionally to better serve at Army installations all over the world. Robinson said his passion for professional development and service to the Army is stressed at his Monday morning staff meetings.

"I say, there are five days left in the week to improve the lives of Soldiers and their family members, and I ask them to look in the mirror and say, today I'm going to do my best," Robinson said.

As IMCOM's senior contracting executive, Adams is responsible for an annual \$4.5 billion portfolio of appropriated and non-appropriated contracts and procurements.

Dahl said the first two job announcements for IMCOM's senior contracting executive yielded unfavorable results.

"I started asking the other senior people in this business why no one wanted to come to San Antonio and they said that talent doesn't exist, you're looking for a unicorn!"

Adams' resume displays the procurement and acquisition experience needed for the position, from execution to policy level positions.

Adams began her contracting career with the Air Force as a vice presidential intern. She later transitioned to advising procurement and contracting policy through private industry for the state government of Pohnpei in Micronesia.

Adams went on to gain greater insight of the Army's needs as contracting officer for U.S. Army Europe, where she would deploy to the Balkans as an emergency essential civilian.

Adams' assignment as a senior procurement analyst gave her experience with acquisition policy at the Office of the Secretary of Defense level. Most recently, Adams served as the director of Service Area Office West for the Veterans Health Administration.

Adams says she looks forward to working with IMCOM and its mission partners in developing the command's contract acquisition strategy, but she will have to add a new hobby to her resume.

"I'm going to have to start collecting unicorns now; I like that analogy," Adams said. LT. COL. KENNETH M. DWYER

Georgia's hands-free law

Effective this past July 1, Georgia's new distracted driver law came into effect. In accordance to the law a driver may not physically hold or support a wireless telecommunications device or stand-alone computer with any part of their body. Exceptions include but may not be limited to earpieces, headphones, smart watches. A driver may not write, send, or read any text-based communication. Exceptions include but may not be limited to voice-based communication automatically converted to written message, navigation and GPS. Drivers may not watch a video with exception to navigation devices. Drivers may not record a video with exception to continuous recording and broadcasting dash cams. Some exceptions are when reporting a traffic accident, medical emergency, fire, crime, or hazardous road condition. This is specifically for employee or contractor of utility service provider acting within the scope of their employment while responding to a utility emergency; or by a first responder (police, fire, and emergency medical services) during the performance of their official duties. Finally when a vehicle is lawfully parked. Please do not get caught doing any of these illegal activities on or offpost. These risks put your life and others lives' in danger as well as come with the potential of making you surrender a monetary fine or loss of your ability to drive on the installation. Summer safety Water safety - To prevent drowning, avoid alcohol when swimming or boating. Wear a lifejacket whenever you are on a boat. Make sure young children are supervised at all times when near the beach, on a boat, or by a pool or hot tub. Don't swim alone or in bad weather. Learn to swim and teach your children to swim. We also recommend that you learn CPR in case of an emergency.

Sun safety - Protect against sunburn and heat stroke. Wear sunscreen with at least a sun protection factor 15 or higher and apply it generously throughout the day. Wear a hat outdoors and a good pair of sunglasses to protect your eyes. Drink plenty of water, especially when in the sun or if you are sweating heavily. If you feel faint or nauseous, get into a cool place immediately.

Travel safety - Do not drink and drive or travel with anyone who has been drinking. Take along a first aid kit to help you be prepared for common emergencies. Wear your seatbelt at all times. Make sure your vehicle has been properly serviced and is in good working shape before a long road trip. Familiarize yourself with your surroundings if you are in an unfamiliar place and know where the nearest emergency room is. Also, avoid talking or texting on a cell phone while driving.

batting practice is a real difference maker."




